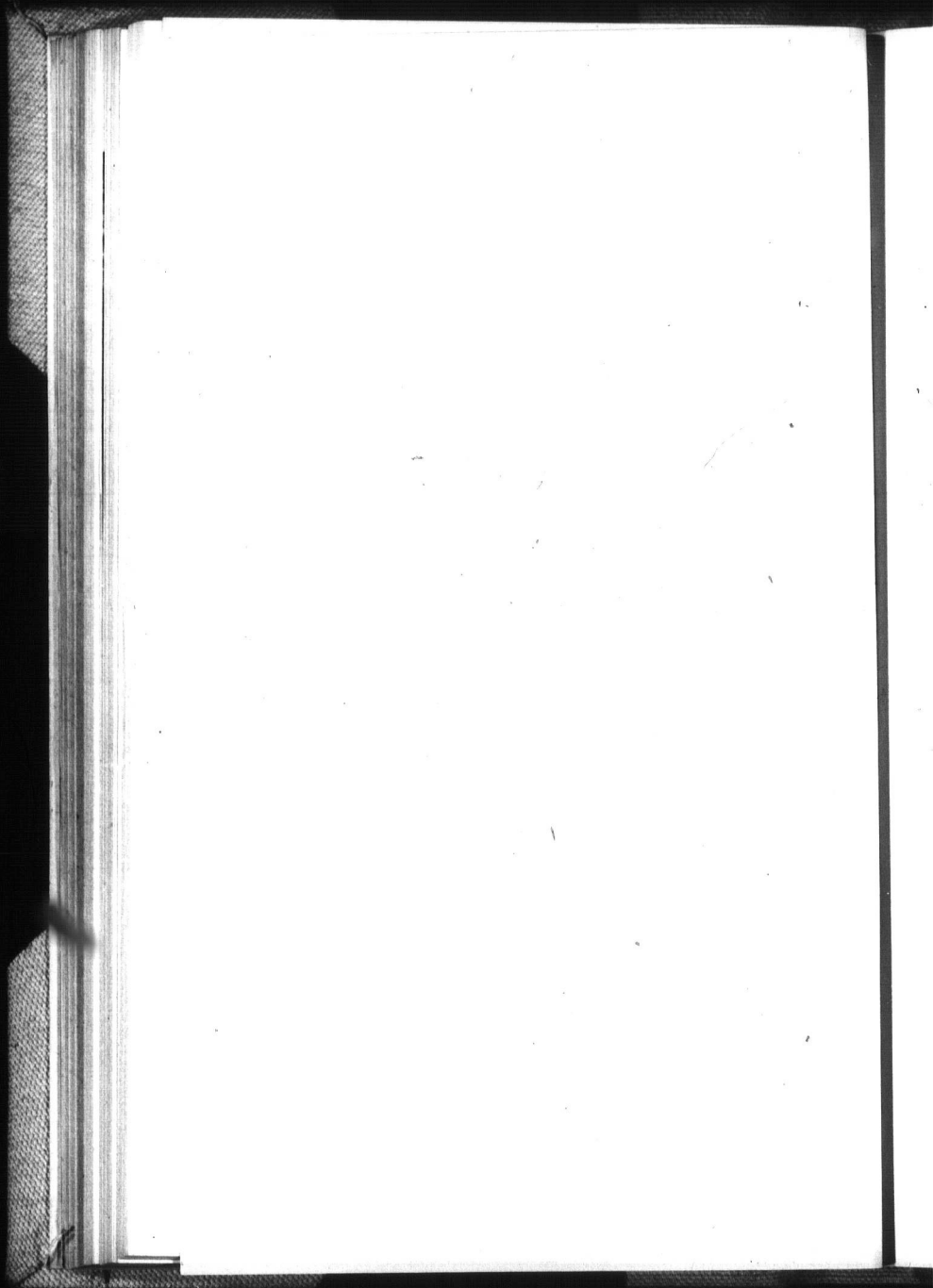

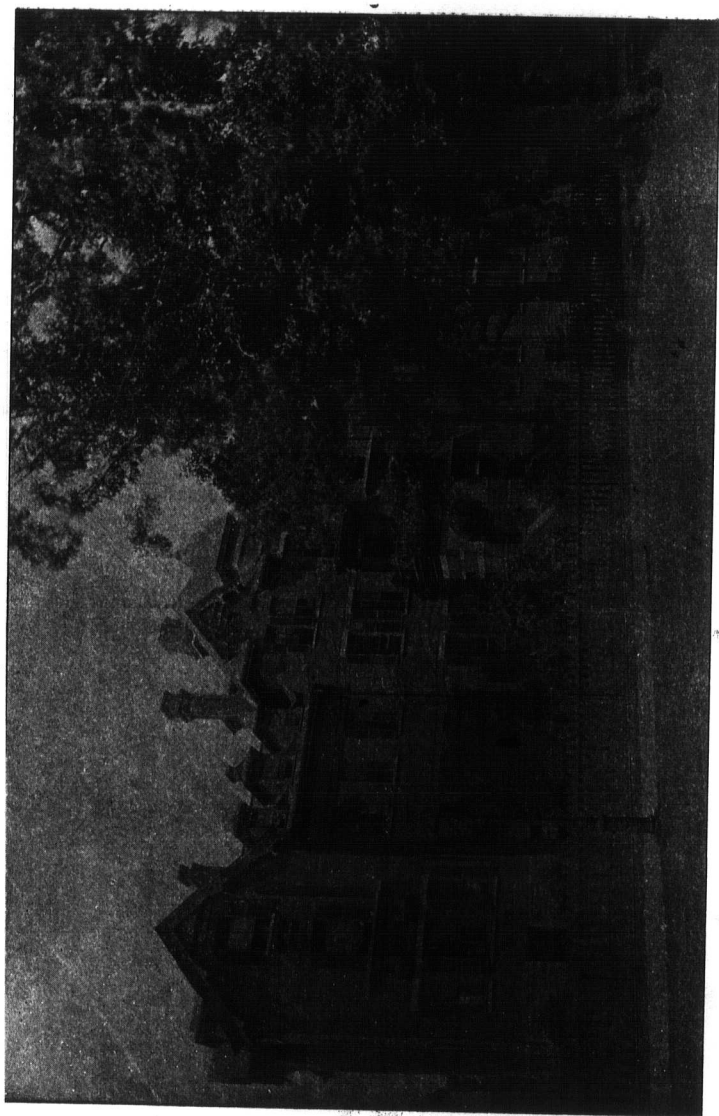

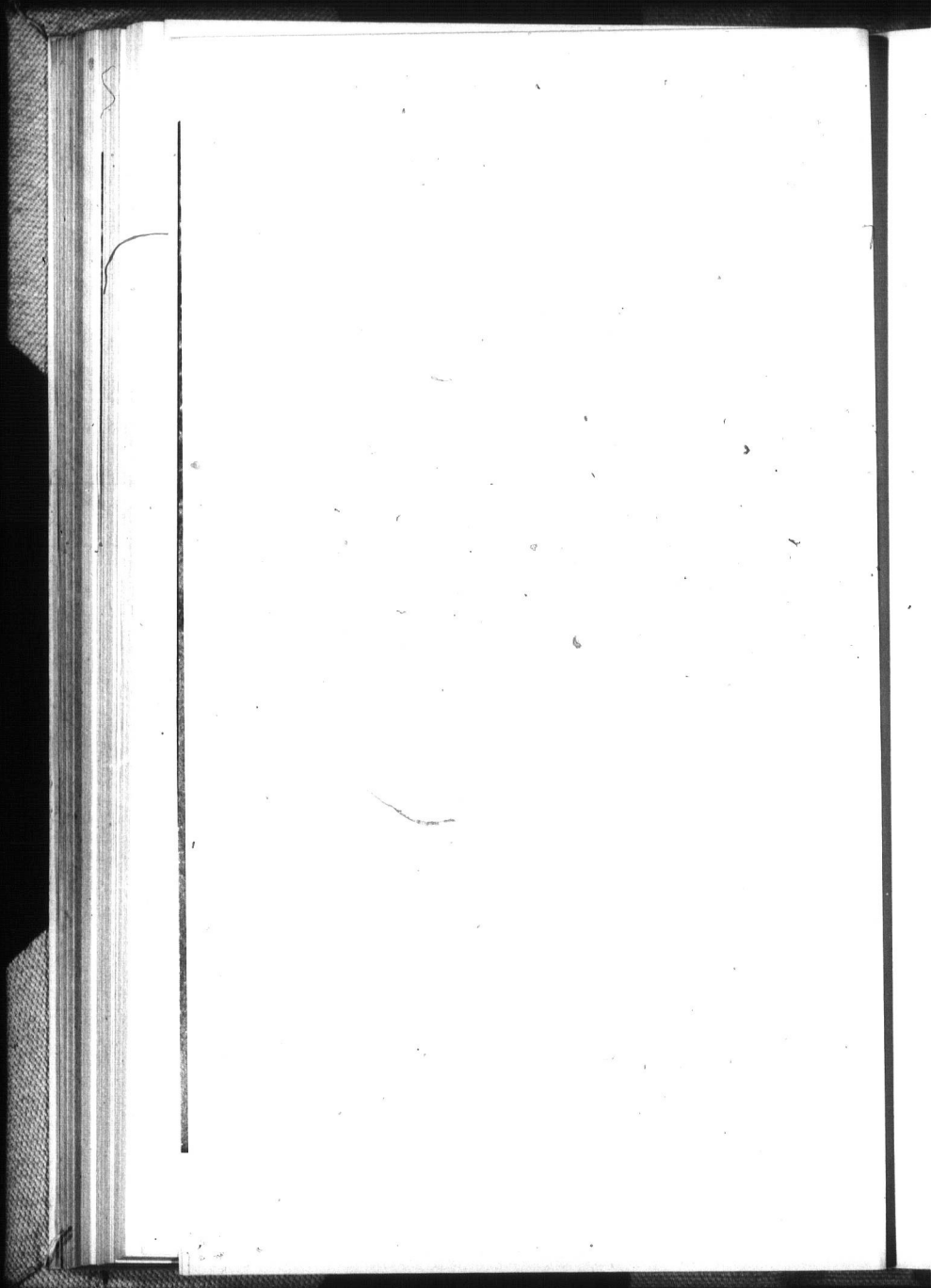

PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME.

The forty-second annual meeting of the Protestant Orphans' Home was held yesterday afternoon in the Home on Dovercourt Road. A large number of ladies and several gentlemen were present. His Honour Lieutenant-Governor Kirkpatrick, presided, and Mrs. Kirkpatrick was also present. On the platform with the Lieutenant-Governor were Mr. H. A. Massey, Major Leigh, Dr. Hunter, Dr. McConnell, Mr. Huson Murray and Rev. John Alexander. Rev. Canon Cayley and Mr. Jas. Perkins, who is a member of the City Council of London, were also present. The boys and girls of the Home, about 200 in number, were ranged along the platform and presented a very creditable appearance indeed. The exercises commenced with the singing of the National Anthem, and prayer by the Rev. Mr. Alexander. Dr. McConnell then, in a brief address presented the institution, on behalf of the lady managers, with large, beautifully framed, photographs of Mrs. Murray, who became a manager of the Home in 1854, and was for 20 years principal directress, and of Mrs. Vankoughnet, the present principal of the board, who was elected to the position in 1877. Mrs. Vankoughnet was absent yesterday through illness. Dr. McConnell referred also to Rev. Dr. Lett, who in 1851 founded the Home, and continued for ten years its chaplain, and to Mr. Wm. Gooderham, who was a life-long friend of the institution, and at his death bequeathed to it \$10,000, whose pictures also adorn the walls of the assembly room. The reports of the secretary, Mrs. Leigh, and of the treasurer, Mrs. R. L. Cowan, were read by Major Leigh. The home was never so full as during the past year, there being in March 216 children. The average has been 195. During the year 80 children have been admitted, 37 boys and 43 girls. Seventy-six children have left the Home, of whom 56 have gone to relatives and friends, the remainder having been taken by farmers or apprenticed. Mrs. Holmsted and Mrs. Wm. Hope are the only retiring managers. The Ladies' Aid of St. Peter's Church had sent in 85 garments, the making of which had given employment to the poor women

of the parish. There has been bequeathed to the Home since the last annual meeting \$100 by Mrs. Henderson, \$300 by Mrs. McNabb, and \$13,000 by Mr. Kitterson, which last had enabled the Board to pay off the \$14,000 mortgage and leave the property free from debt. In acknowledgment of this a special thanksgiving meeting of the managers had been held and it was decided to name one of the wards after Mr. Kitterson.

Some sanitary improvements had been made in the building, and a new furnace had been put in. Miss Wheelwright, who has just concluded her twenty-fifth year as matron was spoken of in the warmest words of praise, and \$100 a year was added to her salary. The managers have been invited to attend the historical conference on charities, to be held at the World's Fair. The receipts for the year, as shown by the treasurer's statement, aggregated \$26,427.21.

The balance now on hand amounts to \$614.27. The Ontario Government's grant, which last year amounted to \$1,168, was, on account of the lateness of the session, not received in time for the annual statement. The reports, on motion of Rev. Canon Cayley, were adopted.

The report of the medical staff was read by Dr. Hunter. During the year there had been an outbreak of measles and croup, but only three deaths had occurred, and the general health of the children had been exceptionally good. The following officers were, upon motion of Mr. Massey, seconded by Mr. Jas. Perkins, appointed for the ensuing year: First directress, Mrs. M. R. VanKoughnet; second directress, Mrs. John Cawthra; treasurer, Mrs. R. L. Cowan; recording secretary, Mrs. Austen; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Leigh; Mrs. H. A. Massey and Mrs. Swabey were added to the Board of Managers, and Mr. H. A. Massey and Rev. Dr. Potts to the council.

In reply to a resolution of thanks to himself and Mrs. Kirkpatrick, the chairman delivered a short address complimenting the Home upon the very fine appearance of its inmates, and stating that he considered it not only a duty but a pleasure to attend meetings of the kind. The children sang a chorus, and Rev. Canon Cayley closed the meeting with prayer.

THE FORTY SECOND REPORT OF THE PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME, 1893.

The Lady Managers of the Protestant Orphans' Home again have the pleasure of presenting their Annual Report to the public. If it were possible to give some of the pathetic histories of the little ones, how much of interest it would give; but these are carefully hidden under a veil of confidence, which is seldom removed.

The Home has never been so full, reaching in March, the large number of 216 inmates.

Number of children admitted during the year, 80. Boys, 37; girls, 43.

Average number of children, 195; average number of inmates altogether, every month, 205. The different denominations were represented by, Church of England, 36; Presbyterian, 14; Methodist, 12; Baptist, 2; Congregationalist, 4; German Church, 1; and Protestants, not named, 11.

Excepting the children from the city and Ontario, the rest, so far as has been ascertained, came from, England 4, Parry Sound 3, Kingston 2, Lakefield 2, Port Hope 2, and Russia, 1 child, whose mother took him in a few days to New York.

With regard to the children who have left the Home, 76 in number, 39 boys and 37 girls, 56 have been taken by relatives or friends. Of these 27 were boys and 29 girls. Nine boys have been apprenticed to farmers in the country; 2 boys and 3 girls have been adopted; of these, two little sisters were placed together in one family, where there were not any children. One boy and 1 girl were sent to Orillia. Two girls returned to The Girls' Home, 1 was taken by her father to the Hospital for Sick Children, and 1 girl, who had grown up in the Home and was apprenticed to it, left, as her time was out. She received her money like any other apprentice, and proved herself a very good girl.

With great regret an outbreak of Measles was observed in the month of April, from the after effects of which two of the children died. Another little girl, who had croup, passed away in presence of her sorrowing father. Nothing could exceed the attentive care of the medical men in attendance, often spending hours during the day with the patients, for which labour of love no words can thank them. Their efforts were well seconded by Nurse Wilton and the nurses belonging to the Home, who tried to alleviate the

sufferings of the invalids ; and when a trained nurse was considered necessary, Miss Awde gave great satisfaction in that capacity.

Many sanitary improvements have been made during the past year. The cellar floor has been concreted ; an ash pit was also built in the yard, in two compartments, for debris of all kinds. During the epidemic of measles, 27 children were sent to the Isolation Hospital, where they received every attention.

A boy, who was taken to the General Hospital with a crushed foot, from part of the furnace falling upon him, returned almost completely cured. One of the girls, who had an operation on her neck performed at the Hospital of St. John the Divine, was most kindly treated by the Sisters in charge. She returned quite well.

To the teachers, who, with patience and gentleness, have instructed the children in the School, the Lady Managers feel most grateful.

During the winter a boy, Alfred Thwaites, was sent in from the country with frozen fingers and feet. He was sent to the Hospital for Sick Children, where he was most skilfully treated, and although the case appeared to be one of great hardship at first, the farmer with whom he lived, came into the city and gave an explanation to the Lady Managers, showing that it had occurred during the intensely cold weather, and that he had no intention of being unkind to the boy by sending him back, as a doctor had previously treated him in his own village. After leaving the Hospital the boy returned to the Home.

The case of another boy came under the notice of the Board. The farmer liked him very much ; he said he was willing to leave him the farm *at his death* ; but the general opinion was, that it would be better for him to comply, from year to year, with the terms of the Indenture. He agreed to this and sent the money. Of course he can do as he sees fit about the farm eventually. The payments for apprentices, numbering over 50, have been made with commendable regularity during the year.

The City Clerk, having written for information about the working of this institution, as well as others, a statistical account was sent in full, as well as a printed report. Mr. Schooley, of Vancouver, wrote for the By-laws and Constitution, as the erection of an Orphans' Home is in contemplation there.

The retiring Managers for the year are Mrs. Holmstead, and Mrs. William Hope, who plead the tie of domestic duties.

Among the many kindnesses received was the very acceptable one of 85 garments, from St. Peter's Ladies Aid, who employed poor women in the Parish to make them, thus doing a double good. A large number of hats were also kindly given to the children by a merchant in the city. Mrs. Henderson thought-

fully left \$100, and Mrs. McNabb \$300, for the benefit of the orphans, and by the legacy of Mr. Kitterson, the sum of \$13,000 fell to the share of the Protestant Orphans' Home, enabling the Trustees to pay off the mortgage held by the McMaster Estate, thus setting the property entirely *free from debt*.

This was felt to be such a matter of rejoicing, that a special Thanksgiving was held by the Managers. It was also proposed to call a ward after Mr. Kitterson, to perpetuate his memory. The Solicitor, Mr. Hewson Murray, who, with infinite trouble to himself, arranged all the business of the matter, deserves the sincere gratitude of the Board.

Under the circumstances, it was decided to add another \$100 a year to the Matron, Miss Wheelwright's salary, to show an appreciation of her long and valuable services. The present is the 25th Annual Meeting she has taken part in.

It was thought advisable to procure a new furnace before the winter, and Mr. Hart A. Massey, one of the Committee of Council, undertook to see Mr. Gurney about it, the result being eminently satisfactory, two of the newest and best kind having been placed in the Home, at a cost of \$1,500, less \$75 discount for ready money. At first, however, it would not draw well, so Mr. Massey got upon the roof and looked down the chimney—like a veritable Santa Claus!—discovering the fact that it was choked with soot, which had to be removed, when the draught was as good as ever. The Lady Managers greatly appreciated Mr. Massey's practical kindness.

During the summer months the Street Railway carried the children free, time and again, to the different excursions given by the Steamboat Company to Victoria Park and other places. Mr. McKendry, of Yonge Street, also provided refreshments and prizes at Island Park and took a personal interest in their enjoyment. The boys went with their Superintendent for walks about twice a week during the holidays; they were also taken, both boys and girls, to the Exhibition in September.

To all kind friends who have contributed so generously to the Orphans, the Lady Managers offer their sincere thanks.

The members of the Board have been invited to attend and take part in an Historical Conference on Charities, to be held in Chicago, during the World's Fair. The Secretary acknowledged the invitation with thanks, and sent the Report of last year.

With many thanks to His Honor, the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, Mrs. Kirkpatrick, and the other kind friends who are present to-day, the Lady Managers of the Protestant Orphans' Home will conclude their Report.

"In reply, I would say that G—— is getting along well. He is a first-class boy in every respect. He is honest, industrious, upright, and perfectly reliable in every way. He is growing quite a large boy ; he is also very healthy ; he has never been a day sick since he came to live with me.

The following letter was written from Manitoba by one of the boys, formerly in the Home :

"MY DEAR FRIEND,

I got to Manitoba at last, and it is a fine country. I came out a year ago last December and struck work the first day I came to the country, for \$1.40, \$1.50 and \$2.00 a day. That was pretty good pay, but I had to work very hard, and it was very cold out threshing, but we have to put up with all that. Then I went in with my brother Tommy (who was also in the Home), and we are doing well. We have half a section of land, 320 acres. We have 175 acres ready for crop ; we started to seed to-day (10th April), and it has all the appearance of a fine spring. We are putting in 150 acres of wheat, and the rest in oats. We have four cows, fourteen pigs and about thirty hens. So, I think, I will close now, with much love.

MEDICAL REPORT.

In presenting the 42nd Annual Medical Report we cannot claim the same freedom from contagious disease that we have generally been able to do. There was a severe epidemic of measles, during which two patients died. This was a low rate of mortality considering the number and severity of the cases. There was one death from croup. Apart from this outbreak the children have—as usual—enjoyed remarkable immunity from disease; in fact, many an anxious mother would like to know the “ways and means” by which Miss Wheelwright preserves the health of such a large family.

However, another year has gone and although it brought its anxious hours to all interested in the “Home,” and especially to those caring for the sick, yet there is abundant cause for thankfulness to Him who loves the little ones, for innumerable blessings.

In concluding this report the attending physicians have again the pleasure of acknowledging the uniform courtesies extended to them by the Board, the Matron, the nurses and especially the grateful recognition by smiles and kindly welcomes of the children for any services rendered them.
