Skeletons of Strange Type of Prehistoric Man Found in Iowa

FAIRVILLE MAN **OUTLINES SCHEME**

Suggests Elevated Crossing and Speaks of Development of Areas.

Sir,—Now that the paving of Lancaster avenue and Main street, Fairville, is under way, the matter of an elevated crossing over the C. P. R. tracks at the foot of Fairville is getting into the air again. There seems to be a feeling that if the need of an elevated roadway at the Douglas avenue crossing has been considered urgent enough to stop or tie up the paving work on a considerable stretch of the avenue for some time, or until satisfactory plans and arrangements can be made for carrying out the elevated roadway idea on the avenue crossing, owing to the ever-increasing winter port traffic, the need of an elevated roadway over the Fairville crossing, on practically the same thoroughfare, is fully more urgent.

Now, in view of the fact that traffic conditions call for more room on the bridge road, and increased railway siding accommodation for Fairville and vicinity, it occurred to the writer that since these matters are all of public interest in a general way, the present would be a most opportune To the Editor of The Times-Star:

PROMINENT MAN DIES SUNDENLY

Douglas McArthur Stricken in Garden at Son-inlaw's Home.

Stricken with paralysis while workng in the garden with his son-in-law,

Ing in the garden with his son-in-law, L. C. MacFarlane, at the latter's home, at East St. John, Douglas McArthur, prominent business man and active in the life of the city, died about 11 o'clock this morning. He had been in his usual health up until the time the stroke occurred, except for a little trouble with chronic gastritis.

Mr. McArthur, bookseller and stationer, was born in the old parish of Partland, on April 30, 1855, and he was therefore 69 years of age. He was a son of Joseph McArthur, who came here from Straban County, Ireland, He attended the superior schools here. The first entry of Mr. McArthur into commercial life was as a clerk in James Manson's dry goods store. He later entered the employ of the late W. K. Crawford, bookseller, and he purchased the business in 1881 and had conducted it up to the present time. He built up a large and successful business and on last May completed forty-three years in business life.

Always interested in the welfare of the country and city he entered the local political field in 1896 and was elected alderman-at-large and he served three years at that time. He was again elected in 1906 and served with the council for several years.

While a member of the council he

While a member of the council he was for a time chairman of the Board of Public Safety and he was a strong supporter at the time of the scheme to nationalize Canadian ports.

In politics he was a Liberal. He took a strong stand in favor of the independent party in 1896 in the matter of remedial legislation. He supported the Hon. A. G. Blair in 1900 and identified himself with the Conservative party at the by-election in which Dr. J. W. Daniel was returned. Mr. McArthur later again supported the Lib-

Mr. McArthur was a prominent figure in the fraternal orders in the city, especially in the Orange order, in which body he held, at different times, almost every office within the gift of the various branches. He was a past district master, and past county and grand master. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias and the Sons of Temperance. He was as a ceitive in the St. John Branch of the Imperial Federation League which had a branch here about 20 years ago.


