We would direct the attention of our readers to the following extract from the Niagara Mail, containing a different explanation of one of the clauses of the Assessment Act from that generally adopted in this quarter.

THE ASSESSMENT LAW. - We have auhority from the Hon. Mr. Hinks to state, that the interpretation given to the assessment Law in this Town has been erroneous, and that six per cent only of income is to be taxed in Towns and Cities. With this understanding the law is a pretty fair one, and an improvement on the old Law. The income tax, as thus explained, will not bear oppressively on any person, and will proportionately relieve real estate. Formerly many persons were totally exempt, who had a right to incur some portion of the burden of taxation. It is to be regretted, that some of our enactments, as in the present case, are so obscure, as to puzzle persons of no ordinary degree of acumen, in reference to possibility of mistaking their meaning. Were the law in question properly understood in all its parts it is likely the outcry against it would die away, at least so far as those are concerned, who are not interested in the overthrow of the ministry. The operation of the Law will be understoodwhen we say that an individual assessed for £100 of income, will only have to pay 3s., currency of tax provided the rate s 6d., in the pound—should he be assessed for £75 he would have to pay at the same rate 2s 3d., of tax and so on.
