> SOFIA ADMITS RETREAT. [Canadian Press.]

Sofia, Oct. 2-Via London, Oct. 3.-A etreat by the Bulgarians under heavy Serbian artillery fire is reported in an official statement issued by the war of fice referring to the Macedonian front. The statement says:

'Macedonian front: In the Lake Pres ba region there was considerable artilactivity without infantry action at Hill 1,944 south of Kaimakcalan. As a consequence of violent artillery fire on the summit and in order to avoid un necessary loss, our troops were ordered to withdraw to their main position in the Moglenica Valley. ### SERBS SMASHHEAVY BLOW LONDON SOLDIERS AHEAD, TAKING FOR TEUTONS

FOE'S TRENCH Von Mackensen Orders Evacuation of Recently Captured Rumanian Fortresses in Order to Escape Fast Closing Jaws of Allies' Trap.

Berlin, Oct. 3.—Via London, 5:11 p.m.—The war office announced today that Austrian and German monitors had destroyed the pontoon bridges across the Danube in the rear of the Rumanian forces which have crossed the river and invaded Bulgaria.

London, Oct. 3 .- Field Marshal von Mackensen, who commands the forces of the Central Allies operating against the Rumanians and Russians in the province of Dobrudja, has ordered the evacuation of the Danube fortresses of Silistria and Turtuksi, recently captured by the Teutons, Bulgarian and Turkish forces, says a Rome dispatch to the Wireless Press.

The reason given for the withdrawal of von Mackensen's forces is that the German commander is in danger of being enveloped by the Russian and Rumanian troops, which have crossed the Danube between Rustchuk and Turtuksi.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Oct. 3 .- A cable to the Herald from London says: A new zeppelin chaser aeroplane em ployed by the British home defence is one of the most formidble air fighting machines yet invented. The secret regarding many details of its construction is closely kept and only the main features are now allowed by the British and French censorships to be mentioned in the press. The news egarding the efficiency of the mahine and the confidence which the public may place in it is at last published on account of the insistence of new spapermen or the desirability of the main fact being given out, A Tractor Biplane.

A French aviation expert, Jaques chine and his published account of it, after the censors in two countries has made their eliminations, is as follows The machine is a tractor biplane of powerful construction, with a high powered fixed motor. Its stability is remarkable to a point of being practically automatic. Landings can be made by this machine at relatively low speed. As for the form and volume of armament, it is decided that they are not to be made known until peace has been signed. 





### **CANADIANS ADVANCED** BRINGS HEALTH NINE HUNDRED YARDS ON THE SOMME FRONT

Have Taken 1,600 Prisoners and Many Machine Guns.

NOTABLE OPERATIONS

Splendid Week's Work by the Dominion's Fighters in Northern France.

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.-How an unnamed corporal of an eastern battalion of the Canadlan forces in France single-handed charged a party of Germans, consisting of two officers and about twenty men, who were advancing to the attack, and accomplished the wonderful feat of making casualties of all excepting one, whom he took prisoner, is related in the report of the Canadian eyewitness in his communique covering the severe fighting from September 20 to 27.

The dispatch follows: CANADIAN CORPS HEADQUAR-TERS IN FRANCE, via London, Oct. -As a result of further severe fighting the Canadians have captured several important German positions, and have advanced their own lines upon a frontage of nearly two miles to a




