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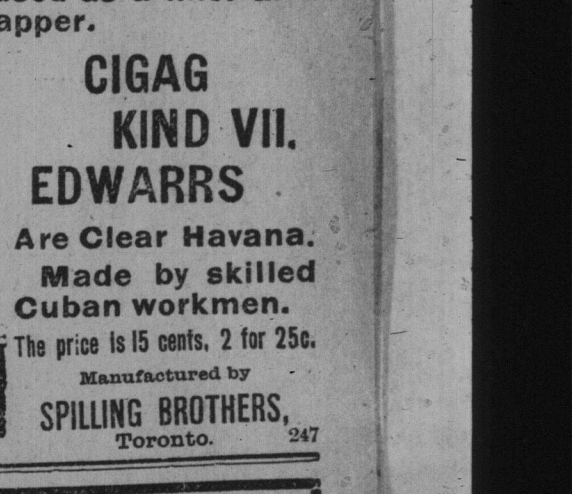

RAISE IN FREIGHT RATES.

From Montreal comes the news that the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk Railways are jointly preparing to advance their rates of transportation. 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INSURANCE COMPANY REVERSED

Judicial Committee of Privy Council Reverses the Decisions of Quebec Courts.

JUDGMENT GIVEN FOR THE BANK

Echo of the John Eaton Fire—Policy Sued on Was \$2500.

London, Nov. 19.—(Telegram cable.)—Judgment has been given by the Privy Council, allowing the appeal of the Bank of Toronto against the judgment of the Supreme Court of Quebec, which was in favor of the St. Lawrence Fire Insurance Company.

This was one of the many cases which arose out of the John Eaton fire. The St. Lawrence Co. did not join in the other insurance companies in the defence made in Ontario, and the bank was compelled to sue them in Quebec. Under the laws of that Province, their defence differed considerably from that raised by the companies in Ontario. But the Quebec decisions the Privy Council now reverse. The amount of the policy sued on was \$2500.

WOMEN'S RESIDENCE NEEDED.

Annual Meeting of Association That is Dealing With Idea.

The annual meeting of the Women's University College Residence Association was held on Wednesday afternoon, with Miss Hamilton, the president, in the chair. Various reports were presented, showing what had been done during the year. The treasurer's report stated there was a balance on hand of \$1010, and during the discussion upon it, the needs of a woman's residence were strongly urged, as was evidenced by the fact that the greater majority of the women students, who attended Varsity, were from outside places. Nothing definite, however, could be decided in connection with the matter, owing to the lack of funds. It was agreed that before adequate accommodation could be provided, the association should have on hand at least \$25,000 before undertaking anything. The following officers were elected: Hon. president, Mrs. Louden; president, Miss Hamilton; vice-president, Mrs. W. H. Cameron; secretary, Mrs. F. H. Sauter; treasurer, Mrs. F. H. Sauter; Miss Wright, Miss Charlotte Ross.

MOLINEUX WRITING A BOOK.

New York, Nov. 19.—A story of prison life from the view point of a man sentenced to death will be put upon the market shortly by the writer, according to a report from the New York Times. The author is a man who has spent a year in the penitentiary, and his book is expected to be published in the next few days. The book is expected to be a valuable contribution to the study of prison life, and to suggest reforms in the treatment of prisoners.

SEND BRITISHERS HERE.

President of Royal Statistical Society Sends a Sensible Note.

London, Nov. 19.—Major Craigie, President of the Royal Statistical Society, speaking last night, urged that, in view of the problems before the British Empire, it is necessary to send more Britishers to the United States to study the methods of the Americans in the various branches of industry and commerce.

REBATE ON FOREIGN WHEAT.

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—The British Consul at the City of Mexico has notified the Department of Trade and Commerce that, in order to obviate the damage that may arise from the present scarcity of wheat, a temporary rebate on foreign wheat, entering Mexico, is granted until March 31, 1903. The former duty was \$2 per 100 kilos. The temporary rate will be 50 cents.

RUSSIANS SEIZE SEALERS.

Two Japanese Vessels Taken for Being Within Proscribed Limits.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 19.—Sealers who have arrived here by the Japanese schooner Seifu Maru tell of the seizure of the Japanese schooner, the Maru, at a village south of Vladivostok, at which she called for water. Boats with armed Russians put off from shore to seize the sealer, and the Japanese captain first fled, but was captured and taken to the schooner, which was then used for sealing guns. Three Japanese crew members were killed, and the schooner was seized. The other members of the crew were sent to Vladivostok. At last advice, the sealer was still in the Russian prison. News was brought that an unknown Japanese schooner had been sunk after being seized by the Russian cruiser Yakuhtai, in June last, off the Copper River. According to reports which reached Hokkaido, the schooner was used for being within the limits of the Japanese sealers' territory, and the Yakuhtai turned her guns on the schooner and sank her.

AFIER FOUR AND A HALF DAYS.

Examination and Cross-Examination of Mitchell Ended.

Scranton, Pa., Nov. 19.—President Mitchell was cross-examined again to-day since his coal strike commission. Judge Gray suggested that Mr. Mitchell be not asked to give his opinion of matters of which he had no personal knowledge. Mr. Mitchell did not favor an organization for the hard coal miners, but in any event they are to go into the coal strike commission. Mr. Mitchell declared with emphasis in the course of subsequent examination that the miners will carry out the decision of the commission to the letter "or go out of our union."

LIFE SAVING SERVICE.

Report of U.S. Superintendent Shows Forty-Four Lives Lost.

Washington, Nov. 19.—The general superintendent of the Life-Saving Service has rendered his report for the year 1902. It shows most gratifying results. The number of lives lost during the year was 44, the number of boats lost 100, yet the number of lives lost from documented vessels—those of tons burden or over—was only 19, while six were lost from smaller craft, sailboats, rowboats, etc., making a total of 25, a number far below the average.

The amount of property imperilled was greatly in excess of that of any previous year in the history of the service, owing to the unusual number of vessels involved. No less than 54 vessels of over 1000 tons burden were imperilled, and the loss of property, however, was comparatively light.

The number of boats lost was 100, and the value of the property imperilled was \$9,233,830, and that of the cargoes \$5,131,380, making a total of \$14,365,210. Of this amount, \$12,123,226 was saved, and \$2,241,984 lost.

In addition to the foregoing, there were 361 casualties to undocumented vessels, of which 179 were lost, and 182 were saved. The number of persons killed was 70, and the number of property imperilled was \$1,474,120, of which \$167,575 were saved, and \$1,306,545 lost.

MATOS VERSUS CASTRO

Former Said to Be Trying to Get Colombian Government's Aid.

Wilmetts, Ind., Curacao, Nov. 19.—President Castro of Venezuela is negotiating with operations to prevent the revolutionists in that republic from recovering from the effect of his dissensions and the flight of General Matos. One of the objects of the president's policy is to attempt to induce the Colombian government, which is markedly unfriendly to the revolutionists, to send arms and ammunition to his men.
