QUITS SWEDEN

A Serious Quarrel Between t! e Strange Natural Phenomena Crown Prince and the Crown Princess.

Stockholm, Feb. 25. - It is reported rom the entourage of the royal court hat there has been a serious quarrel etween Crown Prince Gustav and the Crown Princess Victoria, who has, as result of the disagreement, left the Swedish capital for a long trip to Italy. Back of the quarrel is said to be a love

affair of the Crown Prince. Prince Gustav married Princess Vicoria of Baden in 1881. The young princess-she was then 19 years old-Hohenzollern blood. It soon became evident that democratic Sweden dul ot suit the princess, and even in the t Karlsruhe. There she appeared glad and happy, while in Sweden she was always serious and irritable. The rown Prince, with his income of less han \$160,000 a year, could not afford o maintain his household in the sumpious manner the Crown Princess iked, and that restriction in expenses aused additional domestic trouble. But there was no open breach in the oyal household, and it was with asonishment that the people read the innouncement in the official paper that the Crown Princess had been taken ill suddenly and must go away instantly. This was two days previous to the celebration of King Oscar's 75th birth-

day, and people began to inquire if there was not some other reason than that of sudden sickness to cause the Crown Princess to leave Stockholm at such a time. There inquiries brought out this story Some days before the announcement f the departure of the Crown Princess the Crown Prince gave a reception with concert at the castle, to which a certain member of the moneyed arisocracy and his handsome wife were nvited. The Crown Princess asked or reasons; none satisfactory were given her; she investigated on her own behalf. A stormy scene between the crown Princess and her husband fol-

owed, and she declared that she at nce would go to Italy. King Oscar interfered, but in vain. The Crown Princess was firm in her determination, and in face of the celeof the King's jubilee she packed her trunks and hurried away from Stockholm.

A Great Patriotic Enterprise.

Sir Sandford Fleming, who was chief engineer of the construction of the C P. R., makes a strong plea for a transcontinental railway by the northern route. Addressing the Canadian Club, Toronto, on Wednesday, he dwelt on the necessity of reclaiming the territory intervening between Eastern and Western Canada. He described this gap as a dangerous area of cleavage, the people of Canada being separated into two groups by an unpopulated wilderness, traversed by only a single line of railway. This area stretching from Manitoba to the Saguenay, and running 300 or 350 miles north of the C. P. R., was equal in extent to more than four provinces of Manitoba. It was practically without a white inhabitant. According to information received by well-informed military men, the Russian army which is intended to operate in Korea will consist of an advance vanguard of two regiments of Siberian sharpshooters, a vanguard of 16 regiments of infantry, with ninety-six quick-firing guns, three batteries of mountain guns, and a corresponding force of cavalry. The main body will consist of forty regiments, including Cossack cavalry, with 300 guns. It is added that no important military operations will be possible before the melting of the ice, and that the present operations will be confined to

necessary preparations. WAR NOTES.

The question of stay of the Russian gunboat Mandjur at Shanghai remains unsettled. Paul Lessar, Russian minister to China, is said to be trying to intimidate the Chinese Government in the matter, declaring emphatically that Japan has little chance of victory against a Russian army 500,000 strong. The court at Pekin is oscillating on this question. Russia is also pressing China to declare the neutrality of that portion of the empire which Russia also occupies.


BRITAINS HELP RUSSIANS.

London, Feb. 25. - A special dispatch from Hong Kong says the British ad-miralty officials are serving out clothing to the Russian sailors rescued at Chemulpo, Korea, and that the crews of the vessels forming part of the British squadron have given half a day's pay to provide luxuries for the Russian wounded.

The most sacred image in Russia has been sent to St. Petersburg, and it will be taken later to the Far East with the army. This image is a representation of the Virgin appearing to St. Sergius, and is always kept at the Troitzke, St. Petersburg. It is about one foot square, and is covered with precious stones. The image has a remarkable history. It accompanied Alexis, Peter the Great and Alexander I., on all their campaigns. A silver tablet attached to it enumerates the battles at which the image was present. It is now said that the Russian Baltic squadron, comprising eight battleships, two armored orusers, three protected cruisers, two large transports and thirty torpedo boats, will leave for the Far East at the end of June. It is added that it will be commanded by Rear Admiral Rojestvensky.
