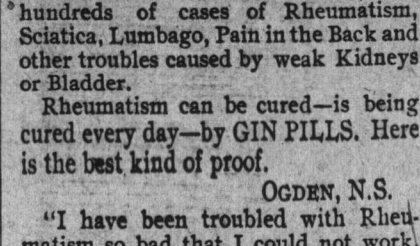

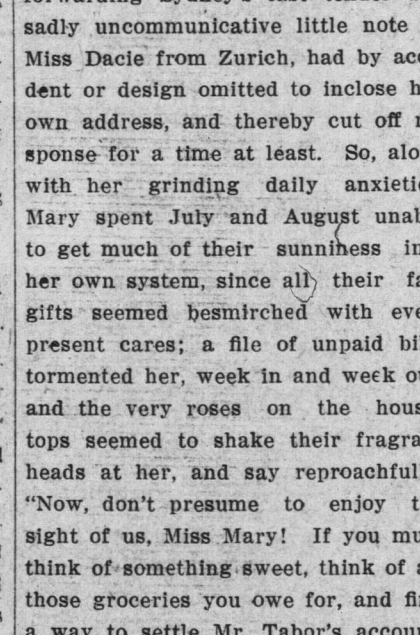

## Paraguay and Uruguay.

Paraguay and Uruguay are usually mentioned together like Tweedledum and Tweedledee. They are two South American countries which lie between Brazil and Argentina—this being their chief mission. For if they did not lie between Brazil and Argentina these two larger countries would soon be jostling each other with battleships and other well-known and effective jostlers.

Paraguay is as large as Colorado and has about as many people. They are mostly Indians, diluted with a little foreign blood, and varnished over with enough civilization to make them wear cotton shirts and trousers in summer when they do not need them. Uruguay is as large as Nebraska and has almost a million people, chiefly Creoles of Spanish descent. It is more prosperous than Paraguay and the use of schools and soap are much more readily understood.

Paraguay and Uruguay are republics, modeled after the ordinary American stock company in which the president runs things to suit himself. They were inoculated with freedom a hundred years ago, but it never took. If the ordinary citizen were to demand the privilege of voting against the particular president who is running either country, he would not be shot at, as in the case of the United States, because that would be too long to wait. Presidents of both countries have been short-lived, as a rule, however, and urging them on to a better land has been a favorite diversion.

Both countries consist of broad plains, which grow cattle and horses in great abundance. Oranges are used for cattle food, thus showing the great need of an orange trust. The climate is so good that talking about the weather is an unknown art. Ocean steamers ramble up and down the Paraguay and Parana rivers, but an American in either country is not half as common a sight as a warhog on a city street.

Paraguay and Uruguay got along so better together than the above mentioned Tweedledum and Tweedledee. For many years they quarreled continually. In 1870 Uruguay, Argentina and Brazil all jumped upon Paraguay together. At the end of the jumping Paraguay had decreased in population from 1,400,000 to a little

over 200,000. Thus Paraguay can boast of having suffered the bloodiest war in history. When it was over there was only one man left to every four women, and a husband is still a scarce and much longed for luxury in that country. Owing to the great competition, being a husband is still the chief and most profitable occupation of the Paraguayan man, and work and disease are regarded by him with equal horror. For this reason we need not fear Paraguay as a business rival for some centuries to come.

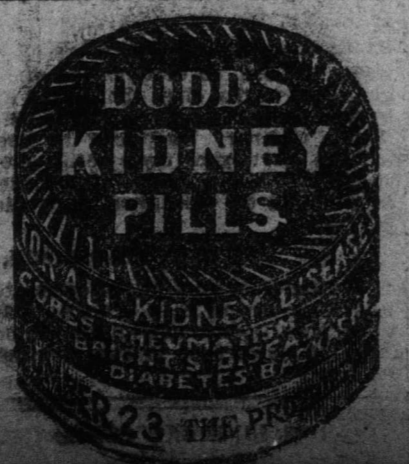

## The British Budget

We can remember the day when a Tory Budget which proposed an expenditure of \$400,000,000 excited a fierce campaign under the late Mr. Gladstone. An expenditure of two and a half times as much nowadays excites less talk of reform and economy. Speaking generally it is proposed to spend as much on National Defence as was spent then in the aggregate on the whole of the civil, military and naval services and public facilities and aids. It will be observed from Lloyd George's Speech, excepting what he is borrowing from the Sinking Fund, he proposes to meet his estimated deficit on national accounts and his relief of local taxation out of additional taxation on incomes and estates left at death. His borrowings from the Sinking Fund, which is a fund for a gradual paying off of the National Debt, show that he cannot see his way to meet his expenditure out of his income by the amount he takes from this fund. This amounts to Five Million Dollars, which is no great sum, in consider-

ing an expenditure of \$1,030,000,000. He proposes to raise \$40,000,000 out of additional taxation on incomes and \$4,000,000 additional by death duties on estates. The revenue from incomes was about \$200,000,000 in 1911 to 1912. Lloyd George proposes to get about 20 per cent. more from this source.

It is of interest to observe how the incomes which are reviewed by the Inland Revenue Department can respond to these demands. In 1896-7 the Board had under review incomes amounting to \$3,500,000,000; and in 1901-2 \$4,300,000,000; in 1906-7, \$4,700,000,000 and in 1911-12 \$5,300,000,000. The first quinquennial period shows an increase in incomes of \$900,000,000; the second period an increase of \$600,000,000; the third of \$400,000,000 and the fourth of \$600,000,000. The super-tax of Lloyd George has been exacted on incomes only during the last period, and the increase in taxable incomes shows a marked increase in incomes over the first period of the Liberal Government, when the super-tax was not exacted. The first two periods were under Tory Government; the latter two under Liberal Governments; and they gave a much better showing than the last two, the aggregate increase in the first being \$1,400,000,000; in the latter two \$1,000,000,000. But taking the fourth against the third it is clear that the increases in income can easily stand the new super-tax. Lloyd George has also put his hands in "Incomes from abroad," which have escaped him partially in the past. This is a source of income which has increased largely the last decade or so, the increase being over \$200,000,000 a year. The proposed extra taxation of \$40,000,000 on incomes is a living within the income and no eating into capital, although it must necessarily cause a rate of increase of capital which is less than would otherwise take place. The taxation of estates at death, however, shows no marked increase in the aggregate value of such estates, and it looks as if these duties and the income tax are keeping estates left at death at much the same value.

## C. E. T. S.

"The Gateway through the East," was the subject of Mr. W. H. Jones' lecture at the Synod Hall, last night. Rev. Canon White presided and introduced the speaker, who gave a very entertaining address. At the close a hearty vote of thanks, by acclamation, was tendered to Mr. Jones, and the singing of the National Anthem brought the affair to a close. The proceeds go towards the sealing of the Sinking Fund. R. Rees, Secretary.

## Obituary.

There passed peacefully away at Petty Harbor, yesterday, an estimable lady in the person of Mrs. Rebecca Chafe, after an illness of about a month. The deceased was 77 years of age, and is survived by one son and two daughters to whom the Telegram extends sincere sympathy.

## A New Firm.

Mr. G. F. Kearney, who had been visiting the United States selecting goods for his new store, returned to the city by yesterday's express.

Mr. Kearney will be ready to receive his old patrons and new customers about the middle of the month. He will conduct the new business in the store formerly known as the K. and A. Store, Smythe Building, and will carry an extensive line of English and American goods including the latest creations in gents furnishings.

In this business which will be known as Smythe and Co., and which is merely an extension of a firm of many years standing. We wish Mr. Kearney a full measure of success.

## Bruce and Lintrose.

The Bruce and Lintrose are now on the way to Louisburg, as it is now impossible to enter North Sydney owing to the heavy ice blockade. The following were received from them this morning:

"Bruce, 7 a.m., 20 miles E.N.E. of Low Point, open water, making for Louisburg."

"Lintrose, 6 a.m., 10 miles N.E. of Low Point, no prospects of getting to North Sydney, proceeding to Louisburg."

Both ships were due at Louisburg early this afternoon.

After acknowledging its receipt, the physician added that, since they were so kind as to give his servant a degree, it would add to his obligation if they would confer one upon his favorite hound. But the faculty, the joke once fairly scented, rose to the occasion.

"We are obliged," they wrote, "respectfully to decline so distinguished a favour. We have searched the college records for a precedent, but the only one to be found lies in the fact that some years ago a degree was conferred upon an ass named McIntire."

The election of officers resulted in the installation of the same directors for the ensuing year.

At a dinner party, recently, while engaged in earnest conversation with the man on her right, she quite unconsciously dropped her serviette.

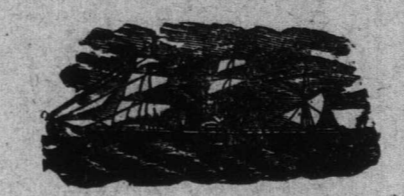

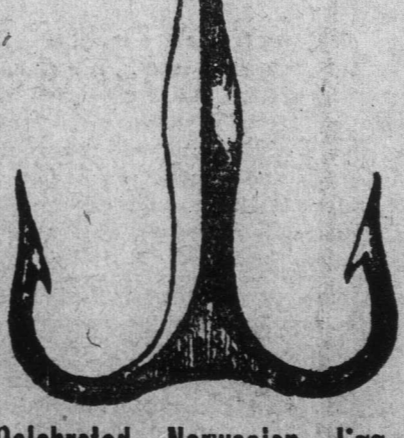

**NEWS BY CABLE. Household Notes.**

LONDON, May 4.—David Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, introduced his sixth budget into the Commons to-day with the announcement that he had to meet an estimated deficit for 1914-15 aggregating \$26,650,000. The Nation's total reserve he estimated at \$1,003,375,000, while he placed the expenditure at \$1,029,925,000.

MONTREAL, May 4.—Subscriptions to the Newfoundland Sealing Disaster, collected by the Board of Trade amount to over \$2,000. Those collected by the Newfoundland Society of this city, amount to \$1,200.

NEW YORK, May 4.—Policeman Wm. B. Kelly, was mortally wounded by two hold-up men in Brooklyn to-day, after they had shot and killed a Greek restaurant keeper. The Greek was shot, when he refused the gun-men's demand for money, and Kelly was shot when he pursued the murderers. Christopher Dunn was arrested, charged with participation in the crime. His companion escaped. Kelly died in the hospital.

VALPARAISO, May 4.—More than 50 lives were lost in a fire which broke out to-day in the commercial section of the city.

Always use the coldest of dishes to serve salad on.

Potatoes are more wholesome baked than boiled.

It is a good idea to have regular days for each kind of work.

Macaroni as an article of food is rather more valuable than bread.

Never mix any salad with dressing until you are ready to use it.

A very practical way to finish a floor is to paint it with linseed oil.

Coffee made with an egg has a rich flavor, which egg alone can give.

If cauliflower is good, it should be heavy and compact in appearance.

Peas, beans and lentils are the most nutritious of all vegetable substances.

The heavy heads of cabbage are always the more solid, and of finer texture.

Cabbage leaves contain a great deal of gluten, therefore are very nourishing.

In making salad dressing, cream and melted butter may be used in place of oil.

Soup should never be boiled in an iron vessel; porcelain or granite iron are better.

For the bathroom, cork mats which can be rolled up are among the sensible accessories.

Rag rugs made of cotton wash well, are inexpensive and are often just the thing for the kitchen.

It is best not to serve the same dish twice a week unless it be a vegetable, as every one likes variety.

Don't forget to close the refrigerator door each time you use the box; the ice will last much longer.

Oysters chopped and served in the gravy of a particularly juicy port-house steak are very delicious.

The bone should be left in a roast; it will help to keep the juice in and will add flavor and sweetness.

Damp salt is an excellent thing to remove stains on cups and saucers caused by tea and careless washing.

Always take off the draughts of the kitchen range as soon as you have finished a meal, thereby saving fuel.

When choosing potatoes take those of medium size, free from blemishes and of a yellowish white color.

A boot tree is an excellent thing to use when darning a stocking. It helps in shaping the darning to the foot.

Paper bag cookery is peculiarly suitable for fish. They are much more delightful when cooked by this method.

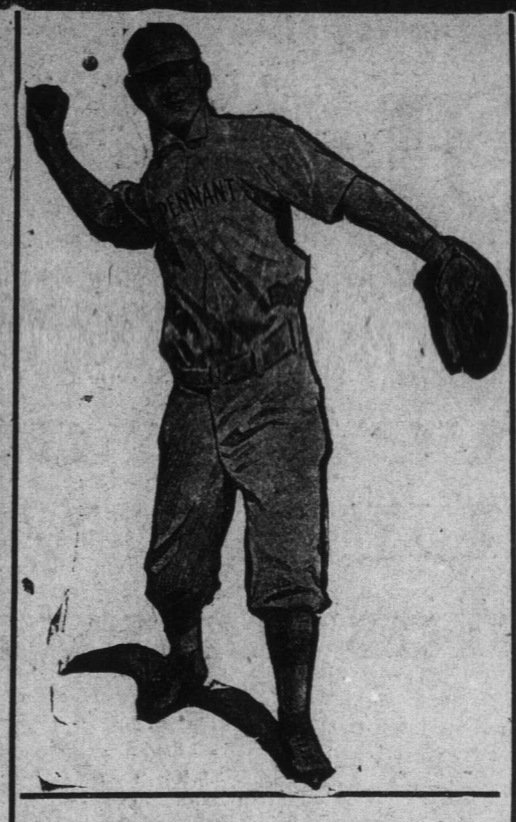
When boiling eggs, always have the water boiling when eggs are put in, and then boil them for two minutes.

Jelly bags, pudding cloths and strainer cloths should be thrown into clear, warm water immediately after using.

All rubbing and wringing by twisting is harmful when washing woollens; be sure to rinse out all the soap-suds.

A chicken for broiling should be wrapped in a buttered paper bag. This will keep the flesh moist and retain flavor.

Woolen fabrics, such as flannel shirts, petticoats, trousers and blankets, should be pulled into shape and hung straight to dry.

## A Ghost is at Work.

A haunted station is causing a deal of excitement in police circles in Calcutta just now. The strange experiences of those who have done duty and lived at the Fenwick Bazar Thana, have time and again been related, but the strangest experience heard of is that which occurred recently at the same place. One of the sub-inspectors had retired for the night, and had apparently fallen into a heavy sleep. The thana was empty except for the writer, head constable and the constable on lock-up duty. Just after midnight a great noise was heard in the room upstairs. Thinking there was something wrong the head constable went upstairs and found the inspector already awake, making inquiries as to where the noise had come from. It was then ascertained that a quantity of harness and saddle-ry which had been hung on a peg had been strewn across the floor, but no one was visible. A search was also made in case any intruder may have entered the premises, but no one could be seen. The inspector retired to rest again, and all appeared quiet, when a noise even greater than the first was heard. On this occasion all those awake in the thana, including the inspector, rushed out, but no one was to be seen. It was, however, ascertained that one of the inspector's arm-chairs had been pitched out of the sitting-room into the compound and smashed to pieces. The constable on gate duty was questioned, but he denied that anybody had left or entered the thana.

## First Modern Woman.

A correspondent claims that the first "modern Englishwoman" was born in 1589. She was Mary Frith, a pioneer in many ways, and the first woman in England to smoke a pipe. She was also the first to come out "daintily dressed" for which offence she was sentenced by the Court of Arches to do penance at St. Paul's Cross. Her home was near the Fleet, and as further evidence of her advanced tendencies, it is said that she was "a participator in most of the crimes and wild frolics of her time." As a barber in Drurylane she made a fortune, which she left to her nephew, with the strict injunction that he should not lay it out foolishly, but should get drunk with it while it lasted.

## A Rapid Rhymer.

In illustration of the working powers of George R. Simms, the dramatist and poet, it is said that one night a new piece was produced at a leading theatre in London. Simms sat it out and then returned to his office, where he wrote a column and a half of criticism in rhyme. It was near the time for the paper to go to press when he began, and the boy took the piece verse by verse from him to the composing room, the boy walking continuously from one to the other for an hour.

## German Colony For the West.

New York, April 30.—Canada is a really novel experiment in German colonization, according to Arthur Thaden, manager director of a German syndicate capitalized in England, who has arrived at the Waldorf on his way to Alberta.

The syndicate has bought up much land in that province, and a lot of young Germans, largely of the nobility, are settling upon it. Forty families, comprising about one hundred persons, will be located on the tract within a short time, and the plan is not only to farm, but to build up manufacturing industries connected with agriculture.

## Painting Rocks With Oatmeal.

In the Zoological Gardens in London they have just finished building a series of concrete hills and terraces upon which wild animals will roam at large under conditions as nearly natural as possible. These hills and terraces have been painted with a mixture of oatmeal mush and bone-meal, the object being to add phosphate to the lime of the concrete, phosphates being essential to the growth of moss and lichens. It is believed that this coating will capture the spores of mosses and lichens and enable them to grow, thus making the surface of the rocks green and more natural in appearance than the bare concrete.

## Goes to Glasgow for New Steam Yacht.

Messrs. Kendrick and Noseworthy, two well known seafaring men, will take passage by the Allan liner Sardinian, leaving here at the end of the week for Glasgow, where they will join the steam yacht Tinto, which has just been purchased. The Tinto was built to the order of a millionaire of Hamilton, Ontario, and will be used for pleasure and yachting on the Great Lakes during the summer season. Capt. Kendrick, late of the barqt. Clementine, has been appointed to take command of the Tinto, with Mr. Noseworthy as mate.

## Meigle Sails To-Morrow

The s.s. Meigle, Capt. Gooby, sails to-morrow morning for Port aux Basques, where she will await instructions preparatory to taking up the Straits service. At present the ice blockade will not permit her to enter Humbermouth, so it is expected she will have to proceed to Bonnie Bay to take up the route, and from there she will go as far north as ice conditions will permit. She is now taking on board freight for points on the regular route.

## Obesity Saved England's Liberty.

The mode in which that bulwark of England's constitution, the habeas corpus act, became a law is, very remarkable. So grave a historian as Bishop Burnet relates that it was carried by an "odd artifice." Lords Grey and Norris were named to be tellers. Lord Norris, being a man subject to vapors, was not at all times attentive to what he was doing; so, a very fat lord, coming in, Lord Grey counted him for ten, as a jest at first, but seeing that Lord Norris had not observed it he went on with his misreckoning of ten, so it was reported to the House and declared that they who were for the bill were in the majority.—London Chronicle.

## Money Letters Impounded.

Thousands of letters are lying in the dead letter offices in Ottawa, Toronto and other cities that contain money. That is the reason why they are in the dead office. It is contrary to a regulation recently put in force to send money through the mail unless by postal order, check, or in a registered envelope. The order was issued to stop the sending of money through the mails, and the idea was to remove temptation as far as possible from postal employees.

Many retail houses do a good deal of rural business in this way. Many of their customers enclose coins in envelopes and send them through the post to retail houses. There is no penalty attached to the sending of money through the mails, but the sending of it is contrary to the regulations, and unregistered letters which are being found to contain money have been sent to the dead letter offices.

Representations are being made urging that the rule be rescinded and sums less than \$1 may soon be sent by letter.

BRITISH BUDGET.

Big Increase in Expenditure—Relief to Local Bodies—\$14,000,000 More to be Taken Out of Large Incomes and Estates at Death.

Special to the Evening Telegram.

LONDON, May 4. Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, introduced his Budget in the Commons to-day. The estimated deficit of 1914 and '15 is \$26,650,000 adding to this the charge against the Exchequer of \$21,090,000, arising from the readjustment of relations between Imperial and local taxation and a necessary margin of \$5,000,000 the Chancellor showed the need of increasing the national income for the coming year by about \$49,000,000. Lloyd George's proposals to raise this money include a material increase in the rate of tax levied on earned and unearned incomes and raising the death duties a minimum per cent. He plans also to raise the tax burden to the man who expends money on his property to improve in proportion to the amt. spent. The Nation's total revenue he estimated at \$1,003,375,000 while he placed the expenditure at \$1,029,925,000. This deficit alone Chancellor said made taxation inevitable, but the Government had come to conclusion that in order to save some Municipalities from bankruptcy, there must be readjustment in relations of Imperial and local taxation. These would mean large additional expenditures by the Exchequer, Lloyd George proposed set up a national system and variation under which "Site Values" would be separated from "Improvement Values," and under which relief would be afforded the man who improved his property in proportion to the amount he expended to this end. These proposed grants of relief to local taxation for the purpose of public health, education, road construction, etc., would entail an additional expenditure by the Exchequer of \$21,090,000. In so much as he must have a margin of \$1,000,000, he would have to raise the total about \$49,000,000. To meet this he proposed a revision of the graduated income tax. The existing tax on the earned incomes up to \$5,000 a year would remain unchanged, on incomes between \$5,000 and \$5,750, and \$10,000 a year the tax would be one shilling, from \$10,000 to \$12,500, 14 pence while from \$12,500 to \$15,000 rate would be 16 pence. The rate on unearned incomes would be raised to 16 pence. The allowance for children of parents whose incomes do not exceed \$2,500 a year would be doubled. There would be levied a super tax on incomes on \$15,000 upwards, instead of this super-tax beginning as it does at present with incomes of \$2,500 a year. The total yield from this super-tax in the present year would amount to \$12,500,000. The Chancellor declared he proposed to make Englishmen who made investments abroad in order to escape income tax, pay their dues. He estimated the increased yields from these changes as follows:—Ordinary income tax \$26,250,000; Investments abroad 1,250,000; Super-tax 12,500,000, Death duties \$3,250,000. Settlement of estate duties \$750,000. The total from these sources is \$44,000,000; this left \$5,000,000 to be found, which Chancellor proposed to take from the Sinking Fund. As was anticipated Budget bids fair rank in Parliamentary annals with famous budget 1903. The speech of Chancellor is said to have been one of the most un-Lloyd Georgian he has ever delivered, being particularly free from offensive language and in fact, the Morning Post commented that it is a cleverly drafted electioneering document, while the Telegraph charges the Chancellor with setting before nation a system providing new and numerous benefits for one part of the community entire.

The financial News says that the prolific nature of 1909 taxes might have suggested that their subjects should have been allowed a longer time before being harried again.

Fortune Harbor Notes.

A number of young ladies of the place held a Sale of Work in the school rooms, Southside on Easter Monday night. A most enjoyable time was spent by all the young people who attended. The sale realized \$100.00 which was very good as the ladies had started the work only a few days before Easter.

The members of the F.P.U. intend holding a meeting next week, to elect a new chairman and officers. The F. P. U. Hall is now nearly completed, sufficient funds are on hand to finish the work.

There are quite a number of children attending the three schools here, viz., the North Side school, the South Side school and High School. A large number of children have been attending those schools for years and no W.C. has been provided for their use. Whose fault is it? Certainly it must be the fault of the School Board or is it not the fault of the foolish parents who send their children to those schools. No W.C. has been provided for the school grounds for about twelve years. I believe that some of the people living near the school house complained to the magistrate on account of the drinking water. A little talking was done but nothing more. Is this the way those schools are going to be left all the time? The High School has been a "centre" for the C.H.E. Exams. for four or five years Strangers have been here "supervising." What must these people think of the schools, the school board and the people who quietly submit to such conditions? Would it not be worth while to get a member or members of the Board of Health to take a look around the school premises and note the sanitary conditions there. It appears that we will have to submit to more than the want of W.C.'s for the schools if the chairman of the school board will not allow the North Side teacher to teach children who were taken from the South Side school by their parents and sent to the North Side school. Cannot parents send their children to whatever school they choose? and a teacher must teach all children sent to his or her school as long as they comply with the rules of the school. In acting thus (it is the opinion of many) the chairman is overstepping the boundary of his authority.

NEWS BY CABLE.

SYDNEY, To-day. Frank Hayes, convicted of the murder of H. S. Atkinson and sentenced to be hanged on Friday, was refused a commutation of his sentence by the Governor in Council. Execution will take place on Friday.

MEXICO CITY, To-day.

It is announced that Agustin Rodriguez and Luis Elguero, both connected with the Mexican National railroads and Senator Emillorabas, would leave here soon for Montreal to attend the Mediation Conference initiated by Argentine, Brazil and Chile. This is the first indication given here that the conference to settle differences between the States and Mexico may be held in Canada.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

General Carranza and Constitution- alists to-day were practically eliminated from the proceedings of South American Envoys, who have undertaken to solve the Mexican problem diplomatically. In a telegram to Carranza, the mediators announced that in view of his refusal to agree to an armistice with Huerta, they withdrew their invitation to him to send representatives.

Disapprove of the New Scale.

The Employers' Protective Association met in the Board of Trade Rooms yesterday afternoon to discuss the new labor tariff recently issued by the Longshoremen's Union. The meeting was largely attended, and the matter was thoroughly dealt with in all its phases. There was general disapproval of the new scale but it is not yet announced what course of action the employers will take in the matter.

The employers were notified that the new tariff would come into effect to-morrow. The employers are very reticent over the question, because of the general depression in trade universally felt to-day.

On the foreign going steamers engaged in the coal trade, etc., the stokers to receive \$35 per month and the donkeymen, \$40. On the steamers going to Hudson Bay they are to receive \$40 and \$45 per month. After the schedule was adopted, hearty votes of thanks were given to the Superintendent of Bowring Bros., the Supt. of the Reid Nfld. Co., and the various ship owners, also to the Delegate for his attention to the matter, and to Hon. M. P. Gibbs, solicitor for the Union. The meeting adjourned at 11 o'clock.

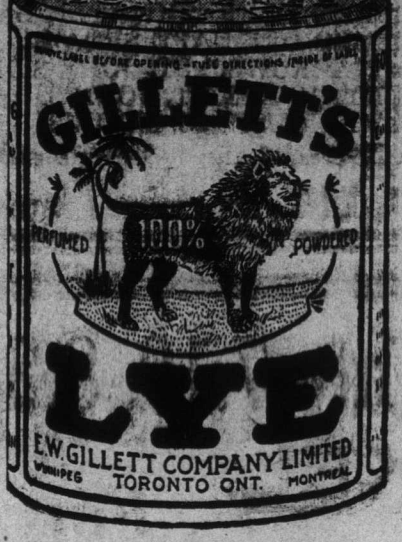

**THE GREATER QUESTION.**

At this season of the year for Farmers with up-to-date ideas is, what are the best means to use to get the best returns from the land.

Fertilizers must be used liberally if large returns are looked for. There are several good chemical fertilizers which may be recommended, but Sulphate of Ammonia has been proved to give the best returns, and is the most valuable and economical source of Nitrogen for agricultural purposes.

For vegetables, grass, and all leaty crops, about one and a half cwt. per acre is the best quantity to use, and this should be applied when the plant is making its growth, as well as before sowing the seed.

A liquid manure is preferred, a 3/4 oz. of Sulphate to one gallon of water should be used, and applied once a week for a month. This quantity should not be exceeded.

It is a good plan to reduce the Sulphate to a fine powder, and mix with four or more times its own bulk, for the purpose of diluting the manure, which is very powerful.

For potatoes the following mixture is strongly recommended:—

40 lbs. Superphosphate.  
26 lbs. Fine bone meal.  
10 lbs. Carbonate of Magnesia.  
15 lbs. Sulphate of Potash.  
21 lbs. SULPHATE OF AMMONIA.

1 cwt. Applied at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to 43 square yards.

The use of Carbonate of Magnesia, in conjunction with Sulphate of Ammonia, is of great importance in potato culture.

For turnips use the following:—

66 lbs. Superphosphate.  
13 lbs. Fine bone meal.  
18 lbs. Sulphate of Potash.  
20 lbs. Sulphate of Ammonia.

1 cwt. Applied at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to square yards.

My mother never was in France, no foreign jargon did she speak, but how I used to sing and dance when she made doughnuts once a week! Oh, they were crisp and brown and sweet, and they were luxurious and sublime, and I could stand around and eat a half a bushel at a time. The doughnuts that our mothers made! They were the goods, they were the stuff, we used to eat them with a spade and loaded down with Choctaw names. I sigh and wish I had a tub of doughnuts, made by old time dimes. I do not care for fancy frits, but when the doughnut dish appears, I kick my hind feet over the thills, and whoop for joy, and wag my tails.

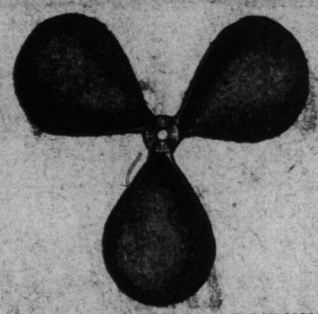
