EDITORS SAY GOOD BYE TO US WITH REGRET Speak Highly of Reception in St. John

Charmed with New Brunswick and Its People - An Early Hour Jaunt to See the Reversing Falls.

The Canadian National "Million Dollar Train" bearing the National Editorial Association party, left here at 12.30 today for Fredericton over the Valley Railway, carrying the party through some of Canada's most magnificent scenery.

London, June 15.—The British are about to evacuate the Black Sea port of Batoum, according to the Daily Mail, which says the 2,000 soldiers there are to be removed to Constantinople on British warships within a fortnight.

Robinson Lumber Mill At Millerton Destroyed By Fire

Loss Estimated at About \$100,000 and More Than 100 Men Are Out of Employment.

Newcastle, N. B., June 15.—The large lumber mill owned and operated by James Robinson at Millerton, excepting the engine room, which was made of brick, was destroyed by fire early this morning.

Besides the mill about six lumber piles on the wharf were burned, but the flames were successful in keeping the lumber yards.

The loss is estimated at about \$100,000. This is the second season that this mill has been in operation. The loss will put more than 100 men out of work.

EXPECT LAPORTE TO OPPOSE THE NAVY ESTIMATES

Four Reasons for Attitude Are Given

Arrangements for Training Boys as Deck Officers on C. G. M. Vessels - Statement by Premier on Office of Librarian.

Ottawa, June 15.—Everyone expects Ernest Lapointe, member for Quebec East, to oppose the naval estimates. As his attitude will be representative of a large section of the Liberal opposition, it is interesting to note his grounds for opposition.

Your correspondent understands he has four reasons for opposing them. First, he considers the country is in no danger on either coast; second, he objects on the score of economy; third, he says the present government was not elected with a mandate to establish the naval policy of the country; and, fourth, such an important matter of policy should not be settled until Canada's status is clear and her exact relations to the empire defined.

Ottawa, June 15.—(Canadian Press)—In his naval policy statement yesterday Hon. Mr. Balfour said that arrangements had been made to train boys as deck officers on the vessels of the government merchant marine. There would be a four year period of apprenticeship. Two boys would be taken on each ship over a certain size and nine of these vessels were now ready. That would mean that eighteen boys could be apprenticed at once. They would, eventually, be placed for forty-four boys. In this way it was hoped to have Canadian personnel on the vessels of the C. G. M. as well as Canadian personnel for the Canadian navy.

The minister said that the two submarines, CC-1 and CC-2, were out of date and these were being sold by public tender as were the Nippon, Rainbow and other vessels.

Ossining, N. Y., June 15.—James Larkin, Irish labor leader, convicted of violating the New York state criminal anarchy statute, was one of a group of seventy prisoners transferred yesterday from Sing Sing prison to Clinton prison at Dannemora, N. Y. Nearly 200 prisoners have been transferred within two weeks because of the crowded conditions at Sing Sing.

MEAN TO PASS HOME RULE BILL

Government Announcement in British House - Carson Amendment Defeated.

London, June 15.—Governmental determination to pass the Irish home rule bill was expressed in a long emphatic statement to the House of Commons when discussion of the bill in the committee stage was resumed by the government. The members were warned that "any opposition of an intention to abandon the measure is quite illusory."

Some observations were made during consideration of an amendment to the measure, moved by Sir Edward Carson and designed to omit the section of the bill giving control of Irish railways to an Irish council. The amendment was defeated by a large majority.

WIRELESS MEN GO OUT ON STRIKE

Serious Situation Affecting Shipping and All Ports of World.

London, June 15.—A strike of marine wireless operators which will affect all ports and shipping was declared this morning by the Association of Wireless Telegraphists. The men are demanding an increase of approximately 180 per cent in wages over the pre-war rates and also better conditions of employment.

Under the strike order operators are instructed to cease work when their voyages end and not to sign for further trips. This is the first general strike of its kind and according to union men it may take on international dimensions. It was said that the marconi headquarters in the Strand and in the docks will be picketed by the strikers who work on shore permanently are not affected by the strike.

This plan, however, was a failure and the date of the murders were set for June 4th, according to the account received in Berlin.

DEMPESEY'S HEARD IN HIS OWN DEFENCE

San Francisco, June 15.—William Harrison (Jack) Dempsey, testifying in his trial on charges of evading the U. S. selective draft act, yesterday denied charges of non-support and cruelty made by his former wife, Mrs. Maxine Dempsey. Dempsey described himself as having been the principal support of his family from the time he was fourteen years old. He detailed experiences as a farmhand, miner, carpenter and boxer, including reverses when "the boxing was dull," and toward the end, his life as a budding champion. He said he had supported his wife until she left him in 1917. Dempsey said he never had struck his wife, and that a jaw fracture she sustained was caused by a fall. Mrs. Dempsey early in the trial alleged that her husband struck her on the jaw because "she had not earned any money for him."

Dempsey told his work as a government recruiting agent for the shipyards late in 1918, saying he "guessed he got three or four hundred men" to work in the Philadelphia yards. He said cross-examination failed to alter or confuse his testimony. The defense announced that one or two more witnesses would be called.

W. H. Stulrow, a traveling salesman of St. Paul, testified that he wrote most of the answers to Dempsey's questions at a Chicago hotel. He said he had done it in a spirit of friendship.

BIG SEIZURE OF LIQUOR MADE

Thirty-Seven Barrels and 200 Cases Captured in Madawaska.

(Special to Times)—Fredericton, June 15.—Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson announced today receipt of a carload of liquor seized at Baker Brook, Madawaska county, by Sub-inspector McLaughlin. The liquor contained in the carload was not given. It was billed as seven barrels and 200 cases. A conservative estimate of its value is upwards of \$15,000.

HIDE DEALERS HARD HIT.

(Fredericton Herald)—Dealers in hides in New Brunswick are said to be affected to an exceedingly large extent by the serious break that has occurred in the hides market. The estimate today placing the value of the present holdings of dealers in this province at not less than a million dollars.

In Fredericton alone dealers are facing losses aggregating between \$15,000 and \$20,000 as a result of the bottom falling out of the market, while they were holding large stocks for the usual favorable markets in June. Local dealers who are hit by the slump are largely Jews, who have been going about the country buying up stocks at big prices.

Cow hides are now selling at nine cents a pound, whereas a year ago they were bringing fifty cents, and calves, which a year ago were selling at twenty-six cents a pound, are now selling at six cents. 

New York, June 15—Frank de R. Storey, a lawyer, convicted of criminally receiving several thousand dollars' worth of stolen securities, was sentenced to Sing Sing Prison for two and a half to five years at hard labor.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH WAS THE VERDICT

A verdict of accidental death, caused by being struck by an automobile driven by Hazen Hamilton, and completely exonerating the driver from any blame was brought in by the jury at the inquest into John McDuffe's death, held in the court house, Fairville, last evening.

The finding was as follows: "We, the jury empaneled to inquire into the cause of death of John McDuffe, jeweler, in Fairville, find that his death was accidental and caused by being struck between 8:30 and 9 o'clock p. m. on Saturday, June 12, 1920, in Main street, Fairville, county of St. John, province of New Brunswick, by an automobile driven by Hazen Hamilton. We also find that no blame can be attached to the said Hazen Hamilton, as he was driving very slowly and on his proper side of the street and exercised all possible care in an effort to avoid the accident." The jury were: W. Nelson, foreman, William Pink, O. D. Hanson, F. Butler, Joseph Maxwell and A. W. Caron. The jury first went to Mr. McDuffe's residence, West St. John, and viewed the body.

Glarence Quinton, Manawagonish road, said he was an eye-witness of the fatality, describing the movements of the victim and making reference to the careful manner in which the car was driven. Dr. Omar Comeau, who attended the unfortunate man, told of the extent of the injuries. Samuel Tippet, customs official, said that he would not like to say that the car was traveling more than ten miles an hour. Miss Ermeline Cochran and Mrs. Ella Christopher, who were occupants of the car at the time of the accident, gave corroborative evidence. Hazen Hamilton, the driver, gave an account of the accident in detail.

ST. JOHN HARBOR AFFAIRS BEFORE PARLIAMENT

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Ottawa, June 14.—When the bill which seeks to empower the government to take over the running of the Pictou (N.S.) harbor came up for second reading in the House this afternoon, Hon. Rodolph Lemieux asked the minister of naval affairs if he had noticed a circular stating that debentures for harbor improvements at St. John were being backed by the Dominion government, and that the president of the privy council was named as minister of public works in the interim?

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne said the government had given no sanction for guaranteeing bonds. When the city of St. John had decided by referendum to allow the government to take over the port of St. John, as outlined by a bill passed last year, then the government

would get behind the finances, because the port would have become "nationalized." Mr. Ballantyne explained that when a harbor did not take in sufficient revenue to keep it in good repair, it had to be placed under government care, and the present bill was simply to allow of this being done.

The bill was reported without amendment and was given a third reading.

Apparently the circular referred to by Hon. Mr. Lemieux is one issued by brokers urging the purchase of the St. John Dry Dock and Shipbuilding first mortgage 5 1/2 per cent. serial gold bonds. This circular of course said nothing about St. John city debentures. It explained that the issue of St. John Dry Dock and Shipbuilding bonds was "simply the capitalization of the Dominion government subsidy towards this important local work."

GLACE BAY MAN IS FOUND DEAD IN BED

Sydney, N. S., June 15—Bradford H. Bill, a well-known Glace Bay business man and a native of Lockport, N. S., was found dead in bed yesterday morning. He was taken suddenly ill a few weeks ago, but after being confined to his home for a few days he was able to be up and around again, resuming his position as bookkeeper at Thompson & Sutherland's. On Sunday he took a bad turn. He is survived by his mother, three brothers and three sisters.

CANCELS HIS WAR BOND TO ENCOURAGE OTHERS

London, June 15—Britain's \$8,000,000,000 war debt is reduced by \$680,000 as a result of an anonymous contribution by a taxpayer who conceals his identity under the initials "A. M."


In cancelling war bonds for that amount the donor announced his wish to "encourage others to emulate his patriotic example."

action would appropriately be taken in the matter.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition, joined with the prime minister in his attitude. He expressed the greatest hope that the despatch was incorrect.

Speaker Rhodes said that the despatch certainly called for some action, and he would take into consideration what would be the best course to pursue. Such remarks would have the tendency to sap and undermine the position of parliament.

Jacques Bureau of Three Rivers, remarked that in his view such a slanderous lie had best be ignored. It would be honoring the man who made it too much if he were called to answer before the bar of the House.

Dr. Speer's Reply.

"Toronto, June 15.—"There was nothing in my statement that would cast a shadow of reflection upon the integrity and honor of any member of parliament," said Rev. Dr. Speer. "I have made this plain to Speaker Rhodes in a wire that I sent him last night. My remarks were made in reply to a man on the platform who berated the Methodist church for not having sent letters to members of parliament in respect to race track gambling.

"I replied that letters were of no use whatever, as it was a foregone conclusion that after the war some legislation would be enacted in respect to this matter. I further stated that the Methodist church had no money to spend to send or keep deputations to Ottawa. My use of the term 'lobby' was not used in a way to cast reproach upon the honesty of any member of parliament, but was used to convey an impression that the race track people had money for lobbying, if necessary."

BARON FORSTER NAMED GOVERNOR OF AUSTRALIA

London, June 15.—Baron Forster has been appointed governor-general of Australia. He succeeds Sir Donald C. Munro-Ferguson.

HENRY WILLIAM FORSTER WAS CREATED BARON FORSTER IN 1910

He was financial secretary to the war office in 1915-16.

BROTHER OF KING OF SIAM DIES OF PNEUMONIA

London, June 15.—Prince Chao, Phra Prachin, brother of the King of Siam and heir presumptive to the throne, died yesterday in Singapore. His death was due to pneumonia.



FEDERAL HELP IN THE COMBAT WITH DISEASE

Order for Grants for Provincial Venereal Clinics To Distribute \$200,000 — Population the Basis, and Payment to Be Made in Two Instalments.

Ottawa, June 15.—The federal government through the department of health, plans to take an active part in a Dominion-wide campaign against venereal disease. To this end an order-in-council has been passed, which was tabled in the Commons today by Hon. S. W. Rowell, minister presiding over the department of health, providing for the distribution of \$200,000 among the nine provinces, to assist them in combating venereal disease. The grants are to be made on a basis of population, and in two payments. The first of these will be made when the province has given assurance that it will spend an equal amount in

the fight and submitted an outline of its plans of campaign. The provincial departments of health must also sign agreements which will provide for the establishment of approved clinics, under the care of specialists with assistants, hospital beds with free treatment, diagnostic laboratories and efficient inspection and treatment of patients in jails and other public institutions. The second payment is to be made six months after the federal department of health is satisfied with the vigor being shown in carrying out the campaign.


