



NORTH OF ENGLAND REPORTS NO DAMAGE DONE BY AIRSHIPS.

LONDON, Nov. 28. Reports from the North of England indicate that the latest raid by German airships was futile as far as infliction of damage was concerned The military authorities in a number

ortheast coast of England. The crews of both airships perished. The damage caused by the Zeppelin aid is reported officially as one woman died from shock, while five men. even women and four children were injured. In one town 15 houses were seriously and 20 slightly damaged. In other places in which bombs were fropped the damage was insignificant. There was no military damage of im-

pelins being attacked by aircraft guns as well as airplanes, they were unable to do much damage. Lights were turned off in all towns and districts affected as soon as reports of the approach of the airships were announced. The commanders of the Zeppelins apparently had difficulty in locating themselves. A number of bombs were dropped. In the North Sea, on the Atlantic, on trade routes and wherever duty has demanded, our Naval volunteers have acquitted themselves with distinction.

Wherever the Regiment has been called on to discharge its duty it has won unstinted praise.

But more men are needed to finish the work, to overwhelm the enemy, and secure the blessings of a lasting peace. We therefore appeal to the men of Newfoundland to offer themselves for service and to furnish His Majesty the King with a portion of that help which the Mother Country deems necessary to accomplish this

The obligation rests upon us to furnish reserves to fill the ranks, and our comparative immunity from the consequences of a state of war must not be allowed to blind us to the stern need of more men, not alone that victory may be secured but that Newfoundland's place in the Colonial Empire of Great Britain may be assured. It must not be said of us that the blood shed and the treasure expended has been in vain; but if the response which is anticipated be fully realized it will be blazoned to the remotest dependency of the Crown that the boast of this Colony has been well justified-most ancient and most loyal.






