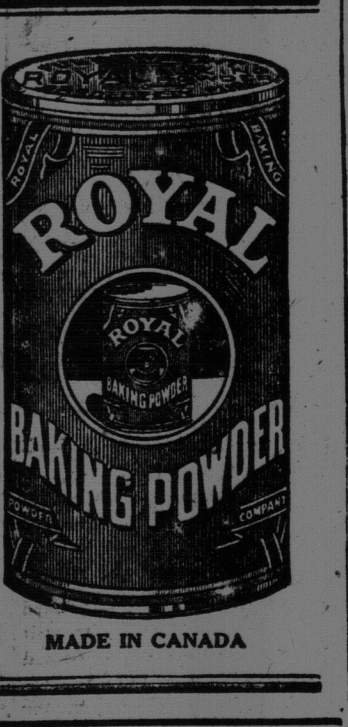
MORE THROUGH THE RIVER ICE

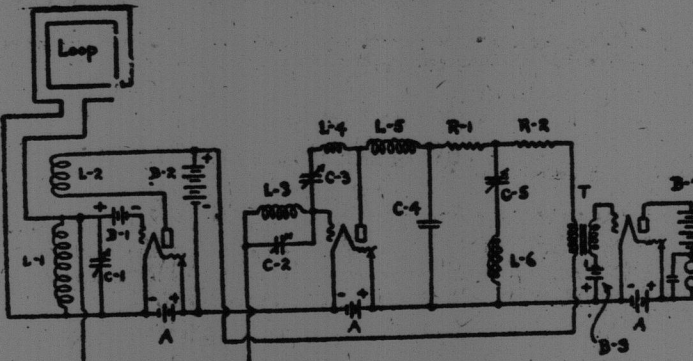

FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

By Edward N. Davis Formerly Technical Electrical Expert For U. S. Government

Lesson No. 167. THE ARMSTRONG SUPER-REGENERATIVE SYSTEM. When the radio receiver, employing the vacuum tube, is so connected that a portion of the energy of the plate circuit, is "fed back" to the grid circuit, the radio oscillation in the grid circuit is reinforced and causes a considerable increase in the amplification of the plate current.



In the accompanying diagram of the Armstrong "Super-Regenerative" circuit, the various elements are assigned the following values to allow tuning of the circuit up to wave lengths of 700 meters. For the loop antenna, from seven to twelve turns of No. 18 bell wire may be used spaced an inch apart and wound upon a three-foot frame, the loop being connected in parallel to the primary (L-1) of a variocoupler.

The tuning condenser (C-1) which is variable has a capacity of 0.001 microfarad. (C-2) may be either a fixed or variable condenser having a capacity of 0.0025 microfarad. Condenser (C-3) is a variable condenser of 0.001 microfarad capacity and may be used to adjust the tuned circuit if a new tube is inserted. The fixed condenser (C-4) is a telephone condenser having a capacity of 0.005 microfarad, while the condenser (C-5) is variable and has a capacity of 0.005 microfarad and is used to control the effect of the iron core choke coil (L-6).

The battery for heating the filament of the respective tubes is shown at (A). In the accompanying diagram separate filament batteries are shown.

shown, but one filament battery may be used by properly connecting the filaments and rheostat in multiple as in an ordinary amplifier. The transformer (T) is an audio-frequency amplifying transformer of standard design.

Battery (B-1) is a biasing battery having a potential of 0 to 5 volts and consists of the small flashlight type of dry cells with the negative terminal connected to the grid. (B-2) is a plate battery having a range in potential of 80 to 100 volts. The grid biasing battery (B-3) is a "B" battery having a potential of 22 volts and is connected in series with the secondary of the amplifying transformer. The plate battery (B-4) has a potential of 100 to 200 volts.

Briefly, the necessary adjustments for efficient operation of this system consists in rotating the loop until it is in the direction of the broadcast station, whose signals are to be received. The capacity of the condenser (C-1) is then varied to tune the loop and primary circuits to resonance with the incoming wave.

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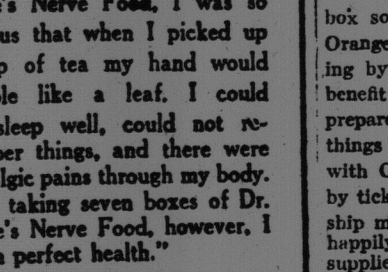
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COMMON COUNCIL

Chester Street Bridge Matter Disposed of—Detective's Pay—Offer Regarding Erection of Distribution System.

It was announced at yesterday's meeting of the Common Council that the C. P. R. had been authorized by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada to reconstruct the railway crossing over Chester street on the present sub-structure. Letters of protest in connection with a recent tag lay were received and filed.

In view of a statement in the press by Inspector Stevens regarding a revised offer to Detective Biddlecombe, it was decided to ask Commissioner Horton to bring in a further report on the matter.

Telegrams from the engineering firm of Day & Zimmerman, New York, offering their services to the city in connection with the erection and financing of a distribution system, were referred to the Mayor. The report of the committee of the whole was adopted without discussion.

A letter from a citizen was read, pointing out the need for better lighting arrangements in the vicinity of the Public Library. The communication contained a press clipping about the installing of a purse from a Mrs. Charles Stevens, Kingsville, last week.

After short discussion, it was decided that, notwithstanding any resolutions of the Council, payments from the N. B. Power Company on account of paving, snow removal and other charges might be accepted by the city chamberlain and applied to the liquidation of the account of the company with the city. This decision arose from an explanation given by Mayor Fisher regarding three payments, amounting to \$11,400, made by the company on an account of \$37,540, which had fallen due last October but which had not been paid.

Mayor Fisher stated that the company had promised to pay \$5,000 monthly on this account. Taken with the credit from lighting charges, the debt should be wiped out in a few months, he explained.

Complying with a request from the Health Centre authorities, Mayor Fisher will become an ex-officio member of the Board of Governors for the Centre and Commissioner Bullock will be the Council representative on the board.

On recommendation of Commissioner Bullock, it was decided that the suggested improvements at the city bathing houses be carried through, at an estimated cost of \$1,500—this cost to be spread over a period of five years and payments to be made out of the yearly grant of \$1,200. The account may be liquidated at an opportune time, if deemed advisable.

Commissioner Bullock announced that the N. B. Power Co. had agreed to retain the present fencing on the Rodney Wharf, as well as to erect a fence between the roadway and the wharf.

FIFTY YEARS ON THE U. S. TURF

W. S. Vosburgh Writes of Half Century of Racing for N. Y. Jockey Club.

At the instance of the New York Jockey Club, Mr. W. S. Vosburgh has written an outline of horse racing in the United States in the last fifty years. For more than half that period Mr. Vosburgh has served as a racing official and has first hand knowledge of practically all the horses he writes about. No man in America is better qualified for the task than Mr. Vosburgh, for he has been a lover and student of horses all his life, besides being an accomplished wielder of a pen. He is no mere dispassionate chronicler of events, either, but does not hesitate to express his own views or even his own prejudices when discussing individual horses. For instance, he is not quite so enthusiastic about Man o' War as most present-day writers. The Riddle horse was undoubtedly a great one, but he was given his present position as a record money earner through the kindness of our fellow citizen, Mr. Abe Orpen, who offered a \$75,000 purse for the race between Man o' War and Sir Barton. The latter horse was not fit to race the day he did, and perhaps there were a dozen other colts that could have beaten him besides Man o' War.

Synsby the Greatest. Mr. Vosburgh is probably of opinion that the greatest race horse in the past half century was Synsby, owned by the late James R. Keene, sired in England, but born in the United States. Synsby, like Man o' War, lost one race, and that as a two-year-old, but Artful who beat him then could never be induced to start against him again. It was said of Synsby by experts at the time, that he could beat any horse in America at any distance from a hundred yards to a hundred miles. When he died suddenly, it is related that his stern owner shed a tear. Mr. Vosburgh does not think so highly of Collin, another of Mr. Keene's champions, though he had a remarkable record and is of opinion that Collin, a stable companion was a better animal. Turf Romanesque.

The book is full of stories of the romance of the turf. It tells once more the remarkable story of Morvich, the despised little selling plater that came out of the West in the spring of 1921, and won a fortune for a novice who had never owned a race horse before, ending his two-year-old career as the unbeaten hero of a decade. He was hailed by some enthusiasts as a great horse, but he was a bitter disappointment. In 1921 his owner, Benjamin Block, scored thirteen victories to one defeat. This year he had one victory and thirteen defeats. Some twenty-five years ago Morello was the hero of the turf. He was bought for \$115,000, a winner of \$75,000 in two years and sold for \$24,000 at auction. Another tremendous bargain was Hansburg, bought for \$2,000, a winner of \$40,000 as a two-year-old, and sold for another \$40,000. He subsequently proved one of the best sires in the United States.

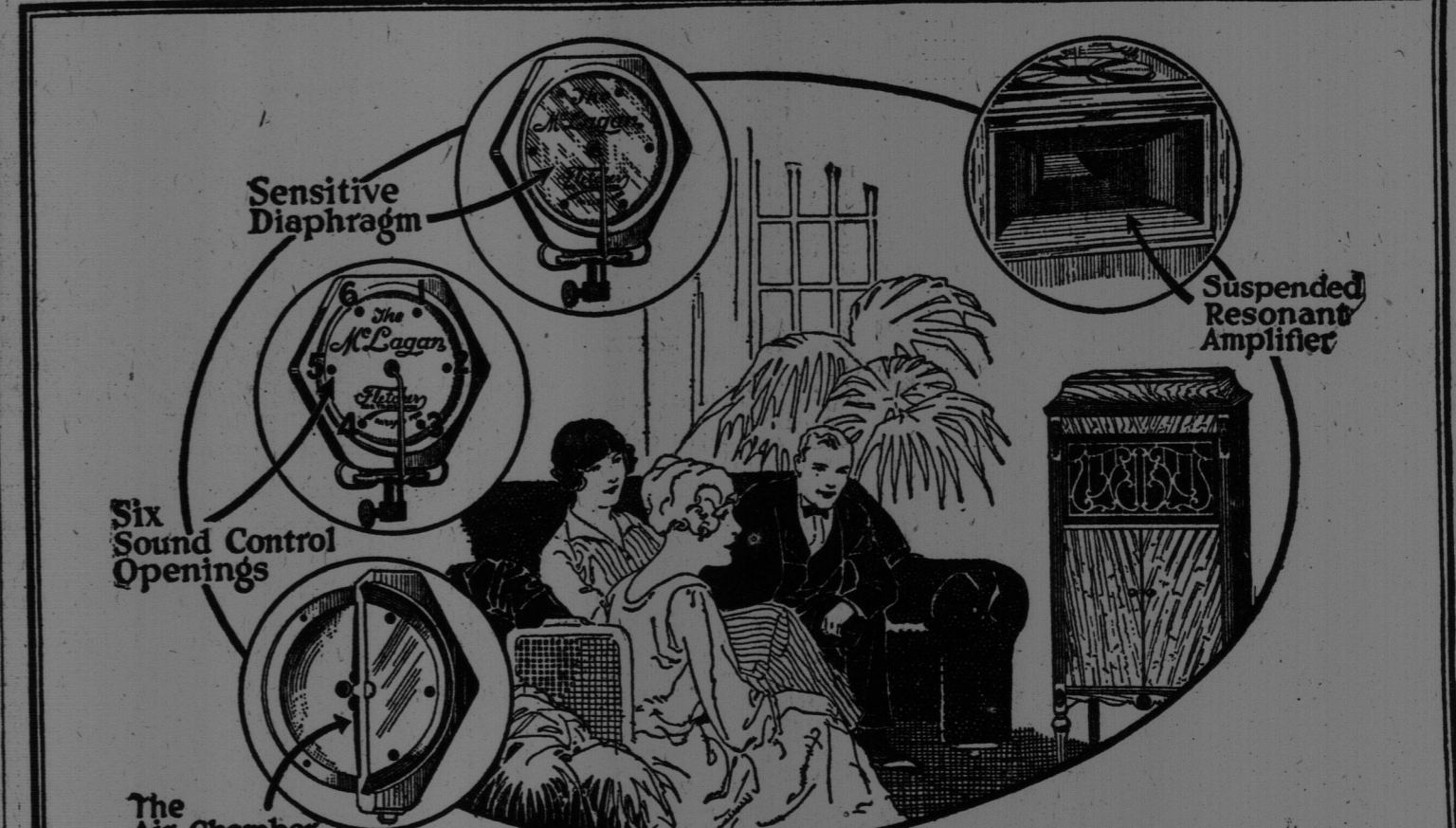

TUG MEN MAY ASK RULING REGARDING PROFITABLE TRADE

KATING.

BASKETBALL.

Centals Win. The second basketball team of the Central Baptist church, playing four men, defeated Ludlow street Baptist church team 20 to 15 last evening. The players were: Central, Golding, Macdonald, Arthur and Beans; Ludlow, Waring, Hammond, Toole, Edwards and Belyea.

Young Judeans Win. The Y. M. C. I. Junior Basketball League opened last night, when the Young Judans and the Sons of Zion played a fast game, the former winning the long end of an 8-7 score.

Game This Evening. An interesting game of basketball will be played in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium this evening between last year's champions and the Sons of Zion School team. The latter squad have been practicing hard and are anxious to score a victory over their more experienced opponents.

FOOTBALL. New Record. New Haven, Conn., Nov. 29.—Financially Yale has broken all American intercollegiate football records this season. Twice the bowl has been filled to its capacity of 77,000, the Army and Harvard drawing these crowds. Yale attracted 85,000 patrons. No minor college drew less than 10,000, the average attendance at these contests being 26,000. Ten games were scheduled, two more than usual, making between \$100,000 and \$500,000 as the total receipts for the season.

BILLIARDS. Hoppe's Comeback. (New York Times) Willie Hoppe once more is supreme in the billiard world. Last week he regained the 18.2 championship by winning the international tournament at the Hotel Pennsylvania. That his victory was a popular one was emphatically demonstrated by the acclaim with which it was received. Never has there been a more enthusiastic demonstration following the crowning of a king in sports than that which greeted Hoppe's clash between Hoppe and Jake Schaefer, who had held the title for a year.

That Hoppe's successful comeback occasioned some surprise was to be expected. Last season he was thrice defeated by Schaefer in succession. He defeated Hoppe in the final game of the international tournament at Chicago and repeated the dose in the play-off of the tie for first place. Later he successfully defended his crown against Hoppe in a challenge match of 1,900 points. To many this indicated that Schaefer had Hoppe's number; that Willie at last had met his measure. But Hoppe upset these calculations.

Hoppe's victory was one in which grit and bulldog tenacity in refusing to admit defeat played a leading part. Prior to the tournament the former "boy wonder" believed that he was in the best possible physical condition to withstand the terrific strain. But he developed a nervous disorder in his right shoulder which seriously handicapped him in executing treacherous masses. For a time it seemed that this handicap would prove too great for him to

overcome and would lead to his downfall. But Hoppe is a fighter as well as a master billiardist. He realized more than any one else what he was up against. He knew how seriously his playing was affected. It was then that he called all of his resources into action, and frequently during the last three of his five games extricated himself from difficulties by making bank shots and around-the-table drives in preference to attempting masses. It was his accuracy in executing these strokes that saved him.

Jake Schaefer, Roger Conti and Edmond Horemans were tied in the matter of games won and lost, each scoring three victories against two defeats. The tie was decided by the grand averages. On this basis they finished in the order named, and Schaefer and Conti will play a match game of 1,900 points within sixty days for the privilege of challenging Hoppe to a match of similar length for the title. Should Hoppe be beaten he can challenge for a return match. Thus, plenty of activity is promised during the remainder of the season.

HOCKEY. St. Patricks Win Great Game. Winnipeg, Nov. 29.—The world's champions, St. Patricks of Toronto, were victorious in the first game of the western tour here last night, defeating the Edmonton Eskimos 2 to 1. All the goals were scored in the second period. The win was rather a lucky one, as a soft shot from Randall's stick, which Winkler pulled into the Edmonton net when it was a foot outside the post, decided the conflict in favor of the Pats. But it was the greatest exhibition of hockey staged on Winnipeg ice for many a year and abounded with thrills from going to goal.

The lightning rushes of Simpson were the feature of the Edmonton play, while Stuart and Randall did the heavy work for the winners.

These decisions were made at the recent convention of the officers of the international Skating Union. SCOTCH COAL COMING.

The first shipments of Scotch anthracite of any volume, to arrive in this port since 1915 will be brought here from Glasgow on the first two boats of the Anchor-Dominion Line winter service, the Gracia, sailing from Glasgow on December 8 and the Cabotia, on December 22. The use of this kind of coal in Canada was first commenced in the winter of 1901-1902 and was continued until 1915 when the last shipment of any commercial size reached here. Since then small lots have occasionally dribbled in but the coming shipments are declared the first of great importance in the last seven years.

DEATH OF SOLDIER.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 29.—It was said last night that the Wanderers' Hockey Club would probably play Sussex, champions of Brunswick, at St. John's on New Year's night.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 29.—A. C. Mills, vice-president of the Maritime Amateur A. U. at Toronto, Dec. 8. President Covey will also attend as the delegate for the maritimes.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 29.—Promoters of the McKenna-Hesley championship bout, scheduled for next Friday night, have decided to stage it in the Majestic Theatre. Mills is expected to arrive in Halifax tomorrow night.

F. W. BUDD HEADS THE TRAVELERS

Election of Officers by Maritime Commercial Men—New Brunswick Representation.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 29.—F. W. Budd, representative of the Ogilvie, Bloom, Mills, was today elected president of the Maritime Commercial Travelers' Association. F. H. Keating of the W. R. Brock company, C. W. Smith, of Moira, Ltd., and E. Y. Rowland, of Ganong Bros., were elected directors for Nova Scotia.

G. A. Faulkner of the National Drug Company was elected vice-president for Nova Scotia and E. B. Richardson of the National Fish Co., vice-president for New Brunswick, both returned by acclamation. C. E. Patterson, added to the directorate for New Brunswick.

COAL REPORTS

Through the good offices of the Provincial Fuel Administrator, George S. Cushing, an arrangement has been completed whereby coal consigned to Fredericton from the United States will be forwarded by boat to St. John and thence by rail, thus saving the long haul on the cars and in this manner assisting in relieving the car shortage.

C. S. Cushing said today that the situation was still critical in spite of the fact that there were some quantities of anthracite on the way to St. John, including 500 tons for George Dick, 3,000 tons for the Maritime Navigation Co., 3,000 tons of stevedore coal, and 1,000 tons of Scotch anthracite for R. P. & W. F. Starr. There was also some Welsh anthracite in view, but arrangements for its delivery have not yet been completed.

LOOK INTO THE MATTER OF WORK OF CANVASSER

A man soliciting subscriptions for Maclean's Magazine told several citizens that all commissions went to the Disabled Soldiers' Fund, and for this reason a number subscribed. One citizen, however, called up W. A. Munro, Ltd., and the result appears in the following telegram—

Young man named Reverend taking subscriptions for Maclean's. Says he is a salaried employee, sent here your expense, all commissions from sales to go to Disabled Soldiers' Fund. Is this correct? Please wire our expense.

Reverend is a member of subscription sales staff now working in the Maritime Provinces. We have no acknowledgment of any arrangement whereby commission on subscription making any reference to disabled soldiers' funds, or anything else that is not authorized by our regular credential form.

Mr. Munro says he has urged for some time that solicitors of this class should have credentials from the Mayor or Police Magistrate, and he feels that this course should be adopted in the interests of the public.

SCHOONER CASE IN N. S. ADJUSTED

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 29.—Shoults, a New York man arrested here last week on a warrant issued at the suit of Lunenburg people for \$3,700 for provisioning and fitting up a schooner, and who later was served with a second capias for \$2,000 issued at the request of the owners of the schooner Independence, the claim being for the price of the schooner alleged to have been sold to the defendant or to New York people represented by him, has been released. It is understood that a remittance of more than \$20,000 arrived from New York and that \$15,000 had been paid on two claims, the schooner being held at Lunenburg pending final settlement.

SERIOUSLY ILL HERE.

Fredericton, N. S., Nov. 29.—Fred Blair of North Devon is seriously ill at the Lancaster Hospital, West St. John. Mr. Blair was formerly C. P. R. station agent at Debec Junction, and was a member of the First Canadian Division going over with the 12th Battalion in 1914. He was in the pay office at Canadian base headquarters at Etaples, France, until the spring of 1918, when the order was issued for all originals to return to Canada on leave. He returned here and has been a patient at the military and the Lancaster hospitals practically ever since.

COLLAPSED IN COURT ROOM

Man Charged With Making Trouble Last Night in Wellington Row.

As a result of trying to force an entrance into the G. W. V. A. rooms in Wellington row last evening Joseph Wallace appeared in the police court this morning charged with drunkenness and assault. During the progress of the case Wallace collapsed and had to be carried from the court room.

Harry Cannon said that he was the caretaker at the G. W. V. A. headquarters and that last evening he had seen Wallace at the door very much intoxicated. He had told him that he could not enter and the accused had gone away but had returned a while later. The witness then had advised him to go home and have a sleep. He had taken the accused by the arm and arms and in the tussle they had arrived at the bottom of the steps. The accused had struck the witness in the eye and loosened some of his upper teeth. The matter had been reported to the police.

James Fitzpatrick, doorkeeper at the G. W. V. A. rooms, corroborated the previous evidence. He said he ordered Wallace to allow no one, member or non-member, into the building if he was under the influence of liquor. For that reason he had refused to allow the accused to enter. He said the accused was not a member of the association.

Ralph Ganong, chairman of the house committee of the G. W. V. A., said that he had gone into the building about nine o'clock last evening and that the doorkeeper had complained that a man was causing trouble. He had investigated. The accused had used very bad language and he had been forced to send for the police. It was the intention of the association to take any necessary steps to prevent drunkenness and rowdiness in the building even if it were necessary to enlist the aid of the police.

The accused was remanded.

INSTRUCTRESS FOR SCHOOL "GYM"

Miss Pauline Kindred Comes from Boston for Cliff Street Classes.

Next week the gymnasium in the new Catholic school in Cliff street will be in full operation, under the direction of Miss Pauline Kindred, who is due to arrive here from Boston on Saturday. Work in connection with the gymnasium has been taken over by the Catholic Women's League, which has assigned it to the physical committee under the co-operation of Mrs. P. Joseph Gleason. The registration of the gym classes is now being carried out by W. E. Stirling, physical director of the Y. M. C. I. Besides the regular physical classes, it is planned to use the gym for basketball, folk dancing and possibly badminton, but arrangements for these will be made until the arrival of the instructress. The organization of the classes is planned for next Monday.

The lady who will have charge is Miss Pauline Kindred of Worcester, Mass. She is a graduate of the Boston School of Physical Education and has had a wide experience in her profession and comes highly recommended. Among her other activities since graduation, she taught physical training and setting up classes in Boston last year, supervised corrective exercises in the Newton Hospital, coached the ladies' basketball league in Boston and refereed some of the games; officiated as umpire in the football league at the Worcester High School and during the past summer and the summer before taught folk dancing in the Providence, I. I. playgrounds.

Although the new gymnasium has been in use for nearly a year, there have been no regular classes arranged for the girls, and the opening next week is looked forward to with interest.
