PARIS, Jan. 12 - Another version of the Cambodian trouble says it is learned from semi official sources that a serious revolt, heade i by a brother of the king, has occurred in Cambodia. Revolutionists have obtained complete possession of a number of French posts and murdered the garrisons. It is suspected that Chinese intrigue is at the bottom of the uprising, and a general massacre of the French at the military posts is feared. The king telegraphs that he is powerless to resist the revolutionists, and a large force of French troops has been ordered to be in readiness

The more impracticable his proposals are, the better they like him; and it may be surmised that their interest in the annual crop of railway "cranks" is a strong one. One thing they do dread; however, and that is, the appearance before the public of some really sensible scheme of nationa control. Such a thing is sure to turn up, some of these days; and railway monopolists fear it more than they do "granger" legislation in the western states. It is

The conditions within the globe which cause these disturbances are changing, but so slowly that there is practically no difference between what they were thousands of years ago and what they will

be thousands of years hence. Nobody would have cause of surprise, therefore, the earthquake of Lisbon, in 1755, should presently be repeated. Indeed, it seems possible that great disturbances have recently taken place not on dry land, but of land that is under the ocean, and that th big wave at New Haven and the shocks in Spain indicate the limits of their extent.

No. 2 red wheat closed Jan. 8 at 940, against 880 a week before, and Indian corn, No. 2 mixed, at 533, a decline of 120 on the week, the response of this cereal to the later advance in wheat not being so active as it was earlier.

Hog products and provisions have been higher in sympathy with the grain market. Spot mess pork closed at \$13 25, a gain of 500, and refined lard at \$7 70, a gain of 30 points on the week.

The Rights of the Press. In a recent libel suit in Rhode Island, the chief justice laid down the law in his charge to the jury as follows : I think that a public newspaper has a right to commer upon and criticise in the discharge of pub-lic duties. I think that if the publishers upon and criticise in the table the publishers discover what they consider to be defects, they have a right to point them out. If there are facts which auggest fault, I think that the public press has a right to criticise and to censure, if in the exercise of this freedom of comment they act fairly and honestly and meaning to do what is right, they cannot be held accountable. It is of great importance to the public that its or great importance to the public that its newspapers should have this liberty. If there should be none to censure or to criticise, frauds would grow more and more intolerable, to the manifest peril of the public welfare, and therefore, you can see that the public have a great interest in maintaining unshackled the right of the maintaining unshackled the right public press to freely and fairly crit



But the match proved a very unhappy one, and after a ten days honeymoon, according to the story that the widow told in Chief Justice ameron's court yesterday afternoon, the leputy inaugurated a series of indignities owards her which wound up by their paration after living together for one paration after living together for one par, Mrs. Argue being allowed \$500, ader circumstances which resulted in a suit against the estate of deceased for suit against the estate of decessed for dowry. This suit was begun yesterday before Chief Justice Cameron and a jury. The defendants are Robt. Dunlop, Ann Harris and Alexandria Argue (grandaughters of decessed), and Thos. Riggs. James Reeve appeared for plaintiff and C. R. W. Bigger for the defence.

The plaintiff's evidence in brief was that after her marriage with the deputy-mayor they lived happily enough for ten days. Then he began to get very cross and nothing she could do pleased him. He would pull down the bed after she had made it. On several occasions he told her he was afraid she would poison him. If she ever went out the deputy mayor would say on her return that she had been in bad company. He repeatedly swore at her, and on one occasion he threatened to knock out her brains with a chair. He locked up all the provisions, table cloths, dishes, etc., and doled cut the tea, butter, bread, etc. in a miserly manner. She considered that she was neither a wife nor a servant in the deputy mayor's household. He never spoke a pleasant word to her. One mornspoke a pleasant word to her. One morning he got up very cross and told her they would have to part. She told him she was poor, without friends and without a home and she did not think it was fair to turn her out. He said he would provide to her and told her to go to Mr. McNabb, who would draw up papers of separation who would draw up papers of separation, she taking one and he taking one. He would provide for her keep. Witness testified that she was unable to read or write, and she signed a paper which she thought provided that she was not to trouble her husband for the rest of his He was to pay her \$500 for her support. She wanted \$1000. He first offered \$300, then \$500, and would give no more. There was no mention whatever of dowry in the deed. She was given a copy of the After her husb told that she was entitled to a wife's dower, and she accordingly instructed her solicitor to bring the suit.
