Frozen Bodies of The Captain And Three Men in The Rigging

Bark Ashore Near Cape Cod; Seven Are Rescued GRIM TALE OF THE SEA

Italian Vessel Struck in Sixty Mile Snow Storm—Life Savers Find Bodies—Big Liners Buffered by Storm, Turn Back

Wellfleet, Mass., Feb. 17.—Four men perished when the Italian bark Castagna struck on the half south of the Cape Cod, a mile and a half south of the Cape Cod life saving station today. Seven seamen, all badly frost bitten and nearly unconscious from exposure, were brought ashore by the life savers.

BATTERED ON THE DEEP, TURN BACK

Queensferry, Feb. 17.—Such violent storms have prevailed in the North Atlantic during the past week that many passenger steamers and cargo boats have turned round and run for shelter to ports on this side of the Atlantic. Three large steamers are returning in a severely battered condition. The French liner Niagara, which left Havre on Feb. 15, New York lost her starboard propeller and crippled also her port propeller and is now crawling slowly back. The big Dutch oil tank Rotterdam, eight days out from Amsterdam on her way to New York, lost her rudder and was forced to make for Queensferry in tow of a steam trawler. The British steamer Titania, from Glasgow to New York, passed Inishtrahull today after being seven days out. Her steering gear was carried away, the mast broken and the rigging damaged during the gale on Friday.

FALLS THREE STORIES, UNHURT

New York, Feb. 17.—Suffering from the delusion produced by a vivid dream that she was being suffocated by illuminating gas, Miss Ella O'Keefe, a stenographer plunged from the third story window of her home in Brooklyn, and suffered only a slight abrasion on the index finger of her right hand.

OUR WAR MINISTER

Canada's war minister must have made a profound impression upon the people of France, Belgium, Germany and Switzerland last summer. His bill for automobiles amounted to almost \$7,000. Not only was the war minister accompanied by seasoned warriors, including Mr. H. F. McLeod, M.P., of New Brunswick, but in his own immediate entourage there was a private secretary at \$1,200, an assistant secretary at \$800, and an order from the Army Service Corps.

The fact that there has recently been a steady rise in the value of all Irish securities is an indication that the threat of civil war in Ulster is not taken seriously in financial circles.

The death of a child in Newcastle from eating medicine tablets left within his reach should be a warning to all parents to be especially careful to put medicines of every kind in a safe place.

The nomination of a candidate for the city council by the trades and labor council will add further interest to the coming civic elections, as there is talk of some four or five other candidates aspiring to civic honors.

The Halifax Herald tells of great trouble for steamships in Halifax harbor during the storm of Saturday, and of an Allan liner which decided not to put to sea until morning, although she was ready to sail the evening before.

The report of Commissioner Schofield on the harbor revenues shows that the citizens should make every effort to get the Empire's steamships back to this port next winter. There has been a large shrinkage in the revenue since they were switched to Halifax.

Chatham World—Suburban trains were cancelled at St. John and Fredericton because they didn't pay. The St. Andrews Beacon thinks their removal will not pay. We agree with the Beacon.

They begin by showing that his impetuosity is such that he cannot pay his ordinary liabilities, and then go on to prove that he has enriched himself by the building of the Southampton Railway.

The startling deterioration of the Liberal party at Ottawa since the St. John Standard sent a representative to the press gallery suggests that, if Mr. Hazen's organ could spare another man for service at the capital, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his supporters would be completely flabbergasted.

Although Hon. Robert Rogers has no knowledge of those concrete wharves at Fredericton, Mr. H. F. McLeod, M.P., assures the people that it is all right, and a staff of surveyors are joyously impressing the electorate by making measurements and conducting a survey.

The attempts of the Borden government by partisan commissions to discover wrong doing on the part of the Laurier administration have proved sadly disappointing to them and their supporters. It was gleefully asserted as soon as the Laurier government was defeated that revelations would be made which would shock the country.

The Hon. William Pugsley was one special subject of attack, but the most eager search by vindictive political enemies could discover no wrong doing in the conduct of affairs of his department. The Transcontinental Railway appeared to offer an especially inviting field, because of the magnitude of the work involved, and the Gutelius-Stanton commission was set at work. Mr. Gutelius has done his best for his friends, but he has failed to discover that which was so earnestly sought. It goes without saying that in a work of construction so enormous mistakes would be made, perhaps some of them costly; but there has been an utter failure to bring home to the Laurier government

Contrary to the recent order of events, as far as the local weather is concerned, there was a variation of only six degrees in the temperature during the twenty-four hours between nine o'clock yesterday morning and the same hour this morning, which is quite a feat for our mercury. 

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 17.—Chief of Police Rideout received a telegram from the Ottawa immigration authorities asking for the record of a Moncton woman who was caught while attempting to enter the United States with three children.

The U. S. authorities are holding them at the border.

George Pelelier, whose death occurred in Shediac on Sunday was well known in Moncton. He was a clerk in many other operations in the steel and iron industry. Reports from large lumber producing and consuming centres in all sections of the United States strike a dominant note of cheer, inspired either by proved demand already manifested in the substantial form of orders or in the form of inquiries bearing all the earmarks of urgent requirement. In fact, the financial and general commercial atmosphere appears to be clearing up for a long period of fair business weather that will be a welcome change for the not altogether satisfactory conditions that have prevailed intermittently during recent months.

ADVOCATE HOTEL BURNED

The New Brunswick House, Advocate, N. S., Joseph Rector, proprietor, was burned to the ground last week. The large barn was saved with difficulty, but the carriage shed and wood house were destroyed with all the winter's supply of fuel. 

The magistrate pointed out that the idea of imposing a fine on a man for drunkenness or sending him to jail was to try to keep him from doing it again and he thought the system of getting hold of those parties who supplied the liquor would be more effective. He called upon the policemen to keep a sharp lookout for anyone who would sell liquor to the interdicted under this system.
