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# DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.

The Twenty-third Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society—which was postponed in consequence of stormy weather—was held on Wednesday evening, the 13th Feb. 1867, in St. Paul's schoolroom, and was well attended. Proceedings commenced at 7½ o'clock; His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, Patron of the Society, presiding. After singing a hymn, the appointed prayers were offered up by the Rector of Charlottetown. His Excellency then addressed the meeting to the following effect:—

### Ladies and Gentlemen;

I am very glad to have another opportunity of meeting you here, and still more so to find that the Committee are able to lay before us a very satisfactory report of our Church for the past year. There is generally so much matter for discussion, and we are usually so much hurried towards the end of our meeting, that I do not intend to claim your attention for many moments. Referring to some remarks, which will be shortly brought to your notice in the Report for the year, concerning the late legal decisions in England, and their bearing on the relation between the Mother Church and that of the Colony, I would point out to you what grounds for thankfulness we have, that, whatever legal distinctions there may be, nothing can ever deprive our Church of that bond of union she inherits, through the Apostles. from the Divine authority of the Lord himself.

It was a matter of gratification to me, as well as, I trust, to all I address, to receive the Bishop among us last summer. I rejoice to think that he was favorably impressed with the progress made in this portion of his Diocese, and I hope that his efforts amongst us will not have been without beneficial results. I am glad to have this public opportunity of expressing the sympathy I felt for the Bishop in the annoyances to which he was recently subjected.

In conclusion, I would venture to impress upon you that, as members of the Church, it is our duty, individually, to spread to the utmost her principles, and attach her adherents to her; it is our duty to exhibit great toleration for the different shades of opinion existing in the Church, marking what is good rather than what we disapprove in them; and it is particularly our duty to exercise great liberality in our contributions to church purposes. I am far from ignoring the extent to which this liberality now exists, but I would urge you not to rest content merely with what you have done, but to give still more largely from the stores of which God has constituted you the stewards.

The Secretary, Rev. D. B. Parnther, then read the Report for the past year; and a statement of the finances was made by "the Treasurer.

The following Resolutions were then passed unanimously, having been ably moved and seconded. Some of the speakers alluded to the union of Church and State which exists in the mother country, and expressed the opinion that this union has hitherto been a great hindrance to her perfect usefulness, and that their separation would, instead of being prejudicial to her interests, be one of the greatest blessings which could be conferred upon her, and through her, upon the people of England:

Moved by the Archdeacon, and seconded by the Hon. Joseph Hensley:

"That the Report now read be adopted, and printed under the direction of the Committee." Moved by Rev. D. FitzGerald, and seconded by Charles Palmer, Esq.—

"That this meeting gratefully acknowledges God's mercies to this Island during the past year in preserving us from the many visitations which have befallen other countries, and in the gift of an abundant harvest."

Moved by the Rev. Theophilus Richey, and seconded by Henry Haszard, Esq:

"That the long-continued fostering care of the Society for the propagation of the Gospel, and the Colonial and Continental Church Society, calls for the expression of our gratitude."

Moved by Rev. J. W. Forsythe, and seconded by E. J. Hodgson, Esq.—

"That the present position of the Colonial Church, and the results which may arise therefrom, require the serious and prayerful consideration of all her members."

Moved by Mr. George Peake, and seconded by F. W. Hales, Esq.—

"That the thanks of this meeting are due to the collectors for their efficient aid in furthering the objects of this Society, and that the Secretaries be re-appointed, and the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee for the ensuing year.\*

A collection was then taken up in aid of the funds. The Archdeacon, on behalf of the meeting, thanked his Excellency for his presence and able conduct in the chair, when a hymn was sung, and the meeting dismissed with the customary benediction.

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# REPORT.

At no period since the formation of this Society does the Committee appointed to prepare the Annual Report, present it under circumstances so novel and so important as those with which the Church has been characterized during the year 1866.

Attached to the Mother Church of England, not from sentiment only, but from the conviction that she is a branch of that Society organized by the Lord himself to be his Truth, and the instrument of its dissemination throughout the world, the Committee cannot adequately express their feelings when it was announced, on authority, that the Church in the Colonies was separated from that of England, and that however painful the thought may be, we must be prepared for that separation, on the now declared principle, that "there is no Church of England out of England."

The Church in these Provinces, it is now asserted, is a "voluntary association," in no better and no worse position than that of those denominations by which she is surrounded. These words, however, do not mean that because the members of such a church constitute a voluntary association, that they may adopt any doctrines and ordinances they please, and yet remain members of the Church of England. All that really is meant by these words is, that where there is no State Religion established by the Legislature in any Colony, and in such a Colony is found a number of persons who are members of the Church of England, and who establish a church there, with the doctrines, rites and ordinances of the Church of England,

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it is a part of the Church of England, and the members of it are, by implied agreement, bound by all its laws. Such is the judgment pronounced by the highest legal authority at home; and thus it is to be feared that some of those ties that have so long bound us to our venerable mother, are dissolved, and all that is now left us is the cherished memory of her maternal regard. The Committee, however, entertain the hope that the decision arrived at will be ultimately modified, and that this system of exclusiveness will not be fully and finally confirmed. A meeting of all the Anglican Bishops may be held next year, (D. V.) under the presidency of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Committee trust that in their united wisdom they will devise such means as shall conduce to a more satisfactory state of things than that of an entire and final separation.

Since then, it is decided that the Church in the Colonies is to be a separate and independent society, without appeal to England, or her ecclesiastical law, it follows that we must have some form of government for ourselves—some legislative authority by which our laws, our rules, are to be enacted, and some Executive by which they may be enforced; and the only question which remains, under existing circumstances, is, whether the Church in this Island will elect to be governed solely and irresponsibly by the Bishop of Nova Scotia (from whose judgment and decision in that case there would be no appeal), or by a Diocesan Synod, consisting of the Bishop (as its President ex officio), the Clergy, and two lay delegates, chosen from each parish in the Island; and we believe that we echo the sentiments of the Bishop himself, in saying that the latter mode would have his preference and approval.

On the 30th July, the Bishop made his triennial visitation to this Island. On the 1st August, Divine service was held at St. Paul's, at which all the Clergy, and with a few exceptions, the lay delegates from the different parishes, were present. The charge was delivered, and in the afternoon the Bishop addressing the clergy, lay delegates and other members of the

church, entered fully into the all-important subject to which reference has been made; confirmed the interpretation we had placed on the judgment of the Privy Council, viz:—that as "the United Church of England and Ireland is not a part of the constitution in any colonial settlement, nor can its authorities, or those who bear office in it, claim to be recognized by the law of the colony, otherwise than as the members of a voluntary association," the Church in the Colonies has full liberty to govern itself and manage its own affairs.

An adjourned meeting was held on the 2d, at the Masonic Hall, when several Resolutions were passed.

The first that this Island (though under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of Nova Scotia) is, and shall continue a separate and distinct Diocese. The second, recognizing the necessity of some such church assembly as a Synod, and recommending that steps be taken by the several parishes to bring the matter to a speedy issue. The third, that each congregation do send one delegate (except Charlottetown, which shall send three) to meet the Bishop and report the opinions of the people respecting the Synod, at a meeting to be convened by his Lordship; and we may also add that the meeting adopted the new forms of subscription as authorized by the revised canons (36, 37, 38) of the Church of England.

On Sunday the Bishop administered the rite of confirmation at the parish church; after which he addressed a few remarks to the congregation, and expressed his satisfaction at the progress he had observed since his last visit.

Among other-subjects which are of interest to the society, the extension of our church accommodation is not the least. Its necessity has been for some time apparent. Three propositions have been made and considered: the first to erect a new and spacious Church, of such proportions and of such an architectural character as would justly represent the Church in Charlottetown: the second, to enlarge the present structure, so as to supply the present want; and the third, to build a new

Church in another part of our town. These several propositions have been considered, but it was not until the meeting of 17th Aug., presided over by the Bishop, that it was finally resolved that the third proposition was the one best adapted to the end. Nor must we omit to mention, among the signs of progress, by which the past year has been marked, the enlargement and manifest improvement of the Room in which we are assembled here. The old one had been found far too small to accommodate our increasing Sunday School, and hence it was that a generous and persistent spirit among us resolved that the room must be enlarged, and sympathised with and aided by another of a kindred mind, their efforts are realized in the comfortable and convenient Room in which we are assembled. Subscriptions in furtherance of this object are now being made.

On the 28th of August, the Bishop held an ordination in St. Thomas's Church, New London, when the Rev. J. A. Richey was admitted to the order of Priesthood.

During his visitation of the Island, the Bishop delivered his charge to the clergy; presided over a meeting of the clergy and lay delegates, and also at a church meeting in Charlottetown; admitted 179 persons into full communion; delivered thirteen addresses to the confirmed and to the several congregations; preached twenty-one sermons; consecrated three churches and a burial ground, and admitted a Deacon to the order of Priesthood.

The departure of the Rev. R. T. Roach from Georgetown, for the more genial climate of the Delaware, and of the Rev. J. A. Richey for a station in another portion of the Diocese, had caused a vacancy in two of our missions.

The Committee would express their cordial sympathy with the late Missionary at Georgetown for the cause which induced him to quit, after twelve years of faithful and laborious services, the sphere in which he had been located. The parishoners generally have felt their loss, if we may judge from the terms of an address presented to him on the morning of hise departure, breathing as it did, sentiments of gratitude and attachment. The Committee will ever thankfully hear of his renewed health, and sincerely trust that he will be eminently blessed and prospered in the new field of duty to which he has in Providence been called. Georgetown, the Committee are glad to say, is occupied by the Rev. Theo. Richey, who assumed the duties of the Mission in October last.

The Mission of New London remains unoccupied. A gentleman made some enquiries in reference to it, and a correspondence ensued between the Corresponding Committee and him, but he finally decided on remaining for the present in the sphere he occupies.

The sales of the last year at the Bible and Prayer Book Depository, bear no comparison with that of the eighteen preceding months, being—Bibles, 11; Prayer Books, 96; Church Services, 7; Collects, 27; Hymns, 18; making a total of 159, against 792, the number previously disposed of. This, however, may be accounted for on the supposition that the different missions are supplied sufficiently for the present. The stock remaining on hand, and any additional Books that may be imported will consequently meet with a comparatively limited sale. We now turn to the Reports of the Parishes

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### CHARLOTTETOWN.

The Ministers of the Parish report, that during the past year there have been 43 baptisms, 21 marriages, 32 burials, the usual number of Divine services (with the exception of Friday evening prayer meetings, discontinued for six months owing to the unfinished state of the School Room), and pastoral and other visits 1200 to 1400.

The general Library has had an addition of 53 volumes, making the number on the shelves amount to 1524. The Sun-

\* day School has had an increase of scholars, for whose accommodation the School Room has been considerably enlarged and improved at an outlay of £340, a large portion of which is still due. Reward Books, to the number of 149 have been distributed to the diligent and attentive.

The many meetings held during the year, for the purpose of providing sufficient church accommodation for our people have resulted in the proposed erection of a second Church in another part of the City, which will cost about £1500, subscriptions to the required amount being already entered into.

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There has been much sickness during the year; the Church has lost some valuable members, among whom we may notice Hon. R. Hutchinson, who, for many years, efficiently and zealously discharged the important duties of Churchwarden.

The attendance on the means of grace has not fallen off, nor the contributions for religious and church purposes.

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### MILTON.

The Archdeacon is thankful to be able to state, that the prospects of the Church at Milton, Rustico, and North Wiltshire, are most encouraging. The congregations are large, regular, and attentive; the Sunday School keeps up its number of scholars; the communicants have increased more than fourfold, and whilst the people have contributed liberally to the improvement of the Church Edifice, and other religious objects, he has continued to receive proofs of their kind attention and good will.

The events in the year that deserve particular notice, are the Bishop's visit to Milton, and the restoration and improvement of the church. The whole of the exterior has been shingled and painted; a tower and spire built, the base of which forms a commodious Porch; all the windows are Gothic and new; a chancel and vestry have been added and buttresses built to the tower, nave and chancel, giving the entire edifice the appearance of a new Building, which may compare favorably with most of our country churches. The cost of the alterations and repairs, amounting to about £200, has been assumed by the parishoners, who have been substantially assisted in the good work by our kind friends in Charlottetown, whose generous aid deserves his best and sincerest thanks.

The Bishop held a confirmation here in August, when fiftysix persons were confirmed in the Christian faith. The sight was indeed cheering; every part of the church was densely crowded, and it was supposed that not more than one-half of the persons congregated could get admission. The occasion presented a marked contrast to the previous Episcopal visit, when there was not one candidate for the ancient Apostolic rite of confirmation.

It is also gratifying to remark that there was not one parish in the Island in which the Bishop did not observe some im-

provement. May our beloved Church be more abundantly prospered of God, both temporally and spiritually; may ministers and people be imbued with the spirit of faith, hope and love for the Redeemer's sake.

# SAINT ELEANOR'S AND SUMMERSIDE.

The Rector of Saint Eleanor's reports that in dependence upon God's help, he has been endeavouring, during the past year, to carry on as diligently as possible the blessed work in which he has been privileged to take part. On almost all the Sundays of the year there have been three full services, which have been very well attended. Four Sunday Schools have been in operation, which have been the means of communicating religious instruction, more or less regularly, to some one hundred and fifty, or two hundred children; and most week days throughout the year have been spent by him in visiting, from house to house, the whole as well as the sick, his endeavor on each occasion, being, to engage the family visited in conversation on some religious subject, and to bring before them, so far as may be done, those things which concern our peace.

The number of those who have been communicants has been considerably increased, and he has good reason to hope

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that many of these and more especially of those who were confirmed during the year, have truly given their hearts to God. The utmost pains have also been taken to make the Sunday Schools in the Mission more efficient. A hundred of the children, with their friends, were entertained at a Sunday School festival during the summer. St. Eleanor's Sunday School has been superintended by himself, on Sunday mornings; while for the St. Eleanor's and Summerside Sunday Schools excellent and expensive Libraries of religious Books have been provided. He has also much pleasure in testifying to the continued energy and zeal of the St. Eleanor's and Summerside Ladies, by whom the funds for many useful purposes of this kind have been happily supplied.

The parsonage house is gradually becoming more habitable. He believes the parishoners intend to finish it next summer.

### CRAPAUD.

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Rev. Mr. Sterns reports that during the past year an effort was made to have the Church painted, and the sum of £12 10s. was subscribed by the congregation for this purpose. In addition to this, £5 stg. was forwarded by Lady G. Fane to her Agent in aid of this undertaking, but owing to various difficulties the work has been deferred until next spring. It is also contemplated to have the church at Springfield painted during the ensuing summer.

The services throughout the year have, with few exceptions, been held as usual, and in both churches the congregations have continued to attend regularly. The Sunday Schools at Crapaud and Springfield have also been well attended—the average number of scholars in each being twenty-five.

The visit of our beloved Bishop was highly appreciated by the entire congregation, and we trust that his Godly counsel and earnest exhortation will leave a lasting impression for good. On that occasion, the rite of confirmation was administered to eight at Crapaud, and three at Springfield.

### CASCUMPEC.

The Rev. Mr. Dyer says: Although I have not much to communicate in reference to my mission, yet I trust my Heavenly Master has been pleased to vouchsafe to me his merciful aid, and has enabled me to prosecute my duties during the past year. Divine service has been regularly performed in

Cascampec on every alternate Sunday. The congregation has gradually increased, and occasionally has been too large to find accommodation in the pews. On the Bishop's visitation in August last, the people willingly assembled for Divine Service, which was held on Thursday evening. After prayers, the Bishop addressed the candidates for confirmation, and then confirmed those who were presented for that rite. The Grave Yard was also consecrated: this was a novel sight, being the first ever witnessed at Cascumpec. His Lordship expressed his satisfaction with the Church and Yard—the former being neatly built; since then we have finished both the tower and spire, and underpinned the whole, and we purpose next summer to complete the inside.

The Sunday School at Cascumpec has been regularly attended. The Teachers have been greatly encouraged in their work by the steady progress of the children who have been rewarded with Bibles and other books, for their good behaviour and attendance.

The neat little Church at the Capes, was consecrated during the Bishop's visit in August. He was pleased to express his entire satisfaction at the very neat and becoming style in which this church was finished, and also at the fact that no debt whatever remains upon the building. There is a well conducted Sunday School at the Capes.

The services at Tignish have been encouragingly attended with the promise of future prosperity and blessing. In the Temperance Hall, where I preach once a month, the congregation, consisting of members of different denominations, has been pretty regular and attentive; and at the French Village station, though the congregation is similar to the last, the services are fairly attended.

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At Hill's River station, the same aspect presents itself, and I am pleased to add that a manifest change is apparent in the lives and conversation of some who attend the service at this on has place. I still continue my monthly meetings at Township No. rge to 3, (the Western Road Lot,) and thus afford to many the means tation of grace, which, if discontinued they would be deprived of ale Ser- together. At Lower Kildare, my Tuesday evening Lecture is exceedingly encouraging, and is, I am fully persuaded, attended then with many blessings.

In conclusion—I have every hope that a good work is going on through the mission, and earnestly pray that grace may be given me to declare the whole counsel of God to the salvation of many souls.

# SOUTHPORT AND CHERRY VALLEY,

The Rev. Mr. Stewart informs the Society that by the assistance of a kind Providence he has been enabled to fulfil all his engagements (with one exception) during the past year -that there is little of an interesting character to be reported of the work of the mission, but he trusts that sound doctrine has been preached, which has not failed to leave good impressions upon the minds of all who attend our places of public worship. That during the past year our congregations have been larger than in any previous one. The whole of the Church Yard was fenced in last summer, and was consecrated by the Bishop at his visit. A Bell has been purchased which cost upwards of £20. The Church has been opened for Divine Service, with few exceptions, every Sunday during the past year. For this regularity I am indebted to the kind assistance of Charles Desbrisay, Esq., who, in my absence, has conducted

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the services of the Church in this place. The clergy of Charlottetown have also favored us with a few services. The congregations at Cherry Valley were good during the summer season. A service has been held at the Barrens every third Sunday, and a few at Mount Stewart. We are progressing in raising funds to build a Parsonage in this Mission. Major Picton beete has granted a piece of Land, in a very eligible situation for that purpose, and Mr. Stewart is asking the Society to make a grant of £18 for that object, on the condition that this Mission raises £8, being double the amount annually subscribed to the Society.

# TO CONCLUDE.

True it is, we are not an integral part of that Church, as we supposed ourselves to be, but that legal decision cannot affect the real oneness which exists between any branch of the Catholic Church. Equally with her, the hallowed associations of the past are ours, and ours too with her are the bright hopes of a still more glorious future. If we then value the privilege of this connection, let us show ourselves worthy of it, by endeavouring to establish the Church in this Island upon a more extensive basis, and by strengthening in every way the hands of those whom God has called to minister at her altars.


