When the provincial sanatorium was established this paper suggested that if the government was really in earnest in the de-sire to limit the ravages of tuberculosis in our province provision sire to limit the ravages of tuberculosis in our province provision should be made for a measure of free treatment for those unable to themselves bear the expense. THE ACADIAN believed then as now that the real menage of the malady was not in the homes of the rich who were able to pay the cost of treatment at the sanatorium but in the homes of the overcrowded poor. This being the case it was the plain duty of those in authority to safeguard the public health by such measures as provided all the benefit which the in-stitution is able to provide for the prevention of the spread of the disease. disease

It is because of such a belief that we are pleased to know that It is because of such a belief that we are pleased to know that now after the lapse of so many years the government of the pro-vince has decided to take action. A bill was presented in the legis-lature last week which provides that any person unable to pay the necessary expenses of treatment, and who is recommended by the medical health officer of any municipality or town in which the sufferer has a settlement, may be admitted to the Nova Scotia San-atorium on request of the mayor, warden or clerk of such munici-pality for a period of theme menths the cost to be made a matter for a period of three months, the cost to be made a matter pality of public charge.

As in numerous other cases of a similar character the govern-ment has failed to assume the responsibility of making action on the part of the municipal authorities obligatory, thus rendering ineffective what otherwise might prove very useful legislation. The passing of laws the carrying out of which is made optional on the part of those affected, while apparently very popular with our pro-vincial rulers is not likely to be attended with any very material results. We need today in our legislative halls a bolder spirit than that which evidently dominates and directs their activities.

LET US HOPE SO In these days when in view of the off reported corruption ex-isting in connection with public affairs we are at times inclined to the belief that "every man has his price", it is most encouraging to find evidence to the contrary. One such case which brings refreshment and reassurance is that of John W. Davis, who servied for a time as Ambassador from the United States to Great Britain. A solicitous friend, who was anxious that Davis should appear to advantage as a prospective nominee of the Democratic Party for the office of President, urged him to sever his connection with certain New York financial inter-ests which he is now serving as attorney. The reply which was given should be well pondered: "If I were in the market for the goods you offer," Mr. Davis writes, "I would not complain of the char-acter of this consignment, although I notice you do not guarantee delivery! The price you put on them, however, is entirely too high The only limitation upon a right thinking lawyer's independence is the duty which he owes to his clients, once selected, to serve them without the slightest thought of the effect which such a service may have upon his own personal popularity or political fortunes. Any lawyer who surrenders this independence or shades his duty by trimming his professional course to fit the gusts of popular opinion in my judgment not only dishonours himself, but disparages and degrades the great profession to which he should be proud to belong." That is fine and we may hope that a spirit and an idealism such as this are much more common than is supposed.



During the four years referred to on-cost of production the average price received by the grower was \$1.35 per box in 1919; \$1.55 per box in 1920; 75 cents in 1921 and 27.5 cents in 1922. Consequently the average profit or loss to the grower per box of apples for those years was 8 cents profit in 1919; 9 cents profit in 1920; 39 cents loss in 1921 and 84.3 cents per box in 1922. Figures for the past year, 1923, have not yet been collected and compiled, but enough is known to definitely state that the grower will again face a heavy loss.



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



SMALL FRUITS FOR THE HOME GARDEN A naturally well-drained loam is pre-ferable for all small fruit plants. Heavier subsoil drainage to prevent an excess of stagnant ground water, will give podd results. On the first type of soil planting may be done without ridging, but on the latter type it is better to ridge the soil slightly with the lowest application of stable manuer, and plow-ed deeply. This should be done as soon as the ground is dry enough to work in the spring so that early planting, which is an important factor, may not be delaye. The sound is dry enough to work in the rows. Currants and gooseberries are set in rows five feet apart in the rows. The year and one-half feet apart in the rows five feet apart each way. 
WAR TO THE KNIFE FRENCTER LONDON, May 3.—Members of the Liberal party today made no effort to conceal their mortification and anger over the rejection in the house of com-mons yesterday of the proportional representation electoral bill, which they declared was due to the vindicitive action of about 80 Laborites. The Laborites themselves made no secret of this resentment and were quoted by Liberal lobbyists as saying they did not vote on the bill's merits, but for the purpose of hitting back at the Liberals. The Liberal newspapers today are bilter in their comment, implying that when the budget, which the Liberals will support, is disposed of, it will be war to the knife between the two par-ties.






