A MERRY WAR IS ON IN NEWCASTLE

**Miramichi Hotel is Closed and
Citizens Take Sides in the
Fight Over Scott Act En-
forcement.**

The town of Newcastle is much
aroused over the denouncement
that has followed the attempt to
rigidly enforce the Scott Act and
many opinions are expressed pro
and con on the subject. The Mir-
amichi hotel closed its doors after it
had stood repeated fines and a raid
in which about \$300 worth of liquor
was seized and will be destroyed by
order of the court. The manager
states that in consequence of the
orders he had received from the
police he had stopped selling all
liquor but before he had a chance
to send this out of the country the
hotel was raided and the goods
taken. Even if he had not been
selling he understood that the fines
were to go on for past offences
against the act and rather than suf-
fer such heavy, and from his stand-
point unfair losses, he closed up the
hotel after acquainting his brother
who is in the west with the state
of affairs and receiving a communi-
cation from him to the same effect.
The house did not pay without the
operation of the bar and it is a
smaller loss to pay the \$10 rental
each day and take nothing in, than
to run the house. The house is not
a public property as many suppose
and it can be closed or opened at
the proprietor's will, though natu-
rally the latter would not close it if
he could get along in any other way.
The hotel now has all its blinds
down and presents a far different
appearance from the normal busi-
ness and activity that it generally shows.
The yard is closed by a high gate
of boards roughly nailed together
and the yard which usually contains
a half-dozen teams of guests and
occasionally a few autos is now the
sole property of the hotel's cow
which provides the necessary laqueal
fluid for the few who remain in the
house for its protection.

Speaking with some of the coun-
cil who are in favor of the strict en-
forcement of the act, the opinion
seemed to be general among them
that the fight would go on and the
aldermen would not give in, though
what steps they were taking to avoid
accommodations for the public un-
der the unusual circumstances could
not be learned. The inconvenience
to the travelling public is no small
one and merchants are finding that
the travellers who carry heavy lines
of samples are unable to display
their goods in the town and already
some have informed the Newcastle
buyers that they must come to
Chatham to inspect the lines they
carry. A large number of the up-
river citizens seem to have taken
sides with the hotel management
judging by their actions on last
Saturday night. It is said that
about ninety of them came down in
the Dorothy No. but that when they
found they could not get a bottle or
even a quencher for their thirst they
refused to make their customary
purchases in the stores and infor-
med some of the shopkeepers that
under the circumstances they would
do their buying in both lines of wet
and dry goods elsewhere.

The county court met at New-
castle yesterday and provision had
to be made for the judge and some
of the outside lawyers in private
houses.

The contest will certainly be
watched with interest not only in
Newcastle but throughout the
county—Gazette.

DAVID RUSSELL SUED FOR DEFAMATION

**Action Brought As a Result of
Russell's Evidence In
"Conspiracy Case"**

Montreal, May 31.—The inscrip-
tion prepared by Mr. David Russell,
through his attorneys, in the case
of E. R. Carrington, plaintiff,
versus David Russell, defendant,
was dismissed with costs, in a
judgement given yesterday by
Judge Laurendeau, in the practice
court, and the ground is now clear-
ed for the main case to proceed on
its merits.

The judgement given yesterday,
and the defendant's inscription,
deal mainly with the privileges of
a witness and his immunity from
damage suits afterwards. In the
case the plaintiff is suing defendant
for defamation and he claims \$25,
000 damages.

In the former case Mr. David
Russell had been plaintiff, and had
sworn that the plaintiff had been
party to a conspiracy against the
present defendant in order to have
him incarcerated in a lunatic asy-
lum.

ORANGEMEN MEET AT FREDERICTON

**Sovereign Grand Lodge Com-
pletes Interesting Conven-
tion**

Fredericton, May 30.—The Sov-
ereign Grand Orange Lodge of
British America, which opened its
83rd annual meeting on Wednesday,
is expected to have an unusually
short session here. At noon today
it was said that it was not unlikely
that the business would be all con-
cluded some time tonight, so that
delegates would be able to leave for
their homes to-morrow morning.
There is nothing of a contentious
nature to come before the Grand
Lodge, and with a smaller attend-
ance than usual it is not expected
that the sessions will be protracted.
This morning there was a formal
civic welcome, Mayor Hooper and
Ald. Guthrie visiting the Grand
Lodge, and, on behalf of the citizens,
welcoming the delegates.

On behalf of the Grand Lodge,
Grand Treasurer W. J. Parkhill, of
Midland, Ont., and Mr. Fred Dane,
of Toronto, replied.

Afterwards an address of welcome
was read by County Master E. H.
Clarkson, of Stanley, on behalf of
York County Lodge.

Considerable time was taken up
with the report of the committee on
legislation, and this afternoon the
committees on finance, correspond-
ence, etc., are expected to make
their reports.

Towards the close of this morn-
ing's session Sir Mackenzie Bowell
and Hon. Dr. Sproule, M. P., on the
invitation of Dr. H. V. B. Bridges,
the principal, and accompanied by
Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., visited the
Provincial Normal School. The
students gathered in the Assembly
Hall, and addresses of an appropri-
ate nature were delivered by Sir
Mackenzie, Hon. Dr. Sproule and
Mr. Crockett. The proceedings
closed with the students joining in
singing O Canada, and the Nation-
al Anthem.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell has a close
rival in the race for the honor of
being the oldest Orangeman in at-
tendance at the Grand Lodge Ses-
sions. Sir Mackenzie has been an
Orangeman for sixty-seven years
and is in his 89th year, while
Howard Segee, of this city, who is
in charge of the door at the Grand
Lodge session, will be sixty-six years
an Orangeman if he lives until this
fall, and is about 80 years of age.

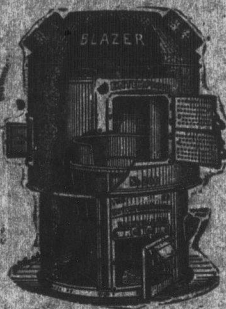

LOGS!

The following is an extract from the Criminal Code of Canada:

"391. Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to three years imprisonment, who:

(a) Without the consent of the owner thereof,

(1) Fraudulently takes, holds, keeps in his possession, collects, conceals, appropriates, purloins, sells, or causes or procures or assists to be taken possession of, collected, concealed, received, appropriated, purchased or sold, any timber, mast, spar, saw-log, or other description of lumber which is found afloat in, or cast ashore on the bank or beach of any river, stream or lake, or

(2) wholly or partially defaces or adds or causes or procures to be defaced or added, any mark or number on any such timber, mast, spar, saw-log, or other description of lumber or makes or causes or procures to be made, any false or counterfeit mark or any such timber, mast, spar, saw-log, or other description of lumber, or

(3) refuses to deliver up to the proper owner thereof, or to the person in charge thereof, on behalf of such owner, or authorized by such owner to receive the same, any such timber, mast, spar, saw-log, or other description of lumber.

The following is an extract from "The Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick 1903" Chapter 15, Sections 1 and 2.

Respecting Trespasses to Lands and Lumber.

1. Any person who shall fraudulently and wilfully cut or cause to be cut, or being cut, carry away or cause to be carried away off any lands, any lumber, and any person who shall by himself or another, fraudulently and wilfully take, carry away, convert to his own use, or possess himself of any lumber, the property of another, lying or being in or near any river, pond, bay or inlet, or the bank or shore thereof, without the consent of the owner or person in lawful charge thereof, whether the owner be known or not, or injure, cut up or destroy any such lumber, or wantonly or maliciously cut away or cast afloat any boom for preserving the same, or any raft of lumber, or hay cut, obliterate or deface the mark by which the same may have been distinguished, shall be liable to the owner of such lumber, raft or boom respecting which such act shall have been committed in an action for double the value of the property taken or injured.

2. The owner of any such lumber may at any reasonable time, by himself or his agent, enter in a peaceable manner upon any mill, mill pond, boom, or raft of lumber, in search of any such property he may have lost, any person wilfully preventing such search, shall for each offence be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars and costs, to be paid to the person by whom or on whose account such entry may have been claimed.

IS IT ALL OVER?

A few weeks ago a mass meeting of citizens was held in the Opera House at which a resolution of protest was passed against the Doherty verdict and forwarded to the Attorney General. Beyond the bare acknowledgment of receipt nothing has yet been heard from the Hon. Mr. Grimmer or his department and we just want to jog his memory a bit and ask what he is going to do about it.

In the famous or infamous Doherty trial a verdict was brought in which two of the jurymen publicly stated in the press was not the verdict arrived at in the jury room. The counsel for the defence is amazed, the prisoner himself does not know whether he stands on his head or feet, and the common people all wonder at the return of such a verdict.

If a verdict is returned which is directly contrary to the evidence, and in contradiction to the judges' charges to the jury, has the crown authorities no power to step in and investigate the conduct of the trial? If a jury returns a verdict which is not in accordance with the charge of the judge can it be called a legal verdict. We may be wrong but we are of opinion it is not. According to the evidence of two of the jurymen we are informed that "Not guilty of the charge of murder" was the correct verdict arrived at leaving the crown free (as they were informed) to prosecute on the charge of manslaughter. Now Mr Attorney we only want you to investigate this matter in a plain and orderly manner. This is not to be made a political matter unless it is desired and we really think that the unanimous request of a town like Campbellton should be attended to.

CLEAN UP

Now that we have committed ourselves to have a day to ourselves during "Old Home Week" it behooves us to get a hustle on and make some shape at cleaning up.

Many who have recently built and are building have not had much chance to get their properties cleaned up as they would like, but many others have not that excuse.

Could nothing be done with the property at the head of Water Street next to the crossing? It is more like a dumping ground than anything else, and as the advertising committee will likely be erecting a banner at this point, the owner might endeavour to do a little to it and make it at least look respectable by throwing a few loads of excavated material over it and making it level. Then some complaints are heard regarding the play grounds at the school and we know a word to the Board is all that is necessary and the work will be done. Come now and let us do our best. Every little helps and its all for the good of the town. Don't let us be ashamed of our home on July 11th 1912.

L. C. R. SUNDAY TRAINS

The objection to a Sunday through train on the Intercolonial Railway does not seem to be any more reasonable than the old time protests against Sunday street cars. It is only a few years since the latter were tolerated in the city of Toronto but communities as they grow larger are apt to take a broader and more liberal view of what ought and what ought not to be done on the Sabbath. Indeed, the necessities of the time compel them to do so. If the public by acquiescence has agreed to the operation of Sunday passenger trains on the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways, there surely can not be much objection to the Intercolonial meeting the competition of these lines by running the Ocean Limited on Sundays as well as week days. It has formerly been the

practice to hold this train over in Montreal on Saturdays and have it depart on Sundays from Montreal, so as to avoid Sunday operation in New Brunswick and in Nova Scotia. In order to reach its destination the train must run somewhere part of Sunday, and we cannot see that the Sabbath is violated any the less by the railway in Quebec than in the other provinces. If the Intercolonial is to be a success it must meet the wishes of the public, and it is unfair to try and handicap it because it is a government railway.—Globe.

THE MARRIAGE LAW ARGUMENT AT OTTAWA

Counsel Explains Position in Quebec

Ottawa, May 29.—What is considered to be the crucial point in the argument of counsel opposing the right of the Dominion parliament to enact the Lancaster Marriage Bill was reached in the Supreme Court Tuesday afternoon when P. B. Migneault K. C., of Montreal, asserted that the general public misunderstood, and many legal lights seemingly deliberately misconstrued the marriage law of Quebec. "Marriage may be prevented by means of the opposition of the father, mother, tutor or prior consort of one of the parties," he said. "In this event there must be some officer, priest or minister who by legislation is charged with the solemnization. Take the city of Montreal for instance. There are about fifty Catholic parishes in that city and about three times as many other demonstrations. The law requires that to stay a marriage, notice must be served on some officer. It is set forth in the act that the articles of marriage must say there is no opposition. This shows the status of the parties. My contention is that there must be some one party with special qualifications to solemnize marriage."

Justice Idington—"In the case of a priest, must it be a priest in charge of a church?"

Mr. Migneault—"It must be the parish priest."

Justice Idington—"Suppose a man does not belong to any parish?"

Mr. Migneault explained that in the Catholic church a man without a fixed place of residence was held to be a member of the parish in which he had been baptized.

Justice Idington—"Supposing a man of no church and a woman of no church were married and lived together for some years, what would be their status under the Quebec laws?"

Mr. Migneault—"The marriage would be null. I should say there never had been a marriage."

Justice Idington—"Then the children would be illegitimate?"

Mr. Migneault—"Not under our laws in Quebec. Article 63 clearly says that if the marriage is contracted in good faith in this way, but through ignorance of the parties as to the law, the children are protected. The point is absolutely misconceived and misconstrued by people who are responsible for the agitation. It is not the law of the province of Quebec and never was."

Justice Idington—"Can he (meaning the husband) marry again?"

Mr. Migneault—"As there is no marriage he is free to do so."

Justice Idington—"You contend that parliament has no power to declare the status thus brought about."

Mr. Migneault—"The solemnization is left to the provinces, and the dominion cannot interfere in a putative marriage, such as you refer to."

Argument against the right of Parliament to pass a marriage law was continued before the Supreme Court this morning by Migneault, K. C. He declared that in the province of Quebec at present there was no need for such legislation, as all marriages before authorized persons were recognized.

PRINCE OF WALES NEAR HIS MAJORITY

Will Legally Come of Age on June 23rd Next

The Prince of Wales will reach his legal majority on June 23rd, when he will have his own special household and large suites suitably appointed and set apart at Buckingham and Windsor Palaces. Queen Mary will personally superintend the furnishing and decoration of these palaces. The King will continue to supervise the occupations and pursuits of the boy, but the Prince will have a governor and controller of the household, an equerry, and two staff secretaries, as well as a large staff of servants at special wages, and coachmen and grooms.

The Prince of Wales will not sever himself from his affectionate family life, but will be able to entertain his friends at luncheons and dinners in his own apartments. He will receive his invitations direct, and not through the King. The regency of the Queen is created in the event of the prolonged absence or dire misfortune to the King. This would be the situation on June 23rd, when the Prince of Wales would legally be able to take the King's position in an emergency.

The King's fourth son, Prince George, went to his first school last week. He accompanied his brother, Prince Henry, to the private school at Broadstairs, where the latter has been for nearly three years, greatly to the benefit of his health, which, combined with his highly nervous temperament, caused a good deal of anxiety to his parents some time ago.

The Princess Mary, following the example of her aunt, Princess Victoria, keeps copy of a diary. She has been observed making entries in a blue-covered volume at the Royal Academy, especially before the Royal pictures.

M'DRIDE PLEADS FOR NAVAL SUPREMACY

"The time has come for Canada to show to the empire and the whole world what she can do, and what she intends to do, to help the mother country, which as done so much for her children while they were growing up," declared Hon. Richard McBride, Premier of British Columbia, as he landed on Saturday, from the Empress of Britain, which brought him from England where he had conferred with Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty on Canadian naval matters. It is the duty of Canada to co-operate in the maintenance of British naval supremacy.

"Something serious should be done said Mr. McBride, "and this should be done quickly. As for British Columbia, no real policy founded on up-to-date and substantial lines will be too much."

The body of another of the Titanic disaster victims, James McGrady of Belfast, Ireland a fireman, has been recovered by the steamer Algerine, a sealer, which is under charter by the White Star Line. Word to this effect was sent by wireless to Cape Race the Algerine at the time being within forty miles of that station.

Immediately after sending this information the Algerine set out on a ten days' cruise to further search the seas in the vicinity of the scene of the disaster in the hope of securing more bodies. The Canadian steamer, which also has been prosecuting the search for bodies, was spoken by the Algerine several days ago.

Fortunes in Tea Cups

Did you ever learn to tell fortunes in teacups? Some of you say: "There's nothing in it. It's just foolishness." But that is a mistake. There is any amount of fun wrapped up in the weird, uncanny-looking tea leaves, and now that the long cold days have come and the tea hour seems the coziest in the day your popularity will be established by enlivening your little tea-parties by telling your friends' fortunes.

Here is the way to do it. Brew the tea in a teapot without a strainer, or put a spoonful of tea in the cup itself and pour the hot water directly upon it. The tea must all be drunk except a few drops, which serve to keep the leaves in circulation. The cup must be whirled around three times, then turned on the saucer three times. Then begins the fortune-reading.

A lover (either man or woman, because sometimes you have "pink" tea parties) is represented by a number of dots in which one figure stands separate.

Two dots side by side mean an engagement.

An offer of marriage is shown by a figure kneeling in the cup.

A group of dots, three in a row, means that the offer will be accepted. Without them the lover has no chance.

Three large dots in the shape of a parallelogram will bear watching. These mean illness, sad news, or loss of home.

Three large dots in triangular shape mean just the contrary—good news, good fortune and good health.

If the following signs will tell you just what to expect: Four dots in a square tell of an important letter. A dot within the square means there is something in the letter which you will be glad to hear or something you want to receive, as money, a check, books, etc., arriving within the square or near it indicates bad news in the epistle.

A long journey is indicated by a long line of dots extending half way around the cup. A group of dots near the terminus of the journey denotes that you will be greeted by a large circle of friends upon your arrival.

If you wish for something very much, indeed, three small dots in a triangular shape bid you hope the wish is about to come true.

Very large dots in a line warn you that many trials are in store for you. If these are mixed with fine dots, you will encounter disagreeable people.

Tears to be shed for one cause or another are represented by drops of tea in the bottom of the cup.

A clean rim to the cup means a quiet, happy, and prosperous existence.

Look out for the leaf that folds over the rim! This means that you are likely to have a stroke of good luck very soon.

The different shapes of the leaves indicate respectively, men, women, and clothes. A long hard leaf shows a man. Small leaves, or even points upon this long leaf, take the form of his silk hat, cane, boots, etc. A woman is shown by a broader leaf or paler shade. She is often distinguished by her wide skirts, her bonnet, parasol, etc.

To ascertain whether or not the man and woman are friends or enemies examine the space about them. If it is filled with tiny dots thickly set, they are enemies. If the space be clear and no dots appear about them they are good friends.

A cross in the teacup means the news of a death.

A group of trees standing separately means that your wish will come true.

And as you become more expert new ideas will come to you. Try it, girls.
