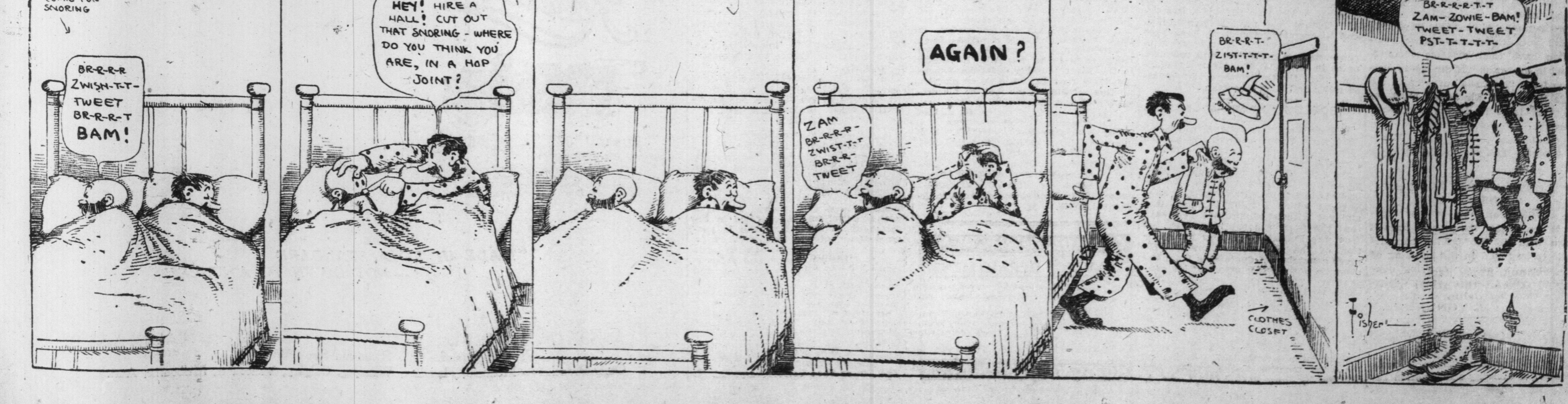

Minister of finance under grave suspicion, and that the whole transaction was infamously done.

Mr. Fielding said it was his intention to reply to the statements of the member for N. Algoma, but as the matter was so personal to himself, he decided to make a statement and then withdraw from the issue.

Mr. Fielding said that this friend continued to press the matter, on the ground that the finance minister was getting old, but he remained obdurate.

Mr. Fielding said that he had suggested that, should the time come when he might be out of office, he might care to know who had been his friends, but he was informed that even under such circumstances it was not proposed to reveal to him the names of the subscribers.

Ungenerous Comments. The finance minister then went on to say that before the testimonial had been actually presented some ungenerous comments had been made by members of the house and in the press.

Mr. Fielding then bowed to the speaker and walked out of the chamber amidst Liberal cheers.

Asked General Verdict. When court resumed at 11 o'clock, Mr. Justice Eddell submitted a list of 31 questions to the jury.

Conditions Were Made Plain. Continuing, Sir Wilfrid asked who would blame the finance minister if he thought of his wife and family when the occasion was given to him.

'T WAS GREATEST NIGHT THE OLD TOWN EVER SAW

Weston Pays Tribute to Her First Citizen—County Council Go Out in a Body.

WESTON, Jan. 31.—(Special.)—Many a festive gathering has been held within the four walls of the old town hall, but never in the history of this municipality has one so manifestly actuated by deep-seated love and respect as that tendered to-night by the citizens' committee to Robert J. Bull, warden-elect of the County of York. It was a rare tribute to a worthy citizen and, more than all else, it showed what a firm hold "Bob" Bull has on the hearts of, not alone his colleagues in the broad sphere of municipal life, but alike among his nearby friends and neighbors. They love him most who know him best.

Accompanied practically by every member of the county council, with the exception of Messrs. Paterson and Coulson (detained thru indisposition), the warden came out on the 8:45 p.m. C.P.R. train, and was met at the station by an immense torchlight procession, together with the town band, the whole forming a triumphal body guard and marching to the town hall, where the banquet was held.

Duffin Hall, under the deft hands of the ladies and others, had been transformed into fairyland, the walls and platform having been lavishly decorated with flags and bunting, while hanging on the walls were two life-like portraits of William Tyrrell, the first warden, with the figures 1864 beneath, and R. J. Bull, 1911—the only two wardens Weston has ever possessed. No wonder they captivated the eyes of seven years without a real live warden!

The tables fairly groaned under the weight of good things prepared by Miss Host Armstrong and Mrs. Armstrong, whose reputation as caterers is now provincial. Last night's spread detracted nothing from their standing.

George W. Verall, that prince of good fellows, and by the way, the chairman of the reception committee, was in the chair, and seated to right and left respectively were W. H. Pugsley, T. H. Lennox, M.L.A., W. F. Maclean, M.P., Dr. Godfrey, M.L.A., ex-Warden George S. Heby, ex-Warden Keith, ex-Warden George Arthur Pugsley, Dr. Charlton and George H. Gooderham, M.L.A. "We are out for a good time," said Chairman Verall, "and let us cut ourselves loose!"—And they did.

Fully 124 sat down to the luncheon, and following that the toast list—and it was a big one—was taken up. "The King" was followed by that of "Canada," proposed by H. J. Alexander and associated with the names of W. F. Maclean, M.P., Dr. Godfrey, M.L.A., T. Herbert Lennox, M.L.A., and Reeve Pugsley.

The member for South York paid a glowing tribute to Warden Bull, whom he characterized as a man of sterling worth, beloved of every man with whom his business relations had identified him, and one who would do in infinite credit to the high office of warden.

Dealing in general with matters national, Mr. Maclean referred briefly to the proposed reciprocity treaty. He declared that the freedom of trade between the two countries might, under certain conditions, be found mutually advantageous. He ought to come rather as the free act of the two nations than as a trade arrangement, "I am free to admit that I have little faith as to the value of the suggested changes," he said.

"I take the ground," said the member for South York, and the sentiment evoked the most enthusiastic cheering. That nationality is an infinitely greater thing than trade or benefit, and let us not forget that our duty is loyalty to ourselves and the motherland, of which we form an integral part."

Godfrey, M.L.A., responded in fitting terms, paying a high tribute to the warden, but eschewing wholly matters political.

W. H. Pugsley dealt with matters municipal, and referring to the limited resources of the west, counseled care in the selection of immigrants. Herbert Lennox, M.L.A., met with a royal reception and a brilliant and witty speech, replete with humor, delighted the big crowd from start to finish.

Rio was taken in hand early in the morning and large transactions carried it up two points, making a new high record price for the shares, one lot of 50 shares selling as high as 104 1/2. The demand for Mackay was thought to have emanated from New York, at which exchange there was good buying of shares early in the day. At this Toronto market the opening transaction was 2 1/2, and the price advanced to 9 1/2 before profit-taking had its usual effect.
