The central principle—his opponents call it adogma—of Mr. Darwin's system is "natural selection," called by Herbet Spencer "the survival of the fittest," a choice which results inevitably from "the struggle for existence." It is a law and struggle for existence. It is a law and a fact in nature that there shall be the weak and the strong. The strong shall triumph and the weak shall go to the wall. The law, though involving destruction, is really preservative. If all plants and animals were free to reproduce their kind under like and equally favorable conditions, if all more consultations and well consultations. if all were equally strong and well equip-ped for obtaining sustenance and making their way in the world, there would soon be no room on the earth for even a single species. But Mr. Darwin also discovered that natural selection created special fitness that natural selection created special litness for given circumstances and surroundings. Timate, soil, food supply, and other conditions act in this way, and the result is the differentiation of species. A certain thistle grows in a kind of soil which is rich in the elements which go to produce the tiny hairs upon the surface of the plant. The seeds are thus furnished with downy wings longer than usual, and are wafted further off where they have plenty of space to grow, and than usual, and are watted further off where they have plenty of space to grow, and they, in turn, reproduce and emphasize the changes to which they owe their existence. Seeds or nuts developing a thick covering for the kernel are thus protected from birds and animals, and live to germinate, producing also hard-shelled seeds, and thus the process goes on.
