**Afternoon Session.**

The Synod met at 2 P.M.

His LORDSHIP then delivered the following Address to the Synod :

MY DEAR BRETHERN—

I am glad to meet you to take counsel together regarding the affairs of the Diocese after the long interval of two years. This delay in calling the Synod together happened thus : I wrote from London to the Secretary requesting him to summon the Synod for the 3rd of December. On returning home I found that that day had been appointed as the Day of General Thanksgiving, and it would be unseemly if the Church of England Clergy should ignore the proclamation by meeting in Synod instead of holding Divine Service in their churches on Thanksgiving Day. I, therefore, prorogued the Synod for six months, intending to call you together the first week of the present month, but the occurrence of the Local Elections throughout the Province in the first week, and the sitting of the Law Courts in the second week, have obliged me to select this rather late period for our Session.

Since we last met in Synod the second Conference of the Bishops in Lambeth Palace took place in July last. One hundred Bishops of the Anglican Communion assembled to confer on the state of the Church throughout the world, and to set in order such things as were wanting. The late Bishop Selwyn called the first Lambeth Conference, consisting of seventy-six Bishops, the greatest event in the Church's history since the Reformation, and had he lived to see the development which was so marked in the second Conference, he would have seen ample reason to justify his assertion. The first Lambeth Conference was viewed by the Church and public, I will not say with disfavor, but at all events with suspicion. The tone of the press in England was sneaking and fault-finding. The second Conference has met with a kindlier reception. The press was congratulatory, and spoke of the reports adopted by the Conference with approbation. The growth of the Anglican Church was brought before the people in England in a manner that could not but impress them with the belief that the consolidation of such a vast Communion was necessary, so that a mutual understanding between the various branches of it was essential to the maintenance of unity. I do not intend to take up your time with a detailed account of the proceedings of the Conference,

REPORT ON THE

"In considering

as the resolutions have been embodied in a letter from the Bishops, including the reports adopted by the Conference, and can be procured at a trifling cost ; but there are one or two subjects to which I would invite attention, as they have proved of late years material for much discussion. Let me, however, first say something regarding objections which have been made to the Conference, or to the binding character of its utterances. First, it has been said that a mistake had been committed in not permitting reporters for the public press to be present and thus give to the world the debates in full. But it was, in my opinion, rightly thought, that full freedom of expression of opinion was more likely to be secured by the mode adopted, and the publication of the full text of the discussion was the less necessary, because, as it providentially happened, all the reports were adopted by unanimous votes. Another objection urged was that the Conference not having any legislative power to enforce its resolutions it was scarcely worth while to convene so many Bishops, even from the uttermost parts of the earth. But the reply is, that it will be impossible to ignore the solemn utterances of one hundred bishops, especially when those utterances were put forward unanimously. The great Councils of primitive antiquity had not legal powers, yet to the undisputed General Councils the Anglican Church has always expressed its willingness to defer. The resolutions of the Conference are put forth to the Church on their purity. Their authority will depend on their acceptance, either at once or gradually, by the Church. How small seems the area of Christianity represented by the Fathers of Nicea compared with that represented by the hundred Bishops assembled at Lambeth. It does therefore, seem to me that the resolutions of the Bishops, arrived at under the deepest sense of moral responsibility, must have their due weight, and that the legislation of our Provincial Synod and General Conventions throughout the world, if not in exact accordance with these Resolutions, will certainly not be in opposition to them. All the resolutions (several of which do not concern the Canadian Church) are prefaced by the following letter from the Conference :—

*To the Faithful in Christ Jesus.*

GREETING :—We, Archbishops, Bishops Metropolitan, and other Bishops of the Holy Catholic Church, in full communion with the Church of England, one hundred in number, all exercising superintendence over Dioceses, or lawfully commissioned to exercise Episcopal functions therein, assembled, many of us from the most distant parts of the earth, at Lambeth Palace, in the year of our Lord, 1878, under the presidency of the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell, by Divine Providence Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of all England ; after receiving, in the Private Chapel of the said Palace, the blessed Sacrament of the Lord's body and blood, and after having united in prayer for the guidance of the Holy Spirit, have taken into our consideration various definite questions submitted to us affecting the condition of the Church in divers parts of the world.

We have made these questions the subject of serious deliberation for many days, and we now commend to the faithful the conclusions which have been adopted.

REPORT ON THE BEST MODE OF MAINTAINING UNION AMONG THE VARIOUS CHURCHES OF THE ANGLICAN COMMUNION.

"In considering the best mode of maintaining union among the various

Churches of our Communion, the Committee, first of all, recognized, with deep thankfulness to Almighty God, the essential and evident unity which the Church of England and the Churches in visible communion with her, have always been bound together.\* United under One Divine Head in the fellowship of the One Catholic and Apostolic Church, holding the One Faith revealed in Holy Writ, defined in the Creeds, and maintained by the Primitive Church, receiving the same Canonical Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as containing all things necessary to salvation—these Churches teach the same Word of God, partake of the same divinely ordained Sacraments, through the Ministry of the same Apostolic Orders, and worship one God and Father through the same Lord Jesus Christ, by the same Holy and Divine Spirit, Who is given to those that believe, to guide them into all truth.

"Together with this unity, however, there has existed among these Churches that variety of custom, discipline and form of worship which necessarily results from the exercise by each 'particular or national Church' of its right 'to ordain, change, and abolish ceremonies or rites of the Church ordained only by man's authority, so that all things be done to edifying.' We gladly acknowledge that there is at present no real ground for anxiety on account of this diversity, but the desire has of late been largely felt and expressed that some practical and efficient methods should be adopted, in order to guard against possible sources of disunion in the future, and at the same time further to manifest and cherish that true and substantial agreement which exists among these increasingly numerous Churches.

"The method which first naturally suggests itself is that which, originating with the inspired Apostles, long served to hold all the Churches of Christ in one undivided and visible Communion. The assembling, however, of a true General Council, such as the Church of England has always declared her readiness to resort to, is, in the present condition of Christendom, unhappily but obviously impossible. The difficulties attending the assembling of a Synod of all the Anglican Churches, though different in character and less serious in nature, seem to us, nevertheless, too great to allow of our recommending it for present adoption.

"The experiment, now twice tried, of a conference of Bishops, called together by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and meeting under his presidency, offers at least the hope that the problem, hitherto unsolved, of combining together for consultation representatives of Churches so differently situated and administered, may find, in the providential course of events, its own solution. Your committee would, on this point, venture to suggest that such Conferences, called together from time to time by the Archbishop of Canterbury, at the request of, or in consultation with, the Bishops of our Communion, might, with advantage, be invested in future with somewhat larger liberty as to the initiation and selection of subjects for discussion. For example, a committee might be constituted, such as should represent more or less completely, the several Churches of the Anglican Communion, and to this Committee it might be entrusted to draw up, after receiving communications from the Bishops, a scheme of subjects to be discussed."

The next resolution to which I shall call attention is the 6th "Of diversities in worship."

"Your Committee, believing that next to oneness 'in the faith once delivered to the saints,' Communion in worship is the link which most firmly binds together bodies of Christian men, and remembering that the Book of Common Prayer, retained as it is with some modifications, by all our Churches, has been one principal bond of union among them, desire to call attention to the fact that such Communion in worship may be endangered by excessive diversities of Ritual.

\* The Churches thus invited are the Church of England, and the Churches of India and the Colonies, the Church of Ireland, the Episcopal Church in Scotland, the Church in the United States with its Missionary Branches, and the Church in Hayti.

They believe that the internal unity of the several Churches will help greatly to the union of these, one with another. And, while they consider that such large elasticity in the forms of worship is desirable as will give wide scope to all legitimate expressions of devotional feeling, they would appeal, on the other hand, to the Apostolic precept that 'all things be done unto edifying' and to the Catholic principle, that order and obedience, even at the sacrifice of personal preferences and tastes, lie at the foundation of Christian unity, and are even essential to the successful maintenance of the faith.

"They cannot leave this subject without expressing an earnest hope that Churchmen of all views, however varying, will recognize the duty of submitting themselves, for conscience sake, in matters ritual and ceremonial, to the authoritative judgments of that particular or national Church in which by God's Providence, they may be placed; and that they will abstain from all that tends to estrangement or irritation, and will rather daily and fervently pray that the Holy Spirit may guide every member of the Church to 'think and do always such things as be rightful,' and that He may unite us all in that brotherly charity which is 'the very bond of peace and of all virtues.'"

The last resolution of the Conference was on two subjects that had given occasion of bitter controversy in our day, one on Ritual, and the other on Confession. The unanimous decision of the Conference was as follows:

"Considering unhappy disputes on questions of Ritual, whereby divers congregations in the Church of England and elsewhere, have been seriously disquieted, your Committee desire to affirm the principle that no alteration from long accustomed ritual should be made contrary to the admonition of the Bishop of the Diocese.

"Further, having in view certain novel practices and teachings on the subject of Confession, your Committee desire to affirm that in the matter of Confession the Churches of the Anglican Communion hold fast those principles which are set forth in the Holy Scriptures, which were professed by the Primitive Church and which were re-affirmed at the English Reformation; and it is their deliberate opinion that no minister of the Church is authorized to require from those who may resort to him, to open their grief, a particular or detailed enumeration of all their sins, or to require private Confession previous to receiving Holy Communion, or to enjoin or even encourage the practice of habitual Confession to a Priest, or to teach that such practice of habitual Confession, or the being subject to what has been the direction of a Priest, is a condition of attaining to the highest spiritual life. At the same time your Committee are not to be understood as desiring to limit in any way the provision made in the Book of Common Prayer for the relief of troubled consciences."

The reports conclude with the following address, signed on behalf of the Conference by the Archbishop of Canterbury:

"These are the reports of the Conference, and the practical conclusions at which we have arrived. Some of these conclusions have reference to the special circumstances of different branches of the one Church of Christ, according to peculiarities of their various Missionary work for the heathen, or their labours amongst their own people; some embody principles which apply to all branches of the Church Universal. They are all limited in their scope to those subjects which have been distinctly brought before the assembled Bishops. We invite to them the attention of the various Synods and other governing powers in the several churches, and of all the faithful in Christ Jesus throughout the world.

"We do not claim to be Lords over God's heritage, but we commend the results of this our Conference to the reason and conscience of our brethren as enlightened by the Holy Spirit of God, praying that all throughout the world who call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ may be of one mind, may be united

in one fellowship, may hold fast the faith, once delivered to the saints, and worship their one Lord in the spirit of purity and love."

## RURAL DEANS.

I have thought it expedient to divide the Archdeaconries into Rural Deaneries, four in each. The chief motive influencing me has been a desire to improve the machinery for working more effectively the Mission Fund. While I am thankful for the success that has hitherto attended the Fund, I cannot believe that the Diocese has, as yet, approached the maximum of its ability in supporting the mission work. It is quite true that there is no ground for despondency, as I am informed that the Fund for the last year, a season of unprecedented depression, was the largest the Diocese has as yet received, and that in face of attempts to create suspicion and distrust of the management of the Fund by newspaper writers and whispering detractors. The Laity of the Diocese are not likely to advance the cause of missions if they are told that grants are made capriciously and when they see by the reports that so many of the Clergy do not make collections in all their stations, and that some do not consider it a paramount duty to keep their appointment on deputations. I am induced, therefore, to try a change of system through the agency of Rural Deans. My intention is that each Rural Dean should be *ex-officio* convener of the deputation or deputations in his Rural Deanery; that he should be treasurer and be bound to transmit to the Clerical Secretary all monies received within one month after the deputations have finished their work. It will be well, also, if the Rural Deans should meet, say at the session of each Synod, and consult together as to the appointment of members of deputations, endeavouring to obtain the most efficient aid they can from every quarter. A change in this direction seems obviously demanded. When our missions and missionary stations were fewer than they are now I strove to do the duty of nominating the deputations and regulating the course of their meetings. But I found after some years' trial that the work involved so much correspondence and anxiety that I requested the Archdeacons to perform this task subject to general revision by myself. But the difficulty of satisfying members of deputations as to where they should go and with whom they should be associated in the work still remains. It may, then, be hoped that the eight Rural Deans may, by means of mutual consultation, devise some more excellent way than any heretofore tried. They will be men of experience, and, I doubt not, filled with a sense of deep responsibility which will urge them to see that everything that can be done to bring the duties of our members to the mission work prominently before their notice will be efficiently performed. The Archdeaconry of Kingston will be divided into the following Rural Deaneries:

I now express the hope that the Clergy will, by their co-operation with the Rural Deans, give effect to this attempt to systematise the mission work of the Diocese, and should my expectations be fulfilled we shall have the pleasure of adding to the number paid to the stipends of the missionaries, instead of the disagreeable duty of diminishing both.

Since the last Synod I have held three general ordinations, at which I admitted seven candidates to the Holy Order of Deacons, and six to the Holy Order of Priesthood, and at a special ordination, held in the Church of St. Mildred, Canterbury, Eng., by permission of the Archbishop, I admitted Mr. W. That the whole of section 19 of the Constitution be repealed, and that the following be substituted: "That on the first business day of the Annual Meeting of Synod a committee be elected, whose duty it shall be forthwith to nominate all the Standing Committees of Synod."

9. By Rev. R. LEWIS—

That in all cases where Commutation (or other funds) are in future invested in mortgages, all interest received above six per cent. shall, for the present, be invested as a sinking fund; to meet any losses that may arise.

10. By Rev. A. W. COOK—

That the grant of \$200 made by this Synod four years ago to the Archdeacon of Kingston be withdrawn.

## II. By Canon BEDFORD JONES—

That he will call the serious attention of the Synod to the general disregard of Canons IX., XI., XIII., XVII., and XVIII. ; that this disregard is detrimental to the well-being of the Church ; and will make a motion relative thereto.

## 12. By Rev. H. POLLARD—

That whereas it is desirable for the better provision for the ministration of the Church in the Diocese of Ontario that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries ; therefore,

*It is resolved,* That in the opinion of the Synod all contributions towards the stipends of Missionaries from the various Parishes which receive grants from the Mission Board, shall be sent to the Treasurer of the Synod, and that such Funds, together with such grants, shall be paid to the Missionary through a Committee of Synod ; also, that a Committee be appointed to draw up a Canon founded upon this resolution, or to make such alterations in existing Canons as may be necessary.

## 13. By Mr. G. A. KIRKPATRICK—

That in the opinion of this Synod it is inexpedient to grant permission to mortgage Church property.

## 14. By Canon BEDFORD JONES—

That a sum, not exceeding \$800 per annum, be paid as salary to a competent assistant for the Clerical Secretary, the said assistant to be appointed by the Executive Committee, and to be responsible to that Committee for the faithful discharge of his duties ; and that a Committee, consisting of five members of Synod, proceed at this Session to assess the various funds of the Diocese managed by the Clerical Secretary to provide the salary for the Assistant Secretary.

## APPENDIX.

(A)

### *Auditors' Report.*

We, the Auditors appointed to examine the accounts of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Synod of Ontario, for the year ending respectively the thirtieth days of April, 1878 and 1879, have the honor to report as follows:

We have examined the securities belonging to the various funds which are in the joint possession of the Treasurer and Clerical Secretary, and those in the possession of the Clerical Secretary belonging to the Clergy Trust Fund.

We found that the securities belonging to the Clergy Trust Fund which are transferable by delivery, were in the joint possession of the Treasurer and the Clerical Secretary; and that the mortgages belonging to the same Fund were in the possession of the latter.

The total amount of the permanent clergy trust securities, exclusive of interest, on the 30th day of April, 1878, was the sum of \$263,048.04, and on the 30th day of April, 1879, the sum of \$264,348.74.

We found also that the Treasurer's accounts were correct and agreed with the Bank balance, and that his payments were duly vouched by cheques.

Several of these cheques, however, were signed by the Venerable Archdeacon Parnell, as Bishop's Commissary during the absence of the Bishop in England. In this respect we conceive that the cheques were irregularly issued, as the Canon provides that in the absence of the Bishop they should be signed by the Chairman pro tem. of the Executive Committee.

We regret to have to report that we have been unable to audit the accounts of the Clerical Secretary, or to compare the securities therewith, so as to verify their correctness, as the Secretary's books have not been ready for examination, and the statements required by the Canon have not been prepared by him.

*Petition of Members of the Church in Frankford.*

*To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Ontario, the Clergy and Lay Delegates in Synod assembled:*

We, the undersigned members of the Church of England, bona fide residents of the Township of Sidney, desire most respectfully to call your attention to the fact of the Church endowment of this township being made unduly, and as we deem illegally, the subject of Synodical controversy and action from wrong and fatal impressions being widely and sedulously spread abroad concerning it by persons in an adjacent but separate municipality amongst the members of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario. And we have viewed with alarm and much anxiety the onslaughts that have been so made at the last two Synods upon the said endowment by individuals from the extra municipality of Stirling. By misrepresentations and by ignoring or blinking the real state of the case and the true questions at issue, we feel that they have so far imposed upon your honorable body as to induce a committee of it to recommend that a sum of money, invested by the Synod (\$1,000) for the endowment of the Church in the unincorporated Village of Frankford wholly in and with the Township of Sidney associated with it (and most eligibly situated for a Sidney Church Mission) should be diverted from this purpose and devoted to the erection of a parsonage in Stirling, a totally separate municipality, and said report was adopted by the Synod of 1876, and it was unwittingly led to endorse an act that would involve a violation of a sacred trust if duly carried out according to the terms of the same. And though this action was suspended by another committee appointed on the motion of the Rev. Canon Bleasdel thereon, being considered as an amendment to it, yet the report of the said committee in its first and third clauses contains similarly objectionable principles. In the former it asserts that the \$1,000 "are not charged with any trust, but are at the disposition of the Synod to be applied for such religious purposes as to the Synod may seem fit."

And at the beginning of the second clause it asserts that the recommendation of the former committee, objected to by Canon Bleasdel, is not ultra vires, whilst the third clause reads most extraordinarily inasmuch as it proposes to give half the proceeds of the endowment to a Clergyman, Rev. F. L. Stephenson, who never officiated at any time in the Parish Church of the Township of Sidney, namely, Trinity Church, Frankford, or in that village, whilst the other half only is to be given to the clergyman that does the work in it.

Against the action thus taken under the authority of the Synod (or purposed to be taken by the second report as it now stands) at the session of 1876 and 1877, we therefore most respectfully, yet firmly, protest and humbly pray that the Synod will do us justice in the premises by rescinding its action taken in the former session and contained in the seventh clause of Report K, page 14, 17 and 18, Synod Report, 1876, as this was adopted under wrong impressions derived from misrepresentations made by parties to whom allusion has been already made, and

*Report of Committee on Auditors' Report.*

TO HIS LORDSHIP THE BISHOP AND MEMBERS OF THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF ONTARIO:

The Committee appointed to consider the Auditors' Report and the manner of keeping and auditing the Synod accounts beg to report as follows;

As a reason for his failure to prepare the accounts and statements required by the Auditors in sufficient time to enable them to complete their audit for the present session of the Synod, the Clerical Secretary has stated to us that during the past two years he has had too much extra work apart from his duties as Clerical Secretary—(1) as Archdeacon—(2) in attending Missionary meetings, and (3) as Commissary to His Lordship the Bishop during his absence from the Diocese, and in consequence his work fell into arrears. He has suggested that as soon as practicable he should be relieved from the duty of keeping the books and accounts.

2. Your Committee recommend that the Constitution be so amended that the duty of receiving the monies under the control of the Synod, and keeping the books and accounts in connection therewith, shall constitute a separate office from that of Clerical Secretary.

That the person occupying this office shall be called the Financial Secretary, and shall be elected annually by vote of the Synod, who shall fix the amount of his salary.

That he shall be subject to the control of the Executive Committee; that he shall receive and deposit all monies belonging to the Synod; shall keep the books and accounts in connection therewith, and shall perform such other duties as the Synod shall from time to time prescribe.

And that the Clerical Secretaryship shall be made an honorary office.

3. Respecting the manner of keeping and auditing the Synod accounts, your Committee beg to make the following recommendation :

(1) That, with the exception of the Mission Fund, no money should be paid out from any interest fund in excess of the amount at the time of such payment at the credit of the particular account from which such payment is made.

(2) That a ledger account should be kept for all Debentures held, in the same manner as the accounts are now kept for the Mortgages.

(3) That separate accounts should be published with the Synod Report of the capital and interest monies; and a note should be made at the foot of the statements of securities held, explaining any variation in the total amount of the securities. The statement of securities also showing the rate of interest payable on all debentures and mortgages or other securities held by the Synod.

(4) In the opinion of your Committee the present system of dividing the general expense account among the various funds is confusing and should be discontinued, and one general expense account should be kept, and the amount thereof should be made up by the Synod Assessment Fund and by an assessment pro rata on the income of the different funds.

The Clerical Secretary informs us that the accounts of the past two years will be ready for audit during the coming week. Your Committee recommend that they be audited as soon as possible, and that immediately after the Auditors shall have completed their Report, it shall be submitted to a special meeting of the Executive Committee, and published at once on receiving the approval of the Committee.

We beg also to report that Mr. Walkem, one of the Auditors, has fully explained the mode of auditing in the past, from which it appears that the Auditors, besides giving it a close personal attention to the discharge of their duties, obtained the assistance of a skilled gentleman. And we recommend that the present Auditors be requested to act for the present year, and that they be allowed a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars for the payment of a skilled Accountant or Accountants, to make from time to time during the year, as they may think proper, a thorough investigation of the Accounts; and that the Auditors have access at all times to all the securities, vouchers, books and documents connected with the various funds; and that they shall at any time and at all times receive all needful assistance from the Clerical Secretary and Treasurer.

And your Committee further recommend that the accounts of the Synod be closed and ready for the Auditors by the tenth day of May in each year, in order that the Auditors may have more time to discharge their duties.

Your Committee further recommend that if it should become necessary during the interval between two meetings of Synod, in the first instance, to appoint a Financial Secretary, or if at any time the office should become vacant during such an interval the appointment shall be made by the Executive Committee, but shall only continue in force until the then next regular meeting of Synod, when an appointment shall be made by the Synod.

*Report of the Committee on Foreign Missions.*

The Committee on Foreign Missions beg to present to the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario a report of their work for the year ending April 30, 1879.

While thanking all the members of the Church throughout the Diocese for the interest that has been taken in the objects of the Committee, they take the opportunity of pleading for a more liberal ministry of means on this behalf.

They would especially invite attention to the wants of the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, to the maintenance of which the Church in Canada became pledged by the action of her representatives in Provincial Synod. The Committee has accepted as a primary duty the obligation to take charge of this work, and they confidently believe that the sense of Christian honour in the hearts of Canadian Churchmen will recognize the obligation which has been thus assumed. A good work is being carried on in Algoma under great disadvantages, and the Church owes it to the self-denying head of that Diocese to strengthen his hands in the performance of his missionary labors.

The Committee beg to remind the members of Synod that contributions for any recognized Church Missionary Agency outside the Diocese are also received by the Committee and forwarded to their destinations.

It is indeed far from the wish of your Committee that funds should be diverted from Diocesan purposes in aid of Foreign Missions, but they are convinced that both duties may be faithfully discharged by Christian people without interference with each other.

The Committee beg to submit herewith the annual statements of money received and disbursed. They request that all contributions for any Foreign Mission work may be forwarded to the Treasurer, Rev. F. W. Kirkpatrick, M.A., who will promptly acknowledge them and place them to the credit of the congregations contributing, in the annual statements.

It is in their opinion to be regretted that objection exists to the payment of the entire Assessment for the years 1878-79 and 1879-80, as the Fund is overdrawn.

Your Committee consider that they cannot too strongly urge the necessity of taking steps to collect the arrears of assessments due; and they would further suggest that to simplify the question of the settlement of arrears, hereinafter a book should be kept by the Clerical Secretary, so ruled as to show in each year the amount due by each parish in default.

Your Committee have once more to report with regret that no less than twenty parishes have neglected to forward the last assessment; the names of those parishes are as follows: Archieville, Barriefield, Beachburg, Bell's Corners, Carleton Place, Carrying Place, Cumberland, Eganville, Fitzroy Harbour, Frontenac (rear), Hillier and Wellington, Kitley, Lanark, March, Moulinette, North Augusta, Pakenham, Pembroke, Renfrew, Roslyn, Rochesterville and Tamworth.

#### REPORT ON AMENDMENTS.

Your Committee have considered the cases of St. Peter's, Brockville, and Christ Church, Ottawa, and recommend that in the former case the assessment be \$30 instead of \$24; and in the latter \$45 instead of \$37.50.

In the case of the parish of Lanark it is recommended that the sum of \$5 be accepted in payment of arrears to date. And further that the arrears due by the parish of Beachburg be remitted, and that the assessment of those parishes be fixed as above specified.

Your Committee further recommend that parishes in arrears for assessment be called upon by letter from the Clerical Secretary to make representations in relation thereto, which shall be laid before the Executive Committee, who, the Committee recommend, should be instructed to consider the same and make such recommendations in relation to the several cases as the evidence may justify.

1. That the value of the insurable property in the Diocese is about \$450,000.
2. That insurance is effected on this property to the amount of \$229,000.
3. That property to the value of \$70,000 has no insurance whatever upon it, and that in some parishes none of the church property is insured at all, this oftentimes amounting in value to \$6,000 or \$7,000.

The property insured in the Diocese is in the following companies, some of which your Committee do not consider the most reliable with which to do business: Queen, Northern, Royal, Isolated Risk, London Agricultural, Liverpool and Lancashire, North British, Ottawa Agricultural, Victoria of Hamilton, and the Prince Edward County Mutual. The per cent. varies from  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. to  $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. for three years, according to the reliability of the Companies and the nature of the risk to be taken. Your Committee regret that they have not been able to recommend any scheme by which the Synod might become its own insurer, which should commend itself to the Synod. They would, however, strongly urge upon the Synod the adoption of some measures, either to compel all parishes to insure the church property within their respective limits, or to make arrangements with some thoroughly reliable company to insure all the church's property within this Diocese, several liberal offers from good companies, to this end, having been received by your Committee.

*Report of the Frankford Endowment Committee.*

The Committee to whom was referred back the Report of the Committee in reference the Frankford Endowment, beg leave to report :

That your Committee having heard further evidence and statements in reference to the sum of \$1,000 received by His Lordship the Bishop, from or through the intervention of the Crown Lands Department, are of opinion that said money was not given or received upon any definite or specific trust, but was subject to the disposition of the Bishop or the Synod.

In order to remove doubts as to the person or body having the disposition of said fund, His Lordship the Bishop has expressed to your Committee his willingness that the disposition of the said fund and income arising therefrom, shall be from time to time subject to the resolution of Synod.

In view of the desire of His Lordship the Bishop to re-unite the Missions of Frankford and Stirling, your Committee recommend that, subject to the payment referred to in the next clause of this Report, the income arising from said fund be, until otherwise ordered, paid to the clergyman of the re-united Missions of Frankford and Stirling.

That out of the first moneys received as income of said fund, the one-half of said receipts be paid to Rev. F. L. Stephenson, until the sum of \$80 be paid to him in full of his claim against said fund.

*Report of Committee on Clerical Secretary's Accounts.*

The Committee appointed to investigate the matters referred to in the letters which have appeared in the *Evangelical Churchman*, with reference to the accounts of the Synod, have the honor to report as follows :

The first subject examined by them was an apparent error in the accounts of the Widows and Orphans' Fund for the years 1870-71 and 1871-72, as printed in the Journals of Synod. In the statement of securities of the former year it appears that the investment had been increased by a sum which exceeded the amount of the payments which had been made upon that account. In the following year the payments for investments appeared to exceed by a corresponding amount the new investments made during that year. On examining into the matter the Committee found that a security had been purchased before the close of the financial year of 1870-71, but had not been paid for until the financial year of 1871-72 had begun. These facts which fully explain the apparent error do not appear in the statement in the Journal of Synod, and could not therefore be understood without an examination of the books.

Another complaint which has been made is that there appears in the statement of securities in the journal of Synod for the year 1866-67 a security for \$973.34, for which no payment appears in the investment account for the year. In the following year, 1867-68, a payment of the sum above mentioned appears for which there is no corresponding increase in the securities. The explanation of this matter is as follows :—The security in question was purchased in the month of June, 1867, immediately after the close of the financial year 1866-67, but before the Auditors made their examination of the accounts and securities for that year, and that the Auditors then acting finding the security in question, with the others belonging to the fund, assumed that it had been purchased during the preceding financial year, and without consulting the Secretary, included it in a statement of securities for that year. This was clearly an error and escaped observation at the time.

The Clergy Trust Fund being under the control of the Clergy Trust Committee and the accounts thereof being kept by the Treasurer, this Committee is of opinion that the discussion of any complaints respecting it should take place when the report of that Committee comes before the Synod for adoption. This Committee cannot find that the Clerical Secretary is in any way responsible for the alleged mismanagement of that fund, or for any improper dealings with it if such have existed.

The Clerical Secretary admits that the Bishop by his drafts or cheques has at times overdrawn the amount then actually due him under the Episcopal Trust Fund, and paid in to the credit of that fund,—but states that there was always upon such occasions interest in arrears or accruing due which would balance the amount of such drafts or cheques, and that by the action of the Executive Committee at its last meeting arrangements have been made to obviate any difficulty of the kind for the future. The Committee cannot help expressing their

regret that the Clerical Secretary has taken the false position.

Your Committee would not wish to overdraw their account, and therefore recommend that nothing should be done.

There are other matters which have come under which your Committee have rendered it impossible to have those above mentioned explanations in respect of the same given.

In conclusion your Committee considered them every year, and engaged their attention in order to obtain such information as was required and in so far as was required without the aid of the Clerical Secretary. It is to be revealed at a glance that the accounts in the Journals of Synod do not show the true balance of the securities for the year, and that in the statements respectively before the Synod.

Your Committee would have been glad to have had the Clerical Secretary should have been more forthcoming, and that the same thereon will allay the doubts of the Synod.

Your Committee also find that certain of the Rectors have been permitted to overdraw their accounts, and without going into particulars, we strongly recommend that nothing of the kind should be done in future.

There are other matters referred to in the letters mentioned in the resolution under which your Committee are acting which have not escaped their attention, and which they have discussed and considered, but the time at their disposal has rendered it impossible for them to investigate them to the same extent that they have those above specially referred to,—but they have no reason to doubt that the explanations in regard to them would be equally as satisfactory as those above given.

In conclusion your Committee desire to state that the Clerical Secretary rendered them every necessary assistance in examining into the questions which have engaged their attention ; the entries in the books explain the accounts, but in order to obtain such explanation a lengthy investigation was in some instances required and in some it would have been difficult even then to discover what was required without the benefit of the personal knowledge and explanation of the Clerical Secretary. Your Committee think that the books should be so kept as to reveal at a glance the true state of the accounts, and that the statements printed in the Journals of Synod should afford the same ready information, and should show the true balance at the debit or credit of each account. Also, that a statement of the securities held by the Synod should be entered upon the books each year, and that in the printed statement it should appear to what fund the securities respectively belong.

Your Committee regret if any wrong impression in regard to the Clerical Secretary should have been caused by the publication of the letters referred to the Committee,—and trust that the investigation now had by them and their report thereon will allay the same.

As to the Memorial from the Parish of Loughborough for the sale of seven acres of land, adjoining the Village of Sydenham, your Committee consider that it would be inexpedient at present to grant the prayer of the Memorial.

As to the petition from the Rector and Churchwardens of St. James' Church, Kemptville, your Committee consider that until the title of the Archdeacon Patton Memorial Church be vested in the Lord Bishop, or in the Synod, it is inexpedient to recommend that permission be given to mortgage the property referred to in the Petition.

Respecting the Memorial from the members of the Church of England, residents of the Township of Sidney, your Committee consider that as the subject matter of the Memorial is already before the Synod and will be reported on during this Session by a Special Committee, it is unnecessary for your Committee to enter into the question of the endowment claimed by Frankfort and Stirling.

*Canon on Vestries.*

I. WHO SHALL BE MEMBERS OF VESTRIES ?

*(Rented Churches.)*

1. All Members of the Church of England, male and female, being pewholders, or holding sittings and paying therefor such sums as the Vestry may determine, shall form a Vestry for the purposes in this Canon mentioned and declared; pro-

vided always, that he shall not be of legal age before voting shall be taken at the meeting, in a Church of England, sitting in the Church, that he has paid by the Vestry on

2. In case of a Vestry unfit for the holding of an assemble for worship, shall be constituted during such occur-

1. In Churches where there shall be a Vestry and the members shall be communicating members, male and female, that both Communicants, twenty-one years of age, shall declare himself to be a member, and to be habitual attendant at the Vestry is held for

2. The decision of an habitual attendant shall be final.

3.

At all Vestry Meetings, in the absence of the Curate, the Vestry as the majority shall name; and the Vestryman as the Chairman. The proceedings of the Vestry for that purpose, are

4. ANNUAL VESTRY

An Annual Vestry Meeting during Divine Services, the Churchwardens and regular

vided always, that no person shall be allowed to vote at any Vestry meeting who shall not be of the full age of twenty-one years ; provided also, that any person before voting shall, if required by any member of the Vestry, declare in writing at the meeting, in a book to be kept for that purpose, that he is a member of the Church of England and of no other religious body, and that he has held a pew or sitting in the Church of which the Vestry is held for six months previously, and that he has paid all arrears of rent or dues that may have been rated or assessed by the Vestry on his pew or sitting.

2. In case of a Church having been destroyed by fire, or otherwise rendered unfit for the holding of Divine Service, and the congregation of which Church assemble for worship in some temporary place, the Vestry of the said Church shall be constituted under the clause regulating the Vestries of *Free Churches* during such occupancy.

#### 2. WHO SHALL BE MEMBERS OF VESTRIES ?

##### (*Free Churches.*)

1. In Churches in which all the pews or sittings are free and unappropriated, there shall be a Vestry for the purposes of this Canon mentioned and declared, and the members thereof shall be—first, Communicants, male or female, habitually communicating in the Church of which the Vestry is held ; second, Non-Communicants, male or female, habitually attending the Church ; provided always, that both Communicants and Non-Communicants shall be of the full age of twenty-one years ; provided also, that any person voting as a Non-Communicant shall declare himself in writing at the meeting, in a book to be kept for the purpose, to be a member of the Church of England and of no other religious body, and to be habitually attending public worship in the said Church of which the Vestry is held for the space of six months previous to the meeting of Vestry.

2. The decision as to whether a person is either an habitual Communicant or an habitual attender, shall rest with the Chairman of the Vestry, and his decision shall be final.

#### 3. CHAIRMAN AND SECRETARY OF VESTRY MEETING.

At all Vestry Meetings the Priest or Deacon in charge shall preside, and in his absence the Curate-Assistant, or in the absence of both, such member of the Vestry as the majority, duly qualified to vote and present at such Vestry, shall name ; and the Vestry Clerk, or in case there be no Vestry Clerk, then such person as the Chairman shall name, shall be Secretary of such Vestry Meeting ; and the proceedings of such Vestry Meeting shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and preserved in the custody of the Churchwardens.

#### 4. ANNUAL VESTRY TO APPOINT CHURCHWARDENS AND REGULATE THE TEMPORALITIES.

An Annual Vestry shall be held on Easter Monday, after notice thereof given during Divine Service on Easter Sunday, for the purpose of appointing Churchwardens and regulating the charges and rents on all pews and sittings for the

ensuing year, and for the transaction of other business connected with the *Temporalities* of the Church; provided, that in case there should be more churches than one in the Parish or Mission, Vestry Meetings may be held for such churches at any time during the Easter Week, notice thereof having been given on a previous Sunday.

5. SPECIAL VESTRY MEETINGS MAY BE CALLED.

It shall be in the power of the clergyman in charge to call a Special Vestry Meeting whenever he shall think proper to do so, giving notice thereof on the two previous Sundays during Divine Service; and also specifying the business for which such Vestry Meeting is called. And it shall moreover be his duty to call such meeting upon application made to him in writing by at least six members of such Vestry aforesaid; and in case upon such written application being made as aforesaid, such clergyman shall refuse or neglect to call such meeting or to give such notice, then one week after such demand made, it shall be in the power of said six members to call the same by notice to be affixed to the main-entrance Church doors, at least one week previous to such intended meeting.

6. BUSINESS WHICH MAY BE TRANSACTED.

It shall be in the power of the members of Vestry, at such Vestry Meetings as aforesaid, to pass resolutions or to make by-laws for the regulation of their proceedings and for the management of the *Temporalities* of the Church, Parish or Mission to which they belong, and to alter and repeal the same.

7. CERTAIN FEES TO BE REGULATED BY VESTRY.

The fees for certificates from the Parish Register shall be *fifty cents* for each such certificate; and the charges payable for burial plots and on breaking the ground in cemeteries and churchyards for the purpose of burying the dead, and all matters of like nature therewith connected, shall be regulated by the Vestry of the Church to which the cemetery or churchyard belongs.

8. NOMINATION AND ELECTION AND QUALIFICATION OF CHURCHWARDENS.

1. At the Annual Vestry Meeting on Easter Monday one Churchwarden shall be nominated by the clergyman in charge of the Rectory, Parish or Mission to which the said Church belongs, and the other shall be elected by a majority of those present and entitled to vote at such Vestry Meetings as aforesaid. In case of the clergyman, if present at such Vestry Meeting, declining or neglecting to nominate a Churchwarden, or in case of said clergyman being absent from such Vestry and neglecting by writing under his hand to appoint a Churchwarden, then both the Churchwardens for the current year shall be elected by the members of the Vestry present; and in case the members of such Vestry shall neglect at such Vestry Meeting to elect a Churchwarden, then both such Churchwardens for the current year shall be nominated by the clergyman.

3 In case of one or both of the Churchwardens declining to accept office, or in case of deprivation of office, resignation in writing to the clergyman, or change of residence to ten or more miles from the Church of which he was chosen Churchwarden, or of incapacity to act, or being convicted of any crime, or ceasing to be member of the Church of England, or of the death of either or both of said Churchwardens, a Vestry Meeting shall be thereupon called within one month in the manner provided for in this Canon, for the nomination by the clergyman, or for the election by the Vestry as the case may be, of a new Churchwarden, in the place of the one whose office was vacated from any other cause aforesaid.

#### 9. CHURCHWARDENS TO LEASE AND RENT PEWS AND SITTINGS.

It shall be lawful for the Churchwardens, in Churches other than Free Churches, from time to time to lease and rent pews and sittings in Churches where such pews and sittings are not held in freehold, upon such terms as may be settled and appointed at Vestry Meetings to be holden for that purpose as provided, and all pews and sittings shall be subject to such annual rent and other dues as may from time to time be rated and assessed in respect thereof at such Vestry Meetings.

#### 10. SALE OF PEWS FORBIDDEN.

From and after the passing of this Canon no sales of pews shall take place in any Church in the Diocese. But in the case of the absolute purchase of a pew in any Church as aforesaid, before the passing of this Canon, the same shall be construed as a freehold of inheritance not subject to forfeiture by change of residence, and the same may be bargained, sold and assigned to any purchaser thereof, being a member of the Church of England; and such purchaser, provided the same shall have been duly assigned and conveyed to him, shall hold the same subject to the annual rent, charge or other dues rated and assessed, and which may from time to time be rated and assessed in respect thereof.

#### 11. CHURCHWARDENS SHALL ACCOUNT TO VESTRY.

All Churchwardens shall yearly render in writing a just, true and perfect account at the Annual Vestry Meeting on Easter Monday, or at an adjourned meeting to be held within a fortnight after the said Annual Meeting, fairly entered in a book or books to be kept for that purpose, signed by the said Churchwardens (which book or books shall be the property of the Vestry) of all sums of money by them received and of all sums rated or assessed by the Vestry and remaining unpaid, or otherwise due and not received, and also of all goods, chattels and other property of such Church or parish in their possession as such Churchwardens, and of all money paid by such Churchwardens so accounting, and of all other things concerning their said office; which said account and book or books shall have been referred to two or more auditors appointed by the Annual Vestry Meeting. In case of the appointment of a new Churchwarden or Churchwardens, the Churchwardens then retiring from office shall pay and deliver over unto such succeeding Churchwardens the book or books and all sums of money, goods, chattels and other things

being the property of the Church, which shall be in their possession ; and the said book or books shall be carefully preserved by such Churchwardens, and they shall and are hereby required to permit any such member of such Vestry as aforesaid to inspect the same at all reasonable times. In case such Churchwardens shall make default in yielding such account as aforesaid, or in delivering over such money, goods, or other things, as aforesaid, it shall be in the power of the succeeding Churchwardens to proceed against them at law for such default, or to file a bill in Equity for recovery and relief ; and in case of the re-appointment of the same Churchwardens, then such account, as aforesaid, shall in like manner as is aforesaid, be made and rendered before an adjourned meeting of such Vestry, fourteen days after such re-appointment.

12. THE CHURCHWARDENS TO BE A CORPORATION, AND THEIR RELATION TO CHURCHES AND BURYING GROUNDS.

The Churchwardens being a Corporation, shall represent the interests of such Church and the members thereof, and shall and may in such corporate name sue and be sued, answer and be answered unto in all manner of suits and actions whatever, and may prosecute indictments, presentments and other criminal proceedings for and in respect of such churches, churchyards and burying grounds attached or belonging thereto respectively, and all matters and things appertaining thereto ; and the Churchwardens, as such Corporation, shall, if required, make and execute leases to pewholders and grant certificates to those who shall have rented sittings. And, for the purpose of this Canon, every clergyman licensed by the Bishop to any sole charge shall be deemed to be the Clergyman or Parson of all Churches in the district specified in his license, and the Clergyman so licensed shall at all times have access to and quiet possession of the Church or Churches in the said district specified, which district shall be called his Parish or Mission. And it shall not be lawful for any Churchwarden or Churchwardens to permit the Church or Churches in the said Parish or Mission to be used for Divine Service, or the churchyard or burial-ground to be used for the purposes of interment, without the consent of the Clergyman so licensed by the Bishop.

13. APPOINTMENT OF SUBORDINATES.

The Organist, the Vestry Clerk, the Sexton and other subordinate servants of the Church, shall be nominated and appointed by the Churchwardens for the time being, and their salary and wages shall be brought into the general account, to be rendered as aforesaid by such Churchwardens.

## ADDENDUM.

### *Auditors' Report.*

*To the Executive Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario:*

We, the auditors appointed to examine the accounts of the Treasurer and Clerical Secretary of the Synod of Ontario, for the years ending respectively the 30th days of April, 1878 and 1879, now submit our supplementary report.

It was our desire and intention to have completed our audit immediately after the session of Synod, but owing to the Clerical Secretary's illness, the books were not posted or closed until very recently, and were not, therefore, ready for our inspection.

In our former report we stated the result of our examination of the accounts of the Treasurer, and this report deals with those of the Clerical Secretary.

We wish it to be understood, that no examination which we can make can enable us to certify to the absolute correctness of such accounts as those with which the Synod has to deal. Its invested Capital is composed of debentures, mortgages, bank-stocks, deposit-receipts, and scrips; and its income is derived from the interest on these investments, and from collections and donations. Moneys paid on debenture account can be checked by the debentures and coupons. Payments of interest on stocks, and securities of that character, can be traced without much difficulty; but moneys received on mortgage account can be ascertained by us with certainty only by seeing the receipts or acknowledgements given for them. The collections being printed in the Journal of Synod, are brought directly under the notice of the clergy, and can thus be checked by them. The rule which has been laid down, requiring that the particulars of each receipt given should be entered in the counterfoil of the receipt-book, affords no greater security than that which requires that moneys received should be duly entered in the cash-book. The best safeguard, both for the Secretary and the Synod, is regularity and precision in keeping the books of account.

We regret to have to state that the accounts for the past two years have not been kept as they ought to have been. No regular entries were made of the moneys received and paid out at the time of their receipt and payment. The cash-books of some, if not all, of the funds were compiled shortly before the audit from memoranda in the Clerical Secretary's possession, from the bank-books, and

from other sources ; and they are not, therefore, as they ought to be, the original and authentic record of the money received and paid out. In our report presented in June, 1877, we recommended the use of a cash blotter, and such a book has been recently procured, but has not yet been used.

The mode of keeping the cash has led to many irregularities in the accounts. Entries are transposed and out of place ; and several instances occur in which moneys which had been received and deposited in the bank account were not entered in the books until they came into our hands, the omissions being discovered after the cash had been written up.

Such of these omissions as were clearly established we have caused to be entered in the cash-book ; of others, we have preserved a statement, with the view of charging them in this year's account ; but we do not think that all have been, or can be discovered at the present time. We are led to this conclusion, in which the Clerical Secretary agrees with us, by the fact that the accounts, as made up, shew several cash balances, which appear in the appendix, some in the secretary's favor and some against him, the ultimate balance being \$1,672.54 in his favor. The Clerical Secretary does not pretend that he is a creditor of the funds to this amount, and he is unable to explain how these balances exist, except upon the assumption that moneys which he has received and placed in the Bank are not entered in the cash-book, and that he has inadvertently deposited money belonging to one fund to the credit of another. Taking, as an example, the Mission Fund, of which the Clerical Secretary appears by the books to be a creditor in the sum of \$1,354.42, we think that this balance has arisen from deposits of some of the moneys of other funds in the Mission Fund bank account.

During our examination of the accounts, it was brought to our knowledge that on the Rector of Kingston applying to some of the persons who appeared to be in arrears on the mortgages held by the Synod belonging to his Rectory, they produced receipts for moneys which were not entered in the books, and for which there was no acknowledgement on the counterfoil of the receipt-book. In one case, that of Martin's mortgage, a receipt signed by the Clerical Secretary, for the sum of \$222.19, was produced to us. Of this sum, \$207 was principal, and the balance, \$15.19 interest. The interest was entered on the counterfoil of the receipt-book and the cash-book, but the principal did not appear in either. The Clerical Secretary stated to us his belief that the money had been paid to him at his residence, that he had given a receipt at the time of payment, the regular receipt-book being in his office, that the entry of the principal had been overlooked, but that he believed the money had been duly deposited in the Bank. Judging from the amount of the cash balance in the Secretary's favor, we think this explanation is probably correct.

The payments in connection with the various funds were all duly vouched by cheque, with the exception of some small bank charges for collecting coupons. Many of the cheques were, however, irregularly signed, the signature of the Bishop being wanting. This subject was brought before the Synod at its last session, and was dealt with by the report of the Special Committee then appointed.

Our examination of the accounts has convinced us of the necessity for some changes in the system of keeping the books, and we propose, if we receive the proper authority, to have the accounts re-opened from the 30th of April last, and so adjusted as to make them as plain and simple as possible.

An account should be opened for each security, and the principal and interest account of each should be kept separate. The mortgage-book, as at present kept, is a mere memorandum book, and is not connected with the other accounts, so as to enter into the general balance.

The Mission Fund is largely overdrawn, and the debit balance is yearly increasing.

The interest account of the Episcopal Fund is also overdrawn, the amount of the overdraft being \$5,574.46. Against this, there is the accrued interest on the securities belonging to the Fund, the amount recoverable on which is uncertain, but will probably be about \$3,000.

The Rectory Lands Fund is assuming very large proportions. In our opinion, a separate cash account should be kept for each Rectory; as the present system causes some confusion, it being difficult to ascertain the amount of cash at the credit of each Rectory. In connection with this account, a transaction occurred in August, 1877, which, to prevent future misunderstanding, should be explained here.

On the 31st of August, 1877, the Bank of Montreal placed to the credit of the Rectory Lands Fund the sum of \$5,000, for the purpose of purchasing some debentures. This sum was credited in the Bank pass-book, in which were also entered on the 31st December, 1877, a credit of \$180 for dividends, and a charge of \$103.51 for interest on the advance. A further charge of \$98.65 for interest was made in the pass-book on the 30th April, 1878. None of these moneys are entered in the secretary's books up to date, the consequence being that the Bank balance exceeds that in the secretary's books on the 30th April, 1878, by \$4,977.97. On the 2nd July, 1878, the Bank again credited \$180 for dividends, and on the 11th September, 1878, charged \$109.31 for interest. On the same day, a cheque (No. 119) was given to the Bank for the \$5,000, but neither this cheque nor the preceding transactions are entered in the secretary's books. The reason given for not entering this cheque is, that it simply balances the credit in August, 1877.

We again call attention to the urgent necessity which exists for disposing of the balance at the debit of the Rectory Lands Expense Account, which now amounts to \$3,244.65. Every year adds to the difficulty of dealing with this question.

We have examined the mortgages belonging to the various funds, the accounts of which are kept by the Clerical Secretary.

These mortgages, with the exception of some which are in suit, were in his possession. For those in suit the solicitor's receipt was produced.

The amounts of these mortgages are shown in the Statement of Securities which accompanies this report.

The securities transferable by delivery we found in the joint possession of the treasurer and Clerical Secretary.

The Bank and cash balances of the various funds are shown in the accounts

submitted, and in the Bank Accountant's certificate. These cash balances, in our opinion, should not exist, as we think that all moneys received should be deposited from time to time, and particularly at the close of the financial year.

The bank balances agree with those in the secretary's books, except in so far as differences are caused by outstanding cheques.

These outstanding cheques appear in the statements. The discrepancy of \$258 in the Sustentation Fund, mentioned in our report made in June, 1877, has been adjusted by charging the amount back to the Clerical Secretary. We have observed in the accounts a charge by the Bank of 1/4 per cent. for collecting \$4,000 Simcoe debentures. This charge is in addition to the express charge for carriage

We think that this charge might have been more moderate.

In our examination of the books we have employed Mr. LeRicheux, a professional accountant, to prepare the statements and assist in closing the books. We have, however, in view of the anxiety which was felt respecting the accounts examined every item for ourselves. This course has entailed upon us a great deal of labor.

We regret that we are not able to present as favorable a report as in former years.
