It appears that the king in 1901 abrogated or arbitrarily set aside the constitution under which government proceeded up to that time and this had been a cause of friction ever since in some quarters especially in the army. It is separated from Austro-Hungary by the Danube. It was formerly subject to Turkey; but part of the last century.
