INSURANCE BILL

Employers to Provide Al- Musical Revue, Classy lowance for Discharges

Madison, Wis., Feb. I—A bill to compel employers to pay unemployment insurance benefits to their workers, when unemployed, was introduced in the Wisconsin legislature today.

The measure would require employers to form mutual insurance companies and pay benefits to the workers they discharge at the rate of \$1.50 a day for adult men and women and seventy-five cents a day for boys and girls between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years.

The unemployed, providing they had worked at least twenty-six weeks would be entitled to benefits for a maximum period of thirteen weeks on the basis of one week for every four weeks of work. Workers idle as a result of strike or lockout are not entitled to benefits and large to form the laborers' are also exempt.





Action Followed Refusal of Assembly to Recognize all Sovereign States as Members-Took Stand as Early as March, 1919.

This has been disclosed by official documents now made public here confirming previous unofficial declarations that President Irigoyen had personally directed the action of the Argentine delegation at Geneva.
