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### DEATH OF SIR RICHARD SCOTT REMOVES VETERAN STATESMAN HIS POLITICAL RECORD UNIQUE

Venerable Knight Had Served in More Federal and Provincial Governments Than Any Other Canadian of Present Day-Long Identified With Ottawa's Civic History.

OTTAWA, April 28 .- (Can. Press.) Sir Richard W. Scott, legislator, parliamentarian and administrator, e member of the Canadian Senate, and during his lifetime of more federal and provincial governments than any other living Canadian statesman, died at his late residence, 274 Daly avenue, this afternoon at 4 o'clock, after brief illness.

Eighty-eight years of age and described as the Nestor of Canadian Liberalism, the carried with him the esteem of a third generation of contemporaries. For Ottawans his death has an added significance of loss in that it marks the disappearance of a link with the early days of this city as well as a landmark of Canadian political history.

#### **INQUIRY CLOSED** DESPITE PROTEST

Opposition Members Wanted Public Accounts Committee to Continue Work.

HE WOULD NOT ANSWER

F. H. McGuigan Again Refused to Tell of Settlement

By voting down motions made by J. C. Elliott, West Middlesex, the public accounts committee of the legislature yesterday wound up its enquiries into the 1912 expenditure of the government. The opposition members fought tooth and nail for further sittings, claiming that certain men who were summoned to appear as witnesses had stayed away, feigning sickness. Mr. Elliott's amendment asked that a commission should be appointed by the committee to continue the enquiry, and that it should be given power to cross the line into the United States to take the evidence of P. W. Sothman, formerly chief engineer of the Hydro-Electric Commission, and J. Engh of New York and of C. L. DeMuralt of Ann Arbor, Mich.

In the argument that followed the proposal, T. W. McGarry (South Renfrew) bested the opposition members and exposed the plot which they had invented. He stated that he had learned that Mr. Sothman was not sick as he had stated when asked to attend the enquiry, that he was afraid to attend the enquiry and make the statement which he was reported to have made to certain individuals; that in New York he could make statements libelling Canadians without any fear of being tried for perjury, and that it was for the purpose of securing these libelous statements that the Liberals were anxious to cross the line to examine him. 

#### RECORD NUMBER OF IMMIGRANTS

More than 25 additional immigration steamships are how bringing immigrants from Europe to Canada than was the case last year. This was the statement made to The World yesterday by one of the leading immigration authorities of the Dominion, who stated that Canada was now rapidly gaining on the United States in immigration.

In figures of British immigration into the Province of Ontario this year, in which regard this province can show not only an increase of 50 per cent. over all previous years, but can show an increase four months of this year, during which period more than 15,500 persons from the British Isles have settled in Ontario

Among the new steamers are included: The French Line SS. Niagara, from Havre, and SS. Ruthenia; Austria-America, SS. Argentina, from Trieste; Canada Line SS. Belgic, from Rotterdam; Hamburg Liner Bremen and the steamships Willehed, Pelsa, Barcelona, Frankfort, Hanover and Waldersee.

A Big Increase.

It is estimated that the immigration to the United States this year will show a decrease of approximately 30 per cent., while it is now generally conceded that the immigration to Canada this year will be double that of any previous year. This has been the case since the beginning of the year, compared with the same period of other years, and every indication points to the continuance of a 50 per cent. increase in Canadian immigration right thru to the end of the year.

In this connection it is interesting to note that during this period it can be said at any time that three immigrantladen steamers are bound for Canada.

After that, the more, the better. Of course, the baby that sleeps in the open every day does not need to be wheeled about the dusty streets, except for the sake of exercising his mother. However, the day of shutting up weak babies in close, hot rooms is past, and the delicate child often requires more fresh air than the well child. 





MOTOR SPIRIT FROM COAL.

department of trade and commerce Mr. E. D. Arnand, Canadian commissioner at Bristol, refers to a motor spirit produced by a new methol of coal distillation, known as the Del Monte process. By it a spirit more Jonah efficient than ordinary petrol has been obtained that can be placed on the market at as low a price as 20 cents per gallon, or even less. This has been demonstrated during the last few weeks at two experimental plants, one, the larger, laid down at West Bromwich, and the other and smaller near London. The tests were conducted under the supervision of eminent chemists, engineers and colliery owners and proved so successful that the commissioner says the invention cannot be otherwise described than revo-

lutionary in its results. Writing on March 28 Mr. Arnand reported that the spirit had for some days previous been subjected to exhaustive trials. Two cars were driven by it from London to Brighton, thence survive. to Worthing and back to London, the route selected being a hilly and trying one. This and further experiments on other roads have demonstrated that a gallon of the new fuel will, on an average, carry an ordinary car 31/2 miles further than a gallon of the best petrol. The invention consists of a specially designed retort, by which all the oils that coal contains are extracted cheaply and efficiently. Ten million tons of coal it is calculated will supply all the motor spirit needed in Britain and place the motor industry in an independent position. #### WANTS PRESENT SYSTEM TO STAY

Home Smith Says Taxation Scheme Is a Square Deal.

TAX ON LAND VALUES

He Would Levy an Increment Tax and Appoint Com-

One hundred members of the board of trade conference committee attended a luncheon at McConkey's yesterday, when R. Home Smith gave an address on "Assessment Reform."

In his opinion as a land owner, the present system of taxation is a square deal, and he is perfectly satisfied and wants it to continue as it is. As for the 25 per cent. exemption, he claims it would tend to stimulate a building boom, and that is not what is wanted.
"What we want in this country is gradual, healthy growth, and not stimulation," he said. "The idea under the 25 per cent. off improvements, is to encourage building; now, who wants to do that when we are face to face with a famine in labor, material and

"In the cities of the west, they have

"In the cities of the west, they have stimulated building thru exemption from taxes, but I venture to say that within three years Calgary, Edmonton and Vancouver will be back in the same position as Toronto is today.

Need More Money.

"The municipalities are starving today, we have not got enough money. We have to do a great deal more in the future than we have in the past. One hundred million dollars could be spent today to advantage in this city. We have to improve on parks, sewers, slums, and besides, Toronto needs more schools and needs better medical care in them. are in them.

"It is an absolute duty to provide for these matters, and what is pro-posed is that realty owners evade this

posed is that realty owners evade this responsibility to the extent of 25 per cent. of the value of their improvements," said Mr. Smith.

One of his proposals was to levy an increment tax on land values. He also suggested that a commission be appointed to investigate and report on how increment tax on land values should be treated with reference to taxation.







#### BASEBALL NOT A MINT SAYS PHILLIES' LEADER

Many Clubs, Both Major and Minor, Dropped Money Thru Big Salaries.

NEW YORK, April 23.—"If a congressional investigating committee is appointed to look into the affairs of organized basebali," deciared W. H. Look, the new president of the Philadelphia National League Club, "the interesting fact will be made public that fifty per cent. of the major league clubs and seventy-five per cent. of the minor league clubs lost money last season. This was due to the high Salafles paid to the players and the heavy traveling expenses, coupled with the big money spent in rebuilding ball parks.

"The major leagues have contracted to pay nearly \$1,000,000 in salaries this season. Under the provisions of the national agreement, the players must receive every dollar, no matter how much the clubs may lose. Each club stands on its own bottom. There is no syndicate ownership, and neither the National nor American League is incorporated.

"As for the so-called reserve rule, professional baseball would become chaotic without it, it prevents the clubs in the larger cities from enticing away valuable players from the smaller and weaker clubs. If the clubs should outbid one another for starts every year, it would not be long before New York and Chicago would control the best men in the market.







## Stock Markets in Doldrums---Public Interest is

#### **SPECULATION AT** LOW EBB AGAIN

Into Rut and Changes Are Small.

Denial of Merger Sends Shares

on Down Grade-General List Steady. Speculative interest in the Toronto

Stock Exchange ebbed away again yesterday, and the session proved the most apathetic in weeks. The move most apathetic in weeks. The movements in the specialites which served to brighten up the recent action of the list had ceased for the time being, and the narrow price swings in the general favorites were absolutely without feature. The undertone was slightly easier on the whole, a few scattered declines at the close evidencing the fact that liquidation was still going on.

Such stocks as Toronto Railway, Brazilian and the Mackays, which are the usua! leaders in any broad movement, were dull in the extreme. The street has lost interest in the proposed deal between the city and the Mackenzie interests for the moment, the general idea being that, until a clearer view of the proposition can be obtained, the shares have had their fling. Meanwhile traders are keeping their fingers on the pulse of the matter, however, and any developments will be reflected in the market in short order. Rails held between 1451-4 and 1453-4 yesterday, the top price indicating a gain of 3-8 over the close, but the final cuotations were absolutely unchanged for the day, being 1451-2 asked, 145 bid.

Restricted Changes.

The Montreal report to the effect that President Carruthers of the R. and O. had denied any rumors of a proposed merger between the St. Lawrence Navigation and the Richelien, was reilected in a sharp decline in the former stock which opened at

Strong northwest markets lent support to prices here, Winnipeg being especially strong and Minneapolis and Duluth also showing up well. Primary receipts of wheat today were 484,000 bushels, against 248,000 last year.
