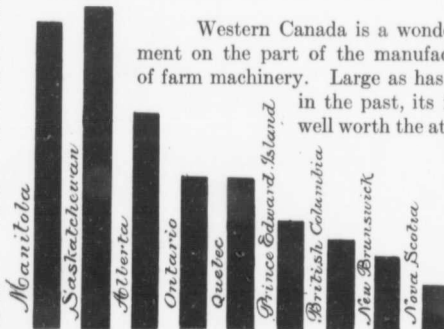
# 1919

The selling of farm machinery is Western Canada's largest and most important industry. So predominantly agricultural is the Canadian West that soil tillage and crops fix the position of the three provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

From May to December each year the question uppermost in the minds of business, professional men and farmers, both east and west, is "What of the grain crop?" In the early spring and summer weather conditions are closely watched, and in the fall, crop statistics are carefully studied.

The growing of field crops means first of all the use of farm machinery, and the more extensive the field crop operations, the more farm machinery is required. Plows, harrows, discs, packers, drills, planters, pulverizers, cultivators, mowers, rakes, loaders, stackers, binders, stokers, sheaf loaders, threshers, tractors, stationary engines, cream separators, milkers, wagons, trucks, automobiles, etc., etc., are all in use and demand. "Don't do by hand what machinery will do" is the slogan of the farmers of progressive Western Canada, with the result that more machinery is purchased per farm in the Canadian West than in any other portion of Canada.

The following "graph" compiled from carefully gathered statistics shows this conclusively.

Western Canada is a wonderful field for development on the part of the manufacturer and distributor of farm machinery. Large as has been its consumption in the past, its future possibilities are well worth the attention of those whose

business it is to make and sell farm implements. In order to give some idea of what we mean by future possibilities, we have compiled some figures on the land areas of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

The percentages used in the above computation have been arrived at only after a very careful investigation into all the available data concerning the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, but as this information is far from complete, these figures represent an approximate conservative estimate only, which depends to a great extent on the limits of the wheat area. For the purpose of the above, the northern limit of the wheat belt has been taken to be a line connecting Grand Rapids on the north-west shore of Lake Winnipeg with Fort Vermilion on the Peace River. As far as is known at present, wheat has been grown successfully in quantity up to this line in both Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Accordingly, out of a total area of 164,217,763 acres at present suitable for agriculture within the three western provinces, only slightly over 8 per cent. was under wheat, and less than 16 per cent all told under field crops. Nevertheless, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta together produced in 1915 nearly one-tenth of the world's wheat requirements.

It will be seen from the above that Western Canada's farm machinery market must be an ever increasing one. Given an abundance of cheap land that yearly produces big crops, it must of necessity attract the settler who must, and will buy farm implements.

Take for example the matter of tractors, and allowing one tractor for each half section, it would require 513,171 of these machines to bring the market to a point of saturation. When we take into consideration that there are approximately 16,000 gas tractors now in operation in the Canadian West, it can readily be seen what an enormous future potential field awaits the manufacturer of this class of implement. The same thing holds true of threshers, binders, plows and all other classes of farm machinery.

The Western Canadian farm machinery market is one that requires constant cultivation. Its population is increasing largely through immigration, with the result that its farmers must needs be educated as to what the farm machinery market has to offer. Our farmers are coming here by thousands from all sections of the United States, Eastern Canada, and European countries, and are consequently unacquainted with the farm implements sold in the Canadian West. They become familiar with what the market has to offer largely through the dealer and the printed page.

Our main idea in compiling the statistics in this booklet was to give to the manufacturer and distributor of farm machinery a first hand survey of the implement situation for 1919. Practically every town of any size in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta has been covered.

# Survey of the Tractor and Farm Machinery Situation

Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta

## 1919

The following statistics which have been compiled from several reliable sources, show in detail the prospects for 1919 as regards the tractor and farm implement business. The conditions are subject to change somewhat in accordance with the way the spring of 1919 opens up and the midsummer and fall business is certain to be influenced by crop conditions.

The information as given in these statistics is however a pretty safe working basis to follow, as the sources from which they have been gathered are thoroughly conversant with local conditions.

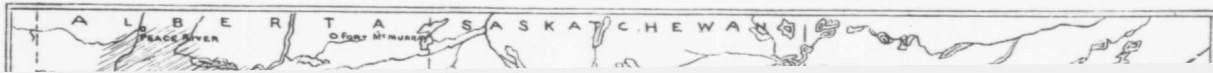


*Map Showing Distribution of Tractor Dealers in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta*

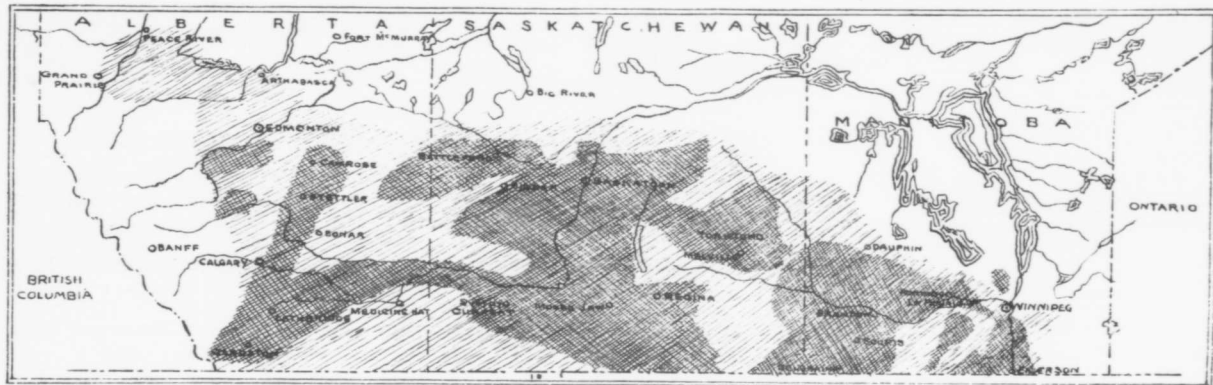
The dealer has been and will continue to be the logical medium of tractor distribution in Western Canada. Some two thousand dealers are now carrying tractor contracts in the Canadian West. The automobile dealer is also "nibbling" on the tractor for with the shortage of motor cars occasioned by the war, he sees in the tractor something that will keep his business alive until such time as the motor car business begins to move once more.

The above map shows how thoroughly the field is covered by the tractor dealer in Western Canada. To the tractor manufacturer who is desirous of working this field it should be quite evident that his medium of distribution is already here and working.

Dark portions show where greatest development has taken place.

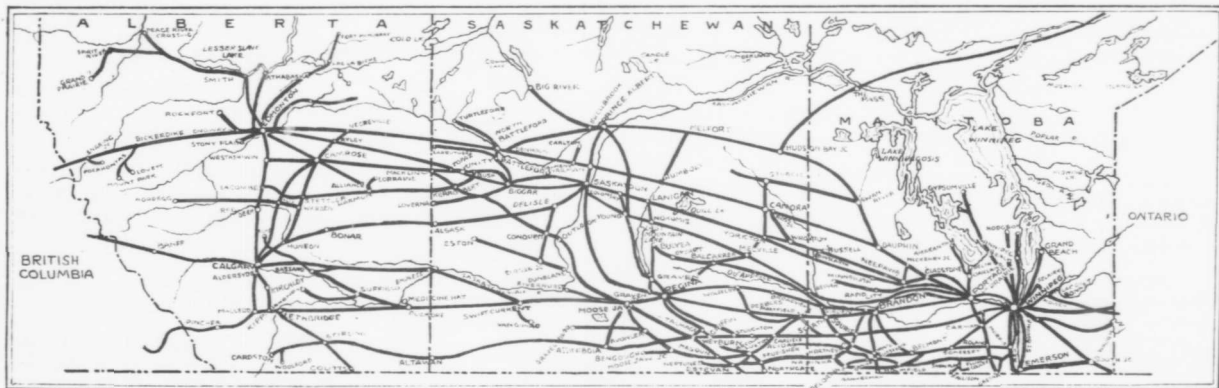
The above map shows the tractor area in Western Canada. It will be observed that the three provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta are pretty well covered. There is no place in the world where tractors are so generally used as in this field. In fact the gas tractor really had its beginning in the Canadian West.

The Winnipeg Motor Contests of 1908-09-10-11-12-13 marked the beginning of tractor history, and the data secured at these contests can be found in the files of practically every tractor designer to-day.

The Western Canadian farmer pioneered the tractor. From a few makeshifts in 1903 to the modern gas tractor of 1918, of which there are over 16,000 in use in the three prairie provinces, is a long cry. It is the story of an implement that made its way through great difficulties both on the part of the farmer and the manufacturer.

Power farming is here to stay and while no doubt the future will see many changes and improvements in tractors, the adaptability of the tractor to soil cultivation has been proven beyond a doubt in the Canadian West.

The three prairie provinces are well equipped with railways; in fact, nowhere on the North American Continent are there so many miles of railway per unit of population as in the Canadian West.

The railways have pioneered Western Canada. They have pushed into practically unknown districts long before the settlers arrived, with the result that settlement has been rendered comparatively easy.

The settler's first crop has in most cases had to be hauled but a few miles to the nearest town or siding, and the getting in of supplies has been but the task of much older settled countries.

All this has meant, and will continue to mean a great deal to the manufacturer and distributor of tractors and farm machinery, as the matter of sales is rendered comparatively easy and the problem of deliveries is reduced to a minimum.

The railway mileages of the various railways are approximately as follows:--
