T our Sunday Afternoon Gospel Service, Sept. 16th, in the west end rooms an interesting bit of information was volun-

teered by Rev. Chas. Duff, who delivered a most practical Gospel address, on the Benefit of forgiveness of Sins; after expressing the great joy he experienced on account of the progress of Railway Y. M. C. A. work, going on at present here, and at many other places; he stated—that he might claim to be father of it in Toronto, for he taught a Bible Class of G. T. R. Men, in Brock St. Temperance Hall, in 1860-61. When he was leaving Toronto the class presented him with a copy of Barnes notes in 11 volumes. The following is the inscription on the 1st volume:


