Canada's "Prosperity"

The Dounnion Watchman, in reviewing the Gov. General's speech at the

opening of Parliament, says :--"The speech delivered by the Gov. tiovernment has no clear understanding of the industrial, commercial and nancial condition of the country. If they had known it, they would in using such glowing language, whave male themselves lulicrous in their own eyes. It is well known that eight tenths of the real estate of the country is under mortgage at excessive rates of interest, more than it can be sold for for cash, and we doubt if it can be sold for the amount on sredit. Those mortgages are supplemented by chattel mortgages to an incredible extent. We lately saw the return for one county, one of the richest in Canada, where such mortgages are increasing at the rate of fully \$250a day, not for one month, but from month to month. Does that look like a restoration to prosperity? A merchant lately said to us: "I dare have it become prosperous and happy" not sell on we dit; if I do I am stre to we must speedily eliminate the beeches find that all the loose assets are cover ed by a chattel mortgage, and if I do not sell on credit there is not business sufficient to pay running expen-ses." Is a naturally rich county returning to prosperity when such a state of things exists, as it does exist all over this country? These state-ments are confirmed by the vast increase in bankrupteies during the past year. The harvest was more abandant than for many years, the prices have been exceptionally good, and yet the Lgan Societies claim to have loaned out an immense amount during the past year, and the amount gone into bankruptcy has been unprecedentedly great. If these are evidences of prosperity, then surely we have it.

If there is a real return to pros perity why are there so many fleeing from their farms as from consuming fire, from the farms they have redeemed from the forest, from the farms on which they have toiled, and where they had cherished the hope to spend the remnant of their days in peace and plenty? Why, if there is a return to prosperity, are they fleeing to the Western States and to Manitoba to commence the world again, fleeing as people fleeing from a horde of robbers, as the Loan Societies and the money lenders all over the country
