ORD FARRAR SAYS SERMONS COULD THEN BE LONGER.

British Peer Thinks it Would be a Good Thing Also to Permit the Use of the Fragrant Weed in the Hous-es of Parliament While Sir Arthur Pinero Favors Same Course for the Theatre.

Smoking in public assemblies inding many champions in England these days. Sir Arthur Pinero the dis-tinguished dramatist, is an advocate of smoking in first-class theatres on the ground that the attendance would be increased and no real harm done to the drama. He cited the high quality of plays and big attendance found in the best music halls, where smoking is permitted, and argued that a similar concession on the part of the managers would revive interest in the legitimate drama.

The real sensation came, however when Lord Farrer publicly expressed his regret that smoking was prohibited in the British House of Commons and that the practise had been given up in church. Sermon nowadays were cut so short because of the restlessness of the auditors, and in his opinon permission to smoke, whih in itself was quite harmless and dignified would permit much longer pulpit

The suggestion has raised a storm and whether or not Lord Farrer's suggestion will ever become a fact remains a debatable point. In any case many a clergy man will feel more willing to forgive Lord Farrer's desire to smoke in church, because of his evi





Trapped in Aqueduct.

Thirty-Five Workmen Miraculously

New York, August 21.-Thirty-five orkmen caught 440 feet underground in a section of the Catskill Aqueduct, in course of construction under Washington Heights here, when fire broke out in the shaft house overhead, last night, were found unharmed, two hours later when the fire was controlled. Their chief suffering had been from lack of air, cut off by the pall of smoke overhead.

The fire was a spectacular one, and besides badly damaging the massive shaft building, spread to apartment houses closely adjoining it on St. Nicholas Place and St. Nicholas Ave. Two of the apartment buildings were ourned out, and others damaged.

Many members of the gang which was descending the shaft. when the fire broke out were on landings so near the surface that they were able to scramble back and escape. Their companions, down in the underground workings, fled 1,500 feet to the end of the section and huddled there, terror-stricken, until the air began to clear. Then one made his way to the elephone connecting with the street and told of the safety of all. Five hours after the fire started the men were hoisted a few at a time in a basket contrivance rigged up with a lummy engine.

Two laborers, two tunnel workers and a fireman were injured, among them Peter Schantuck laborer who became wedged between two beams at the top of the building above the shaft opening. A policeman who went to Schantuck's aid found his clothing afire. It was possible to extricate him only by shoving him from the top of the structure. The policeman did this to save Schantuck from burning to death. Schantuck fell fifty feet, and will die from a fractured skull, burns, and internal injuries. The other injured will live.

A very important point in market ing eggs is that they shall be abso lutely clean, and packed in perfectly clean material. The appearance of utmost care should be exercised in making it look as attractive as nossible. With eggs this is particularly important, as their market value is considerably reduced if they are ofered for sale in a dirty condition Apart from this, it stands to reason when we remember that the shell is ute holes. The nests in which eggs are laid should be absolutely clean and the straw renewed whenever necessary. Rather than send a dirty egg to market, it is better to wash it: but there is a bloom on a newlaid egg which is a hall-mark of freshness which washing entirely re moves.-Weekly Scotsman.

Motor-Power

From the Sun. Charles Dickens called the sun "ou servant of all work"; and indeed al power is derived from the sun though we sometimes forget it, since it comes indirectly. The sun-motor is a successful attempt to obtain now er direct from the sun. In the Tro pecially in the sandy deserts, is never used at all, and it has been calculated that the sun's rays on one square foot of the earth's surface can pro duce one-third of a horse-power. Th to solve is how to collect this energy In California this problem was selved by the sun-motor. The motor itself resembles an enormous lamp shade, supported on one end by steel framework. The inside of th motor is lined with about 1,800 mirrors, 2 feet long by 3 inches broad and these are kept at right angles to the path of the sun by means of a clockwork engine. The apparatus is so arranged that the heat from al the mirrors is focused on one point where there is a boiler containing one hundred gallons of water. Th fierce heat thus produced would smel onverts the water in the boiler into steam, the process continuing as long
