The factory of Graves & Bath will not receive apples for grading on Friday and Saturday of this week, but after that date will receive them as usual.

The steamer Killdeer, Capt. Kerr, which arrived here from Port Hood last Saturday with a cargo of coal for J. H. Longmire & Son, is the first steamer ever to enter the port of Bridgetown.

The Monitor's thanks are due Mrs. Ferguson, who has one of the most productive gardens, and is the champion celery grower of the town, for a sample of this choice vegetable and other fine varieties.

Mrs. Wm. McLaughlin, who visited Port Williams and the Wolfville Exhibition last week, brought into the Monitor office a bunch of large, well formed strawberries nearly ripe, to which a blossom was attached, grown on the farm of Bedford Chase, Esq., of Port Williams.

Mr. Henry Soretti, who is completing the western section of the M. & V. B. railway, has contracted to grade a section of the H. & S. W. railway between Shallowford and Sable River. He has also a contract with the Davison Lumber Co. to build a portion of their railroad.

Among the exhibits at the Wolfville exhibition was a jar of jam, the property of Mrs. E. C. Young, of this town. The jar is about 90 years old and was formerly in the possession of the late Hon. Joseph Fitzpatrick. Mrs. Young had it nicely hand-painted, the work being done by Mrs. J. W. Peters, and the same received first prize.

Rev. B. Hills began a course of sermons on the book of Daniel at his Sunday evening service in Providence Church. The first one was listened to with much interest and showed good thought and thorough preparation on the part of the speaker. The whole series on this particular portion of the Bible cannot be proved interesting to those that hear them at Providence.

The repeated complaints of travelers on the D. A. R. steamship line between Yarmouth and Boston, and the efforts of the D. A. R. officials, have at last effected a change in the immigration officer at that port, and it is expected that the administration of the immigration rules, which has been conducted in the past by one so notorious, will now cease to cause annoyance and offense.

The exhibition at Wolfville was very successful, although the attendance was not so good as it would have been under better train arrangements. The exhibit of apples was pronounced by experts one of the best ever seen in Canada, and the other fruits, vegetables and grain displayed were excellent. The poultry show was exceedingly good. Byron Chesley, T. E. Smith, E. C. Young, J. E. Lloyd and E. T. Kelly were the Annapolis County prize winners.

The schooner Temple Bar, of the Bridgetown-St. John packet service, met with another accident on her last trip from St. John, while coming up the river in tow of the steamer Kilkel, the steamer's bow stuck on the bank at Piggo's Point, and before the schooner could be shored off she struck the steamer amidships. The Temple Bar's bowsprit and fore rigging were carried away and she was otherwise damaged. But little damage was done to the steamer.

A large convention of the Liberal party was held at the Court House here on Thursday afternoon last, when S. W. W. Pickett, Esq., Warden of the Municipal Council, was unanimously elected as the party candidate for the coming election. In the evening a public meeting was held, at which, notwithstanding the weather was very unfavorable, a large gathering was present. Addresses were made by Hon. J. W. Longley, S. W. W. Pickett, Esq., and Mr. W. W. Clarke of Bear River.

Among the many beautiful wedding presents received by Mr. and Mrs. Edward W. Rice, were two handsome landscape pictures in heavy gilt frames, presented by the members of the Olive Branch Division. On the evening of the presentation a number of the members of the Order met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Rice, and after a very pleasant time spent in social amusements, Dr. Armstrong, on behalf of the members, presented the gift in a few happy remarks, which were responded to by Mr. Rice.

The Annapolis Spectator, which has been published by J. B. Mills, K. P., under the name of B. C. Hamilton & Co., publishers, has been purchased and building by Mr. J. L. DeVaney, the change of ownership to take place on the 15th of this month. Mr. DeVaney is favorably known as a newspaper man, having been formerly proprietor of the Bear River Telegraph, and lately of the Monitor. He will edit the new paper on independent principles, and will no doubt publish a paper which will take a prominent place among its contemporaries.

—Poleman Green, whose health has been seriously impaired for some weeks, has sufficiently recovered to resume his duties as guardian of the peace. —Mr. Abram Young is occupying the ground floor front of the former Randolph house, recently purchased by him, as an office, the central location of which is proving a convenience to his customers.

—J. B. Mills, Esq., K. C., has taken up the practice of his profession in British Columbia. Mr. Mills is offering for sale his household effects at public auction, and will leave also for B. C. shortly. —Mr. J. A. Bancroft, M. P. P., of Round Hill, suffered a slight attack of paralysis last Saturday which affected his speech and for a time appeared quite serious. Yesterday, we are glad to report, he was much improved, and an early recovery is hoped for.

—The supreme court opened at Annapolis on Tuesday, 4th inst. Judge Menger presiding. There were only two criminal cases, the grand jury found no bill, and in the civil case of Stevens vs. Fisher, judgment was reserved.

—Mrs. Lewis Morris, formerly of Berwick, a sister of Mrs. Wellington Daniels, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Hazlewood, Roxbury, Mass., on Tuesday last, at the age of seventy-four. The remains were brought on for interment in the family burial lot at Berwick.

—Rev. R. D. Porter, who recently moved to Smith's Cove from Middleton, was attacked by a bull which was leading to water on Sunday, 2nd inst. Fortunately, he was able to seize the ring in the animal's nose, and held him away so that he could be secured. He was quite severely bruised, but by the skillful attention of Dr. Lovett he hopes to be about again in a few days. The animal was broke-horn the same evening and was shot by some of the neighbors. Bridgetown C. R. A. Shoot. The government shoot of the Civilian Rifle Association of this town, on Friday and Saturday, but owing to the lateness of the season, the bleak weather prevailing Friday and the dampness occasioned by rain here, the attendance was small. The scores were not high, the Dyke medal being won at 200, 500 and 600 yards by H. H. Hildesheim, with scores of 87, 89 and 16, total 71. On Saturday, four cups were competed for, viz.—a cup presented by Mr. L. D. Shalmer, at 200, 500 and 600 yards. H. H. Hildesheim had the best score, 87; another by F. L. Miller, the captain of the club, at 200 and 600 yards (ten shots at each range), won by L. C. Berry with a score of 87, and another by B. M. Williams with a score of 88. In comparison with the usual scores of the winning clubs, the above scores are a goodly one for the ordinary. A great deal of interest was manifested in these four competitions, and the day was the close of a very successful shooting season.

Middleton's New Industry. A reporter dropped into the factory of the Valley Pork Packing Co. this week. During the past four weeks the factory has been producing more than it could handle, having put up 25,000 pounds of ham, bacon, barrel pork, etc. About 500 pounds of sausage is being made per week. The date system has been adopted and all hogs now received by appointment. Seven cents per pound was paid up to Oct. 1st, when the market fell and Halifax prices dropped to 64 for hogs up to 150 lbs., and 6 from 150 to 200 lbs. Regarding the future plans of the company, the secretary, S. C. Mahall, informed our reporter that if satisfied there would be an ample supply of hogs, a factory will probably be built near the railway station at Middleton, but otherwise it will probably be removed to Halifax, where a sufficient supply of hogs can generally be obtained. It is desired by getting hogs sent by rail at four cents per pound, while raising should be profitable, especially where the freight and commissions can be saved.

Grand Central Change Proprietor. The Grand Central Hotel has been sold by the proprietor, Mr. E. G. Langley, to Mr. William Gosdy, of Kestville, and the change of ownership will take place on the 15th inst. Mrs. M. Langley has conducted the business for the past fourteen years, and during that time has made many improvements from time to time, and has been very successful in the trade. She has been very popular with the travelling public, and now retires to her home in Kestville. The new proprietor, Mr. Gosdy, has been in the hotel business for many years, and is a well known and popular figure in the town. He will continue to conduct the hotel in the same manner as his predecessor, and will no doubt continue to be a success in the business.
