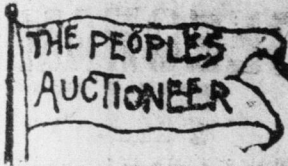

London Boys to Learn Trades in Training Ships

Lord Northampton's Novel and Attractive Scheme Seems Almost Certain to be Realized.

London, May 1.—Before long, it is hoped, there will be established on the Thames, off Temple Bar, if the Government is sympathetic, a training ship in which boys in "blind alley" world—van boys, errand boys, messengers, junior clerks, etc.—will learn the rudiments of some skilled trade. Lord Northampton's scheme is novel and attractive.

The ship—when it has been procured—will be fitted with club-rooms, reading room and gymnasium. Work-shops will be fitted up on board, and the boys will be taught such useful trades as carpenter, wheelwright, coach builder, blacksmith, farrier, saddler, harness-maker, etc.

Friday will be an off-night, and will be given up to concerts and lectures, while on alternate Saturdays there will be route marches on shore. It is proposed to form the boys into a corps to be known as the "Imperial Marine Artificers," and for the first year it is intended to limit the number to 300 non-commissioned officers and artificer apprentices, although it is possible that provision may be made for 100 more boys.

It is estimated that the annual cost of the corps, including wages, maintenance of the ship, and all other expenditure, will be £1,395. Already half of the money required for the initial outfit has been privately promised, and an appeal is to be made to the citizens of London to provide the balance. It is hoped that the Government will assist the scheme to the extent of supplying a ship.

LONDON, May 16.

Churchill, speaking at a banquet of the Shipwrights' Company, referred to naval development in recent years as growth in the concentration of the British fleet in Home waters which, combined with the enormous development of foreign navies had resulted in a sensible restriction of the mobility of the British Navy. He appealed to the Overseas Dominions to remedy this defect. The main naval development in the coming decade, he believed, would be found in the growth of Colonial navies, so that while the British navy maintained supremacy of the sea against all comers at decisive points, the daughter states should guard and patrol all the rest of the Empire. The Admiralty, he said, was prepared to give the Dominions full control over the movements of their naval forces in times of peace. Churchill added: We shall soon receive representatives of the new Canadian administration who are coming over to consult the Government and the Admiralty upon the course and policy which should be adopted in the future.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, This Morning.

That some passengers starved to death in open boats, after they had escaped from the sinking vessel, was made terribly probable yesterday with the arrival of the White Star liner Oceanic. In a collapsible life-raft which the Oceanic sighted and picked up on Monday last were found three bodies, all in such a condition that they were committed to the sea as soon as the burial service could be read over them. The bodies were of men, one of them a freeman, who was chained by the leg to a thwart in one end of the boat, while the two others were huddled together in the other end. In their mouths were small pieces of flesh, and the Oceanic's officers believe the victims chewed their flesh while delirious to ease the pain of hunger and thirst.

LUEBEC, May 16.

The Danish Royal yacht, Darmen, hog, heavily draped in mourning, steamed out of Trave Munde harbor at noon to-day with the casket containing the body of the late King Frederick aboard. The Dowager Queen Louise, with the Danish princess and princesses, stood on her deck, making sorrowful recognition of the demonstration of sympathy from the crowds standing with bared heads on the quay. Two Danish warships saluted with 37 guns as they took up their positions behind the Royal yacht, which they will accompany on her funeral voyage to Copenhagen.

Welsh Dis-establishment.

In view of the heated debates over the Welsh Disestablishment and Dis-establishment Bill, the sensational features of which make good copy, and are therefore being cabled to this side of the water, it will prove matter of some interest to our readers to peruse the chief features of the bill as outlined by the London Daily News. These are as follows:—

"1. The Church of England in Wales is to be disestablished and dis-endowed.

"2. Of the endowments amounting to £259,000, the sum of £173,000 is to be used for Welsh National purposes subject to existing life interests and freehold tenures.

"3. From the endowments the Dis-established Church will receive £87,000; life interests will amount to £62,000 a year; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and Queen Anne's Bounty will be empowered to add £31,000—£180,000 in all.

£26,700 for the University.

"4. Welsh Commissioners are to be established as a temporary body to receive and allocate the endowments taken under the Bill. A sum of £26,700 a year is to go to the University of Wales, and the remainder of the Welsh County Councils for public purposes other than the reduction of rates.

"5. Existing incumbents will receive their full stipend while they hold them, and provision is made for pensions."

Watching an Earthquake.

Mr. John Muir, in the Century for March, describes a striking experience in the Yosemite:—

Before a single boulder had fallen I was convinced that earthquakes were the talus-makers, and positive proof soon came. It was a calm, moonlight night, and no sound was heard for the first minute or so, save low, muffled, bubbling, underground rumblings, and the whispering and rustling of the agitated trees, as if Nature were holding her breath. Then suddenly out of the strange silence and strange motion there came a tremendous roar. The Eagle Rock, on the south wall, about half a mile up the valley, gave way, and I saw it falling in thousands of the great boulders I had been so long studying, pouring to the valley floor in a free curve luminous from friction, making a terribly sublime spectacle—an arc of glowing, passionate fire, fifteen hundred feet span, as true in form and as serene in beauty as a rainbow in the midst of the stupendous, roaring rock-storm. The sound was so tremendously deep and broad and earnest that the whole earth, like a living creature, seemed at last to have found a voice and to be calling to her sister planets. In trying to tell something of the size of this awful sound, it seems to me that if all the thunder of all the storms I had ever heard were condensed into one roar, it would not equal this rock-roar at the birth of a mountain talus. Think, then, of the roar that arose to heaven at the simultaneous birth of all the thousands of ancient canon taluses throughout the length and breadth of the range!

The first severe shocks were soon over, and eager to examine the newborn talus, I ran up the valley in the moonlight and climbed upon it before the huge blocks, after their fiery flight, had come to complete rest. They were slowly settling into their places, chafing, grating against one another, groaning and whispering; but no motion was visible except in a stream of small fragments pattering down the face of the cliff. A cloud of dust particles, lighted by the moon, floated out across the whole breadth of the valley, forming a ceiling that lasted until after sunrise, and the air was filled with the odour of crushed Douglas spruces from a grove that had been mowed down and mashed like weeds.

He concludes:— All Nature's wildness tells the same story; the shocks and outbursts of earthquakes, volcanoes, geysers, roaring, thundering waves and floods, the silent uprush of sap in plants, storms of every sort, each and all, are the orderly, beauty-making love-beats of Nature's heart.

This joy in the convulsion of Nature suggests Browning's line about volcanoes, "God takes a pleasure in their uncouth pride."

Mr. W. T. Stead counted among the most trying experiences of his life an interview he had with King Leopold of Belgium at the time when Gordon was shut up in Khartoum. He went to Brussels and obtained a special interview with the King in order that he should move on behalf of Gordon and claim the Sudan as his reward. "It was terrible; how that man made me sweat!"—London Chronicle.

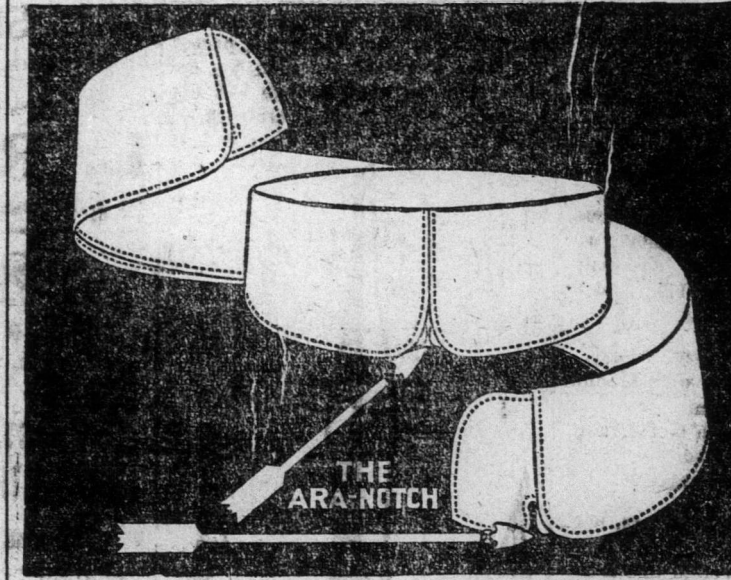

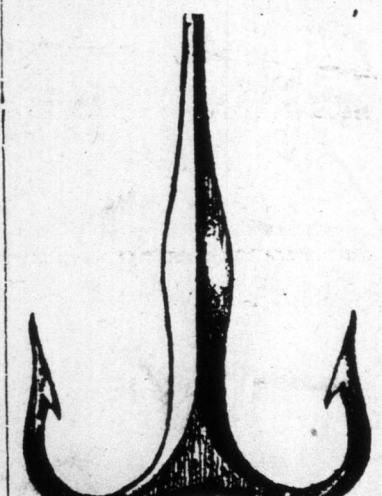

Among the mourners were all the fishermen of Quidi Vidi, of which place the deceased spent the greater portion of his life in the fishing industry, also prominent in the ranks were the officers of the Star of the Sea, forming a guard of honour. At the Cathedral Rev. Fr. Sheehan officiated, and interment was in the family plot at Mount Carmel Cemetery.

T. A. MEETING.—At a special meeting of the T. A. & B. Society last night the resolutions whether members of forty years standing in the Society should be exempt from fines, and the establishment of a savings bank were considered.

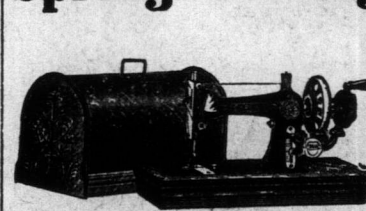

The prevalence of beri-beri at Herring Neck needs the immediate attention of the Health Officer, Dr. Brehm. There are a number of cases at that place, and from the continual increase the situation is growing rather alarming. What the cause of this disease is we do not know as we were under the impression it was confined to hot climates, but there seems to be something contagious about it, there being now seven cases at Herring Neck, most of them otherwise healthy men; and no one knows who is the next able-bodied man to be attacked and possibly lose his summer's work. We direct the attention of our energetic Magistrate and the medical men to this state of affairs, and urge them to take some action to combat this terrible, numbing disease. If it be the water, or diet, or whatever it be let it be diagnosed as soon as possible.—Twillington Sun.

The Western Fishery.

Mr. Amos Hillier arrived here by last night's train from Lunenburg suffering from an affection of the eyes and was taken to Hospital by Mr. Eli Whiteway. Speaking to the Telegram Mr. Hillier said that all the boats are out daily at Lunenburg and neighborhood but there is neither fish nor bait there at present and the outlook is not pleasing. Tuesday past six bankers arrived at Grand Bank with an average of 600 qts. each, will rest and sail for the Banks again shortly. These are the first arrivals and they will bait in the bay where herring is plentiful.

Third House Destroyed.

In addition to the summer houses, flakes and stages owned by Wm. and Henry Button at Spirit Point Cove, to which the Telegram alluded to a few days ago and which were completely demolished by avalanches, the premises of Mr. Rd. Hopkins was also destroyed from the same cause. This entails great loss on these fishermen as they must rebuild their premises.

Empire Day Celebrated.

Gower Street Church will celebrate Empire Day on Sunday, May 26th, in a very special manner. The Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite will assist the pastor, Dr. Rogers, at the morning service. A special programme of patriotic music is being arranged by Professor King for the choir and Sunday School. A service of more than usual interest may be expected on this occasion.

Passed Its Second Reading.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, This Morning.

The Welsh Dis-establishment Bill passed its second reading last night by a vote of 348 to 267. During the course of the debate Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd-George effectively used the charge that the noble families, whose representatives were the most strenuous opponents of the bill on the grounds that it pillaged the Established Church, obtained their vast wealth by spoliation of the Church at the time of the Reformation. A stormy scene followed his reference to a political leaflet, in which he said the Duke of Devonshire charged the Government with robbery from God. "Doesn't he know," queried Lloyd George, "that the very foundation of his fortunes were laid deep in sacrilege; built on desecrated shrines and pillaged altars?" Among the voices raised in angry protest Lord Hugh Cecil's was the most conspicuous. To this the Chancellor retorted, "These charges that we are robbing the Church ought not to be brought in by those whose family tree is laden with the fruits of sacrilege. At the Reformation their ancestors robbed the Catholic Church Monasteries, altars and alms homes; robbed the poor; robbed the dead. Now, when we try to recover some part of the pillaged property for our poor descendants, they accuse us of theft—they whose hands are still dripping with the fat of sacrilege."

KINGS ON THE QUIET.

Odd Things Sometimes Happen when Royalty Travels "Incog."

The Prince of Wales, who has gone to stay in Paris in order to improve his French, has adopted an incognito. Paris knows him simply as the Earl of Chester.

Though this is his first such experience, it will certainly not be his last. All modern Royalties, with few exceptions, find an incognito at times an absolute necessity. It is only the Tsar and the Kaiser who have always refused to veil their identity, however thin.

The disguise of an incognito is usually very thin indeed. Every lady knew, for instance, when the Duke of Lancaster was travelling, that the owner of this title was King Edward. But incognito's serve two purposes. When a Sovereign or Prince travels merely "incognito" he simply means to save brother Royalties and himself the trouble and expense of State visits. He prefers to see them informally.

A Princess as Miss Jones.

But when the phrase a "strict incognito" is used, it is a request to be left in absolute privacy. Queen Alexandra has often travelled as the Duchess of Lancaster, but she has also paid flying visits to Paris under the strict incognito of Mrs. Stephens. Princess Victoria, too, has stayed there as plain Miss Jones.

Our present King and Queen has seldom found incognito's necessary, and never since they came to the Throne. But when the Duchess of York, Queen Mary frequently travelled as the Countess of Killarney.

King Edward had quite a large selection of incognito's. When Prince of Wales he usually preferred to appear abroad as the Earl of Chester, the Earl of Carrick, Baron Renfrew, or the Earl of Cornwall. As these titles attach to that of the Prince of Wales when he became King he abandoned them for that of the Duke of Lancaster.

Too Zealous for King Edward.

Sometimes excessive zeal on the part of the police tends to defeat the object of the incognito and draw attention to the Royalty who wishes to be let alone. King Edward when a Prince was often troubled in this way. Once when in Naples he was annoyed by the constant presence of two detectives.

Sending for the chief of police, he invited him to bring his men into the Royal sitting room. Offering them cigars, he gave them a good-humoured lecture on the way in which their work ought to have been done. And ended with:

"I don't like your clearing people out of my way when I want to go anywhere. I don't mind being a Prince. I do seriously to being troubled as an epidemic disease!" And the crestfallen police retired to ponder more tactful methods.

"Bring Out Your Handcuffs!"

King Alfonso, who used to travel as the Marquis of Cavadonga, had the same fault to find with the French police. When staying at Biarritz once he made it his daily amusement to try to dodge them. After a vain attempt one day on the golf course to baffle his shadowers, he turned suddenly back and held out his wrists, remarking:

"If it is the Marquis of Cavadonga you want I am he. Bring out your handcuffs. My only prayer is that you may never know the tortures that I have suffered through the Louvre once with an enquiry he noticed a coup of Americans who kept turning from the pictures to eye him furtively.

At last one of the two, a lean, elderly man with a goatee beard, came up and asked squarely:

"Sir, are you the Prince of Wales?"


"My name is Renfrew," was the genial answer.

The American muttered bitterly: "Confound you, young man, you've lost me twenty dollars!" and stalked off disconsolate.
