



Taken Over To Permit British To Work Nearer Front.

British Headquarters in France, June 22-(By the Associated Press).-Amer ican doctors, nurses and enlisted menhave within the last fortnight taken over six of the British great general field hospitals, releasing the English staffs for duty near their front. The Americans have been much impressed by the cordiality of their welcome as well as by the thoroughness and effectiveness of the British hospital system. So smoothly have the transfers been made that the Americans have taken up their new work without even a moment's upset in the routine of the various hospitals. The Stars and Stripes fly with the British Union Jack from each hospital flagstaff, the two ensigns fluttering side by side in the cool breezes that sweep in from the sea.

The British selected their hospital sites with the greatest care, and have developed them with a completeness that has come from nearly three years' experience. Some of the general hospitals are made up of tented wards, accommodating forty to sixty bedg each. Others are constructed of a series of huts. Both styles are models of field comfort and convenience. The operating theatres are splendidly built, and seem to lack nothing in the way of modern surgical equipment.



HOUSEKEEPING IS A BUSINESS. ECONOMICAL COOKING IS A SCIENCE.

#### Our Consumers' League

"The conservation of child life is of paramount importance, and I am very much pleased indeed that you have taken up this question in your Consumers' League departmnt. We want all the help we can get in bringing this to the attention of the public."

The foregoing was the comment made by Dr. W. H. Hill. M.O.H., on the editorials in this column a week ago, urging the necessity for greater attention to infant welfare. Dr. Hill added.

"I most heartily approve of the Babies' Welfare exhibitions such as have been held largely in the United States and to some extent i Canada, from the fact that they awaken to the importance of a certain standard of health being maintained for children, and also from the inevitable effect they have in reducing infant mortality. Their educational value cannot be overestimated. You may say through your column that I would like to do something of the kind here, possibly establish weekly clinics to which mothers might bring their babies to have measurements and weight taken and advice given whereby the condition of the little ones might be improved and possibly their lives

#### "NATURAL" FEEDING AS BABY SAVER.

The majority of children under five years of age, die under one year. Eighty per cent of these cases of infant mortality are cases for saving the lives of babies would be natural feeding up to one year old. (I am mentioning one year as a round number).

"In the second place, where artificial feeding is necessary, every pre-

caution should be taken to obtain good, pure milk and to properly modify this to suit the infant. The milk should be pasteurized and great care

"Cow's milk was never intended for babies and, given in its natura state, is more of a menace than a food, hence the importance of careful treatment if it is to take the place of natural food.

#### KEEP THE BABY COOL.

In the third place, if a baby is going to be saved and kept in good condition through the hot weather, it must be kept cool. A lot of mothers with the best intentions imaginable literally smother their infants with clothes and coverings. The less clothes the baby wears in hot weather the better. Good ventilation and plenty of fresh air are absoutely essential to the health of the babies. The little things frequently suffer as much in expensive apartments as in the quarters of the Where it is impossible to get good circulation of air by other means, an electric fan should be used. The electrical department would doubtless lend these out in desperate cases. But where a child is ailing and conditions are not conducive at home to its recovery, and an electric fan is out of the question, owing to the fact that there is no electrical connec-

tion in the house, the place for the babe is in the hospital.
"Where there is not plenty of air circulating through the rooms of the home, and if these are hot and stuffy, the little ones should, if possible, be taken to the country in the summer months.

"The baby should sleep outdoors as much as possible, especially in the summer mouths. Where a child has a poor appetite this almost in-variably improves as a result of sleeping in the open air.

#### SEEK SKILLED ADVICE EARLY.

In the last place, no matter how trifling the complaint may seem, skilled advice should at once be sought when the baby appears sick, especially in the summer time. An early diagnosis may save its life. "Proper food, common sense in dressing, plenty of fresh air, ar three things which will go a long way towards carrying the babies 'Again I say in the interests of reducing infant mortality from pre

ventible causes, I would be glad to arrange for clinics, lectures and whatever else might help along the cause. I know prominent citizens who are interested in this, and who would give their support."

#### A CIVIC DAY NURSERY.

With regard to the subject of "Child Welfare," last year, while traveling in Western Canada, Mrs. F. W. Hughes, former president of the London Union Mothers' Club was much interested in attending a glorified edition of the first Canadian Babies' Welfare Exhibition of the prairie community, held in connection with the annual exhibition in Vancouver.

she says: "I was told that a number of the doctor didn't disturb the doctors and nurses who were in their places all day long to weigh and take measurements of the babies. This exhibition, like others of the same kind, brought good results in several directions. For one thing it awakened the interest of the public in the important question of conserving child life. and reducing infant mortality. It attracted the attention of women taking a prominent part in public work, welfare and otherwise.

It aroused in many mothers who witnessed the exhibition or brought their

babies for examination, an ambition to have their children conform to scientifically recognized health standards. It set them thinking about better care of bir bables. Naturally, the bables reaped a benefit from all this awakening in Saskatoon, I saw something along similar lines, which also very muc

mpressed me, a day nursery for the small calldren of women who must go or o earn the living for the family. The cottage, situated close to the centre of the city was opened first. I understand, by women's organizations of the different churches. Such a public benefit did it prove that it was taken over by the y council and operated under civic auspices.

The nursery is open each day from eight in the morning till five or si

'clock in the evening, and the best of care is given to both the babies and older children. The mother can go to her work in a contented frame of mind, knowing that her little ones are receiving as good care at least as she could possibly give them herself. They will be fed and amused, and kept out of mischief and larger for which she has to pay only a few cents. Out in the backyard I saw orm of patriotic work."

- 1 Have fresh air where you live and work. 2 Wear light, loose, porous clothes.
- 3 Spend part of your time in the open air. 4 Have lots of fresh air where you sleep.
- 5 Breathe deeply. FOOD-

6 Avoid eatting too much.

- 7 Do not eat much meat and eggs. 8 Eat various kinds of food.
- 9 Eat slowly. HABITS-
- 10 Have your bowels move at least once each day. 11 Stand, sit, and walk erect.
- 12 Avoid poisonous drugs.
- 13 Keep clean and avoid catching diseases.
  - 14 Work hard, but play and rest, too. 15 Be cheerful and learn not to worry.

#### WHEAT SUBSTITUTES.

On all sides are heard expression of approval of the businesslike manner which the United States has set to work to carry on its share in the war through the mobilization of its resources of men and materials.

The provision for food control has especially appealed to the housewives of Canada, who doubtless will accept more kindly than some months ago sugges-tions from the United States' Department of Agriculture in regard to war-time food thrift and the use of substitutes for wheat products. The following is an extract from a bulletin issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, entitled, "How to Select Foods—What the Body Needs." "Wheat, rice, rye, barley, oats, corn and potatoes, are largely interchangeable as sources of starch ithe diet."

"As a substitute for wheat breakfast foods, try white or yellow corn meal or hominy grits, served with cream and sugar, butter syrup or fresh or dried fruit.

"As a substitute for wheat biscuits, rolls or toast, the housewife can employ a dozen different forms of corn bread, such as hoe cake, dodgers, soft or spoon corn bread, hominy bread, cornmeal and rye, Boston brown bread, Zuni Indian bread, etc.

They were awarded for work at Vimy Ridge on April 9. It was the Military Cross which was awarded to him, and three men received military medals. The men were Sergt. G. S. Martin, Dufferin avenue, London; Bombardier G. R. Hill of Kippin, Ont., and Ted Soulsby, a former member of the Guelph fire brigade, whose home is in England.

Lieut. Bond is the only officer at present with the 16th Battery who has been with it since its organization. He has been twice wounded, and was home on furlough for a short time last home on furlough for a short time last

Melghen Sees Rocks Ahead.

Hon. Arthur Meighen followed. He declared that the courage of the members of the Opposition side who intended to vote with the Government had made the passage of the bill certain beyond doubt. The real trouble would be in applying the measure. It had been brought forward by the Government because it was the only right. had been brought forward by the Government because it was the only right thing to do, and because no other course was neither honorable or virtuous. The sending of troops to the front was essential for this country. By what other means could they support the troops in France?

"The obligation of honor is upon us to protect the security of the state, and there is no other way to do so. We are able to send these men. While we can use these men here, and their absence will cause some inconvenience, they are more needed at the front. Necessarily there will be more women in the factories, more old men on street cars and more boys on the farms instead of at lake resorts. There might, therefore, be less production, but more necessary even than this is the presence at the battlefront of fighting men."

To the arguments opposed to con-scription, he said that the voluntary system in two months had not yielded scription, he said that the voluntary system in two months had not yielded one man in four to the casualties in France. At present the wastage was so great that it might be that soon Canada would not be adequately represented at the front. The Government might have made mistakes, but it had done the best it could and had adopted the best methods it could devise. He opposed the argument that Canada did not have the full constitutional power to put in force conscription, and said that if there was not that power, it had better be obtained.

Mr. Meighen described Mr. Lapointe of Kamouraska as an able man who had presented a clear, succinct case, the best that could be presented; but that speech had been made for distribution in Quebec.

FLOUR AND SUGAR IS REPORTED TO BE LIGHT

CANADIAN CASUALTIES

Few potatoes were offered. They sold for \$4 to \$4.25 a bag. Green onions brought 5c a bunch and radishes 1c a bunch less. Parsley sold for 40c a dozen bunches. Only a few new carrots were offered the price remaining unchanged at 10c a quart. Lettuce brought from 5c to 7c a head. Rhubarb is plentiful and is selling for 30c a dozen bunches and spinach has a fairly good sale at 20c a peck. Asparagus brings from 7c to 8c a bunch.

Creamery butter retails for 43c a pound, and sells wholesale for 40c a pound. Pound rolls of dairy butter retail for 37c. The wholesale price is 35c to 35c a pound. Dairy butter in crocks sells for 35c to 36c a pound retail and 35c wholesale. Store lots averaged 33c to 34c a pound. There is a wide range in egg prices. Many of the farmers in the market house are holding out for 35c to 38c a dozen. Others declare that the highest price they are able to obtain is 30c. Many of the larger buyers pay only 28c for crate lots.

Oats are selling for \$2.15 to \$2.20 a cwt. Wheat is firmer at \$2.25 to \$2.30 a bushel. There is a good demand for the smaller loads of hay at \$12 to \$13 a ton. Straw is selling for \$9.50 to \$10 a ton. Live hogs are unchanged at \$14 to \$14.25 a cwt. Fat sows are selling for \$11.75 a cwt., and small pigs for \$12 to \$15 a pair. Dressed hogs are selling for \$12 to \$15 a cwt.






