



PARIS. March 14. The appeal of Bolo Pasha from the entence of death imposed by court martial for treason, was rejected today by the court of revision, which confirmed the original judgment.

BOYS' WORKING RESERVE.

WASHINGTON, March 14. President Wilson to-day called on all American boys of 16 years and over, not permanently employed, to enroll in the United States Boys' Working Reserve. A national employment week, beginning March 18, has been set aside by the Department of Labor.

DOWAGER EMPRESS DESTITUTE. LONDON, March 14.

Former Dowager Empress Maria has applied to the Council of Commissaries for assistance. A Reuter despatch from Petrograd reports she declares she is destitute in consequence of the confiscation of the Imperial family.

CONFIDENCE IN JAPAN.

LONDON, March 14. Speaking in the Commons to-day on the situation in the East, Foreign Secretary Balfour expressed perfect confidence in Japan's absolute lovalty in carrying out any decision that might be reached, and declared that in the question he had drawn no distinction between Japan and the other Allies. Considered from the point of view of securing the freedom of small nations and saving the world from the domination of one greedy power, Balfour said nothing could be more unfortunate than the coincidence between the Russian revolution and the war that was being conducted by Russia and her allies. He was an optimist about Russia, he said, but not about Russia's immediate future.

PROPER REPRISALS.

LONDON, March 14. German prisoners of war are to be distributed over areas which the enemy's aircraft is subjecting to attack in their raids, according to the Evening News to-day. This, says the newspaper, is being done because the Allied Governments have learned prisoners of other nationalities in German hands have been so placed in all towns which the German Government considers likely to be attacked.

FORD'S EAGLES.

WASHINGTON, March 14. Henry Ford's submarine chasers will be known in the Navy as eagles and will constitute the eagle class of boats.





AVAILING OF NEUTRAL TONNAGE

tiations with Holland ver Dutch ships in Allied ports and the slowness of the Dutch Government to act in this respect, Great Britain and the United States have reached an agreement to end the negotiations and to take over all such ships next week for the use of the Allies. Every precaution will be taken to safeguard the right of the owners. The ships will be insured and armed, and any ships sunk will be replaced at the earliest possible time after the war. The amount of tonnage made available to the Allies through Dutch arrangements is one million tons, of which seventy per cent. is in the United States, fifteen per cent. in British ports and fifteen per cent. in other Allied ports.

GERMANY HELD UP AGREEMENT.

Negotiations with Holland have een in progress for many months and it was expected an arrangement would be reached last Christmas. The Germans were continually bringing pressure to bear upon Holland and the delay in reaching an agreement, operated continuously to the advantage of Germany and to the disadvantage of the Allies. Realizing the difficult position in Holland the Allies decided to force an immediate settlement. While Germany has been obstructing the employment of Dutch tonnage by the Allies she has been enjoying the use of Dutch barge tonnage on the German canals to an amount greater than the ocean going tonnage which the Allies will secure under the new arrangement.

ACTION WILL NOT FORCE HOL-

WASHINGTON, March 14. Officials and diplomats here have no fears that the taking over of Dutch ships will force Holland into war, as has been predicted in some quarters. They are certain Holland will continue her policy of neutrality. The taking of all the Dutch fleets is the greatest move of its kind since the beginning of the war. The official explanation here is that Holland is in a state of duress, terrorized by the German submarine menace and the necessity of feeding the neutral nations of the world, officials add, calls for the use of every available ton of

ENEMY AIRMEN WORSTED.

LONDON, March 14. On Tuesday two British seaplanes attacked five enemy air craft in the outhern part of the North Sea. The engagement lasted thirty minutes. One enemy two-seater was shot down and destroyed, the observer of second machine was killed and a third was driven down on the water. The engagement terminated when the British seaplanes had expended all. their ammunition. Both the machines returned safely.

WAITING THE SIGNAL.

British Front in France and Belgium, March 14.-This has been another day of ideal fighting weather, but there has been no change in the situation. The British and German military machines tuned up to the finest pitch and probably as nearly perfect as it is supposed to make them, are still awaiting the signal which will send them crashing against each other. Meanwhile the artillery pounds away in thunderous duels at various points and myriad airmen are busy bombing, photographing and acting as eyes for the respective armies. The British airmen have been doing marvellous work recently. The first ten days of March as a whole have been among the best yet recorded for the service. During that period, in addition to a vast amount of reconnoitering and photographing, the intrepid Britishers destroyed thirty-nine German airplanes, brought down 40 others out of control, despite the fact that the first two or three days of the month were so stormy that aerial activity was virtually impossible. Against this total fifteen British machines are reported missing.

TROTZKY ON THE RAMPAGE.

WASHINGTON, March 14. Further indications that Leon Trotzky, former Russian Foreign Minister, will oppose the ratification by the Soviet Congress of Germany's peace terms, and that he will advocate reorganization and use of the army in ending Russia, were contained in a despatch to the State Department to-day from Ambassador Francis at Volegda. The Ambassador reported a onversation that Trotzky had with me one as late as March 11th, in which he said he considered war unidable and advocated an iron disine for the army. The Ambassador added, this might or might not be significant. The former Foreign Min-ister expressed great interest in the report that Siberia was about to be nvaded by Japan either in conjunc-tion with the armies of other Powers or alone, and appeared somewhat constitute regarding it.
