Fighting in the Soudan.

CAIRO, Nov. 25 .- Lord Cromer, the following despatch from Gen. Kitchener: "Wingate's force came up with the Khalifa's force seven miles southeast of Golid and attacked it, After a sharp fight we took his position. The Khalifa, who was surrounded by a body-guard of Emirs, was killed and all the principal Emirs were killed or captured except Osman Digna, who escaped. The dervishes were utterly defeated, their whole

camp was taken and thousands surrendered. A large number of women, children Auglo-Egyptian force. The Khalifa referred to as being killed

in battle is Abdullah el Taishi, the great chieftain of the Soudan, who has given the British so much trouble. It may be said that the power of the dervishes is probably crushed. He was one of the three Khalifas who in 1882 helped the famous Mahdi to overthrow the governits place. At the battle of Omdurman, Sept. 2, 1898, General Kitchener utterly defeated the forces of the Khalifa with tremendous slaughter, but the Khalifa, with his harem and Osman Digna, the most famous of the Soudan generals, escaned and have since been fugitives. There may be some further trouble for the British in the Soudan owing to the fact that Osman Digna has escaped. He is a man of undoubted courage and re-

markable military skill.
