Sanctum Suggestions.

The proposed visit of the Nova Scotia Historical Society to the historic places of this region during the coming summer can be made an event of great interest. The centenary of Longfellow's birth has been celebrated elsewhere and it is fitting that it should be observed at Grand Pre, a spot which the poet did much to make famous.

The question of where to place the Independents in the house is one that is now occupying some attention in parliament. It is customary for those supporting the government to sit upon the right of the speaker while the 'opposition' sits on the left. Up to the present no provision has been made for the Independents either in the house or in the senate and this is going to become an increasingly difficult question as the days go by.

The salary of the members of the Provincial Government has heretofore been \$1,200, with \$500 additional for the Premier. The Provincial Secretary has introduced a Bill, which was read a first time, increasing the salaries. Hereafter the salaries will be to the Provincial Secretary \$5,000; to the Attorney-General \$5,000; to the Commissioner of Public Works and Mines \$5,000; to the members, holding in addition to any of the foregoing offices the recognized position of Premier or first minister, the further sum of \$1,000. It is said there is a strong probability that the sessional pay of the members of the house will also be increased generously, and so the good work goes on. The people must pay the bills and look pleasant.

It is evidently time for another extension in our water system if we are to keep in line with the needs of our growing town. While the supply is fully adequate to the demands of the present water-district the head of the reservoir is not sufficient to give water to that part of the town covering the high ground to the south. Wolfville is rapidly growing in that direction, and will grow even more rapidly when the town is in a position to furnish a good supply of water to the properties in that very desirable part of the town. In order to do this it will probably be necessary to install a new system which we imagine could be done at a comparatively small cost. There are a number of excellent springs on the 'ridge' which should with proper care be made to supply all the water that will be needed in the new district for years. We trust the Council will take up the matter at an early date.

It is expected that all arrangements for the opening of a Memorial Park at Grand Pre will be completed soon. Since this town has derived so much benefit from the tourist travel for a number of years a large contribution towards the purchase of the land is to be expected. Thousands of dollars are spent in this region by those who have been drawn here by the Evangelical story, yet so far we have done practically nothing to enhance the historic attractions at our very doorstep. This harvest can be very greatly increased by a united effort. The memorial scheme is receiving a great deal of notice in United States papers and to put off what is clearly our duty in this matter would be a great mistake and result in loss. The neglect of the Grand Pre grounds has been commented upon by visitors for several years, and we have felt that our lack of effort to make them attractive has not been to our credit as an enterprising town. It would be a source of deep satisfaction to know that Wolfville has been the means of purchasing and making public the historic Grand Pre lands made famous by Longfellow; and to make it possible by acquiring this land to enter upon a larger scheme of the Memorial Park. Once begun and established and made a place of beauty as well as of increased interest in our historical associations, the tide of travel cannot be diverted but will rather be strengthened.

While the interest in this work is in part commercial there is also a phase of it which will not be lost to many. At Grand Pre are landmarks connected with our earliest history which the passing of time makes more precious. We trust the citizens will contribute liberally to the fund to be raised for the purchase of the Grand Pre land.

At a public meeting held in Victoria Hall on Wednesday evening of last week a resolution favoring the proposal to install water works in Berwick by means of an incorporate company was voted down almost unanimously by the ratepayers present. A resolution to the effect that steps be taken to enable the town to install a water system was carried with but a few dissenting votes—Register.

Board of Trade Meeting.

The quarterly meeting of the Wolfville Board of Trade was held on Tuesday evening, when there was a fair attendance of members present. The Council presented a report of their doings, which included the appointment of standing committees for the year as follows:—

Tourist—J. F. Herbin, W. H. Chase, R. R. Duncan, J. E. Hales, W. T. Ford.
Streets and Public Property—C. R. H. Starr, J. D. Chambers, W. T. Ford, C. H. Borden, R. W. Starr.
Press—W. T. Ford, B. O. Davison, R. W. Starr.

Membership—The whole Council. The report of the care-taker of the old church at Grand Pre was read and referred to the tourist committee.

Mr. J. E. Hales tendered his resignation as president, giving as the reason his inability to give the necessary time to the work of the office. The resignation was accepted with regret, and the Vice-President, Mr. R. E. Harris, took the chair.

A communication was read from Rev. Thomas McFall, calling attention to the fact that the agreement concerning the old church at Grand Pre is not being enforced, inasmuch as the church has been opened to tourists on the Sabbath. The matter was referred to the proper committee who are instructed to see that in future the terms of the agreement be strictly observed.

The matter of the proposed abutment across the Cornwallis river received considerable attention in a discussion in which a number of gentlemen took part—the general impression being that the prospects for the carrying on the work were unusually bright at present.

Mr. C. R. H. Starr brought up the proposal for the establishment of an experimental fruit farm in this valley and moved the following resolution which was seconded by Mr. F. J. Porter, and unanimously passed:

Whereas it is understood that an agreement has been entered into between the Dominion and Provincial governments to establish an experimental fruit farm in this valley; and whereas the great need of such an establishment has long been felt by the fruit-growers of Nova Scotia; therefore

Resolved that this Board express its hearty approval of the proposal, feeling confident that an experimental fruit farm, properly located in this valley, must prove a very great benefit to a large number of people in this province.

A committee composed of Messrs. R. W. Starr, C. R. H. Starr, Capt. Tingley, C. S. Fitch and J. Elliot Smith was appointed to look up suitable properties in this vicinity and use their best efforts to have the farm located in the most desirable section from the stand-point of fruit-growing.

Mr. J. F. Herbin read a communication from the secretary of the Historical Society of Nova Scotia stating that the Society intended having an excursion to Grand Pre during the summer, in commemoration of the celebration of the centennial anniversary of Mr. Longfellow, and asking the co-operation of this Board in the matter. The project received the favorable consideration of the Board and was referred to the Tourist Committee for action. Mr. Herbin also reported that an option had been secured on historical property at Grand Pre, and that an effort was being made to collect an amount sufficient to enable the purchase and improvement of such property.

It was decided to defer the election of a new president until the next quarterly meeting.

Mr. R. E. Harris was appointed a committee to interview Mr. Giffkins with regard to some very desirable changes in connection with the railway station.

It is understood that an agreement has been reached between Canada and Britain, whereby British newspapers and periodicals will come to Canada at greatly reduced rates. Postmaster-General Lemieux will likely give the details of the arrangement in Parliament and to the public at once. The decision reached at the Congress in Rome to carry letters of one ounce, instead of half an ounce for two cents from Canada to Britain will take effect at once, instead of in October as previously arranged.

The accounts sent home from the West of severe hardships undergone by many Cornwallis natives during the past winter, should help to make present residents of this Province more contented to remain in their mother country, where a comfortable living is more easily obtained. A former bank manager of Kings county writes that during the coldest weather of this past winter he was obliged to travel three miles for water supplies. Ex.

The Montreal Gazette points out that in 1896 the cost of the Militia Department was \$2,193,372, of which \$1,000,000 was for arms and accoutrements. In 1907 this had grown to \$2,671,922, an increase of 158 per cent. Of this latter amount only \$1,209,875 was for arms, etc. The balance of \$1,462,047—covered the same expenditures as the \$1,193,372 spent in 1896, the expenditure for administration purposes having increased by 36 per cent.

Two Mexican towns, Chilpancingo, population, 15,000 and Chilapa, population, 7,458, are reported to have been completely destroyed by an earthquake on Monday. The number of dead and injured reported is not large, but the towns are practically wrecked.


