


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
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
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The Royal Family.

THE QUEEN.

VICTORIA, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, only daughter of His late Royal Highness Edward, Duke of Kent, and Victoria, late Duchess of Kent, daughter of Francis, Duke of Saxe Cobourg ; born the 24th May, 1819 ; succeeded to the Throne on the decease of her Uncle, William IV., June 20th, 1837 ; Proclaimed Jane 21st, 1837 ; Crowned June 28th, 1838 ; Married February 10th, 1840, to Field Marshal His Royal Highness Prince Albert Augustus Charles Emanuel, Prince of Saxe Cobourg and Gotha, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, &c., &c., who died at Windsor Castle, December 14th, 1861.

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ECLIPSES.

I.—On the 10th of April, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon. At Quebec, it begins at 11 in the evening, and ends at 46 minutes past midnight. At Toronto, it begins at 28 minutes past 10, and ends 14 minutes past midnight.

II.—On the 25th of April, there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, visible in South America and Africa, but not visible in any part of North America.

III.—On the 4th of October, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon in the evening, visible. The beginning occurs before the Moon rises. At Quebec, the middle of the Eclipse occurs at 5.55, and ends there 6.56. At Toronto, it ends 6.24.

IV.—On the 19th of October, there will be an Eclipse of the Sun, visible as a partial Eclipse, but also as Annular in some parts of North America. At Montreal, it begins at 8.57 morning, and ends 7 minutes past noon. At Toronto, it begins at 8.29 and ends 11.36 in the morning. The ring-like appearance not seen in Canada.

PLANETS.

Until March the 18th, Jupiter will be morning star; then evening star until December 31st. Jupiter forms no conjunction this year with Venus, Mars, or Saturn. Mars will be an evening star until November 11th, then morning star the rest of the year. Until January 19th, Saturn will be a morning star, then evening star until October 26th, then morning star the remainder of the year. Venus, as an evening star, will be brilliant 1st April, and as a morning star, 13th of June.

Note.—There are fifty-three Sundays in the year 1865.

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

Letter Rates.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Province, pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per half-ounce, but if posted unpaid, are charged 7 cents per half-ounce.

On letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per half-ounce, with optional prepayment.

The rate on letters to the United Kingdom will be—

By Canadian Packet.....12½ cents per half-ounce.

By Cunard Packet.....17 cents per half-ounce.

If a letter exceed 1 ounce in weight, it will be liable to *four* rates, as, after the first ounce, fractions are not recognized, the rate progressing by the ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling in addition to the deficient postage on delivery in England.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction,—“By Canadian Packet,” or “By British Packet,”—and in that case, they are kept over for the packet designated. “By Canadian Mail” is not a distinctive superscription; for any mail for Canada is a “Canadian Mail,” by whatever packet forwarded.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions, beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, *viz.* England, must be prepaid.

The rate on letters for the United States, 10 cts. per half-ounce.

The rate on letters for British Columbia, 10 cts., to be prepaid.

The rate on letters for Red River, 10 cts. per half-ounce, which must be prepaid.

The rate on letters for the following destinations, per Canadian Ocean Steamers, is 23 cents per half-ounce, and must be prepaid:—

Africa (West Coast of); Australia (including all the Colonies embraced in this general name); Ceylon, Egypt, Gibraltar, Gold Coast, India, Liberia, Malta, Mauritius, Monte Video, New Zealand, Sierra Leone, Spain, Tasmania, West Indies (British). The rate to Buenos Ayres, is 35 cents the half ounce.

The postage upon letters for the following places has recently been increased to 35 cents per half-ounce, *viz.* :—Cape of Good Hope, Ascension, St. Helena, Natal, Surinam, Hayti.

The rate to Belgium, 19 cents the half-ounce.

The rate to Holland, 17 cents the half-ounce.

For the principal German States, the rate is 23 cents per half-ounce.

For France and Algeria, 17 cents per quarter-ounce.

On letters to the above destinations, forwarded by the Cunard line of steamers, an additional charge of 5 cents per half-ounce becomes necessary.

Registration Charges.—For the registration of a letter addressed to any place in British North America, the charge is 2 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United Kingdom, 12½c.

For the registration of a letter to the United States, 5c.

France, and other countries for which letters pass through France, an amount equal to the postage.

Miscellaneous Charges.—The charge on parcels, by Parcel Post, to any place in Canada, is 25 cents per lb. [with 5 cents additional, if registered]. No parcel must exceed three pounds in weight.

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars, prices-current, hand-bills, and other printed matter of a like character; and on books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office, addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charges upon prices-current, when addressed to the United Kingdom, is 2 cents each, and must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Postage Rates on certain Miscellaneous Matter passing within the Province of Canada, or to and from the United States:—

1.—Packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions, or

grafts, may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Province, or to an address within the United States, on prepayment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce; and when received from the United States, addressed to any place in Canada, such packages may be delivered on payment, by the person addressed, of a like rate.

2.—The limit of weight for such packages will be one pound. No communication, whether written or printed, must be enclosed in them; and they must be so put up as to be easy of examination, for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags, the bags must be simply tied at the neck, so as to admit of inspection; and, in the case of such packages mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents, such as "Seeds," "Roots," &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender, as a statement of the claim to pass at the reduced rate hereby made applicable to such matter.

3.—Book manuscript, and printers' proof-sheets (whether corrected or not), maps, prints, drawings, engravings, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass), and sheet music (whether printed or written), may pass in covers open at the ends or sides, and provided that no letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter, be enclosed therein, on prepayment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed-matter rate of one cent per ounce; or upon payment of that rate on delivery on such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Transmission of Books, Patterns of Merchandise, and Samples, between Canada and the United Kingdom:—

4.—On and from the 1st January next, patterns of merchandise, and samples, may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom, by the Canadian Packet Mails, at book-post rates, and subject to the following conditions:—

A The patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or article sent as a pattern or sample be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

B The patterns, &c., must be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck; but bags closed against inspection, although transparent, must not be used for the purpose.

C There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, the manufacturer's or trade mark and number, and price of the article.

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D Any infringement of the above regulations will render the packet liable to be treated and charged as a letter.

E The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any article likely to injure the contents of the mail-bags, will apply to patterns and samples; and any package transgressing this rule is to be sent to the Postmaster General.

5.—The book-post rate between Canada and the United Kingdom remains unaltered, at 7 cents for a packet weighing not more than 4 ounces.

For a packet exceeding 4 oz., and not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ lb.... 12½c.

Ditto	$\frac{1}{2}$ lb.,	"	1 lb.... 25c.
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Ditto	1 lb.,	"	1½lb.... 37½c.
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And so on, adding 12½ cents for each additional half-pound, or fraction of half-pound weight. These charges must be prepaid.

6.—No prints or printed matter will be allowed to pass by book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper, parchment, or vellum.

Book Post with France.—For a packet of printed matter, or single newspaper, book, &c., not over 2 ounces..... 4 cents.

Ditto, exceeding 2 ounces, and not over 4 ounces.....	8 "
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Ditto, " 4 ounces, " 8 ounces.....	17 "

The Book-Post Regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance, by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering post office:—

For a paper published 6 times a week.... 2s. per qr., or 40 cents

" " 3 times a week.... 1s. "	20 "
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" " 2 times a week.... 8d. "	13 "
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" " 1 time a week.... 4d. "	6½ "
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When the above rates are not paid in advance, by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

Transient Newspapers.—Transient newspapers, that is to say, Canadian Newspapers, posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or reposted in Canada, must be prepaid one cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded; except only *British newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers and news-agents, such papers pass free, as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mail.

Newspapers by Mail from England or United States.—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet Mails, are charged 2 cents each on delivery. [This is the American transit charge.]

United-States newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

Periodicals passing by Mail in Canada:—

1.—The rate on all periodicals, other than newspapers, passing by mail in Canada, save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, and such as are exempted from postage by statute, will henceforth be one cent per 4 ounces weight of package containing periodical matter, whether the package contain one or more numbers.

2.—Any fraction of 4 ounces to be charged as a full rate.

3.—On periodicals posted from the office of publication, or by news-agents or booksellers, to regular subscribers *within the Province*, this rate may remain to be collected on delivery, and must in such cases be marked upon the packages and charged in the letter-bills; but when mailed to go out of the Province, such periodical matter must be prepaid by postage stamp. British and United-States periodicals may be posted in Canada by news-agents and booksellers to regular subscribers in the Province under this regulation.

4.—Transient periodical matter posted in Canada must in all cases be prepaid by postage stamp.

5.—The above rate will be payable *on delivery* on all periodical matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

Canadian Periodicals, posted for United Kingdom by Canadian Packets:—

6.—Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, may be posted, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom *by Canadian Packet*, on prepayment by postage stamp of two cents each number.

7.—This rate will be applicable to all classes of Canadian periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom, the exemption to which certain classes of Canadian periodicals are entitled, extending to such numbers only as are addressed from the office of publication within the Province.

Postage Stamps.—Postage Stamps, of the respective values of 1 cent for newspapers; 2 cents for prices-current for the United Kingdom; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United-States rate; 12½ cents for Canadian packet; and 17 cts. for Cunard packet,—are provided for sale to the public.

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Letter Envelopes, impressed with Medallion Stamp, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage, to the amount of 5 and 10 cents respectively, are furnished for sale to the public at the following rates:—

The 5-cent Envelope, at the rate of \$5.50 per 100, or 66 cents per dozen.

The 10-cent Envelope, at \$10.50 per 100, or \$1.26 per dozen.

Penal Clause.—The Act contains the following penal clause:—To inclose a letter, or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers), shall be a misdemeanor.

Money Orders on Canada.—All the Money-Order Post Offices in Canada are authorized to draw Money Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz.:—

On Orders up to \$10.....	5 cents.
On Orders over \$10, and up to \$20.....	10 "
On Orders over \$20, and up to \$40.....	20 "
On Orders over \$40, and up to \$60.....	30 "
On Orders over \$60, and up to \$80.....	40 "
On Orders over \$80, and up to \$100.....	50 "

Money Orders on the United Kingdom.—The Canadian Money Order Offices also draw upon all the Money-Order Offices in England, Ireland, and Scotland, and the Channel Islands, for any sum up to £10 sterling, and grant as many Orders for £10 sterling each, as may be needed to make up the amount to be remitted. The terms are as under:—

On Orders up to £2	25 cents.
On Orders over £2, and up to £5.....	50 "
On Orders over £5, and up to £7.....	75 "
On Orders over £7, and up to £10.....	\$1.00.

Money Orders on the Lower Provinces.—The Canadian Money Order Offices draw also upon all Money-Order Offices in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland. The Orders, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in Sterling money, and for sums up to £10 sterling. The terms are:—

For Orders up to £5	25 cents.
For Orders over £5, and up to £10	50 cents.

The Money-Order Post Offices are furnished with lists of all the Money-Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland; and the postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to such issues as the intending remitters may desire.

Table of Prohibitions.—The following articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of fifty pounds, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found:—Books, Drawings, Paintings, and Prints, of an immoral or indecent character; Coin, base or counterfeit.

Free for Use of Her Majesty's Army in Canada.—Silver or plated Ware, Glassware, China Ware, Table Linen, and Cigars, for the use of any regimental mess of officers serving in Canada.

The phrase, "All importations for the use of Her Majesty's Army and Navy, or for the public uses of the Province," is by the last Act, interpreted to mean, that such importations are only free when the duty, otherwise payable thereon, would be borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or this Province.

NEW STAMP ACT.

An Act to impose Duties on Promissory Notes and Bills of Exchange.

P R E A M B L E.

WHEREAS it is necessary to increase the Provincial Revenue, and for that purpose to impose and provide for the collection of the Duty hereinafter mentioned: Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Duties Imposed—Instruments under \$100 exempt—Instruments made, drawn, or accepted after 1st August, 1864, only affected—Rates on Bills, &c., executed singly, in duplicate, triplicate, and otherwise.

I. Upon and in respect of every promissory note, draft, or bill

of exchange, for an amount not less than one hundred dollars, made, drawn, or accepted in this Province, on or after the first day of August, in the present year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, there shall be levied, collected, and paid to Her Majesty, for the public uses of the Province, the duties herein-after mentioned, that is to say:—

On each such promissory note, and on each such draft or bill of exchange, executed singly, a duty of three cents, for the first hundred dollars of the amount thereof, and a further duty of three cents for each additional hundred dollars or fraction of a hundred dollars of the amount thereof;

On each such draft or bill of exchange executed in duplicate, a duty of two cents on each part for the first hundred dollars of the amount thereof, and a further duty of two cents for each additional hundred dollars or fraction of a hundred dollars of the amount thereof;

On each such draft or bill of exchange executed in more than two parts, a duty of one cent on each part for the first hundred dollars of the amount thereof, and a further duty of one cent for each additional hundred dollars or fraction of a hundred dollars of the amount thereof;

And any interest made payable at the maturity of any bill, draft, or note, with the principal sum, shall be counted as part of the amount thereof.

Duty to be paid by affixing Adhesive Stamp—Stamp to be defaced by maker, drawer, acceptor, or first endorser, and how.

II. The duty on any such promissory note, draft, bill of exchange, or part thereof, shall be paid by affixing thereto an adhesive stamp or adhesive stamps of the kind hereinafter mentioned, to the value of such duty, upon which the signature or part of the signature of the maker or drawer, or in the case of a draft or bill made or drawn out of this Province of the acceptor or first indorser in this Province, or his initials, or some integral or material part of the instrument shall be written, so as (as far as may be practicable) to identify each stamp with the instrument to which it is attached, and to show that it has not before been used, and to prevent its being thereafter used for any other instrument.

Meaning of Bill of Exchange or Draft—Letters of Credit, and certain kinds of Receipts chargeable.

III. Every bill, draft, order, or instrument,—

For the payment of any sum of money by a bill or promissory note, whether such payment be required to be made to the bearer or to order;

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Every document usually termed a letter of credit, or whereby any person is entitled to have credit with, or to receive from or draw upon any person for any sum of money;

And every receipt for money, given by any bank or person, which shall entitle the person paying such money or the bearer of such receipt to receive the like sum from any third person;

shall be deemed a bill of exchange or draft chargeable with the duty under this Act.

Commissariat and Government Bills, &c., Bank-notes, Post-office Orders, Municipal Debentures, and Coupons exempted.

IV. Every bill of exchange, draft, or order drawn by any officer of Her Majesty's Commissariat, or by any other officer in Her Majesty's Imperial or Provincial service, in his official capacity, or any acceptance or endorsement by such officer on a bill of exchange drawn out of Canada, or any draft of or on any bank payable to the order of any such officer in his official capacity as aforesaid, or any note payable on demand to bearer, issued by any chartered bank of this Province, or by any bank issuing such note under the Act, Chapter 55, of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, intituled, *An Act respecting Banks and Freedom of Banking*, shall be free from duty under this Act.

Any cheque upon any chartered bank or licensed banker, or on any savings bank, if the same shall be payable on demand;

Any post-office money order; and

Any municipal debenture or coupon of such debenture; shall be free of duty under this Act.

Preparation of Stamps—Value to appear thereon.

V. The Governor in Council may, from time to time, direct stamps to be prepared for the purposes of this Act, of such kinds and bearing respectively such device as he thinks proper, and may defray the cost thereof out of any unappropriated monies forming part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund; but the device on each stamp shall express the value thereof, that is to say, the sum at which it shall be reckoned in payment of the duties hereby imposed.

Sale of Stamps—Remuneration therefor.

VI. The Minister of Finance may appoint any postmasters, collectors of inland revenue, or other officers of the Government, to be the distributors of stamps under this Act, and may authorize any other persons to purchase stamps from such distributors to

sell again; and the Governor in Council may fix the remuneration to be allowed to such distributors, and the discount to be made to persons so purchasing to sell again; but such discount shall in no case exceed five per cent. on the value of such stamps, and shall not be allowed on any quantity less than one hundred dollars worth.

Governor in Council may declare if Instrument chargeable under this Act—Order may be Amended—Publication and Proof thereof.

VII. The Governor in Council may make such further regulations as he may deem necessary for carrying this Act into effect, and may, by any Order in Council, declare that any kind or class of instruments as to which doubts may arise, are or are not chargeable with any and what duty under this Act according to the true meaning thereof; and any Order in Council made under this Act may be explained, amended, or repealed by any other such order of later date; and any Order in Council under this Act shall be published, and may be proved, in the manner provided by the Act respecting duties of Customs, and the collection thereof, as to Orders in Council under that Act.

Stamp to be affixed by Maker or Drawer of Inland Bill, &c.—Acceptor or First Endorser of Foreign—Penalty for omission at time to Stamp sufficiently.

VIII. The stamp or stamps required to pay the duty hereby imposed shall, in the case of any promissory note, draft, or bill of exchange made or drawn within this Province, be affixed by the maker or drawer thereof, and, in the case of any draft or bill of exchange drawn out of this Province, by the acceptor thereof or the first indorser thereof in this Province; and such maker or drawer, acceptor or first indorser, failing to affix such stamp or stamps at the time of making, drawing, accepting, or indorsing such note, draft, or bill, or affixing stamps of insufficient amount, shall thereby incur the penalty hereinafter imposed, and the duty payable on such instrument, or the duty by which the stamps affixed fall short of the proper amount, shall be doubled.

Party to Bill not properly Stamped incurs Penalty of \$100—Instrument invalid—Subsequent party may pay Double Duty and make it valid—Defaulter not thereby released from Penalty.

IX. If any person within this Province makes, draws, accepts, indorses, signs, becomes a party to, or pays any promissory note, draft, or bill of exchange, chargeable with duty under this Act,

before such duty (or double duty, as the case may be) has been paid by affixing thereto the proper stamp or stamps, such person shall thereby incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and except only in case of the payment of double duty as hereinafter mentioned, such instrument shall be invalid and of no effect in law or in equity, and the acceptance or payment or protest thereof shall be of no effect; except that any subsequent party to such instrument or person paying the same, may, at the time of his so paying or becoming a party thereto, pay such double duty by affixing to such instrument a stamp or stamps to the amount thereof, or the amount of double the sum by which the stamps affixed fall short of the proper duty, and by writing his signature or part thereof or his initials on such stamp or stamps, in the manner and for the purposes mentioned in the second section of this Act; and such instrument shall thereby become valid, but no prior party, who ought to have paid the duty thereon, shall be released from the penalty by him incurred as aforesaid; and in suing for any such penalty, the fact that no part of the signature of the party charged with neglecting to affix the proper stamp or stamps is written over the stamp or stamps affixed to any instrument, shall be *prima facie* evidence that such party did not affix such stamp as required by this Act.

Using Stamp already used a Misdemeanor—Penalty, \$500.

X. If any person wilfully affixes to any promissory note, draft, or bill of exchange any stamp which has been previously affixed to any other, or used for the purpose of paying any duty under this Act or any other Act, or which has been in any way previously written upon or defaced, such person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall thereby incur a penalty of five hundred dollars.

Separate Penalty incurred by each person to Instrument not properly Stamped.

XI. The penalties hereinbefore imposed shall be incurred in respect of each such promissory note, draft, or bill of exchange, on which the duty or double duty hereby imposed is not paid as aforesaid, or to which a stamp, previously used, has been fraudulently affixed, whatever be the number of such instruments, executed, accepted, paid, or delivered, or offences committed on the same day; and a separate penalty to the full amount shall be incurred by each person committing such offence, whatever the number of such persons.

Penalties recoverable under Interpretation Act.

XII. The penalties imposed by the foregoing sections of this Act, shall be recoverable in the manner prescribed by the Inter-

pretation Act, in cases where penalties are imposed and the recovery is not otherwise provided for.

Forging Stamps, using or selling Forged Stamps, engraving or using Plate or Die without permission, tearing off Stamp from Instrument or removing Writing therefrom—Felony, punishable with Imprisonment for twenty-one years, and within Consolidated Statutes of Canada, cap. 94.

XIII. If any person forges, counterfeits, or imitates, or procures to be forged, counterfeited, or imitated, any stamp issued or authorized to be used for the purposes of this Act, or by means whereof any duty hereby imposed may be paid, or any part or portion of any such stamp; or knowingly uses, offers, sells, or exposes to sale, any such forged, counterfeited, or imitated stamp; or engraves, cuts, sinks, or makes any plate, die, or other thing whereby to forge, counterfeit, or imitate such stamp, or any part or portion thereof, except by permission of the Finance Minister or of some officer or persons who, under an Order in Council in that behalf, may lawfully grant such permission; or has possession of any such plate, die, or other thing, without such permission; or, without such permission, uses or has possession of any such plate, die, or thing lawfully engraved, cut, or made; or tears off, or removes from any instrument, on which a duty is payable under this Act, any stamp by which such duty has been wholly or in part paid; or removes from any such stamp any writing or mark indicating that it has been used for or towards the payment of any such duty,—such person shall be guilty of felony, and shall, on conviction, be liable to be imprisoned in the Provincial Penitentiary for any term not exceeding twenty-one years: and every such offence shall be forgery within the meaning and purview of chapter ninety-four of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, intituled, *An Act respecting Forgery*; and all the provisions of the Act shall apply to every such offence, and to principals in the second degree and accessories, as if such offence were expressly mentioned in the said Act.

Duties imposed to form part of Consolidated Fund, &c.

XIV. The duties imposed by this Act shall be duties within the meaning and purview of chapter sixteen of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, intituled, *An Act respecting the Collection and Management of the Revenue, the Auditing of Public Accounts, and the Liability of Public Accountants*, and the proceeds of the said duties shall form part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of this Province.

Grocers—£7 10s. per £100 on their rental.

Gas Works—an annual duty of £200.

Livery Stable Keepers—an annual duty of £20; on each two-wheeled carriage, 15s.; on each four-wheeled carriage, 20s.

Inn-keepers, having vehicles for the use and advantage of customers—for each two-wheeled carriage, 30s.; for each four-wheeled carriage, 40s.

Pawnbrokers—an annual duty of £50.

Hawkers, carrying a pack—an annual duty of £2.

Hawkers, using cart or vehicle—an annual duty of £5.

For each pleasure-horse, 30s.; for each working-horse, 12s. 6d. Horses daily and constantly employed in the owner's work or business, by which he gains his maintenance, to be considered working-horses.

Vehicles for hire—for each two-wheeled vehicle, 20s.; for each four-wheeled vehicle, 30s.

Stage-Coach, Omnibus, or Stage-Waggon—when drawn by one or two horses, 40s.; when drawn by four or more horses, 60s.

For each close carriage, or corresponding winter vehicle, £5; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or ditto, drawn by two horses, 60s.; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or ditto, drawn by one horse, 50s.; double dennet, &c., or ditto, 40s.; gig, caleche, spring cart, or ditto, 30s.; waggon or vehicle, not above specified, or winter vehicle, adapted for draught of two or more horses, 20s.

Dogs, 7s. 6d. each. (Sheltering, or permitting to resort, is keeping a dog.)

Theatres - an annual duty of £40 (above assessment) on the proprietor.

Proprietors of caravans of wild beasts, circuses, &c., to obtain permission from His Worship the Mayor, and pay £25 therefor, and \$10 for each subsequent day that the same is open.

Proprietor or proprietors of each steam ferry-boat plying from Laprairie or Longueuil, an annual duty of £50 currency.

Banks or bank agencies, annual duty of £100.

Fire insurance companies or agencies, annual duty of £50.

Marine insurance companies, annual duty of £25.

Brokers or money-changers, annual duty of £25.

Produce brokers, money-lenders, and commission merchants—an annual duty of £20.

Distillers, or agents of distillers—20 per cent. on the whole of the rental of business premises.

Brewers, or agents of brewers—15 per cent. on the whole of the rental of business premises.

Ball-alleys, skittle grounds, nine-pin alleys—an annual duty of £12 10s.

Brick-yards, an annual duty of £10.

Horse-dealers, an annual duty of £5.

TAXES COLLECTED BY THE CHIEF OF POLICE.

Each carter, cabman, &c., shall pay an annual duty to the Chief of Police, for registration and number, as follows:—For every cart or caleche, 10s.; ditto cab, whether two or four-wheeled, 15s.; ditto coach drawn by two horses, 30s.; ditto omnibus, 50s.; certificate to every master carter, 1s.; do. driver, 6d.

The Chief of Police also collects all assessments leviable on all horses and vehicles for which certificates of registry are applied for, viz.:—On each working horse, annually, 12s. 6d.; ditto two-wheeled vehicle for hire, 15s.; ditto four-wheeled ditto, 20s.; ditto stage coach, omnibus, or wagon, drawn by one or two horses, 40s.; ditto drawn by four or more horses, 60s.; each cart or sleigh drawn by one horse, conveying any kind of building materials into the city from the Banlieu, an annual duty of 5s., for registration and number; for each vehicle, under similar circumstances, drawn by two horses, 10s.; for each wagon or other four-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two horses, 20s.

Brickmakers, builders, or any person carting building materials in the city, an annual duty for registration, as follows:—For each two-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by one horse, 15s.; ditto, drawn by two horses, 20s.; for each wagon, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two or more horses, 20s.

All bakers, brewers, and distillers, and their agents, the following annual duty, for registration:—For each baker's two-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding sleigh, 40s.; ditto waggon, or ditto, 60s.; ditto brewer's or distiller's two or four wheeled vehicle, or corresponding sleigh, 60s.

Merchants, manufacturers, and traders, or other persons, using any cart, waggon, dray, or other vehicle, for the conveyance or delivery of goods, wares, effects, or merchandise of any kind whatsoever, to pay an annual duty for registration, as follows, viz. :—

For each and every two-wheeled cart, or other vehicle, and corresponding winter sleigh.....	\$8 00





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


