

### THE UNIVERSITY OF ACADIA.

# Acadia College.

ACADIA COLLEGE was founded in 1838. Its location at Wolfville, Nova Scotia, is central to the populations of the Maritime Provinces.

The Charter of the College provides that the Trustees and Governors, together with the Fellows, shall be a body politic and corporate, in deed and in name, and have successors forever as "The Trustees, Governors, and Fellows of Acadia College." It confers on the Corporation power to have and use a common seal, to appoint and remove Professors, to make by-laws and ordinances for the regulation and general management of the College, and to acquire, hold and apply all forms of property for the use and benefit of the same.

The "Body of the College " provided by the Charter, is composed of the Faculty, Six Fellows, and twelve Scholars, upon whom are conferred the powers of a University, and who are designated " The Senate of the University of Acadia." The chief functions of the Senate are those of discipline, the prescribing of courses of study and text-books, the care of the Library and Museum, and the conferring of the learned degrees or any such other degrees of literary, scientific, or technical honors as they may desire, and certificates of merit. At the instance of the Corporation, or otherwise, the Senate may recommend Professors to fill any chairs becoming vacant and Professors to fill new chairs, and present to the Corporation any member of the Faculty guilty of misbehaviour or neglect of duty. The Senate is given power also to do, perform and establish every other thing and matter of a literary and scholastic character pertaining to the University.

The Governors are appointed by the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, one third of them being nominated by the Corporation of the Associated Alumni.

While no religious tests or subscriptions are required, Acadia is designed to be a positively Christian College, not only in resp philosophy to influences w Many now o knowledged deepened in view of the Christian fai tional instituhigher educatian influence

only in respect to the character of its Professors, and in the philosophy taught in its lecture rooms, but especially in the influences which pervade the daily life of the institution. Many now occupying important positions have freely acknowledged that earnest Christian views were developed or deepened in them while pursuing their studies here. In view of the fact that forms of philosophy alien to the Christian faith are finding their platform in many educational institutions, it is of increased importance that the higher education should be available under positively Christ itan influences.

The studies of the Arts Course are comprehensive and thorough; and it is the purpose of the Corporation and the Senate to maintain the College in such a state of efficiency that it shall be able to meet the wants of all young men who desire to obtain a liberal education. A four-years' course has always been required for the degree of B.A.

In connection with the College buildings there are forty acres of land most favourably situated for the various purposes that will be developed in the growth of the institution. The new College erected since the fire of 1877, affords excellent facilities for the purposes of instruction. Its lacture rooms are commodious, well lighted, and easily ventilated, and its Assembly hall supplies spacious accommodation for all public Academic exercises.

Acadia graduated its first class in 1843. Besides the large number who have been admitted as general students, nearly seven hundred, including the present enrolment have entered upon the full undergraduate course, of whom 317 have received the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

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#### MATRICULATION.

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Matriculation.

The regular Matriculation Examination begins on the day named in the Calendar.

Any person of the full age of sixteen years will be admitted to the examination on producing satisfactory evidence of good moral character. The holder of a certificate or license required of Male Teachers of the first-class in either of the Provinces of Canada will be exempted from examination in English, History, Geography, and Mathematics.

Candidates for Matriculation will be required to pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects :

I. Latin. Cæsar, Gallic War, Book I.; Vergil's Æneid, Book I.; Cicero, two Orations against Catiline, or the Manilian Law; Latin Grammar (Harkness' Abridged is preferred); Smith's Principia Latina, Part IV: Exs. 1–25, or the equivalent.

II. Greek. Dr. Smith's Initia Græca, Part I.; Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I.; or Book IV.; Greek Grammar (Hadley's Abridged is preferred.)

III. Mathematics. Arithmetic; Algebra to the end of Quadratic Equations; Geometry, as in Hamblin and Smith, Books I.-IV. (inclusive), or the equivalent thereof.

IV. English. Grammar, Writing from Dictation; and a short composition upon a subject drawn from one of the following works: Shakespeare's Julius Cæsar, and Merchant of Venice; Longfellow's Evangeline; Macaulay's Lays of Ancient Rom sion and divi punctuation

#### MATRICULATION.

Graduates of Horton Collegiate Academy, of the Baptist Seminary of New Brunswick, and of approved High Schools may be admitted without examination, upon presentation of certificates that they have completed the prescribed studies and passed satisfactory examinations thereon.

Students<sup>4</sup>desiring to enter upon the full course or to take general studies, should report themselves to the President, on the day before the opening of the College, for registration. A fee of one dollar is charged for each name entered on the register. Matriculated Students will pay an additional fee of one dollar.

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# Course of Study for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts.

It is expected that the Staff of instruction will be enlarged at the next meeting of the Board of Governors. This will lead to some change in the arrangement of studies. # Examinations, and Standing.

At the end of each Session all the Classes will be examined on the studies of the Session. These examinations will be conducted for the most part by written papers; but oral examinations will be introduced at the discretion of the Faculty. The results of these examinations will be combined with the record of the daily exercises to determine the standing of the student. An average of seventy-five per cent. of the maximum must be made to admit a student to first-class standing.

At the close of each Session the standing of each student will be reported to his parent or guardian, if desired.

# Pegrees and Hees.

The degree of Bachelor of Arts is granted to students who satisfactorily pass the prescribed examinations of the College course.

The degree of Master of Arts may be received at the expiration of three years after the first Degree—subject to the following regulation of the Senate :—

Application for the degree must be sent to the Secretary of the Faculty one year in advance of the time of conferring of the degree. The applicant will be expected to prepare a Thesis on some assigned subject, which must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Faculty before the first of March previous to the time for conferring the degree. Before the next regular meeting of the Senate, the Secretary will communicate to the applicant the report of the committee appointed by the Senate for the examination of such Thesis.

The fee for the Honor Certificate is one dollar; for the Diploma of the Degree of B.A., four dollars; for the Degree of M. A., six dollars.

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# General Students.

The studies of the College are arranged with reference to the wants of students who intend to take the *full course of four years*; but provision is also made to accommodate all who may wish to study for a shorter period in any department, if, after examination, they are found to be prepared to work with existing classes. Such students, on leaving the College, can have certificates of proficiency according to their attainments.

# Expenses.

Students occupying rooms provided by the College authorities, board with the Steward of Chipman Hall. They are charged \$2.60 per week. If two students occupy a room, the rent will vary, according to the location of the room, from \$6 to \$18 per year. Board and lodgings can be obtained in approved places in the village at reasonable rates.

### 1.-SCHOLARSHIPS IN THE ENDOWMENT FUND.

The Governors hold a few Scholarships, which can be assigned to needy and deserving Students. Applications for these should be made to the President. Scholarships held by individuals can also be used for payment of College fees on presentation of the required certificates.

#### 2-THE DeWOLF SCHOLARSHIPS.

There are five of these Scholarships—one of the value of \$25.00 a year, two of \$30.00, one of \$40.00 and one of \$50.00. The nominetion to these Scholarships will be determined by the Senate, according to the class standing, needs and general conduct of applicants.

#### 3.-MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND.

Students who have the Christian Ministry in view and are approved by the churches of which they are members, may, in case assistance is needed, receive an annual appropriation from the Board of Ministerial Education. At the opprovides for Hall.

#### PUBLIC EXERCISES.

At the opening of the College in September, the Senate provides for the delivery of an Oration in the Assembly Hall.

At the close of the First Session the Junior Exhibition is held, when orations are given by members of the class.

On the first Thursday in June the Anniversary of the College is commemorated, at which time the ceremonies connected with the graduation of students and the conferring of degrees, are observed by the Senate.

#### LIBRARY, &c .-

The College Library, containing valuable works in the departments of Literature, Science and Theology, is accessible, under proper regulations, to the students of the College and Collegiate Academy.

The income of the DeWolf Library Fund provides for yearly additions to the Library.

The College is provided with apparatus for experiments in Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Surveying, &c.; also

A Cabinet, well furnished with contributions from various parts of the world, illustrative of the departments of Geology, Mineralogy and Botany.

#### SOCIETIES.

Acadia Athenœum.—The object of this Society is the improvement of the students in debate and public speaking. The laws and regulations of the Society are subject to the approval of the Faculty. Besides its weekly meetings arrangements are made for a course of Public Lectures during each College year.

The Society has under its control a Reading Room furnished with a selection of Newspapers, provincial and foreign, and other periodicals.

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## GENERAL REMARKS.

College Young Men's Christian Association.—A branch of this Society has been formed and is in a flourishing condition. At present there are about 90 members.

Acadia Missionary Society.—This Society holds monthly meetings. Its aim is to cultivate interest in Missionary work, and especially to gain information respecting Christian Missions in foreign lands.

#### PRAYER MEETINGS.

Prayer Meetings, conducted by the Students, are regularly held on Lord's Day morning and on Wednesday evening throughout the College year. These social services have been continuously maintained, it is believed, ever since the founding of the College.

#### REMARKS.

The officers of the College will seek in all proper ways to promote the moral and religious, as well as the intellectual, culture of the Students. All members of the College are expected to attend public worship regularly on the Sabbath. Parents and guardians are requested to give instructions as to the place of worship which they wish the Students under their care to attend. Religious services are held every Sabbath in the village in connection with the Baptists, Church of England, Methodists and Presbyterians.

All Students are expected to be present at Morning Prayers. Opportunity for uniting in Bible study on the Lord's Day will be provided.

Special rules will be announced by the Faculty, from time to time, as circumstances may require. Students will occupy such rooms and lodgings as are approved by the Faculty.

The use of spirituous or malt liquors by students is not permitted.

Inattention to study, or misbehaviour of any kind, will subject the offender to private or public reproof, a record of demerit in the weekly report, or suspension, at the discretion of the Faculty. 1
