Postponed games will be played in order of their postponement on the first available night.

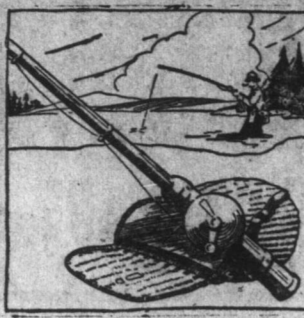
Should games be called off, a means will be adopted to inform the public. The League are desirous that all games start on time, and that all players appear on the field in proper football attire.

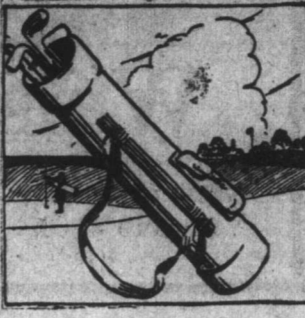

Supreme Court

(Before Chief Justice Horwood).

The trial of Wm. Day, of Old Shop Trinity, B.S., concluded last night when the jury, after an hour's deliberation, brought in a verdict of "not guilty" of rape, but "guilty" of assault.

Counsel then addressed the jury, pointing out the different parts of the evidence and asking for full consideration of it. At six o'clock adjournment was taken for tea. Court again assembled at 7:30 when the Chief Justice addressed the jury. He explained the law on the charge and then went over the evidence that had direct bearing on the offence.

Romance of the Pioneers

“Our Empire,” The British Empire Service League Magazine for April Vol. 1, No. 1. NEWFOUNDLAND'S CLAIM TO FAME.

No survey of the Empire would be complete without some reference to the ancient Colony of Newfoundland, and to the part it has played in British History. The story of the island since its discovery by John Cabot in 1497, is one long romantic tale full of incident and adventure. The West of England sailors who accompanied Cabot on his voyage of discovery opened up the way to the New World and sowed the seeds of Empire in North America. For several hundred years sailors from the West Country used to cross the ocean in the fragile craft of that period, to gather the codfish that abound in such limitless quantities in the waters around the island's coasts.

Not only were there British sailors trading in this way, but French, Portuguese, and Spaniards all alike took part in the early expeditions which set forth across the North Atlantic in search for food for their peoples. It was in these early days and amid such adventurous surroundings that the men of Devon and Dorset developed their prowess at sea and prepared themselves and their descendants for the great navy which is the proud boast of the English-speaking race.

It is not difficult to conjure up in one's mind the adventures and perils of these early voyages, and it is to them that we owe the first settlement of Newfoundland. Their grandchildren and great grandchildren are on the island to this day, practising the same hazardous calling, enduring similar hardships as did their forebears in ages long ago.

“SAILORS—AND SOLDIERS TOO.” That the people of the island are great sailors none will deny; the Colony's record in the War is sufficient to prove that. The dangers of the sea have no terrors for the redoubtable people, who have a supreme contempt for the danger which they have vanquished in a life-long struggle against the elements. It is necessary to reflect upon the place that Newfoundland occupies in the Empire; it has an acknowledged position as one of the self-governing Dominions, but more than that, it has an historical record to which none of the other Dominions can lay claim.

In the development of overseas communications the island has rendered a special service to the world, for it was here that the first submarine cable was laid and the first wireless message received, and it was the jumping-off place for the first transatlantic flight. Although sparsely populated, Newfoundland is a country covering a considerable area—42,000 square miles—and its dependency, Labrador, under the jurisdiction of the Colony, has wider territory still, covering 129,000 square miles of country.

Those who were privileged to see the Pageant of Empire will have memories of the various historic events in the story of the island; the landing of Sir Humphrey Gilbert with a Charter from Queen Elizabeth, in 1583, the period of rule (or mis-rule) of the Fishing Admirals and the Naval influence until the grant to the Colony of Responsible Government in 1855. This event marked the beginning of progress in the island's history, and while the development of the country's resources and the opening up of its lands do not increase with the same rapidity as in the larger and richer territories in the overseas Empire, there is nevertheless a definite policy of progress in operation. Great mines are working and pulp and paper mills established, in addition to the myriads of fish and seals that are the chief product of the country, and the future is rich with the promise of prosperity.

“WORTHY OF THE RACE.”

The ex-Service men will remember the part that was played by Newfoundland in the Great War. The young men of the Colony, born to the sea and trained in the Naval Reserve of the country, came forward without hesitation to defend their native shores. The mettle of the pastures of these men was displayed in all the principal sea actions and in the various mine-stown areas; and the large numbers who lost their lives a striking testimony to the valour and loyalty of Newfoundland.

With similar gallantry the men of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment won for themselves a name that will pass down to history as equal to the bravest and most heroic record in the annals of fighting men. All readers of this journal will remember the 1st of July, 1916; let them remember also the following words, written by the General Officer Commanding, about the Royal Newfoundland Regiment and the part they played that day:—

“The Battalion covered itself with glory by the magnificent way in which it carried out the attacks entrusted to it. It went forward when two other attacks on that same part of the line had failed, and by its behaviour on that occasion it showed itself worthy of the highest traditions of the British race. There were no waverers, no stragglers, and not a man

Wholesale Thefts
Pianos, Thousands of Artificial Teeth, Tons of Waste-Paper, and A Third Table, Have Been “Removed” By Enterprising Burglars.
A railway policeman stopped a chair woman leaving the hotel attached to a London terminus, and she produced a piece of cake and three eggs. It was her bulky appearance which aroused the official's suspicions, and later a woman searcher got to work and her find was a surprising one. In the top of the suspect's stockings were two pieces of chicken, a portion of ham and three pieces of soap. Confessed about her were three more eggs, two tomatoes, a pound of butter, some cooked fish, three kippers, and some matches. A new bed sheet was found wrapped around her. She had also a hoard of stolen goods at home.
Recently, too, another wholesale theft occurred. The thieves hid themselves on the premises of a dentist, in a large way of business, before early closing. They then sawed through the hinges of a safe and stole 20,000 artificial teeth, and a quantity of gold and platinum valued at 400 pounds.
Stolen From A Show.
The men who stole a piano from a suburban house lately, and got clear away, although the owner saw them going, are matched by the robbers who got away with a full-sized billiard table from a billiard saloon, and also by the thieves who stole a whole collection of orchids from a flower show.
A very remarkable theft took place during the war, when waste-paper became quite a valuable article of commerce. From a Chancery Lane office thieves stole three tons of legal documents contained in two large cellars, the accumulation of twenty years. They used a two-horse van for the job.
A woman, lately arrested in a big London store, was found in illegal possession of a hatpin, two bracelets, a metal clock, a paper-weight, two pairs of scissors, six hair ornaments, and two bottles of scent. They cost her five months' imprisonment.
Some time ago a well-known detective met two men in a public-house. One of the men's pockets bulged considerably, and on being searched there were found to contain three silver cups and five chalices, stolen from a famous cathedral.

Walking Pawnshops.
Three men, who aroused a considerable amount of suspicion by their bulky appearance, were stopped at Croydon, and, on being taken to the police station and searched, the following articles were found upon them: Three silver candlesticks, two silver cups, a gold mounted case, a secret bottle, a silver pencil case, two umbrellas, five coats, four vests, two pairs of trousers one pair of boots, a silver tray, a tobacco pouches, three briar pipes, seventy-five cigars, a jewelry, three boxes of matches, a lantern, a centre bit, two knives, a chisel, an oil can, a pocket knife, two pieces of candle, and a revolver cartridge.
At a recent football match, one of the players gave the ball a tremendous kick, close to the touchline, and, instead of the ball travelling towards the goal, it hit a spectator with such force on the nose that he was stunned, and fell as though shot. A policeman searched the man's pockets for some indication of his identity, and found twelve gold and silver watches. He was a well known pickpocket!

More Appendicitis
50,000 SERIOUS CASES A YEAR.
In some districts in and around London appendicitis is unusually prevalent. There are large numbers of cases in all the great hospitals. The disease is steadily increasing year by year.
“There are more deaths now than ten years ago,” said a surgeon. “In the past ten years 25,000 people have died of this disease. We have no means of knowing how many people are attacked, but calculating from the deaths there must be more than 50,000 serious cases a year.”
Dr. James Sherrin, surgeon to the London Hospital, said that a sudden severe pain in the abdomen is nearly always the first symptom of appendicitis. The need for submitting to instant surgical treatment is shown by results at the London and St. Thomas' Hospital published by Dr. Joseph E. Adams, in the British Medical Journal. In cases operated on immediately mortality was less than 1 per cent; when the inflammation extended and became local peritonitis mortality after operation was 2 per cent; when there was further extension to general peritonitis mortality ranged from 20 to 25 per cent.

Greenspond War Memorial Unveiled.

Ceremony Conducted by His Excellency the Governor.

Upon the arrival of his Excellency the Governor and Lady Allardyce at Greenspond on Tuesday morning, accompanied by the Prime Minister, Hon. W. S. Monroe, the Colonial Secretary, Hon. J. R. Bennett, Miss Penberthy, and Major Shand, A.M.C., they were given a hearty welcome by the residents of the town, and were received by the Citizens' Committee consisting of J. W. James, J.P., the Magistrate; Messrs. E. J. and J. B. Wornell, Justices of the Peace; Revs. G. L. Mercer, and A. Sheppard, Adjt. Keeping, S.A., Dr. Jamieson, E. J. Crammey and I. Batten, the local school masters. A guard of honour composed of the sailors and soldiers under Capt. Frank Green, ex-P.O., and the school children of the place were formed up to receive the Governor who inspected the veterans, while Lady Allardyce inspected the latter. The party then proceeded to the Hall, where the following Address was presented to his Excellency on behalf of the citizens of Greenspond:

ADDRESS OF WELCOME.

To His Excellency Sir William Lomond Allardyce, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

May it please Your Excellency:

We, the undersigned inhabitants of Greenspond, for ourselves and on behalf of our fellow citizens, beg to tender to Your Excellency as representative of our Most Gracious Sovereign, King George the Fifth, a most respectful and cordial welcome on the occasion of this your first visit to our town.

Some fifteen years have elapsed since we were honoured by a visit of a representative of the Crown, during which period the Empire has passed victoriously through the throes of a great world conflict, in which Greenspond was nobly represented by twenty-two sailors and forty-two soldiers; of this number, one sailor and thirteen soldiers paid the Supreme Sacrifice, to whose memory we have erected a Monument which you have graciously consented to unveil.

We greatly appreciate the valued services which you have rendered to the different Colonies over which you have been placed as Governor, and since your appointment as our Governor, you have displayed the same energy and enthusiasm in everything pertaining to the welfare of this Colony.

We regret that at this time of the year so many of our citizens, who would be pleased to be present to do honour to Your Excellency, are away

ours was. It comprised one quarter of the Earth's surface. It contained 460 million inhabitants, owing allegiance to His Majesty, King George V. The British Empire, continued His Excellency, was four times as large as the United States of America, and sixty-five times as large as Germany, and to go back to antiquity, seven times as large as that prodigy of the ancient times, the great Roman Empire. This wonderful Empire of ours was built and maintained on the traditions of our forefathers—those traditions, the mainstay of which are truth and freedom, justice and righteousness. All the children knew what the flag stood for; the red for courage; the blue for loyalty, and the white for purity. That was what we meant when we spoke of the red white and blue. This much loved flag of ours was to be seen in almost every port in the world; and if on any occasion a child were in doubt as to a particular line of conduct, that child would look at the flag of his country and his conscience would dictate to him the right decision. In conclusion His Excellency thanked the people of Greenspond again for their loyal welcome.

LADY ALLARDYCE SPEAKS.

Lady Allardyce was then asked by Mr. James to address the meeting. She addressed herself principally to the large number of women and girls present. Lady Allardyce first congratulated them upon the excellent company of Girl Guides at Greenspond. The whole principal underlying the Girl Guide movement was the desire to lay the foundation of good citizenship in youthful minds. Women's responsibilities had increased immensely in recent years, and now to the women of Newfoundland had been given the power to vote. The Girl Guide training helped to instil a sense of responsibility, service and thought for others, so that in years to come the generation of women now rising would be able to use its vote wisely and unselfishly. Lady Allardyce went on to say that she hoped she would be given the opportunity to meet the women of Greenspond again during the afternoon.

UNVEILING CEREMONY.

The party then proceeded to the site of the monument where the unveiling took place. Magistrate James presided and the programme for the ceremony was as follows:—

Hymn,
Psalm 90,
Unveiling by His Excellency,
Dedication Prayer by Rev. A. Sheppard,

The Last Post,

Ode to Newfoundland.

Before unveiling the Memorial, His Excellency the Governor delivered the following address:—

"I consider it a great privilege to have been asked by the people of Greenspond to come here to-day to unveil this War Memorial. After the Great War, hundreds and hundreds of War Memorials have been erected

throughout our vast Empire to commemorate the courage of those who responded to the call of duty and went into battle. Perhaps you may ask yourselves sometimes why they went to war. Ours was not the blame. Germany had long decided upon the armageddon. For years and years beforehand she had imbued with militarism and materialism, planned and prepared for world-power or downfall. We were unprepared for this terrible conflict, but being forced into war, the response to the call from every part of our Empire was extraordinary—and among those who first responded to the call were the people of Newfoundland, the people, indeed, of Greenspond. The casualties of this War were appalling. One million I believe, scarce covers the Empire's dead." The heroism of Newfoundland's Regiment was so great, that to honor it the King granted to it the title of Royal. At Beaumont Hamel it went forward until there were no more left to go on. What more could man demand? It was the Supreme Sacrifice; sacrifices, upon the like of which our mighty Empire has been built, an Empire which can only remain while its citizens are prepared to make sacrifices. The unveiling of this memorial cannot possibly close the story of the wonderful bravery and heroism of those whose names are inscribed upon it. They did their duty by their God, their King, and their Country, and they willingly made the Supreme Sacrifice for those ideals which I have already referred to and which we treasure most. These gallant boys were confident that right would win, and in this confidence they fell asleep. We know that in doing so they passed beyond our ken, but if our religion and our faith are worth anything, they did not live their lives in vain, and although not with us in flesh they are certainly not lost. There are certain things that live on after the body is destroyed; you yourselves know that the spirit is indestructible. Courage, fortitude, self-sacrifice, good example, how can you destroy them? To-day we commemorate the heroism of those who gladly laid down their lives for us. They were your own kith and kin, who:—

"Nobly fighting, nobly fell,
That we might live."

I know that your hearts are sorrowful, that you are in grief, and I would that I could supply an adequate palliative. But I likewise know that that we shall be honoring in the best way possible those who have won for themselves imperishable fame by practicing and maintaining those high ideals for which they themselves so gallantly fought and so courageously and willingly made the Supreme Sacrifice."

A splendid run was made to St. John's and the ship arrived early yesterday morning.

Children's Fears

A great change truly from apprenticeship in an old sailing-ship to captain of the Majestic and commodore of the White Star Line; yet it was in the former capacity that Sir Bertram Hayes began his seafaring career and in the latter that he recently relinquished it, with the added distinction of a K.C.M.G. and a D.S.O. Cutting Out Morse

HOW TO REDUCE INTERFERENCE.

Probably 96 per cent. of people using broadcast receivers have, at some time or other, had their enjoyment marred by interference, the most serious source of which is Morse or "code" signals, in the large majority of cases from ships or the coastal telegraph stations communicating with ships.

Far too many receivers use a direct circuit from the aerial; that is to say, the aerial is brought to one side of the tuning coil and the earth to the other. Such a receiver is and always will be unselective; in other words,

will respond to a greater or less degree to the signals on other wave lengths than that of the broadcasting station which it is tuned to. It is recommended always to use a coupled aerial circuit in which a coil tuned either by a condenser in series or parallel is connected in the aerial and earth, and this coil brought near to the usual tuning coil, but not connected by wires or connections to the latter.

This certainly entails one extra adjustment, but its use justifies this owing to the comparative freedom from interference which is given, and in many cases a distinct gain in signal strength will be noted from the broadcasting stations listened to.

If, when using a coupled aerial circuit, interference is still experienced, moving the coil a little farther away from the closed circuit coil and slight readjustment of the controls will, in a large number of cases, entirely eliminate the interference. For those people who unfortunately live, so to speak, under the shadow of a large coast or commercial station, even this will not give immunity and they are advised to use a wave trap.

What War Debts Mean to Britain

At the bottom of the series of political upheavals that are now taking place in France is finance. Governments come and governments go in that country, but none seem able to evolve a plan whereby the French Republic is able to tax people in such a way as to balance its budget and pay its debts. Travellers returning from France are one in their opinion that everybody in that country is busy. There is apparently work in plenty, while on the other hand Great Britain is suffering from hard times, a scarcity of work, a system of doles that is eating the heart out of the country, and last but not least high taxation.

Not long ago the Federation of British Industries addressed an illuminating document to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, pointing out the necessity of Britain collecting her dues from France, Italy and other debtor nations, and it was done in a manner to impress upon the mind of "the man on the street" just what these debts mean to the taxpayers of Britain. For instance, it is pointed out that the British taxpayers are responsible for an income tax in behalf of France to the amount of seven pence in the pound six and one-half pence in behalf of Italy, while nine and one-half pence is being paid in behalf of other debtor nations, or just a shade under two shillings in the pound is being taken from British taxpayers because inter-Ally nations will not or cannot pay their debts.

Add to these sums eight pence half penny, being Britain's annual payments to the United States, and we have a total of fifty-three cents, to express it in our currency, which the British Government must raise from every five dollars to take care of her obligation arising from the war. In other words the British taxpayers are obliged as it now stands to expend one-tenth of their incomes in the payment of interest and liquidation of debts that belong elsewhere.

But this is not all, for the very fact that France, Italy, and other debtor nations are not paying their debts, makes competition between these countries and Britain all the more keen, with the advantages very much on the side of those that do not now feel the necessity of balancing their national books and meeting their obligations.

Atlantic Liner Barely Missed Huge Iceberg

LONDON, May 19—Passengers on the steamship Aurania on arriving in Liverpool to-day from Montreal reported having seen a huge iceberg off Cape Race on May 8. The iceberg loomed up suddenly out of a dense fog. It was only 100 or 150 feet from the ship. The Aurania's engines were quickly reversed when the iceberg was sighted.

Mr. Justice Weir, Montreal, was a passenger on the ship. In an interview he said the decks of the vessel were quickly crowded by excited passengers when it became known that an iceberg was in sight, but there was no panic.

"We had been growling at the captain for going dead slow all day," Mr. Justice Weir said, "but we sang another tune after we saw the iceberg." Captain Peel, Commander of the ship, was presented with an address signed by all the passengers, expressing admiration for his caution and discretion, and for the able manner in which he had maneuvered the vessel. The Aurania lost two days on the voyage owing to fog, and on May 8th she covered only 75½ miles.

Coyotes Destroy Sheep

VANCOUVER, B.C.—Sheep men of the British Columbia Interior report severe losses this year as a result of the depredations of coyotes, and trappers are being encouraged to make a more intensive drive on the prowlers. Coyote skins are of no value during the summer and trapping is, therefore, profitable only between the months of November and March, the bounty of \$2.00 a head being inadequate to meet the trappers' expenses. Good skins fetch from \$9.00 to \$16.00 in the market when they are in satisfactory condition and these prices make it well worth while for the trapper to go out. Five months out of twelve, however, is not enough in which to check the increase of the marauders and sheep men are urging the British Columbia Government to increase the bounty so that trappers will find it profitable to seek the coyote at all seasons.

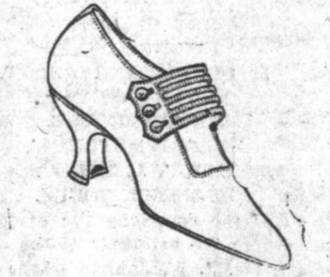

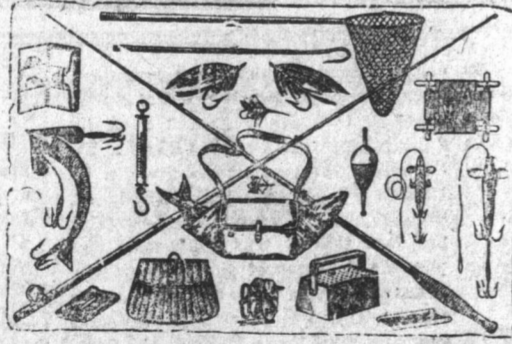

A London Magistrate on the Cult of the Dole

"The dole is to the body politic what dangerous drugs are to the physical body. Morphine, opium, heroin and cocaine have medicinal qualities, and in this relation they have done much to alleviate human suffering, and restore health and happiness," writes Mr. J. A. R. Cairns, the well-known London magistrate, in the Weekly Despatch.

"In hospitals and nursing homes the lives of millions are spared the agony of intense suffering, and people in the grip of painful disease are hushed to sleep instead of tossing in anguish through long dark nights of pain.

"Drugs are a benediction, but they can become a curse. What was discovered as a cure became a disease, and the menace was of such urgency that the Legislature passed the Dangerous Drugs Act in 1920, which imposed stringent regulations on the use of the specified drugs.

"The ideoals associated with the dole are just those associated with dope. Both were intended as instruments of healing and both became instruments of disease. For the new social disease we want something analogous to the Dangerous Drugs Act.

"I have been interested in the reformative efforts of half a dozen youths all of them under eighteen. They were the product of 'doped' homes—doped either by the dole or Poor Law relief. They varied in physique, in temperament and manners, and most of them were neither truant nor dishonest. They all loathed discipline and hated work, and they were quite frank about the matter. Loathing about the purlieus of a London slum was their loftiest desire.

"I wish to associate myself in the most definite way with Mr. George Lansbury's testimony. Like him, I think the demoralization of the younger men and lads is the gravest aspect of this problem. There is a section that will want rather than work. To them work is the primordial curse.

"The work test will eliminate them from the list of applications. The work may be uneconomical; it may cost twice as much as it produces, but it will produce something. And, most important of all, it will keep effective both muscle and moral.

"The cult of the dole has become a byword among the industrious poor. In an East End omnibus, as it travels through Commercial Road, the City office-cleaners regale each other with stories of its abuse, and the most bitter protests of all come from women whose husbands and sons have degenerated into effortless parasites through prolonged and self-chosen idleness. Economic demoralization results in domestic discontent.

"The time has come, in the interests of national expenditure and national character, for a drastic revision of the whole question.

"As dangerous drugs are intended to be temporary and remedial, so un-

CRUDE RUBBER.
 Quotations Advance as London Stocks Decline and April Consumption in U. S. Shows Excess Over Imports.

NEW YORK, May 13.—Quotations for spot smoked sheets of crude rubber advanced five cents a pound Monday following an advance in London to 29 1/2-24. New York quotation is 61 cents a pound, against a close Saturday of 56. The sharp advance was based on decline of 1900 tons in London stocks to 9800 tons, against 55,000 at beginning of the year and upwards of 70,000 when surplus stocks were at the peak.

Another bullish factor was report of Rubber Association showing crude rubber consumption in this country in April at 36,000, against imports of slightly over 27,000. Consumption for January-April period was 133,900 tons. Brokers predict some of the smaller tire companies will be compelled to discontinue operations because of inability to secure rubber.

Crude rubber market was strong, with sellers of rubber, smoked sheets for nearby delivery at 60 cents, June 59, July 57 and July-September 56. London market closed unsettled, with buyers of nearby at 29d and July-September at 24d.

Importations of crude rubber into the United States in April totalled 27,231 tons, against 26,914 in March and 42,435 in April, 1924, according to Rubber Association of America. In four months of 1925 imports totalled 114,561 tons, against 113,562 tons in the same period of last year. Imports at Atlantic ports in April were 24,573 tons and at Pacific ports 890 tons.

THE OIL STOCKS.
NEW YORK, May 13.—Oil securities are reflecting the strong position of the oil industry and improved earnings of Standard Oil and independent companies.

Reports for the first quarter of 1925 show material improvement in net over last year. This follows the rather general increase in profits for 1924 over 1923.

Conditions which made for good oil profits the first quarter of 1925 have, if anything, improved in the second quarter. Crude prices in the big mid-continent district have remained at the year's top prices, while latterly the wholesale gasoline market has advanced about one cent a gallon in the mid-continent. Demand is increasing.

With present prices and conditions continuing, important oil companies should show better profits in the current quarter than they did in the first three months.

In this situation it is believed oil stocks are not only discounting good second quarter reports, but also likelihood of increases and resumption of dividend payments. Mention is heard in all circles that Pacific Oil is likely to be among the first to raise its first cash payment by going back to the old \$3 annual basis instead of the \$2 a year now being paid.

Marland's earnings of \$2.19 a share in the first quarter, after all deductions and no inventory appreciation, should at least be duplicated in the current quarter. These earnings, as well as the possibility of resumption of dividends, are attracting attention.

Some talk is also heard of Phillips being likely to raise its cash dividend or make a stock distribution. Standard Oil of New York is another company which is considered likely to make some increase in its dividend payments.

WILLIS-OVERLAND.
TOLEDO, May 13.—A committee of Willis-Overland directors will present a plan for paying off accrued preferred dividends to the board, for consideration after annual stockholders' meeting to-day. Dividends amounting to \$30 a share had accumulated on 7 per cent, preferred stock prior to current quarterly payment last Saturday.

It is understood policy will be to pay dividends in cash and not partly in common stock, as some reports suggested.

Company has \$13,000,000 cash and has strengthened its position by a conservative policy of liberal reserves for depreciation and contingencies. More than \$500,000 was reserved for this purpose from first quarter earnings when the company reported net of \$3,175,000.

Bankers close to the company are estimating the current year's earnings at close to \$20,000,000. The company has profited considerably by an increasing margin due to declines in raw materials though its profit per car is lower than that of most manufacturers, according to Mr. Willis.

STANDARD OIL OF INDIANA.
 Company's Magazine Says Control Of Pan American Petroleum And Transport Gives Impregnable Position.

(Halifax Chronicle, May 15.)

CHICAGO, May 13.—Acquisition of control of Pan American Petroleum & Transport Co. places Standard Oil Co. of Indiana in an absolutely impregnable position among oil companies of the world, says the company's magazine, the Stanolind Record, which further says the terms of purchase were most favorable.

Chairman Stewart, of Standard Oil of Indiana, assisted by F. H. Wickett, a group of geologists and others, working against a short period of 60 days expiring March 31, made a complete survey of Pan American's producing territories in Mexico and South America and its entire physical assets, actual and potential.

B.C. Beaver Multiply in Close Season

VICTORIA, B.C., May 10.—Although the intensive and ruthless trapping operations of a few months ago threatened to wipe out altogether British Columbia's beaver colonies, a series of closed seasons and careful government supervision have resulted in a rapid increase in the number of these valuable fur-bearing animals. From all districts beaver are now reported to be multiplying and there is a strong prospect that this branch of the fur industry will be completely rehabilitated within a year or so. The fox farm has come to stay in this province and there are more than 200 licenses for such farms, according to game bird figures. The fur trade of British Columbia represented approximately \$3,000,000 last year.

The Ascania

NEW CUNARD FOR THE CANADIAN SERVICE.

Thousands of Tyne-side ship-workers stopping work to wave good-bye to the vessel that represented five years of their craftsmanship—this was the memory of those who reached Southampton recently in the new Cunard liner "Ascania," which has just successfully completed her trials. Owing to labour, trade, and other difficulties the "Ascania" had slowly grown at Walker-on-Tyne for five years. The "Ascania" was built by Sir W. G. Armstrong, Whitworth, & Co., Ltd. She makes her first sailing from Southampton to Quebec and Montreal on May 22. She is of 14,000 tons, carrying 522 cabin and 928 third-class passengers.

While an attempt has been made to attain the luxury of the Aquitania, comfort and convenience have been studied in her design. She is correctly described as a ship of innovations, the special feature being the accommodation for third-class passengers.

City Under the Sea

"The ruins of an ancient city have been found by divers submerged thirty feet below the surface of the Mediterranean Sea, off the coast of Tunisia," says the Daily Express.

The divers report that many large stone buildings were visible, outlined in dim shadows on the sandy bottom, and that fish swam in and out of crumbled doorways.

"Archaeologists are preparing to make further explorations. Additional interest is attached to the discovery by the fact that the city lies in waters described by Virgil and near the 'Isle of the Lotus Eaters,' of which Homer sang."

High Union Wages Forces Company to Close Mines

PITTSBURGH, May 11.—Suspension of operations at four additional union mines, was announced to-day by the Pittsburg Coal Company. Eleven had previously been closed and the announcement said only two of the company's union mines are now in operation. The mines were closed, the company statement said, "for the reason that coal cannot be produced at the present high union wages and sold in competition with southern non-union coal, except at a heavy loss."

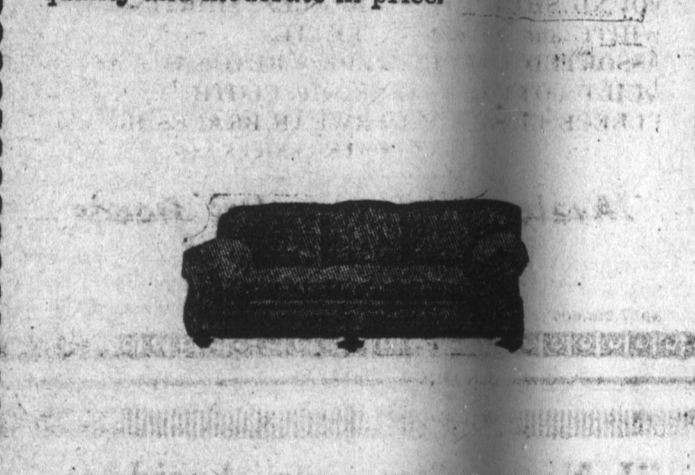
Input or Output Transformer ?

EDITED BY JOHN H. CLAYTON.
A super-heterodyne receiver has a radio-frequency amplifier which operates on a comparatively high wavelength (5,000 to 10,000 meters). This radio-frequency amplifier is known as the intermediate-frequency amplifier. It consists, usually, of iron core transformers whose cores are very thin sheets of laminated silicon steel and whose windings are made of comparatively small wire. These transformers operate over quite a large band of frequencies but in a super we want to amplify and pass only a comparatively narrow band of wavelengths. It is necessary, therefore, to have a sharply-tuned transformer somewhere in the radio-frequency amplifier to limit to some extent the broadness of the intermediate amplifier.
If placed ahead of the intermediate transformer this sharply-tuned system is called an input transformer, and if placed after the intermediate amplifier the tuned transformer is called an output transformer. It can be placed in either place, but which is best? That is a question which is causing much comment and which is worrying super-heterodyne fans. The super will work no matter how the transformer is used, either as an input or an output transformer.

The Problems of the Cinema

SOME AMAZING STATISTICS AND WHY EDUCATIONAL FILMS ARE SO OFTEN A FAILURE.

The question of the cinema and its physical, social and moral influences, particularly upon the young, has long needed serious investigation. The National Council of Public Morals has initiated such an investigation, and the report takes the form of a book, *The Cinema in Education*, which is ably edited by Sir James Marchant, L.L.B. The problem of the cinema is so important and becomes more pressing as the years go by, that there will be many who are perturbed and concerned who will be desirous of learning what the able people who served on the Commission think about this vital matter.

Sir James states: "The functions of cinema," (quoting the report) "are broadly three: recreative, educational, and propagandist. Of these the recreative is at present the most prominent, but to this aspect of the cinema we have not exclusively directed our attention in this inquiry. We recognize quite clearly that it would be a mistake to throw on an industry commercially conducted for private profit the onus of leading public opinion, and, indeed, no claim is made that the leaders of the industry desire or are competent to undertake this work. Accordingly, educational and other authorities in the country might well consider how far they can assist in raising the whole status of the cinema, and to help them in this endeavour has been a main object of our inquiry."

"Although, as already stated, the cinema is to be regarded primarily as a means of amusement and recreation, many praiseworthy attempts have been made by some producers of films to deal with natural phenomena from the educational standpoint, and films have been prepared in which the educational interest is predominant. Films of natural history, geographical and historical interest have been prepared with marked ability and at great cost, but it must be admitted that these films have not proved sufficiently attractive to the general public to warrant the expenditure involved in their production. The reasons for the failure of the mainly educational films are many. The most important are the following:—

"1. The public to which the cinema appeals has not sufficient general knowledge of science, natural history, geography or history to form that connection between previous experience and the subject-matter of the film which is so essential to vivid interest.

"2. The atmosphere in which such films are introduced is highly antagonistic to their favourable reception and to their educational value. A film, however beautiful, of the life history of a plant or insect sandwiched between a Charlie Chaplin film and a thrilling episode of the 'Exploits of Elaine' has little chance of survival. The interest—if ever it has been aroused—is soon switched off, and a feeling of boredom results. To be effective in such surroundings the film must have interests other than the purely educational.

"3. To make an educational film of real value there must be preliminary preparation by work in the school, or the running comment of a lecturer. The valuable film of the making of the Panama Canal would have lost its educational value without the accompanying lecture.

"Teachers and children who have appeared before the Commission had little to say in favour of the educational film as it is at present shown in a mixed programme, though some mentioned the possibility of such films proving of educational value under favorable conditions and in close association with the work of the school.

"We were also told by representatives of the trade that the public would not tolerate a greater admixture of educational films than 10 per cent. in a mixed programme. From statistics of an investigation of the interest of children in different classes of films, it appeared that the total number who preferred educational films was almost negligible. The small percentage of children who like this type of film more than any other was, however, markedly greater among those with good home surroundings than among those from very poor districts. Such films were also shown to be more popular among girls than among boys, but even among girls from good homes only 3 to 4 per cent. declared a preference for educational films.

The Mosquito Danger

There seems a great probability that unless drastic steps are taken the southern countries are likely to suffer this year from a plague of mosquitoes. "It is of great importance that steps should be taken to stamp out the pest, for not only is the mosquito a nuisance, but also a danger. It feeds on all kinds of fith, and thus its bite is not merely irritating but contaminated.

In tropical countries, where mosquitoes are the carriers of various fevers, such as malaria and yellow fever, incessant war is waged upon them, but in England we have hitherto regarded the insect rather in the light of a nuisance than of a danger. But it must not be forgotten that owing to the war many Englishmen living at home now have the germs of malaria in their systems, and that, consequently, the anopheles mosquito, which has for years flourished in England in a more or less innocuous state, may thus become an active agent of malaria in this country, provided that the conditions are sufficiently favourable.

In various ways, therefore, the mosquito is a real menace, and we hope that everybody will do his best in the fight against it.—Daily Mail.



Constitution for South-West Africa

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, May 14.—(Canadian Press, via Reuter's).—The following is stated here to be the essential features of the preliminary draft of the Constitution for South-West Africa, which was formerly a German colony:

The Colony is to be governed by a body of eight members, including the administrator who is appointed by the Government of South Africa.

Three are to be nominated by the Government, one of whom will be a public servant representing the Department for Native Affairs, and the other four will be elected by the Legislative Assembly and must not necessarily be members of that body.

The Assembly is to consist of 18 members, six to be nominated by the Union Government and the others to be elected by registered voters. The territory will be divided into twelve constituencies, containing as far as possible an equal number of voters.

The Assembly will regulate its own procedure and expenses will be submitted, according to the members an opportunity of discussing all the questions of public importance, including those on which the Assembly is not empowered to legislate and which are reserved for treatment by the central authority. These reserved subjects are native affairs, railways, the public services, mines, posts, telegraphs, justice, immigration, defence, currency and customs. Moreover, the Government reserves for three years the subjects of settlement, education, police, land, banks and militia.

The subjects reserved can, from time to time, be delegated by the Central Government to the Assembly. If those subjects reserved for three years only are not voluntarily delegated by the Government to the Assembly at the expiration of that term a vote of at least two-thirds of the members of the Assembly may demand their transference.

Killed by His Own Bomb

A man, aged 25, who had illegally manufactured a bomb, was himself killed by it, according to the Home Office explosives report for 1924.

His intention appears to have been to suspend the bomb from a telegraph post and then by means of a taper to burn through the cord and so give him time to get away. The explosion occurred before he got away. An example of the rash methods employed in making explosives was that of a corporation employee who was killed. He placed gelignite cartridges on sand on a sheet of corrugated iron over a fire. He was turning them over with his hands when they exploded.

In a house in London a man was pouring petroleum spirit along the wallscapings to exterminate vermin. He was smoking a cigarette and the spirit vapour ignited. This disposed of the belief that a cigarette will not ignite petrol.

100,000 Pounds Contract

BRITISH FIRMS UNITE TO BEAT GERMANS.

A contract involving £100,000 for the supply of oil casing to the Anglo-Persian Oil Co. has been obtained by Messrs. Stewart and Lloyds, Ltd., of Glasgow, and the British Mannesmann Tube Co., Ltd., Queen Victoria Street, E.C., who have hitherto their resources for cheap production.

A German syndicate quoted figures 50 per cent. below the British companies' tendering separately, whereupon the Anglo-Persian Oil Co. conferred with the British firms, with the result that the firms referred to co-operated.

Ancient Relics Found in British Columbia

REVELSTOKE, B.C., May 6.—Stone implements older by aeons of time than Senestrus' sarcophagus or Tutankhamen's tomb as emblems of man's past life story are being dug up on the Tagle Pass farm of Thomas Griffiths on the west side of the Thompson River.

The farm is said to be situated in the oldest known rock strata. Each year as he ploughs and breaks the land, Mr. Griffiths finds the primitive relics and he now has a collection believed to be of considerable value. First, he discovered crude stone implements evidently used for cooking purposes. Then he found a goblet made of galena, which had evidently been brought there from a considerable distance, as there is no galena in the adjacent territory.

British Columbia archaeologists regard the farmer's discoveries as among the most important of their kind west of the Rockies. The origin of the relics is a mystery and several theories have been advanced.

It is known that the Indians were on the Pacific Coast long before the Chinese Buddhist priests, who, according to legend and the histories of Hoel-Shin (449 A.D.), discovered Western America long before Christopher Columbus was born.

Efforts to associate the implements with any branch of the Indian race now inhabiting the coast have, so far, proved unsuccessful, and it has been estimated that there are about 160 distinct Indian groups. Professor Hill-Tout, well-known authority on Indian Affairs, and in history of the coast province, finds remote Eastern Asian and Polynesian affinities for some of the six groups that have left their traces in British Columbia, and the implements found on the Griffiths farm are said to be not unlike the handiwork of certain tribes of South Sea Islanders.

A Vicious Dog

Last night a young woman proceeding along MacFarlane Street, was severely bitten by a large Newfoundland dog, and was forced to receive medical attention. Inspector Barter was called to the scene and took the dog in charge, but did not destroy it as he had not the necessary authority.

Humane Slaughter

MECHANICAL INSTRUMENT RECOMMENDED.

The Sanitary Committee of the Corporation of London recommend the passing of Clause 9 (B) of the Ministry of Health's model by-laws relating to slaughter-houses, which provides that animals for slaughter shall be first effectually stunned with a suitable mechanically operated instrument.

The question has been investigated for the committee by the medical officer of health (Dr. W. J. Howarth), the superintendent of the Metropolitan Cattle Market (Mr. J. R. Hayhurst), and the veterinary surgeon at the Central Meat Market (Mr. T. Dunlop Young).

They recommended that mechanically operated stunning instruments be used for cattle, calves, horses and pigs, that a captive bolt instrument be specified for the exclusion of one releasing a bullet, and that classes of instruction be organised for teaching slaughtermen the anatomy of the skull in different animals, and the proper use and care of the instrument.

A rider recommends the exclusion of sheep. Dr. Howarth, however, differs on this point, and appends a recommendation to include sheep.

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The Hindenburg Shock to Europe

A monarchist at heart and professed apostle of revenge, as some describe Field Marshal von Hindenburg, the ex-Kaiser's Commander-in-Chief, has been elected President of the German Republic so unexpectedly, that the shock to Europe is evident in the press of Britain, France and Italy. Even the German journals devoted to Republican principles express a certain anxiety, while those not so warmly attached to them are exultant because they see in the election a symbol of the reappearing strong Germany of old. Thus the monarchist Berlin Kreuz Zeitung avers that the Field Marshal's victory will demonstrate that the German people are regaining self-consciousness, which is the first step to regaining the world's respect. The Berlin Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung declares the election shows the nation tired of taking orders concerning its behavior from foreign countries, and, what is more, it adds, the meaning of it is the awakening not only of old proud memories, but also the determination to lead Germany out of the "condition of helotry."

The danger lies not in the person of von Hindenburg, remarks the Berliner Tageblatt, but in the intrigues of his entourage, and it notes the irony of the fact that "the paladin of Wilhelm II. will now be obliged to take the oath to the Republican Constitution before the Social Democratic President of the Reichstag and under the Republican flag. The Vossische Zeitung, organ of the Right Wing of the Democratic party, also warns against possible machinations on the part of the "general staff camarilla" behind von Hindenburg's back and hopes that the President will listen only to his constitutional advisers. Berlin Associated Press dispatches, which canvass the German press and people in form that the first reaction to the election was not untoward in the popular mind and in France, so now in Germany, a marshal and monarchist appears as President of the Republic after a hard war. The French Republic happily escaped from the danger zone, and it will be the task of German republicans to lead the Republic out of danger as successfully.

It is pointed out in Berlin dispatches that the President-elect will probably have more opponents than supporters in the German Parliament, because the Catholics, Democrats, Socialists and Communists command 277 seats only 216 for the Rightists. In Bavaria it is claimed by the Bayerische Kurier that the Field Marshal owes his victory to the Bavarian People's party, although the Muenchener Neueste Nachrichten observes:

"Von Hindenburg never will be the servant of an individual party. Above all, it should not be forgotten that the Bavarian People's party supported him. It was a testimonial of a confessional of peace and a renunciation of the confessional of intolerance."

In France, however, Hindenburg's election is reported in Paris press dispatches to confirm the impression France has always had, namely, that since 1914, except the surface appearance of the form of Government, nothing has changed. In proof of this we have the observation of the Paris Temps, as follows:

"It is because the German people seek to wipe out the memory and sentiment of their defeat that they have given this honor to the great defeated of 1918. Let nobody deceive himself. The election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is a defiance of Europe and a defiance of Europe and America. Certainly it is not the political genius of this old man, dragged from his retirement in Hanover, that is disquieting. It is all the forces of reaction and brutal revenge which can be seen behind him and which through him many will be again ready for conflict. Germany herself has thrown off the mask which deceived so many naive or complaisant people into belief in the sincerity of her republican and democratic sentiment."

"Is it the Germany of Hindenburg which we are going to admit to the League? Is it with this Germany that we are going to discuss the means of a general reduction of armaments and clauses of a compact of mutual guaranty for the assurance of the security of Europe? Is it with the Government of the victor of Tannenberg that we will invite Poland to negotiate a rearrangement of the Eastern frontiers of the Reich?"

Neither Mr. Briand nor any Foreign Minister in France, we read in a Paris dispatch, could now undertake such a programme of reconciliation with Germany as the British Foreign Office mapped out four months ago for completion in September next by evacuation of Cologne, the admission of Germany to the League and the signing of an Anglo-Franco-German compact. It is related also that at the

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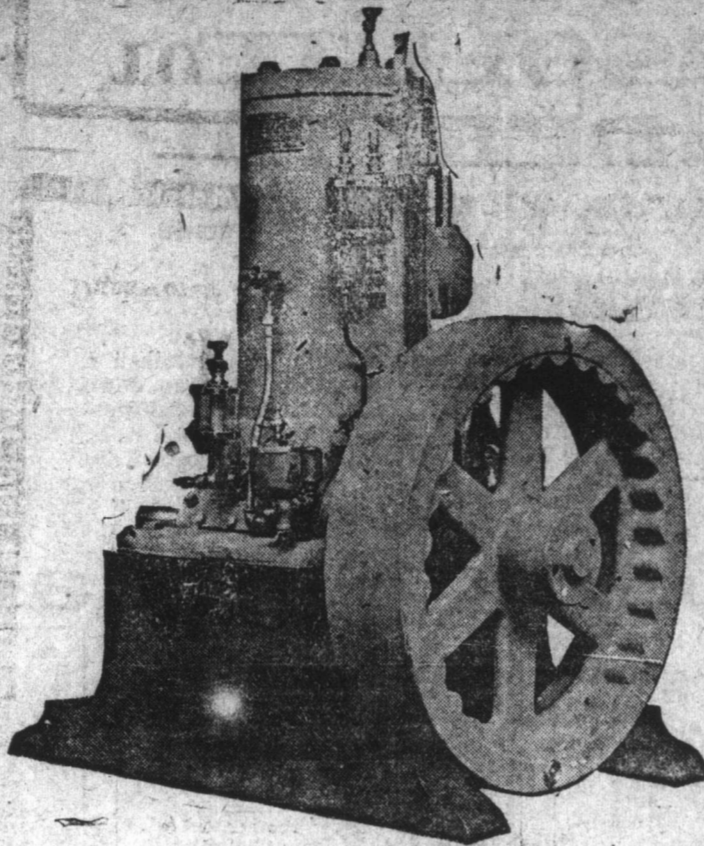
