Powerful Sermons to The Young Men and the Married Men Last

With the married men assembled at a special service in the main body of the church, and the single men meeting in the chapel down-stairs, St. Peter's church was again crowded to the doors hast evening and two powerful sermons were delivered, one by Rev. Father Hogan, C. SS. R., to the married men, and the other by Rev. Father Scully, C. SS. R., to the single men. 




