DOES THE CLINTON BOB

Goderich Bob Expects to Lead in West Huron.

SO DOES THE CLINTON BOB

Veteran Warriors of Both Sides Are in the Riding

And Next Tuesday Will Witness a Great Battle at Polls-Sir Chas. Tupper, Whip Taylor, Montague, McLaren and Others Are There to Help Bob. McLaren, While Hon. Messrs. Paterson, Mulock and Other Big Ones Are Booming Bob Holmes-Great Meeting Addressed by Sir Charles Tupper at Clinton Last Night.

Clinton, Feb. 15.-(Special.)-The bye-election in West Huron, which takes place on Tuesday next, between Robert Holmes of Clinton, the Reform candidate, and Robert McLaren of Goderich, the Conservative candidate, promises to be the most exciting and closest contest in the history of the riding. Both men are very popular and well known and for months, it might be said, they have canvassed the riding personally, excitement grows high. The bye-election here is "Which Bob will be the front Bob or the hind Bob?" The Conservatives say McLaren will be the front Bob.

Sir Charles Tupper on Hand. To-day the excitement is greatly intensified by the arrival at 10 o'clock of Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., accompanied by Dr. Montague, A. McLaren, M.P. for Perth, Robert McLaren, Goderich, the candidate, and many others who are guests at the Rattenburgh House.

Sir Charles Tupper held a reception from 4 to 6 o'clock, and a great many people from all parts of the riding took this advantage of shaking hands with the veteran and his party, and remarks of astonishment were made at his wonderful freshness for a man of 78 years. He has the mental and physical activity of a man 20 years younger.

Sir Charles Tupper's advance on West Huron is an inspiring proof of the vitality of body and mind. His presence here has further emboldened Mr. McLaren's supporters.

The Mass Meeting. To-night the Town Hall here is crowded to overflowing, and hundreds were unable to get in.

Mr. Thomas Jackson, the chairman, opened the meeting by a few remarks, after which he called upon Dr. Bruce, president of the Conservative Association, who made an appropriate address.

The Candidate's Speech. Mr. McLaren, the standard-bearer, made an appropriate speech on the cattle question, in which he referred in sarcastic tones to the assertion that the free trade that was promised with the United States had increased from 20 per cent. to 27 1/2 per cent.

A musical program was then rendered, after which the speaker of the evening, Sir Charles Tupper, rose to speak, and tremendous applause greeted his words.

Sir Charles Tupper's Speech. Sir Charles for two hours delighted the electors of this riding, and it was claimed by his associates to be one of the best speeches he had ever given.

From the Confederation in 1867, he reviewed the political history of Canada up to the present time, and Canada's prosperity to-day was due to the work of the Liberal party, who for 18 years by the N.E. built the Empire up to the present glorious state it is in to-day, in spite of the 28 years of continuous opposition by the Reform party.

HAVE WE THE BEST

A Leading Anglo-Canadian in London Declares He Will Not Support Any Other

IN THE FAST STEAMSHIP SERVICE.

To Have a Second-Rate Lot of Ships Would Be Childish and Fall of Results.

Montreal, Feb. 15.-(Special.)-Mr. Dobbell's visit to England is, for reasons which are difficult to understand, arousing much anxiety in Anglo-Canadian circles, that the Canadian Government should be preparing to lower the standard of the projected fast service. Sir William VanHorne's recent speech at Quebec has been much commented on, and awakens an emphatic echo. 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"THREE STRIKES AND OUT."

Speculators Have Been Making Things Hum in Montreal During the Last Month.

WAR EAGLE WAS THE MOST ACTIVE

Toronto Street Railway Was Next, and the Profit-Taking was Extensive.

Montreal, Feb. 15.-(Special.)-It is no wonder that a seat in the Montreal Stock Exchange is worth \$10,000. During the last month the number of shares sold amounted to the large total of 44,018 contracts of 303,498 miscellaneous, 47,400 street railways and 1088 banks, and \$49,000 worth of bonds. By far the most active stock was War Eagle, of which 315,500 shares changed hands, and the variation in price was also notable, from \$3.05 to \$3.49, which meant \$136 in the pockets of the lucky investors.

The next most active stock was Toronto Street Railway, with 23,700 shares, and here again the advance was substantial, 8 1/2 points.

It follows closely with 20,000 shares to its credit, and a difference between highest and lowest of 7 points.

Domestic Canadian was next on the list, with 19,700 shares, and the gain of 7 1/2 points to its credit, and the latter with 9667 shares and an advance of 5 1/2 points.

It shows a turn-over of 1678 shares, and a difference between highest and lowest of 8 1/2 points.

Of Montreal Street Railway, 136 shares were sold at a variation of 1/4 points, and of new stock \$248 shares at a variation of 7 points.

Bank stocks, as usual, were comparatively quiet, the most active being Commerce, with 122 shares, Montreal with 206 shares, Merchants 144 shares and Johnsons with 220 shares.

In bonds the only active security was Colored Cotton, of which 387,000 worth were sold.

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THERE IS STILL HOPE.

Negotiations at Washington Not Yet Broken Off.

A PORT ON THE LYNN CANAL

Demanded by Lord Herschell and the Canadian Commissioners.

That is at Present the Critical Point, and the Americans are Resisting it in a Most Decided Way-Canadians Will Remain Firm a Long Time, but Americans "Will Use Every Means" to Overcome Their Demands.

Montreal, Feb. 15.-(Special.)-A special to The Herald from Washington, dated today, says: "Contrary to a fair expressed last night, the negotiations of the Joint High Commission were not broken off to-day. The full commission met in the morning, but the Canadian members remained only about five minutes. The American commissioners then went into conference, and remained until 12.15, when an adjournment was taken until 5 o'clock this afternoon. The full commission had adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

The Critical Point. The supreme question now is the demand of the Canadian members for a port on the Lynn Canal. It was feared last night that the negotiations might fall on account of this issue. Lord Herschell and the Canadian commissioners stand firm, and the Americans are resolutely decided that the demand shall not be granted.

The fact that the Canadian members met only a short time, is a strong indication that the Americans will hold two sessions before the joint meeting to-morrow, giving some idea of the seriousness of the point at issue.

"SCRAP IRON" DECISION.

Ontario Cities and Towns Are All After Fair Taxes From the Public Companies.

WANT ASSESSMENT LAW CHANGED So That the Plants Used by Them May be Assessed at Their Proper Value.

The members of the Ontario Cabinet were debated upon yesterday afternoon by a large deputation representing the principal cities and towns in Ontario to urge that legislation be adopted to overcome the present difficulty in assessing the plant of telephons, electric light and street railway companies.

The Resolution Adopted. The following resolution had been adopted at the Queen's Hotel by the deputation before it waited upon the Government:

"That in the opinion of this meeting the allowances for depreciation in value of street railways, telephons, electric light and power, water, gas, telegraph and other such companies should be assessed as real estate, in part of a going concern and that the basis of value thereof should be the same as any real estate owned by a private owner of such companies mentioned in the preceding resolution."

The personal property of all such companies mentioned in the preceding resolution should be assessed on the basis of the same as personal property of private individuals.

Corporations should be assessed. City Solicitor Macleod, Hamilton; Mr. Meredith, London; Dr. Ryan, Kingston; Mr. Pratt, Ottawa; Messrs. Fullerton and White, Toronto; and Mayor Johnson, Belleville, all spoke to the resolution, urging that there was no reason why corporations should not be assessed on the same basis as a private individual or a partnership.

In answer to questions by Hon. Mr. Gibson, as to a method of arriving at a basis of valuation for assessment purposes proposed by the deputation, several speakers explained that the value would be estimated on the basis of the original cost, making a due allowance for depreciation in value, and Mr. Fullerton and others replied that such was not the intention, but that the value to be assessed should be the value of the business in which their owners were engaged—really as part of a going concern.

The Companies' View. Hon. Mr. Gibson said the companies would likely advance an argument that the assessment of plant was how greatly in excess of what had been contemplated when they had entered into their agreements with the municipalities. At the time they made such agreements this taxation was not anticipated.

As far as Toronto was concerned, Mr. Fullerton said that, with the exception of a clause providing that the mayor of each of the municipalities should have the right to refer to taxation, he pointed out that no municipal council had ever taken any action without special legislation.

The subject on which he lectures next Saturday, "Some Types of Rural Life in Canada," is one which should prove intensely interesting, not only to those who are interested in Canadian literature, and in our fellow-citizens of Quebec.

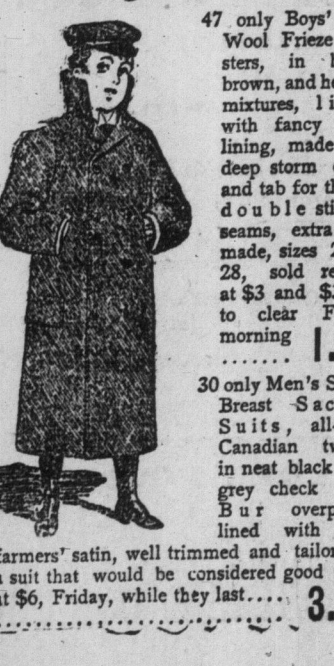
