THE CRIME FOR WHICH NEILL-CREAM SUFFERED.

The circumstances attending the several suspicious deaths by poisoning in Ontario and elsowhere, including the lamentable end some years ago of the unfortunate young women employed as a domestic in this city—all of which pointed strongly to Neill-Cream as the murderer—have recently been referred to in these columns and are still fresh in the minds of ADVERTISER readers.

At 8:57 Billington, accompanied by an aesistant who carried the pinioning material, entered the cell of the condemned man, where he found the prison chaplain ministering to Neill. Without a moment's delay the hangman, while courteously asking the permission of the condemned man, dettly and rapidly pluioned him, passing a broad belt around his waist and securing his elbows with two straps tightly drawn back and fastened to the belt behind. Straps were placed around the wrists and connected with the bedy belt in front. This rendered Neill absolutely incapable of moving his arms or hands. The condemned man did not wince during the process, which lasted barely a minute. The procession to the gallows was than formed. It was headed by the chief warden, followed by the chaplain, who, as he walked, read the burial service. Neil came next, guarded on each side. He walked firmly. A deadly pallor overspread his reatures, but his face showed no other sign of emotion. Close behind the prisoner walked through the corridors toward the scaffold the tolling of the bell of St. Sepulchre's, which has marked the last moments of so many criminals, resounded throughout the prison.

The trial of the prisoner for the last of the long series of crimes committed and for which he has paid the extreme penalty, commenced in London, Eng., on Oct. 17. Sir Charles Russell prosecuted for the Treasury. He said that the prisoner had been indicted for having murdered Matilda Clover on Oct. 21 last, at 27 Lamboth read. From statements made by the prisoner himself, which had been verified by inquiries, it was found that the prisoner's real name was Thomas Neill Cream. He was born in Glasgow in 1850, and was taken by his parents when very young to America, where as a young man he took a degree at the college in Montreal. He after-afterward came back to London, where he attended lectures at St. Thomas' Hospital, with a view of becoming an M. R. C. S., but did not succeed. Subsequently he went to Edinburgh and took two degrees, by which he became a fully qualified medical man. Leaving England sgain, he went to Ontario, and after practicing there for a short time he went to Chicago, where he practiced as Thomas Neill Cream. Passing over the intervening years, at the beginning of October, 1891, the prisoner came back to London and proceeded to Anderton's Hotel, where he stayed on the 6th and 7th of the month. From there he went to live at 103 Lambeth Palace road, until the 6th of the following January, and after-ward went back to America, where he remained until the beginning of April. Returning them to London, he took up his residence again in Lambeth Palace road from April 9 to June 3, when he was arrested on the charge of blackmailing. PROGRESS IN ELECTRIC RAILWAY DEVELOPMENT.
Electric railways have been devel-

oped on this continent during the five years with marvelous rapidity. Figures collected by Harper's Weekly showing the growth of the system, prove that at the end of last year there were in the United States alone 10,599 miles of street railway, with 55,877 cars. Of these, 4,061 miles were electric, and 8,892 cars were electric. The total of horse, cable, and electric mileage had increased, during the year 1891, 1,490 miles but electricity standing by itself had increased 1,538 miles. The total of horse, cable, and electric cars had increased during the year 3,826 cars. Of this number 3,300 were year 3,926 cars. Of this number 3,300 were propelled by electricity. There were at the end of the year seven times as many miles of electric road as of cable, and almost twice as many electric cars as there were cable cars. There were at the end of the year something over 400 electric roads in operation in America. Last March it was estimated that of the sixteen cities in the United States having over 200,000 inhabitants, fourteen, or 87 per cent. were the United States having over 200,000 inhabitants, fourteen, or 87 per cent., were
equipped with electric roads. Of the 42
cities having between 50,000 and 200,000
inhabitants, 41, or 97½ per cent, had
electric roads. Of the remaining 391 cities with a population
of over 8,000 it is said that there
are not a score that have not electric roads,
or are not preparing to introduce the or are not preparing to introduce the system. Since March everyone of the larger cities referred to as the exceptions in the above percentages have fallen into line with the formal approval of this comline with the formal approval of this comparatively new method of rapid transit. The investment to date is said to reach over \$100,000,000. Washington is alleged to have the best equipped electric line in the country, and it is confessed that but few of the cities possessing electric roads have taken proper care to safeguard the public interests against accidents through the trolley overhead wire, which through the trolley overhead wire, which is as yet the system adopted in almost every city. It is contended that in large cities one condition should be insisted ipon when franchises are granted by the authorities, and that if this condition is complied with much of the objection to an overhead system would disappear. The company holding the franchise should be compelled to make the construction of the very best. It is declared that the only overhead wire necessary is the contact overnead wire necessary is the contact wire, which need not be more than one-third of an inch in diameter; that the main conductors and feeders should be put underground in proper conduits All these precautions will be unnecessary if the electric experts are able by and bye to produce a storage battery that will be as cheap and effective as the trolley system.

On the score of expense alone the companies have rejected the storage battery. Once it is perfected and cheapened to rate even approaching that for which the trolley can be operated, no electric railway company would assume the trouble and the risks incident to the operation of the trolley. They cannot wait for that time, and now take the trolley, with all its disadvantages, as a vast improvement on the jog-trot of the horse.

HOSPITAL MANAGEMENT

Several anonymous correspondents, averse, for reasons best known to themselves, to make their attacks in the oper have been writing to the Free Press insinuating that the City Hospital is not prop erly managed, and that there is something about the Roman Catholic Hospital that does not exactly suit them. The correspondence has called forth a straightforward epistle from Dr. Arnott, who says he is not

epistle from Dr. Arnott, who says he is not at present connected with either hospital. Dr. Arnott further says:

"I have been on the staff of the City Hospital for several years, and I cannot allow such indefinite aspersion of its management to pass unchallenged. No one who knows anything about it will deny that the present commissioners have placed the hospital in a much better condition than it was at the time they took office. I am sure they have faithfully tried to do the best possible with the means at their disposal, and the hospital has been a great blessing to many. I have heard many intelligent patients express themselves as perfectly satisfied with the treatment they received. The commissioners are open to public criticism, and I am sure they will welcome any such, if manly, open and definite. But, after all the trouble they have taken it is surely ungenerous to hint that they might have done better. If correspondents have anything to complain of let them state their objections fairly and definitely.

"Regarding the Roman Catholic Hospital, we should be proud and thankful that they are erecting a building that is a credit to our city. I care not what their creed may be, if they are doing a noble work they should receive due credit for it. The City Hospital never was intended to supply wealthy patients with fine large apartments. Indeed, before the establishment of the medical school here such patients went to Toronto. The medical school has been the means of establishing specialties here, and has given rise to a demand for better accommodation for a certain class of patients. If our Roman Catholic brethren supply a portion of that we should be very thankful. But it is time creed prejudice was dead and buried out of sight, and that Christians realized that there are enough enemies to fight without attacking one another."

We are all interested in making the City Hospital just as efficient as it can be made at a reasonable ost to the taxpaver; and we are just as mous attacks upon its management—or, for that matter, upon the management of any institution established for the relief of suffering humanity. suffering humanity, no matter what the creed of its promoters. If any taxpayer has a complaint to make against the hospital trustees or staff, we are certain that the public will not imitate the method pursued in at least one Parliamentary body, and hold that no investigation shall take place. But a truce to those anonymous aspersions. Let those who have so industriously written these insinuations come out of their anonymous refuge, and take the manly position of fathering their allegations.

AN EXTRAORDINARY DEFENSE OF THE OPIUM TRAFFIC. Last year the British House of Commons passed a resolution to the effect that "the system by which the Indian opium revenue is raised is morally indefensible." A deputation called upon Lord Kimberley, Secretary of State for India, last week, and urged him to suppress the traffic. The cable tells us that nearly all the great religious bodies in England were represented, but their mission proved fruitless. An admission was made that the doctrine laid down in the House of ommons resolution was sound, but the practical question how to raise the \$19,000,000 revenue, which the tax on opium 000,000 revenue, which the tax on opium annually yields India, could not at present be solved. Taken in excess, it is undoubtedly mischievous, as drinking, smoking, and all sensual pleasures become in similar conditions."

the defence invariably made for the habitual use of intoxicating liquors. Use the drug in moderation, says the Times, and you will suffer no inconvenience, but enjoy exhibaration.
