WESLEYAN social to-night.

PERSONAL.—The Rev. Mr. Harper, late pastor of the Wesleyan Church here, but now of Port Hope, paid a flying visit to Guelph yesterday. We were pleased to see him looking so well.

GOOD THRESHING.—Mr. R. Black, of Puslinch, thrashed on the farm of Mr. Duncan McPhedrin, Nasaagaways, last Friday 612 bushels of oats in two hours and forty minutes, being over three bushels and six quarts per minute. The oats were a splendid sample and turned out sixty-six bushels per acre. The machine was manufactured by J. Brothers, Milton. Who can beat that?

ACCIDENT AT THE CENTRAL SCHOOL.—This (Thursday) forenoon a labourer named O'Neill, employed by Mr. Debbie, while excavating the foundation for the new Central School, got his leg broken. The bank caved in and fell on O'Neill, breaking his leg between the ankle and the knee. The unfortunate man was at once removed to his residence, and Dr. McGuire sent for, who set the broken limb. O'Neill had only gone to work in the morning for Mr. Debbie, and was therefore only employed a few hours when the unfortunate accident took place.

TWO SHIPS IN DISTRESS. ANOTHER REPORTED SUNK.

St. Jean, Port Joli, Que., Nov. 20.
M. Dupuis writes from St. Roch's yesterday, the 19th:—"There are two vessels in distress opposite St. Roch's—one is on the Fer de Cheval, the other is on the Baturo, and dismantled. Both are large ships. No boats have, as yet, been seen. A steamer passed this morning, but did not pay any attention to them. Another ship is reported to have sunk in the Traverser. He only can see the masts and doesn't know what has become of the steamer."
A SAD ACCIDENT happened on Wednesday morning at the A. S. Whiting manufacturing establishment at Cedarvale, near Oshawa, by the bursting of a large grindstone, on which one Michael O'Connell was grinding hoses. When the stone burst (by which it is feared O'Connell received fatal injuries), it also caused a pulley to burst which ran a polishing machine, and was worked by W. Hunt, fracturing his skull, but it is thought he will recover. O'Connell is yet alive, but the doctors do not hold out any hopes of his recovery. The other man, Hunt, is expected to recover. He had a miraculous escape, as a piece of stone, about two hundred pounds, passed him and went across the shop about forty feet, then out through the window.
On Thursday evening the employees of the Toronto, Grey & Bruce Railway met at the Queen's Wharf Station, Toronto, for the purpose of presenting their late agent, Mr. Wm. Orr, with a handsome drawing-room set of furniture, together with an address, as a token of the esteem in which he is held by the servants of the railway. After the ceremony the company adjourned to the Queen's Wharf Hotel, where a couple of happy hours were spent, with the usual toasts and speeches.

Fears of Famine in Bengal.

Toronto, Nov. 19.
Hon. Alex. Mackenzie and Hon. A. McKellar have both returned to this city from Ottawa.
A meeting of the Ontario Cabinet was held yesterday.
Small-pox is largely on the increase here, and seven cases are reported on Walton street, in St. John's Ward.
It is understood that the Local Legislature will not be called before January, when the session will not be broken by adjournment.
The Scandal Party in the Western Division of the city have at length found a standard-bearer in a person Mr. E. O. Bickford, a cog actor, better known here as "Big Iron." He resides in the neighborhood of Trinity College.
Edward Farrer, formerly one of the leading members of the Mail editorial staff, has now withdrawn from all connection with that journal, and has gone down to Lennox to aid in the canvass of that county for the Hon. Mr. Cerwright, and has formally announced his withdrawal for all future time from the Scandal Party.
Much dissatisfaction exists to-day among certain sections of the Conservative party at the choice of a candidate. Ex-Ald. Canavan is one of the discontents, and feels sorely grieved at not having received the nomination. Others talk of soliciting Walter Shandy the defeated of the Centre Division, to stand for the Western Division instead of Bickford.
The long-talked-of wedding of Beatrice, eldest daughter of Lieut.-Governor Crawford, took place to-day. Owing to the fact that Mr. Watson, the bridegroom, was a Protestant, the marriage ceremony took place in the vestry adjoining the cathedral, rather than in the cathedral itself. The wedding party entered the cathedral shortly before noon, passing up the aisle and into the vestry. The cathedral was thronged with the elite of the city, and included among the guests Attorney-General Mowat, Hon. George Brown, several Judges and other distinguished citizens. The bride was dressed in white satin, two bridesmaids in blue, two in yellow, and two in pink. The altar was gorgeously decorated, and the choir rendered appropriate music.

Notes from Ottawa.
Ottawa, Nov. 19.
Advice received here from Prince Edward Island state the probabilities are that no opposition will be offered to the return of Hon. Mr. Laird.
Sir John Macdonald has stated that he calculated from the first on filling the Senate with his own people, in order to cause a deadlock between both Houses in case he went out of power. This scheme was foreseen and defeated.
Navigation on the Ottawa and its tributaries has closed for the season.
As yet the small-pox has not appeared in this city; the only disease at present in a mild form of typhoid fever, prevalent in the crowded and poor parts of the city.
Messrs. Robitaille, O'Connor, and Mitchell have given instructions to a city solicitor to sell all their horses, carriages and sleighs, and in a few days we expect to hear of several more household furniture auctions.
Hon. Alex. Mackenzie left for the west to-night at 9 o'clock en route for Toronto and Sarnia. The nomination for Lambton comes off at the latter place on Tuesday next. Since the day of his accession to office the hon. gentleman has worked in his department most assiduously, seldom leaving it before 11 o'clock at night. The other Ministers pursue their official duties with equal severity of application. It may not be incorrect to say that in nearly all the departments heavy arrangements of business have greatly increased the labours of Ministers.

Montreal Items.
Montreal, Nov. 19.
This morning the tug John A. Macdonald succeeded in breaking the ice-jam at St. Gabriel Locks, and the Alma Munro has arrived at her discharging berth. Other propellers, and over thirty barges, are following her. The Richelieu Company's steamers have gone to Quebec to lay up.
To-day there are fifteen inches of snow on the ground.
A medical student named Byron was found dead in his bed this morning. He had just finished a terribly exhausting drunken bout.
The Commissioners for the Park appropriation have awarded, for eighty-three acres of the Redpath estate, \$56,000, and \$5,000 for the loss of water, making in all \$61,000. All the Commissioners concurred in this decision. For forty-one acres of the Taylor property, they awarded \$61,000. The park grounds are now the property of the city. It is one of the most magnificent sites for that purpose in the world.
Small-pox is on the increase, and the vaccination law is to be strictly enforced.

SCANDAL.—At the last meeting of the Town Council, while a member of that honorable body was expressing his views in reference to a side-walk at Bilkie's hill, he was abruptly informed by another member that what he was saying was untrue. Not realizing the impertinence, member No. 1 intimated that it would not be well for member No. 2 to repeat the assertion, whereupon No. 2 reiterated "it is untrue." Unable to suppress his anger at the unwarrantable interruption, the speaker seized the offender by the throat and shook him with such violence that his "scalp" dropped on the floor. Those present were terribly horrified at the turn affairs had taken, but on order being restored, the fears were considerably allayed when it was found that it was only a wig that had been removed.—Walkerton Telescope.
Representations having been made from Quebec to Ottawa, that 15 Gaspe schooners, laden with provisions for the people of that district, were weather-bound there, and unable to get away, Hon. Mr. LeBelletier de St. Just, Minister of Agriculture, in the absence of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, immediately sent down orders to fit out the Government steamer, Napoleon, to tow them down. This prompt action will, no doubt, obviate a scarcity of provisions and much distress in Gaspe this winter.
Two hundred and eighty-eight witnesses have been examined for the defence of the Richelieu claimant.

Toronto Notes.
Toronto, Nov. 19.
An order is to be issued at Ottawa to prevent smoking in the departmental offices during the working hours.
About four hundred attended the fifth Anniversary Concert and Public Meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association which was held in the Town Hall St. Catharines, on Tuesday.
FRANCOIS.—During a drunken row on the m.e.a. street of Merion village, a man named Hope stabbed another with a knife in the forehead. The knife broke with the force of the blow, leaving about an inch of steel in the victim's head, who now lies in a critical state.
Mr. H. Hurst, a storekeeper at King, when crossing the bridge near Thornhill on Tuesday was run into by a double team, and his horse so frightened that it leaped the bridge, and hung suspended by the traces and collar. Hurst escaped but the horse was killed.
DURHAM.—A very serious accident occurred on the farm of Mr. Albridge, Benshook, to one George Leopold. It appears that while engaged in oiling a threshing machine on Tuesday his clothes became entangled with the shaft, which dragged him around several times, tearing his clothes completely from off him and bruising him severely before the machine could be stopped. He lies at present in a very critical condition.
REMARKABLE FEAT of threshing was performed last week on the farm of Mr. Lookie, Sprague's road, by Messrs John Sharp and Frank Shield. In 2 hours and 42 minutes they turned out 500 bushels of oats with one of Lutz's threshing machines. Of this quantity 150 bushels were threshed in 12 minutes! Who can beat that?—Galt Reformer.

The Lower Canadian paper are agitated over the news from Manitoba. The *Nouveau Monde* says everything progresses towards a bloody end, which will, we fear, be crowned with revolution civil war—at least if some decisive measure is not taken to frustrate the plots in regard to the news from Manitoba of the finding of true bills against Riel & Co. for the Scott murder. The *Miner* says this decision will cause great agitation among the French Canadian population of Quebec, who will only see in the conduct of the jury the inspiration of fanaticism, and it demands an amnesty to restore calmness, and perhaps prevent great mischief.

There will probably soon be five vacant seats in the Ontario Legislative Assembly. Mr. R. W. Scott's transference to the Dominion Cabinet leaves Ottawa unrepresented. Mr. Frazer is Mr. Scott's probable successor, and his elevation will vacate South Grenville. Tom Ferguson having retired from the dusty arena of politics to the calm seclusion of a custom-house, South Simcoe will have to elect another and doubtless a better representative. Herbert S. Macdonald is now a judge, and someone else will be wanted in South Leeds. The fifth constituency is Peel, represented in the last session of the Assembly by the late Mr. Coyne.

Reports of hard times in the United States are frequent. Many artisans in want of work are arriving in Canada, some having walked long distances.

South Bruce Reform Association.

APPROVAL OF MR. BLAKE'S COURSE

RIVERSDALE, Nov. 19.
The Reform Association of South Bruce met to-day at Riversdale. There was a good attendance. Among other resolutions the following were unanimously adopted:—Moved by Mr. A. Gibson, seconded by Mr. M. McPherson, that this Association holds with the greatest satisfaction the change of Administration, not so much as a party triumph as in reference to its effects on the moral and material prosperity of this great country, and as the termination of twenty years of government by political corruption.—Carried. Moved by Mr. D. Cameron, seconded by Mr. P. McInnes, that we cordially approve of the action of Mr. E. Blake in subordinating his own personal inclination to the wishes of the country by accepting a seat in the Privy Council; and we are of opinion that his presence there will give new strength to, and confidence in, the new Administration.—Carried. Moved by Mr. A. Andrews, seconded by Mr. M. Campbell, that whereas the seat for South Bruce has been vacated by the voluntary resignation of Hon. E. Blake, we rejoice to have this opportunity of reassuring him of our continued confidence in him as our representative, and that, in the event of a contest, we hereby pledge him our hearty and undivided support.—Carried.

Strange Accident—Seven Men Killed.

(From the Huron Signal.)
A frightful accident occurred about two weeks ago in connection with the mills of Messrs. Murray & Williams, on the north shore of Lake Huron. The particulars may be learned from the following letter from Mr. Murray to his partner in Godrich.

BLIND RIVER MILLS, Nov. 6th.—We have had a terrible accident here. On Saturday last, at nine in the morning, seven men left here with a scow loaded with pork, corn meal, and oats. They got up to the portage at the east end of Lake du Roche, about 12 miles from the mill, at which they unloaded the oats and carried them into the granary and piled them all up at one end, one row wide and very high. After they had their supper, they made their bed and lay down with their heads to the oats, and sometime during the night the oats fell down and crushed them all to death. The accident must have happened on Saturday night, for Louis de C. A. was in the granary on Sunday morning, and left on Monday morning, and brought down word that they had been there and unloaded the oats, but said he could not see the men anywhere. They did not come on Monday; Tuesday was stormy, they could not come; but Wednesday was fine, and when they had not arrived at four o'clock, I knew there must be something wrong, so I started up alone in a canoe and got to the granary at 8 o'clock, and found them buried under the oats. All that could be seen of them was one hand sticking up among the tails of oats. I then took some bags and found another man, covered up in the blankets, just as he had lain down; he had never been able to stir. I am starting up this morning to bring them down. The men killed are Andie Proulx, Thomas O'Connor, Andrew Young, Alexander McKay, William Beyer, Peter Boyer, and Geo. Corbier.

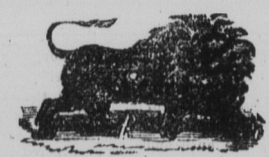

A MISSOURI EDITOR ON SWINE.—The Editor of the Louisiana, Mo. Press, in relating what he knows about farming, touches upon the hog question in this style: "To make Berkshire pigs out of your hazy splitters, select a cold day, stand them on their haunches tied to a sapling, and drive their noses back into their shoulders, leaving about an inch protruding. If you will look at the agricultural papers you will find that all blooded hogs are fixed that way. If you have any whose noses are longer than all the rest of the body, better sell them to an artesian well company for drills, as you cannot drive the nose back without telescoping the whole pig. When you cut up hogs, leave the hams and shoulders square, leave some hair on too, salt everlastingly, and then they will be worth several cents per pound less than when trimmed and eared so that a Christian can eat them."

"Thirty-two cents!" echoed a woman yesterday, when her grocer charged her that sum for a pound of butter. "Yes, 'um," he replied with a bland smile. "You see the grocer can't carry much of a reserve, and we can't turn our collaterals at a sacrifice.
