## NEW BRUNSWICK WANTS PROHIBITION

Vote Not Large as it Should Have  
Been But Verdict is Plain

New Brunswick has elected to prohibit the importation and the bringing of intoxicating liquors into the province at the referendum on the question by a majority estimated to be more than 23,000. On the basis of the incomplete returns the ratio of those voting to prohibit importation to those voting to permit it was about three to two. With many places still to hear from the vote stood at about 17,000 in favor of importation to 40,000 opposed to importation. Legislation giving effect to the verdict will be passed, it is expected, within a short time and after three months it is likely that no more intoxicating liquors may be imported or brought into New Brunswick by private citizens.

Only two of the fifteen counties of the province, namely Madawaska and Gloucester, chose to continue to permit the importation of the liquor at yesterday's referendum.

Quite a sensation was caused in court when Miss Gretchen Smith, the young lady who was in the car when the shooting took place, made the statement that that stories published in newspapers were greatly exaggerated, saying that no one tried to pull her into the car.

Dick Britton, who made a clean breast of the affair to Sheriff Foster even before being asked to do so, said the shooting was an accident as they were out shooting moose or deer and mistook the automobile for a moose or deer.

Mr. Slipp, who is yet in a serious condition, is reported to be improving and likely to recover.

**SALE OF PUREBRED STOCK NEXT THURSDAY**

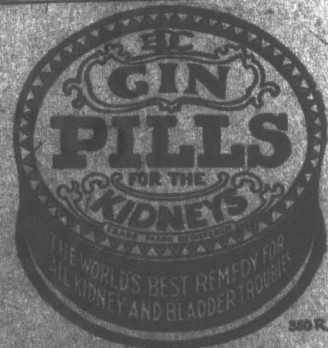

## FARMER BECOMES RAVING MANIAC

Killed One of His Sons and Injured Another—Claimed He Had Been Poisoned—Is Now in Jail

With the eternal triangle declared to be the cause, one of the worst tragedies in the criminal annals for Victoria County is reported from Crombie Settlement, about five miles from Plaster Rock, where Almond Crombie, a well-known farmer, suddenly became a raving maniac, on Saturday evening, threatening to shoot his wife and a man named Donovan, said to be from Chicago, claiming they had tried to poison him, and when they escaped, beat out the brains of his nine-year-old son, Almond, and attacked his other son, Roy, two years younger, whom he left as dead when he was scared away from the house by the arrival of neighbors. He ran into the woods and was found on Sunday morning at daybreak, at a clearing, hanging to the branch of a tree by both arms, dancing with his feet just touching the ground, and shouting like a mad man.

Where Donovan has gone to nobody knows, but Crombie has been taken to the Victoria County jail at Andover by Provincial Constable Johnston, Woodstock, and Turner, Plaster Rock, and an investigation into the circumstances commenced. The facts, so far as can be learned, are that Crombie and his wife, who married him soon after she came out to this country from Ireland, had quarrelled somewhat over the disposition of their children as to whether they should be brought up as Protestants or Catholics, but there had been no serious break in their relations until Donovan, who is said to have come from Chicago, but about whom little information is available, came to stay at their home. On Saturday evening Crombie took a dose of cascara, and within a short time he blamed Donovan and Mrs. Crombie with having given him poison instead of the medicine.

Forthwith he procured his rifle, but in the meantime Donovan got out of the house and has not since been seen. Then Crombie pointed the rifle at his wife, but she succeeded in persuading him not to shoot her. She also escaped from the house, and the crazed man then attacked his two sons. He knocked the boys down, and while Almond, Jr., the older of the two sons, was lying on the floor, the father attacked him with his rifle, literally beating his brains out with the butt of the rifle. The other boy escaped with one finger being smashed off by a blow from the butt end of the rifle when he attempted to protect himself. In the melee the light went out, and when a neighbor named McKay arrived at the house he was not allowed to enter until he had answered a question as to whether he was a friend or a foe. Crombie let him come in when he said he was a friend, but afterwards he (Crombie) hurried away from the house.

Later on to Dr. Coffin, who was called to attend the injured son, and also to pass upon Crombie's mental condition, he told a story to the effect that his wife and Donovan had tried to poison him and that he was later attacked by other persons, who shot him in the back and tried to injure his sons, but he had tried to help the boys and hoped they were all right. The doctor said he had no doubt that Crombie had suddenly become a raving maniac.

Crombie is about forty years of age, and his wife is about the same age. It is reported that Crombie has recovered from his "brain-storm" and expresses horror and sorrow at his awful deed.

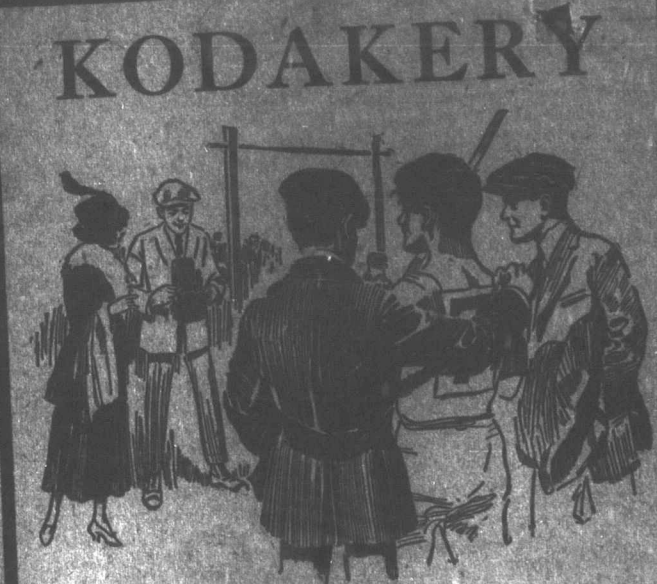

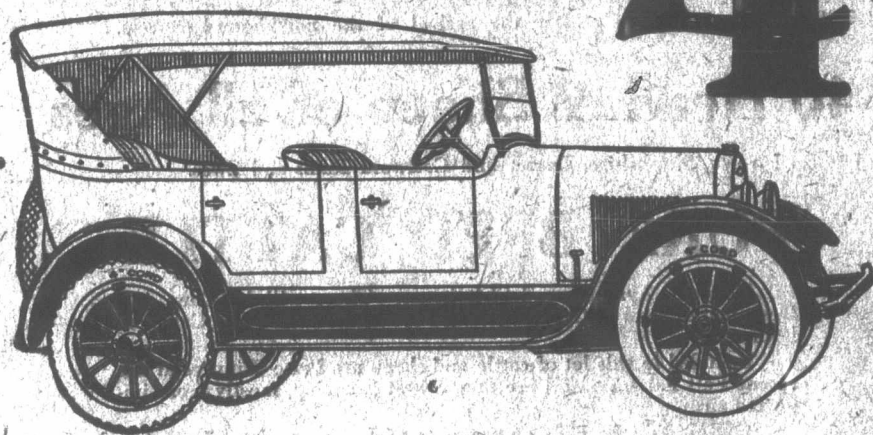

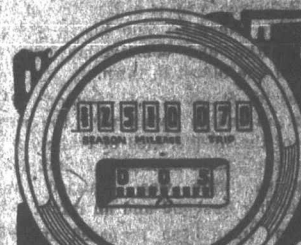
