He works without weariness and thinks that he is making progress. He then explained the reason for his fondness for traveling. He said his work was fatiguing, and he must refresh himself with frequent change of scene. Therefore he regarded criticism in this respect, and his nickname of the "Traveling Emperor" as a good joke. He would not allow it to diminish his pleasure of seeing the world. He thought that many Germans ought to travel more, which would tend to strengthen their love for their country. 
