

BREAKING THE STRIKE WOULDN'T LET DEVLIN SPEAK

Serious Turn to the Labor Trouble in Chicago

Chicago, May 1.—Conditions in the laborers' strike were worse today than at any preceding time. The strikers were in a more open and violent and the attacks on non-union men more frequent and daring than at any time since the beginning of the strike.

The chief cause for the increased bitterness on the part of the strikers and the reason for the more open and violent attacks on non-union men more frequent and daring than at any time since the beginning of the strike.

Tomorrow an every wagon of the Employers' Teaming Association will be carried in open view. During the last week there has been much complaint on the part of strike sympathizers of the (pseudonym) which non-union men, particularly those who have used violence.

A number of strike leaders have been arrested on a charge of carrying concealed weapons and today the attorney of the Employers' Teaming Association called on Chief of Police O'Neill and asked if their men had not the right to carry weapons provided they were held in open view.

More than 1,400 rifles were purchased today and during the latter part of the afternoon a number of weapons were carried through the streets with a rifle lying across the knees of the driver and his assistant.

When Mayor Dunne was informed that rifles would be carried by non-union men, he declared that the police would not be permitted to authorize the carrying of arms by anyone whether in the employ of the Employers' Teaming Association or affiliated with the strikers.

There is no law against the carrying of weapons in the open, the chief declared. "If the men keep the weapons in full view the police cannot interfere. There is a law against shooting within the city limits, and also a law against brandishing a weapon in a threatening manner and both of these laws will be strictly enforced."

Five men were seriously hurt during the fight.

THE OLD CITY COUNCIL

Held Its Last Meeting Yesterday—Various Matters Considered—Communications Sent to the Different Boards.

At the monthly meeting of the common council yesterday afternoon, the recommendations of the various boards were with a few exceptions adopted. A communication from the director of public works asking for \$500 a year increase was received. The returning officers asked for additional fees, but were refused. Carleton electric light matters were discussed and a number of communications were dealt with. The mayor occupied the chair, and the full council was present with the exception of Ald. Robinson. The common clerk and Marshall Goughlin were in attendance.

The common clerk read his certified return of the last election and the candidates who headed the poles were declared duly elected.

The reports of the safety board and ferry committee were adopted.

The director of public works asked that his salary be increased from \$1,200 to \$1,500 a year. Referred to the treasury board.

The Carleton Electric Light Company wrote that an alderman who complained recently that a light near his home was out four nights in succession did not tell the board it was moonlight and the contract did not call for lights on moonlight nights.

Ald. Christie moved that in future the police throughout the city should make a report of any lights out to the director who will submit a monthly report to the safety board.

A letter from the Street Railway Company asked that Mr. Neilson be given a hearing with a council committee regarding the Carleton extension. Referred to the safety board.

The Carleton Electric Light Company wrote detailing the negotiations for the purchase of the property and complaining that aldermen had made public private affairs of the company given them in confidence to enable them to form an idea of the value of the property. The letter concluded with an offer of arbitration to fix the value of the property.

Ald. Christie moved the letter be filed. The purchase, he said, would be closed without the exclusive franchise and he hoped the new council would stand by their guns and not vote for it on any other terms.

Ald. Macrae said the letter of the company was before the legislature when they passed the amended bill. He was not sure that the exclusive franchise was now lost although the clause preventing interference with existing rights had been added.

The matter should be looked into, and he favored referring the letter to the safety board.

Ald. Carleton was against referring the matter, seeing the course the law had taken. He repeated an earlier franking, to have a thing in a free country.

Ald. Macrae—"How about the street car?"

Ald. Carleton, continuing, advocated sending the communication to the new council. After further discussion the letter was referred to the safety board, Ald. Christie, Holder and Carleton dissenting.

The members of the communication were referred to the various boards without comment.

The petition from polling clerks asking for increased remuneration was filed.

The treasury board was entrusted with the duty of recognizing the gallantry of John McFarlane, who saved Pilot Wm. Leiby from drowning.

The matter of placing granite curbing on Church street was referred to the board of works.
