The other medal winners took a good stand, and in truth all did well.

Difficult Papers. The papers were difficult enough, none of them being considered easy. Arithmetic, the plucking subject, cut down the usually good number, although six students were able write a perfect paper on the subject. However, a number of pupils went down, among them being quite a few

There was one subject that did more

plucking than was the custom, and that was spelling. No less than 33 failed in that subject, something quite out of the ordinary. There is mistaking it that the paper was difscult-too difficult as a matter of fact. It was an extract from a British political speech, containing words unfamiliar to the average entrance candidate; in fact, words with which the average reader, not a student of poquestions, is not conversant. As was expected a large number fell by the wayside, and brought consternation to many students.

The other subjects were hard enough, but little complaint could be made concerning them. The teachers are reasonably well satisfied with the results. The average number passing is quite the equal of the best in the province, and much better than the average.


Few Complaints.







A SMALL MARKET AND RATHER DULL

Some Strawberries Were Offered. But the Prices Remained High.

Vegetables Were Also Steady-Live Hog Prices on Monday Will Be \$7 75 Cwt.

The market today again was comparatively small, and save in a few cases not very brisk. Strawberries were offered in some quantities, but the prices remained high, and hence the demand for them was only fair. They were wholesaling from 7 to 8 cents, mostly at the latter price, and retailing at from 8 to 9 cents. The season for this part of the country is rapidly drawing to a close, and Tuesday will likely be the last good market for local berries.

Other fruits remain about the same There was a moderate supply of several varieties of cherries, which sold at 8c a box and 9c by the quart. There was a fair demand for these. Red currants and gooseberries were also offered at the same prices as on Thursday.

Dairy Products.

There was practically no change in dairy products or in butchers' meats, and the demand in both cases was only fair.

Vegetables, too, were fairly stable. Beets were offered in good quantities, 108s to 112s; choicest Russian and Siberian, and the price was somewhat lower. 25 cents a dozen being the price asked. Other vegetables were inclined to be scarce, and there was little change in price. Oats showed a slight tendency to advance, selling today as high as lb boxes, 102s to 104s; choicest Australian, in 56-lb boxes, 98s to 102s. \$1 65, while none sold lower than \$1 63. Two loads of hay were offered. One old load brought \$12, and a load of new \$8.

It is anticipated that the price for live hogs on Monday will be \$7 75. There were none offered today. Other prices are as follows:

Yussuff Izzedine was quite naturally distrusted by Abdul Hamid, who throughout his reign treated him to all intents and purposes as a prisoner of state, confining him to his chateau in Tchamlidja, above Scutari, on the Asiatic side of the straits; and that access to the chateau should be rendered as difficult as possible to visitors, Abdul Hamid gave instructions that the boulevard, constructed nearly 40 years ago by Abdul Aziz from Scutari to Tchamlidja, should never be repaired, so that it remained until a few months ago almost entirely unfit for traffic

After the revolution of last fall the prince recovered in a measure his liberty and developed such an intimacy with Achmed Riza and the other leaders of the Young Turk party, that when the counter-revolution took place in the spring, with the object of ousting the Young Turks from power and of restoring to Abdul Hamid all his absolutist and unrestricted authority, the authors thereof gave as their excuse that it had been organized solely for the purpose of preventing a revolution by the Young Jan. 1, 1910, four mastodonic bells, weigh-Turks, designed to place Yussuff Izzedine on the throne,






