ACCUSED OF THEFT ARE UNDER ARREST

Two Young Men Arrested At Bathurst By Chief Crawford.

EXAMINATION MONDAY.

The two young men, LeTourneau and Moore, accused of taking a sum of money and some jewelry from Rollin Curtis, the St. John storekeeper, were captured at Bathurst by Chief Crawford Tuesday. On the return journey Moore was sitting in a seat with the Chief and the other had asked to be permitted to get a drink and the Chief allowed him to do so. He went to the rear of the car, opened the door and jumped. The train was running at a high rate of speed and although the conductor was notified a stop was not made until Bathurst was reached. The Chief telegraphed to Sheriff Doucet and then both Moore and LeTourneau were arrested and taken to the station. They were held in the lock-up until Monday. Both were remanded until Monday. LeTourneau is out on \$500 bail, but Moore is still in the lock-up.

WORLD TRADE WITH BRITAIN

Henry Chaplin Says Bulks of Canadian Trade Would Go Over The Sea.

PREFERENCE NEEDED.

MONTREAL, Sept. 21.—The Canadian Associated Press cables from London the following: Henry Chaplin, a former president of the board of agriculture and member of the tariff commission of 1904, speaking today at Stourbridge, said that at present Canada required annually to purchase goods to the amount of \$50,000,000 sterling, and if England had conceded the slight preference she asked, the whole of that market would have been placed at the disposal of workers in England because duties would have been imposed upon other countries which would have prevented their interfering. That was an offer made by Canada some years ago, of which, with the greatest folly and unwisdom, we failed to avail ourselves at the time. Other nations, he feared, were now in competition with this country or similar favors from Canada.

PEARY COOK, AND THE POLE CONTROVERSY

Both Explorers Give Interviews, But Say Nothing Important.
Before leaving Sydney Commander Peary granted an important interview to the press men. He said: "I have already made a brief report to the naval department of the United States and to the Coast Geographical Survey. In a short time I shall make an authoritative account to the Peary Arctic Club. Finally I shall report the results of our trip and meteorological observations and soundings to O. H. Tipton, superintendent of coast survey. Asked how you heard Peary's statement to the effect that Cook told him that he had discovered the pole when the two met at Etah?"

THE PULPWOOD QUESTION

American pulp and paper interests are still anxiously enquiring what Canada intends to do on the pulpwood question in view of the situation created by the Alton tariff. There are many Americans who are still in doubt as to the exact meaning of the new tariff provisions affecting Canadian pulp and paper. The New York Journal of Commerce says of the matter: "It is reported from Montreal to be certain that the province of Quebec will assimilate its policy to that of Ontario in regard to the exportation of wood for pulp-making grown on the crown lands, which are leased for the cutting. This means an absolute prohibition of the export of some away with the export tax, which now discriminates the Quebec policy from that of Ontario. That will simplify the application of the countervailing duty levied for in our new tariff, so far as these provinces are concerned, and they are the only ones affected. It will simply result in imposing a duty of one-twelfth of a cent a pound dry weight, upon mechanically ground wood for pulp from these provinces, instead of leaving it free from duty as from other sources, and will add one-tenth of a cent a pound to the duty on printing paper from there, when valued at three cents a pound or less." There will be no equivalent of an export tax to be added.

The provision for the countervailing duty makes no distinction between pulp or paper made from wood from Crown lands and from other sources, but the instructions lately given by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue to the Collector of Customs at Ogdensburg made that distinction and directed that the duty be collected only from pulp or paper made from wood from the Crown lands. If that is the proper construction of the law, it will affect only the smaller part of those articles imported from the two provinces, for it is said that somewhere from fifty to seventy per cent of those imported come from material grown on private property. The provision cannot prohibit the export of those or impose a tax upon it. That can only be done by the Dominion Government, and it is understood that it is not disposed to adopt any such policy.

It is said, however, in the despatch from Montreal, that "the Canadian press is almost unanimously in favor of Provincial and Federal prohibition of the export of pulp wood." It is argued that American paper makers are dependent upon Canada for their supply of this material, and if it is cut off, not only the grinding of the pulp, but the making of the paper, will have to be largely transferred to Canadian soil, building up the industries there. While that policy does not seem likely to be adopted by the Canadian Government, it is an interesting question what the consequence would be if it should be so.

Would it be "unduly" discriminatory against the United States and lead to imposing the additional twenty-five per cent ad valorem to the minimum tariff upon all imports from Canada? If there should be a general prohibition of the exportation of wood for pulp-making from Canada it would cover all the provinces and all the material, whether from public or private lands; but it would apply to exporting to any and all countries, and not to the United States alone. Would the fact that the United States affords practically the only available market for the material make this a "unduly" or otherwise?—Quebec Telegram.

EDITOR'S MAIL

Editor Campbellton Graphic.

Would you kindly allow me space in your valuable paper to state the conditions of our work at Caughnawaga?

As perhaps many of your readers know, this is an Indian Mission situated about nine miles from the city of Montreal.

Caughnawaga is derived from an Indian name, Ka-na-wa-ka, meaning "at the rapids." When the Indians first settled here they chose for their place of settlement that land at the rapids. But as the river was the highway, many of the people lost their lives in crossing the river at this place, so they decided to move camp up the river. The village was now near rapids just opposite the town of LaSalle.

The population of Caughnawaga at the last census was given at four thousand, of whom the French who have become in the eyes of the law Indians are included in the estimate. The natives of this place belong to the Huron tribe.

There is one Protestant Mission on the reserve of which the Rev. A. E. Mathews is the pastor, assisted by one of our Indians from Oka, Mr. Lazarus Flett, who is studying for the ministry.

This church was established here in the year 1857, and the Rev. Mr. Dienne was appointed the Missionary. A few years before this time some able local preachers were sent down to hold services under the superintendency of the Rev. J. J. Olo, who was then a student at the Wesleyan Theological College and who visited the Mission about once a month.

The only place to hold services at this time was in somebody's kitchen and therefore the place was not a great one and scarcely recognized it to be a place of worship.

In the year 1895 a school house was built, erected and this up to the present time has served the purpose of school and church combined. Need here to say with the population before this what is the need for our services.

In the year 1905 the property on which the parsonage house stands was

in the United States about 16 per cent of the acres are granted after three or four years of married life.

After reading Dr. Cook's description of the trip to the North Pole, the wonder is that anybody failed to reach the coveted spot.

Of course the North Pole may have been discovered, but the discoverer carelessly neglected to saw a piece of the ice and bring it back to show us that we would have had a church built where we could bring the people together, to give them the message of the Gospel, as it is very difficult to get to many of them out to the workers in the school.

The Missionary Society has asked that we raise \$400 for this purpose. This has been no easy thing to do, but not furnished. In 1907 the church property was bought, but all this was not without difficulty, as the council man did all in their power to keep us from getting the two lots; and when obtained tried to recall the property. We had hoped that we should have had a church built where we could bring the people together, to give them the message of the Gospel, as it is very difficult to get to many of them out to the workers in the school.

There is nothing apparently to show that the North Pole is any different from any other spot in all the countless miles of eternal ice and snow. But it is the Pole.

In the statement of receiving Peary's story from Battle Harbor the world has developed the wonderful feat performed by a man in carrying in transmitting over four thousand words of press matter from a station equipped only for marine work. It is one of the most wonderful things yet done to the credit of wireless telegraphy and adds another feather to the cap of the Chevalier Marconi.

The North Pole does not appear to have been so bad a spot after all. The weather was comparatively mild, and Peary's lack followed him right to his goal. Five hours after his arrival at the top of the earth the clouds cleared away and he was favored with weather such as that experienced in the Canadian West. In February, the minimum was only 23 below, while the mercury at one time climbed as high as 12 below and the sky was cloudless.

INFORMATION IN INDIAN REPORT

Various Bands Are in Good Shape—Healthy and Fairly Prosperous

Province of Quebec, Mimosas de Restigouche, Pointe St. Germe, May 1, 1909
Frank Polley, Esq., Deputy Supt. General of Indian Affairs.

Sir—I have the honor to submit my annual report for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1909.

Reserve—This reserve is situated on the northern bank of the Restigouche river, in the township of Mann county of Bonaventure, in the province of Quebec, opposite the town of Campbellton, N. B.

Population—The population of this agency is 496, an increase of 5. There were 24 deaths and 19 deaths during the past year.

Health and Sanitation—The health of these Indians has been fairly good, excepting for smallpox, which broke out among them during the winter. The sanitary precautions have been well carried out, and the disease appears to be well stamped out now.

Occupations—These Indians devote themselves to farming, lumbering, river-driving, ship-loading, acting as guides for tourists; a few make barrels, axes and pencils, which they sell to the general public. They are generally active and command good wages when hired out.

Buildings—Though small, their houses are fairly good and of good material, well furnished, such as those of Peter Gray, Mrs. I. Isaac, Thomas McCallie, Sr., Frank Metcalfe, Sam Gray, Louis Michel, Polymer Martin and James Ritchie, and others. The houses are generally well kept.

Education—Their school is kept by the good woman, Mrs. Ritchie, who does great praise for the advancement of their pupils. Unfortunately the attendance is not as good as it should be, but I am happy to say that there is an improvement since last year.

Characteristics and Progress—Near all these Indians are industrious. A good many are progressing, though very few have laid away anything for a rainy day.

Temperance and Morality—I am sorry to say that a great number of the Indians are still addicted to strong drink, and they can procure the same very easily from the neighboring county in spite of our watching and prohibition.

Their morality is not as good as one would desire; nevertheless, I am pleased to say that there is improvement.



HORSE, HITCHED TO WAGON, FOUND DEAD TIED TO TREE

FREDERICTON, Sept. 21.—The result of what was a very brutal and inhuman act was discovered yesterday in the postage woods between the 2nd and Bolton streets and about three-quarters of a mile from the main postage road. It was the dead body of a horse tied to a tree and hanged by a wagon. The horse had evidently been drawn up to the tree and tied there by the driver who walked off and allowed the poor animal to remain there until it died.

After a scuffle both were handcuffed together and led through the streets to the police station followed by a crowd of 200, who booed the deputies and hissed and started to the police station. Sergeant Smith at the head of a squad of policemen, charged the crowd and the hostile demonstration stopped. It stood in front of city hall for fully half an hour, and only backed a leader to get into a mild riot against the enforcement commission. No one was hurt.





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
