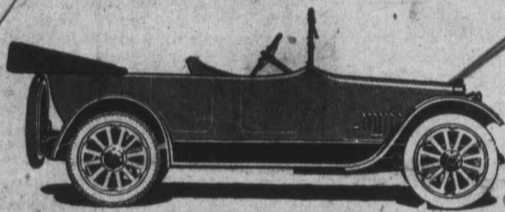

British Giving No Rest to the Germans on Somme Front

London, Feb. 13.—The official report from British Headquarters in France tonight reads:

"Early last night a strong hostile raiding party was driven off by our fire south of Pys and suffered heavy losses, leaving prisoners in our hands."

"Today the enemy made repeated attacks, all unsuccessful on our new positions south of Sere."

"Early this morning we carried out a successful raid east of Souchez. Our troops penetrated several hundred yards into the enemy's position, and did great damage to his defences. A trench rail head and four mine shafts were destroyed and many dug-outs blown in."

"The enemy resisted stubbornly. A considerable number of Germans were killed, and we captured forty-seven prisoners, including one officer. Our casualties are reported to have been light. We also entered the enemy's trenches this morning and during the night northeast of Neuville St. Vaast, north of Loos and east of Ypres. We destroyed several occupied dug-outs and took a few prisoners. A small party of the enemy succeeded in reaching our trenches south of Armentieres, but was at once ejected."

"There was considerable artillery activity on both sides in the neighborhood of the Somme and in Ypres sector."

British Government Thanks Ambassador Gerard

London, Feb. 12.—The gratitude and thanks of the nation have been conveyed by the British Government to former American Ambassador Gerard, at Berlin, for his work on behalf of British civilians and prisoners of war in Germany. Foreign Secretary Balfour made this announcement to day in the House of Commons.

Died for His Country

Truly they may be proud of their splendid sacrifice—a sacrifice that is recognized and appreciated throughout the whole district. Mrs. Blackwell has received a letter from Lieut. Hall speaking in high praise of her heroic son and saying how much he was beloved by all his comrades. He will be much missed by his friends and parents to whom he was devoted. The above is from a Gloucester, England, paper. The deceased soldier was a brother to the late Alfred Blackwell of Centreville, Kings Co., whose widow, and son Arthur, Blackwell are now residing in Kentville.

Oxonian Sank Austrian Sub.

Newport News, Feb. 13.—Members of the crew of the British steamer Oxonian, brought into port today a story that the Oxonian sank by gunfire, an Austrian submarine which attacked her in the Mediterranean Dec. 28. They said some of the men on the submarine were saved by a French patrol boat, but that several were lost.

British naval gunners aboard the Oxonian, the men said, opened upon the submarine after a torpedo, launched at the steamer without warning had passed close to her stern. According to the story the second shot from the Oxonian's 4.7-inch gun mounted aft, struck the submersible squarely in the middle and crumpled her up. The French patrol boat came up in response to "S.O.S." calls sent out by the Oxonian, it was said, and the steamer continued her way.

Conopic at Boston

Boston Feb. 13.—The White Star liner Conopic, from Mediterranean ports with passengers, arrived at Quarantine today.

Hallfax Heir to Big Estate

The New Haven Journal, Jan. 31, says:

"One of the most remarkable cases that has come to the attention of probate court here in a long time was brought to light yesterday in the application made by Attorney Franklin Coeller for an extension of time in which to file the inventory of the estate of the late Rev. Henry H. Johnson, of 112 Henry Street, who died several months ago at an advanced age. Attorney Coeller gave as the reason for his request the fact that whereas it was supposed the estate consisted of only \$500 investigation about the late home of Dr. Johnson, continues to reveal additional valuables that belong to the estate which have been hidden away in most unusual places and while on estimated is worth nearly \$100,000 has already been unearthed, he as administrator is continually finding evidence of further property of the estate."

Notes, documents and bills of great amounts, have been found already secreted in holes and in the walls of the house, under loose floorboards and in various other hiding places about the house, and the administrator is not sure that he has exhausted all the remarkable places that may reveal additions to estate. Curious of some value and of much interest have been found in taking the inventory of the estate. Beads and trinkets from Jamaica and the Islands of the Barbados are among the articles which have been brought to light.

Rev. Mr. Johnson was for many years pastor of the Emmanuel Baptist Church, now located at Chapel and Day St. this city, and was quite well known here. He had been retired from the ministry of his people for quite a number of years before his death which occurred at an advanced age. He was nominated by President Cleveland for a diplomatic post in Hayti at one time.

The estate has two heirs, Gwendolen Johnson of Halifax, N. S., and McKerrow Johnson, of 68 Dixwell Avenue, this city.

Plot to Oust Powers in Cuba

Havana has been stirred by reports of a revolutionary movement. During Friday night the secretary of the interior Aurelio Heavia, notified the civil and military authorities that a plot to overthrow the government had been discovered involving civil and military officials and rumors that high army officers had been placed under arrest spread over the city, causing both excitement and alarm.

Steamers Sunk

Washington, Feb. 13.—Lloyd's reports today of ships sunk by submarines shows a total of 6,808 tons. All the vessels named have been reported by news despatches, except the British brigantine Ada, which the Lloyd's report said had been sunk by gunfire without warning Her crew were rescued. The brigantine Ada was a vessel of 187 tons gross, and built at Prince Edward Island in 1872.

London, Feb. 13.—The sinking of the British steamer Foreland is also announced by Lloyd's.

The Foreland was a steamer of 1,960 tons gross, built in Sunderland in 1914, and owned in London.

Italians Bombard Pola

Rome, Feb. 13.—Via Paris — "Italian seaplanes yesterday made an effective air raid upon Pola, throwing bombs on the arsenal and on ships in the harbor," says an Admiralty announcement. "All the Italian machines returned undamaged."

A Yarmouth despatch says that the wedding took place on Sunday evening of Capt. Ernest Kinney, of the steamer Prince Arthur, and Mrs. Marion Cameron, widow of Aneas Cameron, and daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A C Robbins, Rev Dr. Crowell officiated. They will leave in a few days for Montreal and United States cities.

Three Men Killed in Railway Wreck

Saskatoon, Sask., Feb. 5.—Three men are dead and six are seriously injured as the result of a wreck on the Canadian Northern Railway six miles south of this city at 8.30 last night.

Deutschland Remains German Port.

Amsterdam, Feb. 7 via London.—The Weser Zeitung of Bremen says that the merchant submarine Deutschland has not started on her third voyage to America and remains in a German port.

Seven Survivors of Shackleton's Expedition Rescued.

Wellington, N. Z., Feb. 5, via London—Seven survivors of the Shackleton Antarctic expedition who were stranded on Elephant Island have been rescued by the relief steamer Aurora, which arrived at Cape Evans on January 10 with them on board. Captain MacKintosh and two other men of the stranded party perished.

Four Persons Burned to Death.

Curling, Nfld., Feb. 5—Four persons were burned to death and three others were injured in a fire which followed an accident to a passenger train on the Reid Newfoundland railway, near Glenwood.

New York Full of Vessels

New York, Feb. 13—According to the Associated Press the port of New York is crowded with shipping, and the officers of the various trans-Atlantic lines are busy settling questions by the German blockade declaration. Twelve large steamers came in yesterday and last night, five of them from danger zone.

San Francisco, Feb. 7—Franz Popp, former German consul general here and four aides, under prison sentences for conspiring against American neutrality, were ordered to furnish increased bail of \$25,000 each today by the United States district court. Popp's counsel said it probably meant Popp would go to jail.

DR. CLARK SCORES HIS OWN PARTY

Dr. Michael Clark, the noted Red Deer Liberal, whose speech in support of the Government last session attracted national attention, has once again been compelled to repudiate the petty partizanship of his own party. In a great speech before the Toronto Club last week Dr. Clark made withering reference to the "political partizans," and the men who talked of Canada bankrupting herself for the Empire, and proceeded: "Canada has done well. Some people think that she has shown some little signs of faltering. I do not believe that there is faltering. It is true we heard an echo lately, which was only an echo, and died away, as such things deservedly do."

"The question was asked somewhere—and I am sorry that such a question should have been asked: 'Are we going to bankrupt ourselves for England?' I know I am on dangerous ground, I can't help it. I have a habit of saying what I think. That question did not arouse so much indignation in my mind as pity—pity that any young Canadian should have so failed to grasp the magnitude of the issue, and pity in the second place that any young Canadian should have gone over the history of the British in this war and her history of other days and fail to realize that Britain is going near the verge of bankruptcy for the world's freedom."

And after this scathing arraignment of the man whom Sir Wilfrid endorsed as "My dear Lucien" Dr. Clark proceeded to address himself to the mad partizans of the Opposition as follows:

"There are grouchers and grubblers—yes, and there are profiteers and political partizans, and I would send the whole four groups to somewhere they weren't so likely to be run over by steam engines as they would be were they at the mercy of Canadians such as are represented here."

This strong condemnation of the disloyal utterances of men in the Liberal party like Lucien Cannon, and of partizan blatherskites in the same party like the Kytes and the Carvells, does not come from a Conservative. It is the verdict of a sturdy Liberal as this country has known since the days of Cartwright and Blake—a Liberal of the British school, one who has walked by the side of British Liberals like Gladstone and Morley and Asquith and Grey. And it is a verdict that will cause a searching of hearts among the honest, British Liberals of this country.

New York, Feb. 13—The Associated Press says a funnel shaped sea lane of armed patrol ships, which extends 300 miles from the British Isles westward, has been established by the British Admiralty, according to passengers arriving here on the Cunard liner Andania, from Liverpool. Light cruisers, light patrol boats and armed trawlers lined the course by the Andania from Fastnet until she was safely out of the war zone.

Jap Won British Medal

The British medal has just been awarded to a Japanese, Private Harry Ohara, who has worn the British uniform on the western front since the outbreak of the war, and who has seen so much hard fighting that he has seventy scars. He has been in hospital six times, the last time with twenty shrapnel wounds. Ohara entered the army with the Sikhs, being really taken for an Indian by the recruiting officer. Later he fought as a member of a Middlesex regiment, and now, having earned his discharge, he expects to enlist in the flying corps.

Commencing next week the Red Cross workers will canvass the whole town and vicinity and we ask for them a most hearty response from our citizens to meet the

existing need to carry on the good work.

It has been suggested that each church or society holding a supper or sale contribute a part of their funds to this object. Remember the war must be won and the work of the Red Cross is contributing to that end to a very great extent. Let your contributions be hearty and generous.

LINER DEUTSCHLAND AND 200 U-BOATS TAKEN, BUTLER SAYS

Pittsburg, Feb. 13—Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, declared here today that the submarine Deutschland had been captured by the British.

"I have positive knowledge," he said, "that the Deutschland is one of eighty-five German submarines in one British port. I know that the British have captured not less than 200 German submarines."

"The Deutschland, now lying at Bremen is another submarine with that name painted on it to support the German story that the big commerce carrier never started on a third trip," Mr. Butler said.

"The German submarine plan will not succeed," he declared. "The British patrol and the active submarine arm of the British navy will prove their sufficiency to adequately and most effectively deal with the blockade," he added.

PRESIDENT WILSON MAY SOON BE FORCED TO TAKE SOME ACTION

America's Entry Into War Appears to be Only a Question of Time

Washington, February 14—A steady accumulation of violations of American rights by Germany made it appear possible today that President Wilson would go before Congress to ask authority for further protecting lives and property, without waiting for a serious disaster which might shock the country. There were no indications, however, that he believed the time for such a step had come, and it again was stated authoritatively that he would move deliberately and with full appreciation of all the consequences involved.

British Coin in Hiding London—From data collected in different parts of the country, the London Evening Star estimates that there are 20,000,000 pounds (\$100,000,000) in gold secreted in Great Britain.

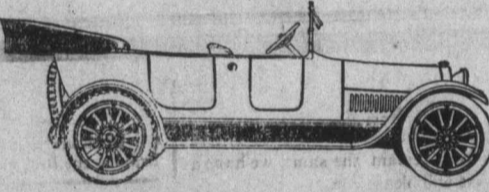

China Severs Relations With Germany

New York, Feb. 12—A News Agency despatch from London published here this afternoon says: "China has broken off diplomatic relations with Germany it was authoritatively reported here this afternoon."

The Saxonian's Crew

London, Feb. 12—Nineteen members of the crew of the British tank steamer Saxonian, which was sunk February 8 by a German submarine, were rescued, according to a Central News report. Eight men were injured.

A crew is at present at work on the steamship Yarmouth at St. John, making necessary repairs before she leaves for the port of New York. The steamer will, in all probability, be ready to sail to-morrow. On arrival at New York the Yarmouth will be placed in dry dock, where she will undergo extensive repairs.

Belgian Relief Steamer Sunk

London, Feb. 5—The Belgian relief steamer Lars Kruse, of 1,460 tons and under Danish register, was sunk by a torpedo or mine near the Belgian coast today. The vessel carried a cargo of wheat from Buenos Aires.

The steamer Hurstwood, 1,229 tons, was torpedoed without warning at noon today. Three men were killed by the explosion and three seriously injured, two of whom died after the crew was landed.

Reward Offered For Capture of Hun Submarines

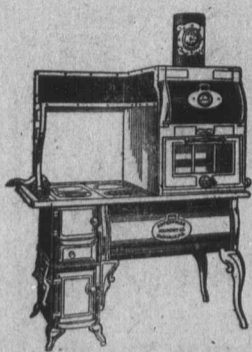

HUNDREDS OF SHIPS DEPART AN ARRIVE AT ENGLISH PORTS

London, Feb. 14—While naval officials here express the belief that the submarine operations may continue at high tension for a couple of months, they show the utmost confidence in the ability of the navy to cope with the latest campaign with approximately the same success as the campaign against the U-boats in 1915.

An admiralty official showed to the Associated Press today the figures of arrivals and departures for yesterday at English ports, proving that a larger number of vessels entered and departed than on any day during the past six months. Taking a day at random during the period since the latest war zone was declared, out of 140 British arrivals and departures, only four vessels were sunk, and these figures, according to the official, give an excellent idea of the percentage of loss to vessels taking the risks.

In the English Channel, where British communications were most vital, the Admiralty official says, the losses have been routed through the Channel.

BRITISH TROOPS ARE SWEEPING FORWARD IN THE ANCRE REGION

London, Feb. 14—The hammering of the British guns and the advance of General Haig's troops against the enemy's defences north of the Ancre resulted in the capture today of a strong German point southeast of Grandcourt, according to the statement issued by the War Office tonight.

All evidence points to the fact that these unceasing attacks are eating the vitals out of the German lines in this region, not only leading to the pocketing of Serre, but demoralizing the German troops, who are given no rest, day or night. It is known the Germans are hurling all their available forces into this area. The British apparently have placed no obstacle to their arrival, but cautious war students are beginning to wonder whether they will ever depart.

Both the British and the French carried out successful raids during the day on the rest of the front Northeast of Arras, Haig's troops penetrated 250 yards into enemy's defences, reaching the third line. The German works were destroyed many troops killed and forty prisoners carried back. "Our casualties were very light," says the War Office statement.

One German, one British and one French machine constituted the days toll of destruction in aerial combats. Dunkirk was bombarded by German squadrons last night and this morning, but little damage was done. A few civilians were killed.
