Trouble Over Girl.

A young girl, whose parents reside in Walkerton, and who was a ward of the Children's Aid Society was placed some years ago into the care of a well-to-do farmer and his wife near Elmwood returned recently to her parent here, in a fallen state, having it is alleged, been ejected from the farmer's home on account of her unfortunate condition, which the girl claims was brought about by none other than the farmer's son, who after she was found to be in trouble folded his tent, it seems, and left for the West. Mr. Gunting, head agent of the Children's Aid Society, Toronto, was in Walkerton on Thursday last in connection with the case, and had the farmer and his wife meet him here with a view to coming to some settlement in the matter. But as it seems that the Elmwood couple couldn't be persuaded to accross with the necessary cash, the conference resulted in a fizzle, and the agriculturalist and his spouse returned home, while Mr. Gunting left later for Owen Sound, from which point he despatched Constable Trout to Walkerton for the girl and her babe, having secured a home for them in the Grey capital, while Mr. Gunting, we understand, will take proceedings against the farmer into whose care and protection the girl was given, as well as causing a warrant to be issued for the arrest and apprehension of his son.—Herald-Times.

A Good Bill.

Mr. William McDonald M.P.P. for North Bruce and editor of the Chesley Enterprise has a bill re taxes on autos that should go through. In the last issue of his paper he writes: Seventy-five per cent of the tax on autos to be returned to municipalities by the Provincial Government by Dec. 1st in each year is the substance of a bill introduced in the Legislature by the members of N. Bruce.

At the present time the Government returns a proportion of the extra tax on railways and if this is just, and we believe it is, why not have a fair share of the auto tax returned to the municipalities in which autos are owned and use the road. The thirtieth sideroad leading into this town was in a worse condition last year than it has been for several years past. The township of Elderslie finds that the auto travel on this highway makes it expensive to maintain, consequently there is a danger of autos meeting with mishaps on the highway and the township will be mltected for damages as Brant was when Danny O'Connor was killed in an auto accident at Dunkeld. That suit cost the township over \$3000 and yet not one cent from auto tax or other provincial source came for the maintenance of that roadway. Its cost of construction and upkeep like other high-ways have been met by local taxation and statute labor. Large sums from the Provincial Treasury have been voted for the Toronto-Hamilton cement road which has cost about \$300,000 more than was estimated, and it is about time some portion of the tax on autos which is making roads so hard to maintain, came back to the municipalities in which the auto owners live and use the roads.

This development has mostly taken place within the last six years, and it all goes to show the increased facilities and comforts which the people possess and which were unknown of by their fathers.

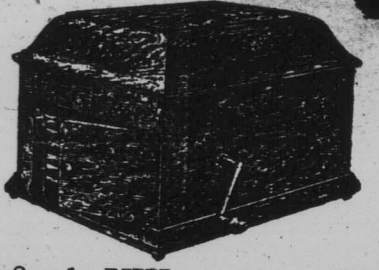

After the milkers, springers, stockers and feeders were deducted there would be about 2100 cattle that were offered as fat. Trade was steady at last Monday's values, but not quite as fast.

The quality of the best loads of cattle was as good as last week, but as usual the percentage of common and medium quality was smaller.

"Baby beef" calves that brought a light load of cattle at the market yet paid for at \$8 more than the percentage was much smaller under \$8.

Choice heavy steers, \$8.00; choice butchers cattle, \$7.75 to \$8.35; good butchers, \$7.85 to \$8.10; medium butchers, \$7.60 to \$7.85; common butchers, \$6.75 to 7; choice cows, \$6.75 to \$7; good cows, \$6.25 to \$6.50; medium cows, \$5.50 to \$5.85; common cows, \$5 to \$5.50; choice bulls, \$7 to \$6.25; good bulls, \$6.50 to \$6.75; common bulls, \$5.25 to \$6.

Stockers and Feeders—Feeders, 850 to 1000 lbs., \$7.25 to \$7.60; stockers, 650 to 750 lbs., \$6.75 to \$7; and for a few dehorned yearling, \$7.25.

Milkers and Springers—A moderate supply of medium to good quality sold at about steady prices. Choice milkers and springers, \$85 to \$90; good cows, \$65 to \$75; common cows, \$50 to \$60.

Veal Calves—Receipts being light, prices were firm at last week's decline. Choice veal calves, \$9 to \$10; good calves \$8.50 to \$9; medium, \$7.50 to \$8; common, \$4.50 to \$6; heavy fat calves, \$6 to \$7.

Sheep and Lambs—Light sheep, \$9 to \$9.50; heavy sheep, \$7 to \$8; culls, \$6 to \$6.50; choice lambs, \$11.50 to \$12.50; cull lambs, 9 to \$10; spring lambs, \$8 to \$10 each.

Hogs.—Selects, weighed off cars, \$11.25; \$10.75 fed and watered; \$10.40 f. o. b. cars. For heavy, fat, thin, light hogs, 50c per cwt. will be deducted; \$2.50 off for sows; \$4 off for stags from prices paid for selects, half of one per cent. off all hogs for inspection.
