AWFUL TRAGEDY AT LEAMINGTON

Floyd Dresser, Aged 20, and His Wife, Aged 19, Found Dead in Bed in Their Home in Western Ontario Town.

INFANT PRATTLED MID SCENE OF DEATH Mr. Nutter's behalf, and in a letter to the board asks why it is that outside architects can be furnished with

Baby, Spared by the Crazed Husband, Cried and Laughed by Turns-It Is Said Husband and Wife Had Had Many Quarrels of Late.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Leamington, Ont., May 13.-The most horrible tragedy in the history of Leamington was discovered this morning, when Mrs. Floyd Dresser, aged 19, Barrel of Cap Making Material was found murdered in bed, and her husband, aged 20, the supposed murderer, a suicide, on the floor in the room.

Tightly clutched in his hands were two revolvers, the implements of death. The citizens of Leamington were shocked beyond expression when the news of the dread tragedy spread like wildfire. The couple were well known in Leamington, and in the township of Mersea.

INFANT IN THE BED.

Both bodies were cold in death when found. A tiny infant, 6 months old, was in bed with the dead mother, and in turn cried for the care and attention only a mother can bestow, and then laughed with childish glee, not realizing the fearful tragedy.

Dresser was about town as usual last night. He was in Jeffrey's billiard room until 10 o'clock, and seemed to be in the best of spirits. He laughed and chaffed his companions, and there seemed to be no sign of care or worry. He left the place shortly after the hour named, and, bidding his companions good night, went home.

Early this morning, Mrs. Dresser's father, John Oliver, went to the home, and found the house locked up, with no sign of life. He went home and told his wife, who went at once to the scene.

Mrs. Oliver got into the house. The fires were out, and there was not a sign of life anywhere. She went to the young couple's room and almost dropped with fright when she saw the awful sight.

A HORRIBLE DISCOVERY. On the bed lay Mrs. Dresser with a ghastly wound in the left temple On the floor, face downwards, near the bed, lay the husband in a pool of

The tiny infant laughed and cried in turn on the bed beside its dead Mrs. Oliver ran from the house with a scream of horror. Mr. Oliver rushed to the place and Constable Booth was notified. Several physicians were hastily summoned also, but man and wife were

MURDERED WHILE ASLEEP.

Mrs. Dresser was evidently murdered while lying asleep. She was lying

A horrible wound in the temple showed where the bullet had sped or its arrand of death. A black, jaggedwound it was, with powder marks and scorched flesh, proving beyond peradventure that the man, with maniacal fury, had made sure that his victim would not escape his anger. The woman apparently never moved after the fatal shot, and lay as it

TWO REVOLVERS IN HANDS.

Dresser was fully clothed, and lay on his face, with the revolvers clasped with the grip of death in his hand. One in his right hand, a 32-calibre revolver showed two empty chambers. The other lay under his body, covered with From all appearances he had come into the room, placed the revovler

near his wife's temple and shot her as she slept. Making sure that the wound was fatal, he turned the weapon upon him-The bullet struck him on the forehead, close to the top of his nose, and crashed into his brain. He fell, striking the side of the bed, leaving

an imprint of blood, and lay on the floor, where he was found. SPARED THE BABY. There was no evidence that he tried to kill the baby, nor that he took any interest whatever in the little infant.

As they died they were found. The dread tragedy had evidently taken place shortly after he came in from the billiard-room, or at least quite early in the night. There is no motive known for the deed. Mrs. Dresser bore a good rep-

utation, and was well liked by her neighbors. Dresser had been living very fast of late, however, drinking, and staying away at nights. This led to many quarrels, it is alleged, when Dresser neglected his wife considerably. She upbraided him for his conduct, and violent quarrels are said to have marked their domestic life of late. Dresser returned home late last night after spending the evening in the poolrooms, and the theory of the crown is that a violent quarrel took place on this score. Dresser evidently determined upon murder in his anger, and waiting until his wife had retired and gone to sleep, he slipped into her room, killing her as she lay.

MONTREAL-CH!CAGO ALL-WATER ROUTE

Inauguration of a New Freight and Passenger Service.

Chicago, May 13.-New freight and passenger service entirely by boat beween Montreal and Chicago will inaugurated today with the arrival of the steamer City of Montreal from the Canadian city. Washington, May 13.-Heavy rainfalls on the isthmus have retarded the port made to the Washington office of the Isthmian Canal commission by The total excavation for the month of April was 2,632,468 cubic yards against 3,067,479 yards in the previous month, but the rainfall for April was 5.08 inches, against 3.78 inches in March.

THE INTERCOLONIAL HAS A SURPLUS

General Betterment of Traffic - Net Earnings About \$500,000.

Ottawa, May 13.-The accounts of the Intercolonial for the past fiscal year, which are now being balanced up by the railway department, show that under the new system of management, with the economies effected and a general betterment of traffic conditions, a substantial surplus, probably in the neighborhood of half a million dollars, has been realized on the year's operations. Compared with a deficit of nearly three-quarters of a million for the preceding year, this result speaks volumes for the businesslike administra-

tion of the road under Hon. Geo. P. Graham. The I. C. R. board of management will make a trip of inspection over, the road towards the end of the month, and will at the same time look into the question of the acquirement of branch lines, as provided for under the provisions of the act passedi last session.





LONDON, FRIDAY, MAY 13, THE BRITISH POLITICAL CRISIS. The political situation in Great Britain derives a new interest, not only from the death of the King, but from the complete statement of the Government's policy contained in the text of the veto bill which has been just

It is made plain that the present settiement of the question for which the Government are pressing is to be regarded as something quite temporary. The Government propose to restrict the veto of the House of Lords, so that a measure sent up by the House of Commons can be delayed only two years by the upper chamber, but this provision is to apply only so long as the House of Lords is constituted on a hereditary basis.

The Government express their intention of placing the House of Lords on "a popular basis." When this is accomplished the whole question of the balance of power, between the two houses will be reopened.

This proposal had no place in the by the House of Commons some time ago, and its incorporation in the bill has come as a surprise to all parties. It will to a certain extent disarm the Unionists, as it destroys their contention that the Government are aiming at the destruction of the two-chamber principle. The issue will not be between a unicameral and bicameral system, but between an elective second
