FINAL REFUSAL BY GOVERNMENT

Will Not Appoint Board of Conciliation as Asked by Carriers.

SENDS LONG STATEMENT Impossible to Hand Over Functions to an Outside Body.

Ottawa, July 28.—Hon. C. J. Doherty, acting prime minister, has sent to the secretaries of the boards of trade at all points where the letter carriers have not returned to work, a telegram in which the appointment of a board of conciliation is finally and definitely refused.

government to appoint conciliation board that it is obviously impossible for government to hand over its functions to any outside body.

"The government in performance of these functions has always been ready to hear and endeavor to equitably adjust any claim made on behalf of any employees in the civil service. It has, as above stated, expressed its readiness to do this in connection with the present men's claims. It has appointed a sub-committee, composed of Sir Thomas White, Messrs. Maclean, Calder, Carroll, Robertson and Blondin, and notified the secretary of the federation that that committee is now ready to take the matter up at once with the men's representatives. It cannot consistently with its duty submit the determination or fixing of civil service salaries to a conciliation or arbitration board. The men must accept this as absolutely final. There will be no conciliation or arbitration board, but the government will give every opportunity for the fullest possible hearing and deal with claims made upon their merits. As regards employees in the west, it may be pointed out that those in receipt of the minimum wage are actually receiving more than the minimum wage which the men asked to have fixed, and those in receipt of the maximum wage are receiving within a few dollars of the maximum asked, and if any allowance be made, as some certainly should be made, for the fact that the men in the maximum class are also receiving as much or more than the maximum asked.

"The position taken seems to be that the men are out on strike to maintain the absolutely inadmissible contention that the salaries in the civil service are to be determined neither by parliament nor by the government, but by an outside body absolutely irresponsible

to parliament. This is clearly inconsistent with the simplest principles of our system of government. It cannot be too clearly stated nor too clearly understood that the proposal of a conciliation board is impossible of acceptance and will not be accepted.

Railway Shopmen Threaten. Calgary, Alta., July 28.—Mayor Costello has conveyed by telegram an appeal to the Ottawa authorities that a conciliation board be granted in the postal dispute.

The mine workers of district 18 have endorsed the stand of the striking employees, and the railway shopmen here threaten to strike if the government does not appoint a conciliation board.

The Calgary Ministerial Association passed a resolution on Monday, that the government to grant a conciliation board. The postmen of Lethbridge are still on strike.

WINNIEG STRIKE STILL ON. Men Have Rejected Proposal That They Return to Work for Ten Days.

Winnipeg, Man., July 28.—The Winnipeg postoffice strike is still effective. A mass meeting of strikers Saturday night rejected the proposal that the men return to work for ten days, during which time the Winnipeg civil authorities and the board of trade would use their efforts and influence to obtain for the postoffice employees the board of conciliation for which they are striking. The attitude of the striking carriers and postal clerks still is "no compromise."

Hereafter the only combatant American troops were aviators, and the appearance of this large body of fighting men from the United States at the present moment has occasioned the greatest satisfaction.

PREPARED FOR TROUBLE. New German Ambassador to Russia Takes His Guard With Him.

London, July 27.—Dr. Hefferich, the newly-appointed German ambassador to Russia, started for Moscow Friday, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Amsterdam. On the same train went a battalion of German soldiers. Dr. Hefferich, former vice-chancellor, takes the place of Count von Mirbach, who was assassinated in Moscow early in July.

RECRUITING PACTS GO IN FORCE SOON

United States Ratifies Treaties With Canada and Britain Tuesday.

Washington, July 28.—Ratification of the British and Canadian recruiting treaties with the United States will be exchanged in London next Tuesday. From July 31 to Sept. 28 both inclusive British subjects in the United States, including declarants who are of present United States draft age, have last chance of enlisting, if they wish, in the British and Canadian armies. After September 28 they become liable to compulsory service, under the draft law, in the United States army.

KILLED BY MOTOR CAR. Cyclist Run Over Near Galt in Early Hours of the Morning.

Galt, July 28.—Albert James Norris, aged 23, was killed early this morning on the Stone road, about 2 1/2 miles from Galt, when he was run over by a car driven by M. A. Record, K.C., of this city. Mr. Record, with his wife and two other ladies, was returning from Hamilton between one and two o'clock. Norris was cycling home and from what can be learned appears to have been on the wrong side of the road. The wheels of the car passed over the young man's groin, and he died shortly after admittance to the Galt Hospital. He had been employed for five years on the farm of Robert Arthur, near Branchton, and had no relatives in this country.

"Unworthy of Consideration."

We took The Industrial Banner to task last week for inaccuracies of statement. We regret that our contemporary, The News, leaves itself equally open to criticism.
