Yet of 52 barred rock pullets of the bred-to-lay type, 13, or nearly 25 per cent, surpassed this high mark. The top record was 282, the showing of the first half dozen being 282, 268, 256, 252, 243, an average of 259.5 at a year.

"An experiment was carried on with a view to a comparison between 23 bred-to-lay pullets and 23 exhibition pullets. The bred-to-lay pullets laid 1032 eggs more than the exhibition variety and at the same time consumed appreciably less food. On the other hand, the exhibition type were larger, weighing six to eight pounds each in comparison to five to six for the brel-to-lay mature more quickly and reach a six-pound weight in a shorter time. 





Development of East End Subdivisions Employing Small Army of Men - Roads

Thru Forest Trees

Two wide yellow slashes up a tree covered hill that rises up from the Kingston-road northward to Gerrardst, catch the attention of every passerby. The slashes are roadways being cut up thru Glenmount Park.

Near the Kingston-road, where a shallow ravine can be seen, these yellow streaks widen out. The sandy earth being cut from the brow of the hill is being taken down to fill in the roads at the ravine. It is a great undertaking, and one on which men were employed all winter, and during the spring, and at present, eighty men and over a dozen teams.

The work is but a part of the operation of developing Glenmount Park for high class homes that the owners, w. N. McEachren & Sons, are carrying out. One of the roadways, eventually to be a boulevard, is 75 feet wide. At the creat of the hill, which is the highest point in the east end, the road cuts deep so that the grade is eased down the terraced hill. After the grading of these two main roads and of the cross streets is finished, water pipes will be put in, to be followed by sewers and gas. A systematic sewage disposal plan for the whole of the east end that is this year opening up on East Gerrard-st., around Woodbineave, is now being worked out by the civic authorities. They have some difficulties to overcome owing to the fact that here the high level that runs all sound the city, juts southward almost above the lake. Besides the district is ravined. Arrangements. for all these services, as well as for permanent roadway, will be made by McEachren's. The idea of selling a subdivision is to improve and develop it first, not to market it and leave it in a raw state and let the lot buyers bear the burden of making it suitable for house building. and this, with the construction of the Gerrard-st, car line, on which rails are being laid and grading being completbeing laid and grading being completed, gives the district an air of activity strangely different from last summer, when most of it was natural woodland, and Gerrard-st. was as quiet—and as pretty—as a country lane. The fall of 1913 will see the entire district along Gerrard- car line built upon, and an attractive class of homes. Several ten thousand dollar residences are planned for the district, and most of the land restricted to solid brick.

The properties, such as the two of McEachren's, in this section show what should be done in the way of planning and improving subdivision offerings for retailing. There could be little criticism if the same attention was given to other subdivisions being

was given to other subdivisions being placed upon the market. This firm, by the way, is selling these properties at prices that compare very well with those of land in equally accessible parts of the city, and there are few spots around Toronto of equal scenic beauty.

Rio and Sao Paulo Hold Their Advance Well - Industrial Stocks Improve - Broad Speculation Under Way.

The former started off rather poorly, dropping rapidly in the early trading until about two points of its advance had disappeared. Substantial buying was under way, however, and once the drastic liquidation was disposed of, the price rallied sharply, almost regaining its record figure of the day before. The range for the day was 125 7-8 to 127 7-8. Sao Paulo dropped back to 213 at the opening, but recovered a point of its loss later on.

Strength in some of the industrials was the real feature of the market. Prominent in this connection were B. C. Packers common, which attained and a newhigh record at 97, Russell preferred, which gained two at 111 1-4, Maple Leaf and Steel Corporation. General Electric was also slightly firmer at 108, and the rights made their first appearance in the trading list. An interesting feature was a sale of Black Lake common at 1.

STEEL IN LEAD

MONTREAL, May 2.—Dominion Steel came to the forefront again to-day and advanced sharply to within 1-3 of the high level touched last week 1-8 of the high level touched last week. The last sale was at 61 3-4, a net gain of 15-8 for the day. Gossip was that a large proportion of the orders have been placed from abroad.
