## REVENUE.

The whole revenue of this congregation is derived from weekly contributions by envelope and the plate collections.

All subscribers by envelope are supplied with envelopes on the first Sunday in each quarter.

Members and adherents who are not subscribers may be supplied with envelopes on application to any of the Managers.

All subscribers are expected to contribute a fixed sum weekly, and if, fram any cause, they are unable to do so, they shall be expected to make up all deficiencies at their earliest convenience.

Subscribers in arrears are notified of the same on the second Sunday of each month.

Any subscriber wishing to increase or decrease their contributions are requested to notify the Managers so that a corresponding alteration may be made in the books.

Each subscriber is particularly requested to see that their envelopes are properly sealed and their names and pew number on the outside before it is handed in.

#### MISSION COLLECTIONS.

Collections for the Mission Schemes of the Church are received by envelope on the last Sunday of each month, and are placed in the boxes, which will be found on entering the Church just inside the doors.

If not convenient to give on the last of the month, any other time will do.

Those wishing to subscribe by envelope, and who are not at present supplied can secure envelopes by applying to any of the members of the committee or to Mr. Warren, church officer.

It is expected that as far as possible subscribers will give a definite sum every month, and if subscribers fall in arrears they will be notified of the same as often as the committee think it best.

Your Managing Board take pleasure in presenting this their Fifty-first Annual Report which is fairly gratifying considering the depression in trade and that so many are out of work.

We have again to draw your attention to the fact that there are a large number of the congregation who contribute little or nothing towards the support of the church. There has been quite an addition to the membership of late, but very few new subscribers. You will see by the Treasurer's statement that the ordinary revenue for 1894 was \$5939-40, as against \$6376.83 for 1803, or a decrease of \$437.43.

The number of subcribers for 1894 was 475 against 460 the previous year. The average per Sunday for 1894 was \$98.44, as against \$103.20 for 1893.

Your Board would again recommend that pew holders about to leave the church should notify the managers at once so that the seats may be re-allocated.

We would recommend that the balance held by the Treasurer at the close of the year, \$492.33, be transferred to the Sunday School building account.

The Managers whose term expires this year are Messrs McFadden, Wilson and Wright.

## Report of S. S. Building Committee.

To the Congregation of Knox Church :

Your Committee in presenting their report do so with feelings of confidence that their work has been appreciated and that the building now in your possession will long remain a credit to the congregation and of great service to all who have occasion to use it.

Immediately after the appointment of the Committee plans were secured from Mr. Charles Mills, who has had a varied experience in this class of work, These plans were fully criticised, and based upon them tenders were asked for. When these tenders were opened the Committee were somewhat surprised to find that the cost would be over the amount stated at the congregational meeting, and it then became a question if we should go on with the work or go back to the congregation for further instructions. Finally after full deliberation we decided to go on with the work, make a first-class building and trust to the congregation for their approval.

Your Committee cannot but speak in the highest terms of the manner in which all the contractors did their work, but special mention should be made of the architect, who was untiring in his efforts to produce a building complete in all its parts. The thanks of the congregation are also due the architect for the beautiful drinking fountain situated in the main passage.

As a general auditorium we believe the building to be unsurpassed, as the accoustics are perfect, and the sight lines are all that could be desired. As a school room it has many features which are of great advantage in efficiently carrying on the work of a well

organized school; notably 18 class-rooms which open up by folding doors into the general school room, three Bible Class rooms—the scholars being present at the opening and closing exercises, a Secretary's room, Library and cloak room, besides lavatories, etc. We would mention as special features the air shaft and perfect system of ventilation from the floor, four exits, with a possible fifth on to James street, combination gas and electric light, a large slate black board and electric call bells.

Besides these we have a very fine session room with a study and retiring room for the minister, a convenient room for the Board of Managers, and a very commodious ladies' parlor.

The opening exercises of the school will be long remembered as an occasion of great profit and pleasure because of the presence and words of the Rev. A. B. Simpson, of New York, a former pastor of this congregation.

The Committee feel themselves responsible for the debt incurred in connection with the erection of the school and have signed a bond to the Bank of Hamilton, and are individually and collectively responsible for its payment.

Your Committee would recommend that two special collections be taken up for this fund during the present year.

### KNOX CHURCH SUNDAY SCHOOL

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DEC. 31ST, 1894.

In presenting a report of the work done in our school during the past year, we would first render unto God our Father our hearty thanks for all the blessings that have come to us from His bountiful hand, and unto Him alone is due the praise for any progress we may have made in His work. This will ever be a memorable year in our history inasmuch as it has seen the completion of a work begun first in the minds of a few of our most ardent workers some years ago, and from this small beginning gradually growing and gaining ground against almost overwhelming difficulties until not only the whole school but the congregation awakened up to the appreciation of its real importance and entered heart and soul into the cause. We refer to the erection of our handsome new school room, opened 16th of September by Rev. A. B. Simpson, of New York, a former pastor. It is second to none in its general equipment and adaptability for Sunday School work, one of the adornments of our city, and the pride of every Sabbath School spirit in our midst. We cannot refer to this great underfaking without uttering our thanks and our praises to the able body of gentlemen who comprised our building committee for all their arduous and painstaking labors on our behalf.

It is true this year has brought us many unforeseen trials. We were forced to great inconvenience while building operations were in progress, it being found necessary to split our school into two sections, the junior scholars occupying the basement and the advanced

pupils the body of the church. We have to admit that a general state of disorder and confusion has been felt not only during our stay in the church but also since entering our new school. Much of this was looked for however under the circumstances, and we are able to report that our troubles have now almost entirely vanished. Chaos and disorder have given place to discipline and we hope before another year rolls by, if spared, to show a really model school in every particular. We feel that possibly in grappling with the material problems of this year's work we have lost sight to some extent of the most important object of our labors, viz., the gathering in of precious souls for Iesus. We pray God to bless us in the coming year and enable us to consecrate ourselves more devotedly to His cause, our text word being "Forward," and thanks to God our new school room is a standing memorial to the motto.

We have to report that with the consent of the Managers, and by the help of willing workers in connection with our Mission, an addition has been made to the building which serves the double purpose of a kitchen and infant class room. This has proven a great convenience and a decided advantage to our primary work, the class having nearly doubled since this accommodation has been provided.

The Treasurer's report which is presented herewith shows that the collections have been liberal and the money judiciously expended.

#### TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

## Knox Church Missionary Society.

The Missionary Society take pleasure in presenting to the congregation their twenty-sixth annual report, which, although not so satisfactory as in other years, still shows that the missionary spirit is alive in a portion of our membership at least.

We have still to bring before you the fact of the very small percentage of our members contributing to missions, only 113 this year giving monthly and 15 giving yearly, making in all 128 giving systematically to missions out of our large membership of fully 1000 persons. In the congregation are 305 families and about 130 single persons. If even the members grouped as families were to give a little, along with the single persons, our missionary funds would be in a much more flourishing condition.

Appended to our report we have the reports of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society, the Young Ladies' Mission Band, the Y. P. S. C. E., and other excellent societies of our church, and the contributions from these sources, along with special collections noted by our Treasurer, of course add to the money in our hands, but we would wish to impress on the congregation that the monthly collections are the principal source from which we are supposed to draw the money for the different schemes of the church, which the Presbytery expects us to contribute to.

This has been a trial year, and we as a committee have been inactive in the matter of placing missionary intelligence before the congregation, once a month, at the process to have practical success the house mean heath North

the prayer meeting, but the interest in missions seems to have abated this year, and we propose to resume the practice. We hope and pray that our efforts may be successful, and that our Father in Heaven will so move the hearts of our people that they will not only consider it a duty but a privilege to give systematically of their means to carry His blessed gospel not only to the heathen but also to our own fellow countrymen in the North-west.

#### SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## Young People's Bociety of Christian Endeavor.

During the past year we have been called upon, for various reasons, to part with many of our active members, thirty of these having left us. Some have gone to distant parts of our own and other countries, and much as we regret the loss, we are satisfied that many of them are still continuing in the Master's work. We have been able to add to our roll the names of fourteen active and five associate members. One active member has been placed on the honorary list, and six associate members have been transferred to the active list.

In good standing on the roll at this date there are sixty-one active, twelve associate, and nine honorary members.

Seven committees carry on the work of the society, viz: Look-out, Prayer-meeting, Social, Missionary, Visiting, Flower and Relief. On one of these each member is expected to work, and in their various departments they are doing excellent service.

During the year, more particularly the latter half, our prayer-meetings have been much broken up and interfered with, other meetings being held for which it was considered best that ours be given up. These interruptions have had the effect of decreasing the attendance, but we trust that in the new year upon which we have just entered our meetings will be more largely attended. We also hope for an increased interest in our society by the young people of the church, and for this we pledge ourselves to work.

The work of the Look-out Committee consists in calling on the new church members and those who are absent from the consecration meetings of the society, and in endeavoring to obtain new members.

The members of the Prayer-meeting Committee see that leaders are supplied for each prayer-meeting, and select appropriate hymns for the same. This committee also takes note of those who participate in the service, and any who fail to take part are interviewed by the members of the committee, and by this means they are able to arouse the interest of those who may be growing somewhat indifferent.

The Social Committee have provided one social, and have always tried to promote friendliness and sociability among the members, as well as keeping a watchful eye on strangers, helping them to become acquainted.

As often as possible the members of the Missionary Committee have attended the Thursday evening prayermeeting at the Mission school. They also look after the distribution of the Missionary Library, to which new volumes are being added from time to time, and which are being read with much profit and pleasure by many of our members. The Golden Rule and other papers are distributed among the fire halls and barber shops, and for these the committee has received many expressions of gratitude. The Fulton plan of giving at least two cents a week for missions is still found to be very satisfactory and is proving a good educator along the line of systematic giving, which, we feel, ought to be more widely practised. Small boxes have been provided for each member by the committee, in which to place the offerings, and these are brought in at the end of every quarter.

The remaining three Committees—Visiting, Flower and Relief,—have worked most harmoniously together, and too much can scarcely be said in their favor. The first mentioned has done a splendid work, and notwithstanding the fact that they were very few in numbers, have made one thousand and seventy-five visits.

Besides the usual basket of flowers every Sunday, the Flower Committee has added extra floral decorations on special occasions, and have distributed throughout the year five hundred bouquets. Many messages of gratitue and appreciation have come to this committee from those to whom flowers have been carried. "God's messengers" have comforted many a sick and sorrowing one where words of ours would fail. We wish here to thank any friends who have placed cut flowers or plants at the disposal of the committee.

The Relief Committee have made three hundred and eighty-four visits and has held fifty cottage prayer-meetings. Those who are unable to attend the church services have been much cheered by these Sunday evening meetings in their homes. This committee has provided cabs in which to convey aged or infirm church members to the communion services, and has also given out food, clothing, and money to those in need.

In closing this Report we would express our thankfulness to our Father who has led us so safely through the year, and we will go forward with renewed energy and a stronger desire to do larger things for Him "whose we are and whom we serve."

## CONSTITUTION

\_\_\_OF\_\_\_

# KNOX CHURCH, HAMILTON.

1st.—The Church, Manse, Burying Ground, and any other houses or real estate now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the Congregation, shall be held in trust by three members of the said Congregation, in full Communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the Sixth Day of September, in the year of our Lord. One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in full Communion with the Congregation shall have the role power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said Congregation.

3rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the Members of the Congregation, which shall have been called from the pulpit of the Church by the officiating minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of Members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of the Elders shall be determined from time to time by the Session, as occasion may require, but the election shall be by the Members of the Congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in clause third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the Congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Nine managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the Congregation, three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy occurring by resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings without leave shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall select their own Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary, hold regular meetings as often as their business may require, and may give notice of their meetings, either from the pulpit on Sabbaths or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Five Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more

Members of the Congregation in full standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a special meeting of the Congregation, stating the object in the notice thereof; and no business shall be entertained at any Special Meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a Member of the Congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular chartered bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, moneys from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general purposes not connected with the Congregation shall be under the control of the Managers, with the concurrence of the Minister.

9th.—The whole revenues of the Congregation from all sources shall be received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of stipend, salaries and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars shall be gone into without the cousent of the Congregation. The "Poor Fund," however, shall be distributed by the Session and contributions for Missionary and Benevolent purposes shall be distributed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The Members of the Congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor, and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the Congregation for their acts, and shall, at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate statement of the Income and Expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the annual meeting; and said-Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the Congregation at any Special or Annual Meeting.

18th.—A Committee, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the Congregation, shall annually arrange for the printing—in pamphlet form—of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the Congregation, together with the list of office-bearers, members

and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the Congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting, and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be Chairman of the said Committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the Congregation.

15th.—At each annual meeting the Congregation shall elect three Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th.—The foregoing rules shall be in force until altered or amended, and no motion to alter or amend said rules shall be put unless due notice of such motion has been given at the annual meeting of the Congregation, and when notice of motion shall have been made, a special meeting of the Congregation shall be called to consider the same, not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months after said annual meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing rules no one shall be held to be a member of the congregation who is not in full communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the Communion Roll of the said Congregation, and no others than members in full communion shall be allowed to vote at any Congregational meeting.
