

TORONTO LABOR COUNCIL DEMANDS CITY MEMBERS

Unanimous Action Approving Maclean Resolutions in House of Commons.

The Toronto District Labor Council at its meeting on Thursday night strongly condemned the action of the Toronto members of the Dominion parliament in refusing support to the resolutions of W. F. Maclean, M.P., in the Dominion house in favor of the proposed competitive telephone in railway stations, and the placing of express companies under the jurisdiction of the railway committee.

The legislative committee presented its report to the council, stating that it was asked to consider the action of the Toronto M.P.'s in failing to support Mr. Maclean's threefold proposal in the Dominion parliament, asking for a reduction in railway fares; support to the proposed competitive telephone in railway stations; and the placing of express companies under the jurisdiction of the railway committee.

On this matter the report says: "As regards the action of the Toronto members of the Dominion parliament, the committee believes that this council looks upon GOVERNMENT OWNED TELEPHONE AS ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT OF MODERN REFORMS IN THE INTEREST OF THE PEOPLE, AND THAT THE ACTION OF MR. MACLEAN IN SEEKING TO STRENGTHEN GOVERNMENT OWNED TELEPHONE OPERATING PUBLIC UTILITIES, WAS A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION."

The report deals with several other subjects, but upon the three paragraphs dealing with the Maclean resolutions the council was unanimous.

MANY FOREIGN MISSIONS RECONCILE US TO TARIFF

Immense Sums Invested in Canadian Factories Split People on Reciprocity.

John M. Barry, special correspondent of The Chicago Tribune, writes from Montreal as follows:

From Montreal, the busiest, the most populous, and in every way the most important city in the Dominion of Canada, it is well to write a letter bearing closely upon the fact that the tariff wall between the United States and Canada is the corner stone of the recent growth, expansion, and prosperity of manufacturing industries in this part of the country.

In seven years more than \$20,000,000 of American money has been invested in Montreal factories. In an equal sum of Canadian money has been put into enterprises which originated in the United States, but which have been brought hither and installed for the original and final purpose of retaining the Canadian market by evading the tariff.

Keen for Quebec, Montreal especially, is keen for the inclusion of foreign capital. Nothing has done better here than this desire that the Canadian port only on articles of Canadian manufacture. In this seven years a total of nearly \$100,000,000 has been invested in manufacturing businesses here, and this province and its tributary territory is no longer dependent upon or subservient to American factories in the lines included.

In Montreal, if anywhere in Canada, you will find that the Dominion manufacturer is pleased with the tariff obstruction that the public dislikes. One-half the factories of this great city of half a million population are of American origin, enriched chiefly by American money, and devoted to nothing but the "main chance."

The Canadian capital industries are innocent of all settlement. American methods, American methods, American methods are used here to the end that Montreal factories here has an advantage in tariff conditions that no other city can boast of.

England, in spite of the preferential discount, is at a disadvantage as compared

with the local factor. For the British factory exporting to Canada is not exempt while the American-Canadian rival, operating here so as to evade the tariff, has the "cut" both in resident labor and in continuity to the vast market at stake.

Be it said that Montreal is the woolen and cotton manufacturing centre of the Dominion. It buys all of its raw material from the United States, for raw material is free of import in these lines, and the woolen business here is a case in point. True, there is almost no limit to the money I make if I choose to "keep the home" market, but the Canadian tariff and the long water haul from Liverpool, Glasgow and London leave the advantages wholly with the local wools of Montreal, contingencies, and wools of material.

Are Doing Well Enough.

Now, you go to the Montreal manufacturer and ask him what sort of international arrangement he wants and he will tell you that he is doing well enough. Thank you. The chances are nine to ten that you will find an American superintendent, an American manager, or an American proprietor in the factories of Montreal. If you go into the factory, itself, you will find a preponderance of skilled laborers from the United States. Here you are money, brains, labor—all imported. The American manufacturer is not only free of import in these lines, and the woolen business here is a case in point. True, there is almost no limit to the money I make if I choose to "keep the home" market, but the Canadian tariff and the long water haul from Liverpool, Glasgow and London leave the advantages wholly with the local wools of Montreal, contingencies, and wools of material.

Reconciled to Their Tariff.

It is here and now, say judiciously, that the United States and Canada are reconciled to their tariff. The American manufacturer who comes here to do so by apparently innumerable trade relations, becomes at once a friend of the manufacturer who has established a "Canadian branch."

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Not All Friendly to Embarco.

Here, in this part of the situation, the manufacturer is not only free of import in these lines, and the woolen business here is a case in point. True, there is almost no limit to the money I make if I choose to "keep the home" market, but the Canadian tariff and the long water haul from Liverpool, Glasgow and London leave the advantages wholly with the local wools of Montreal, contingencies, and wools of material.

Not Friendly to Reciprocity.
